


Design is in the details, and hardware placement is one of those small choices that makes a big impact. It's the finishing layer that brings character, function, and refinement to your cabinetry. Whether you're remodeling a kitchen, designing a custom vanity, or adding built-ins, where and how you place your pulls and knobs shapes the overall feel of your space.

Start With Style

Before reaching for a tape measure, take a step back and consider the overall style of your space. Is your look clean and modern, classic and traditional, or somewhere in between? Your cabinet hardware should complement that vision, not compete with it.

In traditional designs, small round knobs or classic cup pulls often work best. These styles feel timeless and refined, especially when paired with Shaker or inset cabinetry. For transitional spaces, consider blending simple knobs with sleek pulls, this mix bridges the gap between old and new without feeling disjointed. If your style leans more modern, long, linear pulls with clean edges are a popular choice. These are often installed horizontally on drawers and vertically on doors to create a sense of structure, simplicity, and visual rhythm.





Let Scale and Comfort Lead

Cabinet hardware should feel just as good as it looks, easy to grip and effortless to use. Placement isn't only about appearance; it's about everyday function. Hardware should be installed where your hand naturally reaches, making your space more intuitive and comfortable to use.

For drawers, pulls are typically centered and installed horizontally. On doors, hardware is usually placed 2 to 4 inches from the edge, depending on the cabinet size and style. There's no one-size-fits-all rule — your layout, hardware size, and how you use the space should guide final placement.

Scale matters when it comes to design. For narrow drawers or doors, small knobs or short pulls feel balanced and intentional. For wider drawers (30" or more), you have two options: One oversized pull (8–12") or two smaller pulls or knobs, either centered or spaced in thirds.

You can mix hardware sizes throughout the room, just keep the style and finish consistent within each type of application. If you're using 6-inch pulls on all standard drawers, stick with that size. If taller pantry doors or appliance panels need longer pulls, scale up while keeping the same finish for a cohesive look.





Consistency is Key


Consistency creates calm. Repeating the same hardware placement across your cabinetry brings visual order and flow to the space. If you center pulls on drawers, do it throughout the room. The same goes for knob placement on doors.

This kind of repetition builds rhythm, which your eye picks up on even if you don't consciously notice it. In rooms where cabinetry wraps around corners or varies in size, consistent hardware placement becomes even more important to bring the whole look together and give your space that finished, intentional feel.

Thoughtful Design

Combining pulls and knobs can add depth and visual interest when done with care. For example, using knobs on upper cabinets and pulls on base drawers is a classic, functional pairing that feels balanced and timeless. Drop pulls can also be a beautiful addition to vanities or furniture style cabinets, adding a subtle vintage touch or nod to traditional design.

To keep the look cohesive, maintain consistent placement rules and be mindful of proportion. The hardware styles don't need to match, but they should complement each other in size, shape, and finish. The result should feel thoughtfully curated, not busy or mismatched.





Mixing Hardware Finishes

Mixing hardware finishes can add depth and character to a space, but it works best when done with intention and restraint. If you're blending metals, limit it to two complementary tones — like matte black with soft brass, or chrome with brushed nickel. This approach works especially well when highlighting a specific area, such as a contrasting island or furniture-style piece. To keep the look cohesive, aim for consistency in hardware style and placement, even when the finishes vary.

While most homes stick to a single hardware finish for a clean, unified look, mixing finishes is becoming more common in custom design. It's a subtle way to add personality or highlight unique features, like a contrasting island or built-in hutch. That said, it's still less typical in full kitchens, especially in more traditional or timeless styles, so if you choose to mix, it should feel purposeful and balanced.
