


Though I've only been Executive Director of Eagle Condor Humanitarian since September of 2015, it feels like an entire year of work has been accomplished in four months!

One of the most critical contributors to our success is the incredible in-country staff that does so much. Stakeholders of Eagle Condor Humanitarian have known for years how invaluable our staff and volunteers have been.

This year, I want to highlight our in-country personnel and extend a deep and sincere "thank you" to them—to whom we dedicate this year's annual report.

The in-country staff targeted their efforts in such a way as to leverage the time and talents of others; without them, the following couldn't have been possible:

- <u>Children Programs</u>. Over 300 children received educational and a much-needed balanced meal each day—accomplished through the investment of 4,890 hours from our in-country personnel!
- <u>Self- Reliance Business Workshops.</u> Over 280 families graduated, each with 18 hours of training that were provided in 5 different communities—accomplished through the investment of 6,448 hours from in-country personnel!



- <u>Expeditions (Non-Surgical)</u>. 151 individuals that contributed 3,632 hours of labor into humanitarian expeditions, or a value of \$83,790.
- Expeditions (Surgical). 22 professionals donated over 1,589 pre-op/surgical hours for 32 operations (12 serious deformity/scoliosis cases), or a value of \$36,658. The costs of transporting people and equipment, plus the donations of implants, totaled over \$151,120 —all through a generous donation from Innovasis.

What is not reflected in the figures above is the amount of time and attention our in-country personnel give to planning, negotiating with government leaders, and evaluating our impact among those we serve.

It is an honor and blessing to be working with these individuals and I know you join me in formally thanking them for the life-changing work they do every day!

As we continue forward, please consider introducing us to those you believe will be supportive in our work of creating selfreliance among those we serve!

"WHY" ECH?

America live in extreme poverty, some with less than two dollars a day to survive. With little food, schooling, hygiene training, and/or medical care, there is not much hope for a better tomorrow—just a constant cycle of extreme poverty. These individuals often have low paying jobs with no security and children often turn to the streets for food, succumbing to desperate measures such as sex or labor trafficking, criminal delinquency, substance abuse, and/or drug rings just to access basic needs.

While we can't help everyone, Eagle Condor Humanitarian, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, can help break the cycle of poverty one child, one person, one family, and one community at a time. We create options where there had been none through providing food in schools, education materials, hygiene training, volunteer medical care, micro-loan training

- First summer school program organized by interns featuring English classes, reading, crafts and sports

- First dance and music classes
- Projects: Tin roof on 3rd floor, new stove, new kitchen floor, new plumbing
- 10 Interns

Semillas:

- 120 children fed daily nutritional meals (these children would have no other resource)
- Water tanks installed at the Youth center and in Uris's home
- Electricity installed in the center!!
- 2 Interns
