#### HAT AND MITTEN TREE

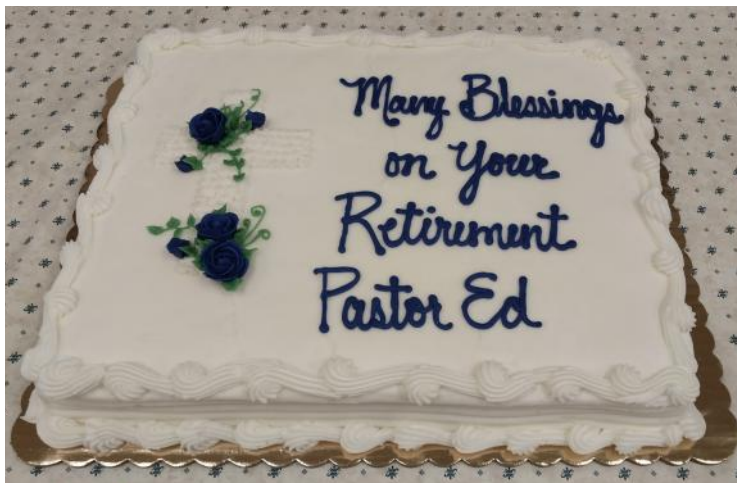

We are so excited to officially welcome to our church Bruce and Narda Druckenmiller. Together, they will serve as our interim pastors beginning on January 1. They are no strangers to most of us, since Narda has filled the pulpit numerous times this past summer.

Narda grew up in our church until she was a junior in high school, when her family moved to New Holland. While living there, she attended St. Stephen's UCC, where she was a ringer in their Bell Choir. While Bruce was a seminary student at Lancaster Theological Seminary, he met Narda when the St. Stephen's Bell Choir played for an event for the spouses of the seminary students. He was unmarried at the time but was told that there were some eligible bell ringers, and the rest is history. Narda and Bruce were married and are parents to three children: Nathan Jackson, Rachel Elizabeth, and Andrew Bruce. They are also grandparents to Landon and Louis.

Bruce is also very musical. He attended the Valley Forge Military Academy for one year on a band scholarship. His main instrument is trumpet. While he was there, he received the call to ministry. He transferred to Lebanon Valley College and graduated with a BA in religion. From there he went on to Lancaster Theological Seminary. His first pastoral call was to St. Paul's UCC in East Canton, OH. Bruce went on to serve as pastor in Williamsport, Waynesboro, and was also the Director of The Hartman Center, a UCC camp in Milroy, PA, for 14 years. Bruce received his doctoral degree in Marriage and Family Counseling from Eastern Baptist Seminary, which is now Palmer Theological Seminary, in Philadelphia. He has never officially worked as a counselor but uses these skills in all of his ministries.

Narda loved being a pastor's wife and supported Bruce in his pastoral ministries. She had various responsibilities in the churches they served but also worked in a Christian bookstore and as the secretary for the UCC Ministry Association. Just as Bruce received the call to ministry, so did Narda. She enrolled in a five-year program at the Jesuit Center for Spiritual Growth in Wernersville, PA. She took classes on weekends and continued her studies for 5 years until she became a licensed minister. She was called to serve two churches at the same time. One was in Madisonburg and the other in Rebersburg, two rural communities in Centre County. One service started at 8:30. She would leave during the last hymn to arrive at the next church during their announcements. She also served Church of the Apostles in Waynesboro.

Bruce and Narda retired from full-time ministry and relocated to Mount Joy to be closer in distance to their children and to their extended families.

God has been so faithful providing someone for us each time we lose one of our interims. I see God's hand in the coming of Narda and Bruce. When asked what ministry strengths they will bring to Honey Brook, Bruce did not hesitate to say that Narda is great at pastoral care, a skill that is so needed in our congregation. Bruce feels that his strength is in community building. And, isn't that what we are trying to do here in Honey Brook? God always provides. We must continue to trust his timing and providence.

We look forward to Narda and Bruce's ministry with us. God is good!

## SHEPHERD'S KITCHEN



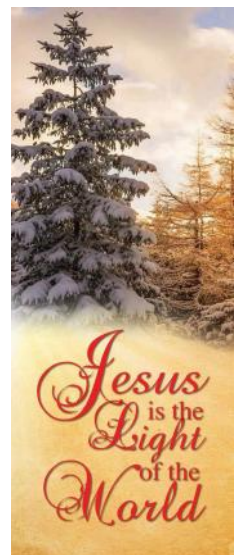
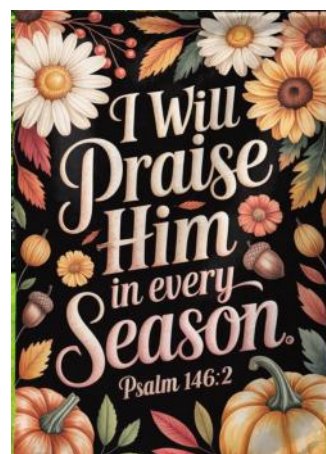
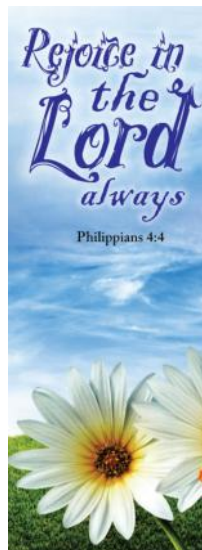

## SUNDAY SCHOOL—"The Chosen"—Season 5

**The Chosen** is a historical drama series about the life and ministry of Jesus of Nazareth, primarily set in Judaea and Galilee in the first century. The series depicts Jesus's life through the eyes of the people who interacted with him. Season 5 covers Jesus's final week in Jerusalem, from his Triumphal Entry (Palm Sunday) through the events leading to the Passion, focusing on the escalating tensions, cleansing of the Temple, and the disciples' confusion as danger nears, culminating in Judas's conflicted kiss before Jesus's arrest, setting the stage for the final Passion week.
