Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. He is the one of whom I said, 'A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.' I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was that he might be made known to Israel." John testified further, saying, "I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from heaven and remain upon him. I did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.' The Road to 100 years, Centennial Feature

As we celebrate the Centennial year at our parish, it may surprise some of you to hear that above our church, there was a thriving Holy Rosary Elementary School dating back to 1939, when five Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet opened the school with 160 students. By 1949, their enrollment had grown to 450 students! Then around 1961, plantation worker families moved out of Paia to "Dream City," a new housing development in Kahului, causing enrollment to fall drastically.

Introducing Susan Tavares-Kenney, who attended Holy Rosary School from 1954 to 1961. "I always felt happy and safe at school. The solid academic foundation I received there prepared me well for St. Anthony High School."

Some of Susan's memories include wearing Indian Head navy blue uniforms with white blouses and any kind of shoes. Some students didn't have shoes to wear and wore slippers or came barefoot to school.

The Dick and Jane Spalding books were utilized, with an emphasis on phonics learning. In math, students were asked to go up to the chalkboard to show they had mastered computations.

Boys played marbles and baseball. Girls who mastered double dutch rope jumping were admired. Boys and girls enjoyed playing tetherball and steal base together.

Susan shared that she remembers the delicious and nutritionally balanced lunches made by the cafeteria manager, Mrs. Nakamura. Students were allowed to choose chocolate or white milk. Snacks were sold at recess, including popsicles and dreamsicles.

While waiting for her dad to pick her up after school, Susan was sometimes asked by one of the nuns to dust the chapel pews in the convent, as well as polish the silverware in their kitchen. The original convent was relocated when the school closed to Christ the King grounds and is still there.

There were two activities that Susan felt were invaluable. The nuns bussed students to the old Puunene Pool to learn to swim during the spring. Also, the bookmobile was invited to the school on a regular basis. Susan was an avid reader and looked forward to the bookmobile visit. She eventually became a school librarian!!!
