Prisoner Packet Packing List

DUE TO LBA BY THURS. NOVEMBER 20

Approved Packing List from the SC Department of Corrections

ONE black non-retractable pen (No wire clips, no other color ink)

ONE 5" x 8" junior legal pad – white or yellow only

(No wire bound books, composition books, journals, or post-it notes)

ONE adult toothbrush (individually factory sealed; no multi-packs, holders, floss, or folding/travel toothbrushes)

ONE 4 oz. to 6 oz. toothpaste (No travel size)

ONE 3.2 oz. to 6 oz. bar of soap (*No travel size, no unwrapped/unboxed bars*)

TWO rolls of hard candy like LifeSavers, Breath Savers, or Mentos

(No Smarties, Sweetarts, Necco Wafers, Rolos, Starburst, or TicTacs)

TWO first-class #10 stamp-embossed envelopes (from US Post Office – NO regular stamps or other size envelopea)

ONE gallon size zipper bag – press and seal AND slider bags accepted.

ALL ITEMS MUST FIT IN THE ZIPPER BAG WITH ZIPPER CLOSED

DO NOT INCLUDE: washcloths, toothbrush holders, floss, combs, or any item not on the above list.

"Settling"

I learned all about the early "settlers" in school studying history. My mom used to tell me to "settle down." As I grow older, I am finding out that there is great comfort in "settling" into my easy chair after a hard day. That reminds me of ole Joe. Joe and Brenda are good friends to Kim and me. Ole Joe is in his 80's and he married a young gal, Brenda, years ago who is still only in her seventies. Kim and I enjoy spending time with them and occasionally we will meet for breakfast or lunch. They are older and wiser than I am, and yes, I know, that's not saying much. But I have learned over the years to respect the "hoary heads" (Proverbs 16:31) among us because they are often full of wisdom. But ole Joe likes to say when asked what he's doing with himself in retirement, that he is practicing his auto mechanic skills. Yessir, he says he is practicing putting a rear end in a recliner.

But there are many ways you settle, like settling in for the night, or settling a debt, or settling a dispute, or settling a wrong. Settling is just part of life! We settle a lot of things through the years. I'm currently trying to settle into this growing old phase of life. And while it's a good phase of life to settle into, it ain't all wine and roses. In fact, you can keep the wine cause I have never, or to use redneck vernacular, I ain't never sipped wine in my whole entire life and I reckon I ain't about to start drinking anything that the Bible calls a viper (Proverbs 23:31-33)...not now, not ever...I don't do vipers. No sir...I just don't! I refuse to settle on doing what everybody else is doing, just for the sake of fit'n in. Ain't gonna do it!

But sometimes it's just plain hard to settle into some things, cause life changes on a dime and so sometimes trying to settle in is like hitting a moving target. Like for me, trying to settle into this Gramps thing is difficult at best, simply because the sheer numbers of them little rascals just keep multiplying. As soon as you get used to the first one, low and behold, you turn around and all of a sudden there's thirteen of them.

Or like a college student trying to settle into his freshman year and getting out on his own in a big old world. And then suddenly, college is over and a new job is on the horizon and marriage is right around the corner and then boom...babies! How does anyone settle into life when it moves so fast? It's like we often say, "Stop the merry-go-round...I want to get off." But...it never stops does it?

But there are still other ways to "settle." Like sometimes we settle for mediocrity rather than settling only for our best. As Kim and I continue to build our new home, we've met some wonderful folks along the way, contractor types. Like old Coot, our seventy-five-year-old electrician. And then there's Javan, our framer who also happens to be the lead pastor of a Mennonite church.

I met him when I saw him framing another house in our area. I immediately liked him and knew he was the guy I wanted to

frame my house. And oh my, what a good choice that was. He told Kim and I one day while we were complimenting him on the quality of his work, that his motto has always been, "I strive for perfection, but I will settle for excellence!" Now, sit back, settle into your easy chair, and chew on that for a while. "I strive for perfection, but I will settle for excellence!"

What's not anywhere in that statement is any room for slacking or mediocrity. It's no wonder getting him to frame a house is near' bouts impossible cause he stays booked up. With a work ethic like that, and a genuine desire to do a job well, that is a combination for success every time. An old say'n amongst us hunter types is, "Aim small, hit small!" Which means if you aim for a very small spot on the target, you have a much greater expectation of hitting close to your bullseye. However, just aiming at the whole target means you have a very high likelihood of never hitting the bullseye.

I wonder, what are we aiming for in our individual Christian lives, or in the life of our churches. Are we aiming for excellence or do we all too often settle for mediocrity? Are we aiming to keep the main thing the main thing or are we settling for whatever comes along that might attract the attention of some for a short time, only to then have to chase the next popular thing. Going above and beyond often requires time, effort and sacrifice, yet that is the very example Christ set for us. Randy Day taught me years ago in the building industry, that merely meeting building code is just one step above unacceptable. Malachi 1:8-9 admonishes us to bring our best to the Lord, anything less than that is unacceptable.

Settling is acceptable at certain times in life, but totally unacceptable when it comes to our relationship with God. An old hymn goes like this, "Give of your best to the Master, give Him the strength of your youth," and every line thereafter begins with, "Give of your best to the Master...!" Never settle...give God your best today...and every day hereafter! He'll accept nothing less!

How to Become a Christian

Jesus Christ was with God the Father before the world was created. He became human and lived among humanity as Jesus of Nazareth. He came to show us what God the Father is like. He lived a sinless life, showing us how to live, and He died on a cross to pay for our sins. God raised Him from the dead. Jesus is the source of eternal life. Jesus wants to be the doorway of new life for you. In the Bible, He was called "Lamb of God" (John 1:29). In the Old Testament, sacrifices were made for the sins of the people. Jesus became the sacrificial Lamb offered for our sin. Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:6). He is waiting for you now.

Admit to God that you are a sinner. Repent, turning away from your sin. By faith, receive Jesus Christ as God's Son and accept Jesus' gift of forgiveness by dying on the cross.

Confess your faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

You may pray a silent prayer similar to this as you call on God to save you. "Dear God, I know that You love me. I confess my sin and need of salvation. I turn away from my sin and place my faith in Jesus as my Savior and Lord. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen." After you have received Jesus Christ into your life, tell a pastor or another Christian about your decision. Show others your faith in Christ by asking for a baptism by immersion in your local church as a public expression of your faith.
