LANDSLIDE



Kuala Lumpur, April 28 – Aspiration International School was met with distressing news on Monday morning when a landslide occurred near its campus at around 7:00 AM. Fortunately, no injuries were reported among students or nearby residents, thanks to the swift action of emergency services.

Kuala Lumpur Fire and Rescue Department operations commander Azkhan Hamdan confirmed that the department received an emergency call at 7:18 AM through the Malaysian Emergency Response Services (MERS) 999 hotline. Firefighters from the TTDI and Sri Hartamas stations were immediately dispatched to the scene, accompanied by two Fire Rescue Tender (FRT) vehicles and an Emergency Medical Rescue Services (EMRS) unit.

Upon arrival, the rescue teams carried out a rapid "size-up" operation to assess the area for safety risks and structural threats. The situation was deemed under control by 7:55 AM, and no evacuations were required.

Early reports suggest that the landslide may have been caused by ongoing construction work and recent heavy rains, which could have weakened the soil structure. Repair and stabilization efforts have been underway for the past two to three weeks.

As a safety measure, the school has temporarily relocated most classes to Block C, which is farther from the affected site. School administrators have expressed their relief that no one was harmed and thanked the emergency responders for their prompt and professional handling of the incident.

Authorities are continuing to monitor the site closely to prevent further movement and ensure the long-term safety of the area. Parents and residents have been advised to remain alert and report any unusual ground activity.

IPOH MUN



Ilpoh MUN took place from April 4–6, 2025, at Quest International University. It was a hybrid conference featuring various councils, including UNEA, BRICS+, UNHRC, ECOFIN, EUCO, UNESCO, CRISIS: ASEAN 2030, and IPC. In total, there were approximately 174 delegates. While the exact number of chairs is unknown, there were about two for each council. The event was organized by Ronan Ooi, with advisors Winnie Choong and Lim Ke Wen.

On Day One, the conference began at 13:00 and ended at 21:00. On Day Two, it ran from 09:00 to 21:30, and on Day Three, from 09:00 to 17:30. During the prize-giving ceremony, Sebastian Shee won Outstanding Journalist in IPC, and Dylan Lim won Outstanding Delegate in CRISIS.

Many memorable moments were shared among delegates. In CRISIS, the chair stuck a plushie in the ceiling. In ECOFIN, delegates played "Most Likely To." In IPC, they played an online game, while in BRICS+, the delegate from Brazil used Minecraft to present a draft resolution.

In conclusion, the friendly match against Fairview not only strengthened our skills and teamwork but also gave us valuable insight into the demands of competitive basketball. We're


motivated to improve and excited for what lies ahead.
