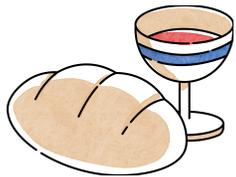

Lent is a great time to try something new in your worship life. So, I want to extend two invitations to forms of prayer and worship that we'll be doing in lent that we don't normally offer.

First, our 4:00 p.m. connections service will once again be singing Holden Evening Prayer. Holden Evening Prayer is a sung vesper service written by Marty Haugen in 1985 during his time at Holden Village, a Lutheran retreat center in the North Cascades. Rooted in the ancient pattern of Evening Prayer, it follows the traditional order—gathering, psalmody, scripture, the Magnificat, prayers, and blessing—while setting the liturgy to simple, lyrical music. The service is designed for congregational participation, with memorable refrains and chant-like verses that invite the whole assembly to sing. Its tone is contemplative yet warm, creating a gentle space of stillness at day's end. Beloved across many denominations, Holden Evening Prayer has become a staple of Advent and Lenten worship as well as retreats and midweek gatherings.

Second, on Wednesdays at Noon starting February 25th, we'll be praying the Stations of the Cross. The Stations of the Cross are a devotional practice that traces Jesus' journey from his condemnation by Pilate to his burial in the tomb. Rooted in early Christian pilgrimage to Jerusalem, the stations developed as a way for believers everywhere to prayerfully walk the Via Dolorosa in their own communities. Traditionally consisting of fourteen stations, each moment invites reflection through scripture, prayer, and silence. The practice engages both body and spirit, often involving movement from station to station as worshipers meditate on Christ's suffering and sacrificial love. Especially observed during Lent and Holy Week, the Stations of the Cross draw us more deeply into the mystery of the Passion and the cost of redemption.

I look forward to praying alongside you this lent at one of these beautiful offerings.

Your actions reinforced the importance of pastoral caregiving, deeply important work that belongs to each member of St. Patrick's as part of the everyday ministry we offer one another.

Pastoral care takes many vital forms: individual and collective prayer, delivering communion or paying a simple visit to a home or hospital, making phone calls to those who cannot attend church, offering practical help like running errands or completing tasks, writing cards or other messages, and even supporting community ministries. When we care for one another in these ways, we live out Jesus' call to love our neighbor: noticing needs, offering presence, and sharing God's compassion in tangible ways. These acts build trust, strengthen faith, and form our community into the true body of Christ so that no one walks alone in times of illness, grief, or transition.

As you may have noticed in recent announcements, a dedicated group of people has answered the call to restart St. Patrick's casserole ministry. Fresh meals in the St. Patrick's freezer are available for anyone who needs them—they say “you're not alone” in a way words sometimes can't. If you're able to help by contributing casseroles to this ministry, there are prepackaged pans with instructions in the narthex.

Thank you again for your kindness during my recovery. May we continue to grow as a congregation of compassionate neighbors—responding in prayer, presence, and practical help—so every member feels seen, supported, and loved.

### How to Give via Charitable Giving Account

Giving to St. Patrick's via Charitable Giving Accounts is becoming more popular. The good news is that they are secure and have tax advantages. The bad news is that some of them are so secure that the Pledge Secretary can't find out who donated the money without a lot of work. To find the donor information the Pledge Secretary needs to create an account with the financial institution, provide information about the church, exchange letters authorizing the Pledge Secretary to display donor information and provide information about our bank account number. This takes a few days.

If you NEED to use these accounts, please be sure to send Charlie Horton an email ([pledge@pats-dublin.org](mailto:pledge@pats-dublin.org)) telling him what institution will be sending the check, how much the check will be for and approximately when the check should arrive. To further make your check unique and identifiable you could send an odd dollar amount, such as \$100.37 instead of an even \$100.00. This will help make your statement as accurate as possible. 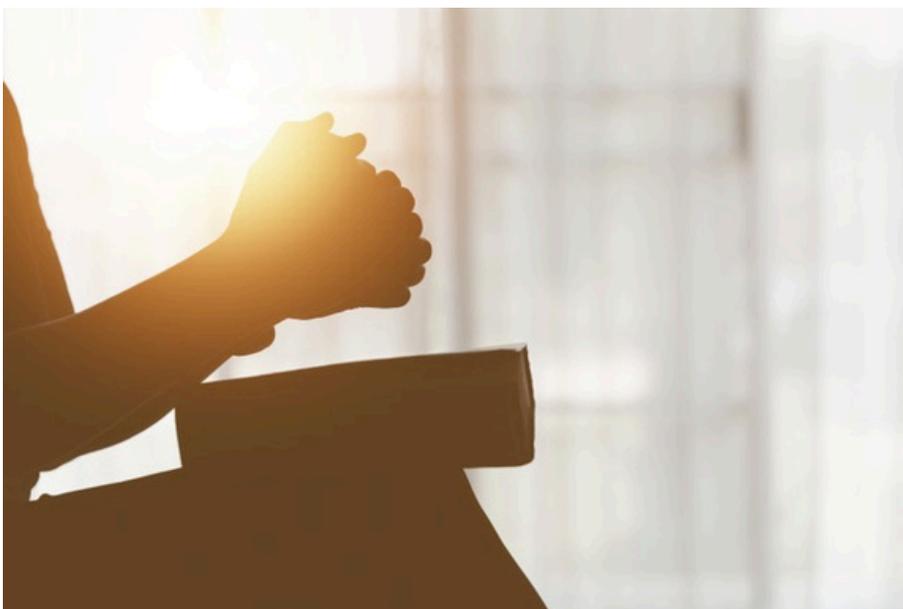

**Lenten Prayer Practice**

There are many ways to pray through Lent. While some of us at St. Patrick's have entered into a book study, others may choose to subscribe to daily readings from Forward Day by Day (<https://forwardmovement.org>) or the Society of St. John the Evangelist (<https://www.ssje.org>). We have many Lenten resources in the Episcopal Church, and you don't have to limit yourself to those. Perhaps centering prayer or meditation feels just right for you this Lent. You might enjoy reading a few lines of Scripture, or use a prayer app on your phone. The important part is to be intentional about spending just a few minutes of your day in quiet time with God. Here are some suggestions:

- Carve out a time of day that works for you—our lives aren't slowing down because it's Lent. Even just ten or fifteen minutes of time with God can nourish you for the rest of your day.
- Commit to trying this for a week, and see the effects of spending this time in prayer. You may be forming a habit that stays with you beyond Lent.
- Talk to God honestly and openly. The Psalmists didn't hold back any of their emotions, and we don't have to, either.
- Consider writing about your prayer; perhaps you might jot down a line or two that helps you to remember your experience.
- Most of all, enjoy spending this time with God as God's beloved child.

During Lent and always, we pray as individuals, and together as a community. Our prayers lead us out into the world as followers of Jesus, giving us everything we need to do the work of bringing God's dream of peace, justice, and beloved community to reality.

Wow! Lent is coming fast this year and it's quickly on the heels of all those New year's Resolutions. Not only are the resolutions quickly fading away, but now we get to Lent and the traditional "what am I going to give up for Lent?" quandary. OK, we won't go into the "What am I going to DO for Lent?" approach right now. What we are going to talk about is some real great advice from two very reasonable people (besides Rose and Lissa).

Scott Simon is a long-time journalist and radio host at National Public Radio. His Saturday morning shows are balanced and cover a variety of interesting topics. In his recent newsletter, he highlighted the work of Dr. Zeke Emmanuel, a prominent physician with an impressive resume. In his recent book, "Eat Your Ice Cream: Six Simple Rules for a Long and Healthy Life", he talks about living sensibly and not being a "schmuck" (his words).

As Lissa read his book, his six rules make lots of sense, so she's passing them along.

**Avoid excessive risks** - that is don't be obsessive about calorie counts, over ambitious exercise routines and avoid listening to or following influencers who tout unproven remedies for "better health". Trust Science.

**Prize Social Interactions** - Social interactions that are positive and fun are great for health (we have lots of those opportunities at St. Patrick's)

**Stay Mentally Sharp** - Read good books, play fun games, have good conversations with people- even those who you don't know. Avoid self-destructive behaviors like marijuana (it may be legal but it's not pro-wellness) or over indulgence in ANYTHING.

**Eat Well** - It doesn't matter too much what food pyramid you use (this is Lissa talking). Dr. Emmanuel emphasizes that you eat balanced meals, avoid overindulgence in foods with little nutritional value. Family Meals are excellent for wellness (no cell phones at the table). He does say that treating yourself to an occasional ice cream is OK (Yeah!)

**Do aerobic, strength training and flexibility exercises regularly** - Exercise saves lives, improves mental acuity and enhances social interaction. Even if you have physical limitations, there are exercises you can do. Lissa has lots of suggestions. 😊

**Sleep Like A Baby** - OK don't sleep like a newborn who awakens every two or three hours to be fed. Sleep like a contented toddler who sleeps for eight hours and awakens ready to go. Lissa suggests that if your mattress is over 7 years old, consider a new one. A good pillow will also help.

All in all, Scott Simon and Dr. Emmanuel have a lot of reasonable things to help with the enhancement of your wellness. The Wellness Group has purchased a copy of the book and it's been put in the Parish Library. Stay tuned, we are going to develop a Wellness Section for the library. It will have lots of reliable information on a variety of topics.

### Summary of St. Patrick's Vestry Minutes - February 11, 2026

**Opening:** Mark Hanes led us in prayer.

**Welcome:** new Vestry members Tom Jones, and Caroline Wagner

**Guests:** Sam and Cory, from Shift Roofing, talked with us about installing a new roof and working with the insurance company if we make a claim. Vestry agreed to file an insurance claim and proceed with vetting Shift Roofing.

**Parochial Report :** has been completed and was shared with the Vestry. After a few edits to the report, the report was accepted by the Vestry.

**Sabbatical Grant Application :** The report to help fund Father Jason's sabbatical in 2027 was completed by Kim Nelson, Kathy Lamb-Gilbert and Father Jason and shared with the Vestry. The report will be filed and the results announced in August. The Vestry passed the motion to file the application and support the Sabbatical.

**Plate Discretionary Fund :** Mark led the Vestry in a discussion of using a portion of the plate each month to fund the Rector's discretionary fund to support those in need. Alex suggested we start this in the new program year.

**Reports :** The Rector, Associate Rector, Senior Warden and Junior Warden's reports were distributed. There were no questions on the reports.

**Vestry Retreat :** Father Jason shared that Rev. Vicki Zust of St. Mark's Episcopal Church will be with us on March 7th to discuss church size dynamics and how we function and prepare for growth.

**Solar Panels :** Randy discussed his preliminary findings about Solar Panels. There was discussion of having companies come to a Vestry meeting to further explore the idea of installing them at St. Patrick's.

**Treasurer's Reports :** The December report was accepted by the Vestry. Mark shared in the January Report that we were \$26,000 over in our budget and pledges. Expenses were up by only \$2,500. We have \$ 237,000 in available cash. It was a good month. The report was accepted by the Vestry.

**Endowment Team :** Reported a good year. There is a push to ask ministries that bring in revenue to tithe 10% to help increase the Endowment.

**The Meeting ended in prayer at 8:40 p.m.**

For any of you wanting to become more educated in this area, there are programs available. She Has A Name (SHAN) offers a class called “Human Trafficking 101” which is how many of us got started 7 years ago. With this basis, we are better equipped to support the volunteer programs of Freedom a la Cart. This class is recommended by Freedom a la Cart, but they say it is not required. The class is also available through their Online Training Platform. The next training is as follows:

Our Kairos Mission is in full swing again. Mike Studebaker and I are preparing for a “Weekend” at NCCC (North Central Correctional Complex) from March 12-15<sup>th</sup>, 2026. We are attending team meetings, 8 of these that are 4 hours long, learning the dos and don’ts of going into the prison, as well the preparation of talks, homilies and meditations for the weekend with of course the songs we sing with the men on the inside.

We cannot do this work alone; we need you too! It is hard for me to express the gratitude of the men inside the prison, as they receive gifts of cookies made in the special way you have over the years. It is again an opportunity to share those gifts with the men. Cookies, one dozen per bag, can be dropped off at the church between now and March 8<sup>th</sup> for delivery to the prison. Any kind of cookie will be warmly received.

Not all our parishioners are able to visit the prisons themselves and may also not be able to assist in making cookies. An alternative would be to donate whatever you may be moved to do. If you are, these donations can also be brought to the church. Make your check payable to “Kairos Prison Ministry”.

These prayers can be done from anywhere, even at home. Also, Dick Gehman will be starting up teams for the London facility soon as well. We truly appreciate the continued support of prayers, Cookies, and financial support bless you all for going inside the prison with us, without those things we are just a bunch of dudes showing up, thank you. After delivering our handmade hats and mittens to Freedom and Daniel Wright School (DWS) just before Thanksgiving, our Knitting Nexus basket in the Parish Hallway sat empty for a while. But, with the holidays behind us, it is once again filling with colorful, happy hats (and a few mittens) made by you...the "makers and givers" of St Patrick's.

We historically have easily met the annual need for warm outerwear for the ladies of CATCH/Freedom (20-25/yr) and for hats for the children (35-45/yr) and I anticipate this will continue. I recently talked with a staff member at DWS who reported that mittens are their greatest need. The 2025 supply (which included purchased mittens to supplement the hand-knitted ones) is exhausted.

Mittens are a bit "fiddly" to knit. But, once you work your way through a couple of thumb gussets, they become as easy as (and take less time and less yarn than) a hat! So, consider this a call for children's mittens for the 2026-27 winter.
