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#### **Exploring Beauty as a Doorway to God**

One of the treasures of our Anglican tradition is the way it holds together truth, goodness, and beauty as expressions of God's presence. This month in our Anglican Identity Series, we are exploring beauty as a doorway to God. For centuries, Anglicans have understood beauty not as a luxury or decoration, but as a doorway—a way of encountering the divine. In our worship, our architecture, our music, and our prayer, we are invited to meet God through the language of beauty.

Beauty has always been central to our faith. The psalmist prays, "Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (Psalm 96:9). The beauty of holiness is not simply about aesthetics—it is about the radiance of God's presence shining through ordinary things. Think of a stained-glass window catching the light, a hymn that stirs the soul, or a prayer spoken with reverence. In each of these moments, beauty awakens something within us. It draws us out of ourselves and orients our hearts toward God.

Anglican identity has often been described as a "via media," a middle way that seeks balance between Scripture, tradition, and reason. But I would argue that beauty is also part of this balance. Our tradition has always cherished the Book of Common Prayer not only for its theological depth but also for its poetic beauty. Its cadences and rhythms have shaped generations of believers, teaching us that the way we speak to God matters. In Anglicanism, words are not only functional; they are crafted with care so that they might lift the soul toward heaven.

This emphasis on beauty extends beyond words. Our churches are places where stone, wood, glass, and light come together to form sacred spaces. These spaces are not simply practical gathering places —they are designed to embody the presence of God. Even the simplest country chapel, with its plain wooden cross and quiet dignity, reflects the conviction that beauty can point us to the holy.

In June of 2024, I was able to tour St. Paul's Cathedral in London. I soaked in the architecture—the rising columns and glorious stained glass windows—I was struck speechless. There was a permanent art display honoring the victims of WWI and a temporary exhibit grieving the tortures of the Inquisition. I was forced to stop, pray, and grieve. Anglican exploration of beauty does not shy away from the horrors and sins of our broken world. Rather, beauty can help us process grief, heal from trauma, repent of our sins, and know the forgiveness of God.

To explore beauty as a doorway to God is to reclaim an essential part of who we are as Anglicans. It is to affirm that our worship, our buildings, our music, and even our daily lives are not only about function but about wonder. God has made a world of beauty, and God has given us eyes, ears, and hearts to delight in it. When we receive beauty as a gift, and let it draw us closer to its Giver, we are living fully into our Anglican identity: a people who seek and serve Christ in the beauty of holiness.

#### Mother Catherine's Corner

For four weeks this fall, St. Patrick's is engaging in a study of the St. Paul's Letter to the Romans. This study is led by our own Kim Nelson and aims to help us understand more about some of Paul's key teachings and how we can apply them to our lives.

St. Paul's transformation from a persecutor of Christians to a passionate evangelist is meant to be a model for our lives. Paul was a devout Jew who fervently opposed the Christian movement until he had a dramatic encounter with Jesus. This experience changed his life forever, and he dedicated himself to spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Paul spread the message across the Roman Empire despite facing imprisonment, beatings, and countless hardships.

Paul wrote his letter to the Romans around 57 A.D., a key period in his ministry. The Roman church was a diverse community of believers; Paul was aware of some tensions within the Roman church over Jewish law and Gentile inclusion. Writing this letter was an effort to address these issues. At that time, Paul had not yet visited the Christian community in Rome, but he felt a strong desire to connect with them and clarify the core truths of the Gospel.

In Romans, Paul offers a comprehensive explanation of Christian doctrine. He emphasizes that salvation is a gift from God, accessible to everyone through faith in Jesus Christ. Paul reassures believers that no one is excluded from God's grace—a grace that can be transformational.

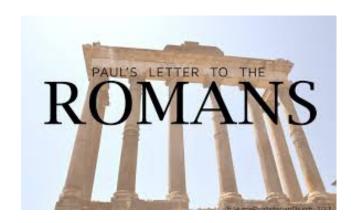
Paul also teaches that a life of faith consists of more than simply following rules. He urges followers of Jesus to offer their full selves—mind and body—as living sacrifices to God. He encourages believers to live out their faith through humble and loving service, challenging us to be reflections of Christ's love in our daily actions.

As we move through the world, we may find ourselves in places and situations where the message of Jesus' kindness, justice, or forgiveness is desperately needed. We can draw on Paul's courage in challenging times. Paul trusted in God's promises that all would be well, and saw the role of Christians as ones who can choose peace and love always, in the name of Jesus.

There is much more to Paul's Letter to the Romans (and to all of our Holy Scriptures!) I invite you to join the Bible Study class on Romans to hear more about how this theologically rich letter is still speaking to Jesus' followers. I also invite you to our monthly Way of Love dinners and other formation opportunities to be able to think more about how to make sense of scripture and apply it to our lives.

A group of sewists and artists from our congregation have been meeting over the summer to plan the banners to observe "ordinary time" - the green season. In keeping with Ohio's quilting tradition, we are incorporating some quilted blocks and a central panel with a tree of life. The tree symbolizes the growth of our ministries and family at St. Patrick's and the continuing outreach of God's love through roots, branches, and colorful leaves.

We invite everyone to help us complete these banners! There are many different ways to help. First, we'd like to collect fabric remnants to incorporate into the banners. Next, we will set up times for you to help with cutting, assembling kits, and sewing blocks if you are able. We hope these banners will have many hands touch them as they are being created and that they will beautify our sanctuary for the next 25 years!

There is a plastic bin in Smith Hall for fabric remnants. Cotton, silk, upholstery, etc., are welcome. We encourage you to donate fabric that is meaningful to you in some way—scraps from a wedding gown, favorite tablecloth, cherished child's garment, etc. We will do our best to incorporate as many parishioner remnants as possible into the final designs. Colors: greens, golds, reds, yellows, browns.

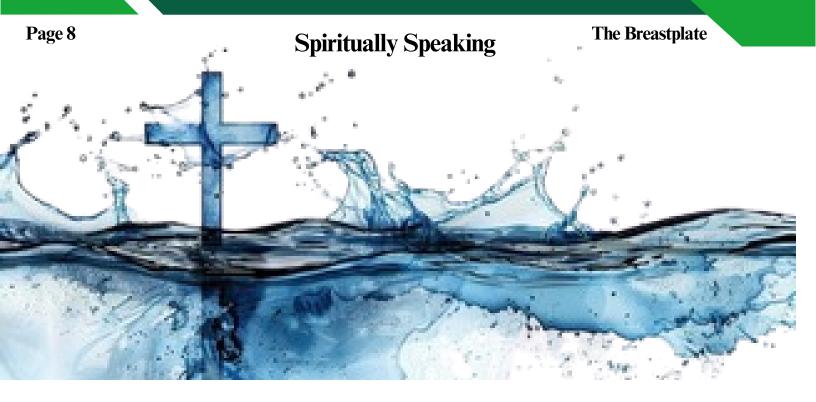

The Vestry of St. Patrick's met on September 10, 2025. Ben Trotter led us in prayer and Core Values Reflection. The Rev. Derrick Fetz joined us and led us in a discussion of "How to Prepare for a Parish Capital Campaign". We learned what questions need to be answered during the foundational work of a successful Capital Campaign, as well as, the key components involved in planning one.

Our Senior Warden, Alex Carter, told us to expect an email containing a survey to help us discern our spiritual gifts. We are to take the survey and identify three spiritual gifts to share with her. At some point, the nominating committee will meet to propose names for our new Vestry members next year. Alex explained that it will be important to know what spiritual gifts current Vestry members already possess, so we can determine what other gifts might be helpful to round-out a healthy Vestry.

Father Jason shared in his report a great start to our program year kick-off with our Ministry Fair, Backpack Blessing and start of the Season of Creation. He and Lucas met after Lucas's first ninety days with the church. We also welcomed Kati's exciting return on September 2nd. He also reported Terri Gleason will be our Christmas pageant director this year. She has many exciting ideas for boosting participation and enhancing production. On another exciting note, average Sunday in-person attendance grew 14% compared to 2024 at the 8 and 9:30 combined for June-August.

Mother Catherine reported The Way of Love dinners kicked off with the start of The Parables of Jesus. Those in attendance claimed it was one of our most successful and meaningful dinners to date. She also shared that the Welcome Team continues their planning of the Newcomer Info Class with Vicky Bratton leading the first Sunday class. The Senior Warden reported the Stewardship Team continues preparations for our pledge campaign kick-off dinner and Sunday speakers. The College for Congregational Development continues preparation for their project, including refining interview questions.

Our Junior Warden raised the question should we turn off our sprinkler system instead of spending more money on chasing leaks. He also gave an update on the shipping and installation of the sound panels and carpet.

The Treasurer reported that revenue was below budget in August and expenditures were as expected. Ministry budgets went out in August with an expected return by September 30th. Mark also shared with us the rules for unbudgeted items, and the online payment authorization and payment process. Discussion continued about the rationale to change banks from Middlefield to Huntington Bank. The meeting ended in prayer.

Here we are in the season of pumpkins (including the omnipresent pumpkin spice everything), turning leaves (that means raking them again and again), Halloween munchkins at your door (have you seen the price of chocolate lately?) and other portents of Advent and the inexorable slide into winter and Christmas business. However, Lissa really loves Autumn, it is colorful, and the sky seems bluer, and the weather is crisper.

One thing that sometimes seems to get lost in the shuffle is an exercise program that really works- even when you are not running or swimming outdoors, or your golf games are less frequent. Even if you are continuing with your exercise program (good for you), low back pain can be an annoying distraction and interfere with your routine.

Yoga can be a great help. Not yoga that twists you into an impossible pretzel, but one that is designed to help relieve the back pain and involves stretching, strengthening muscles in the trunk and hips, improving posture, and maintaining flexibility. Many exercise programs include breathing, relaxation and meditation.

In a recent study published in JAMA, 141 adults with moderate to severe back pain for at least three months, entered a program of hatha yoga, which emphasizes holding poses and deep breathing. The program included a once-a-week guided session online and encouragement to practice daily. After 12 weeks, participants who followed the program had significant improvement in back pain relief, improved sleep, and decreased use of pain medications. The benefits lasted up to 24 weeks even though the program was only 12 weeks.

There are multiple programs for "chair yoga" on the internet, most of them say that they are for people over 60, but the exercises are good for anyone at any age. A certified yoga therapist can also design a program for you. If you are part of the Silver Sneakers insurance program, a good program may also be available for you. So low back pain can be addressed so it does not always require heavy medication and surgery. If you give the program an honest try and the results aren't what you want, then it's a good time to consult your provider

As to the pumpkin spice, Lissa saves it for pie, hires a teenager to rake leaves, and gives out rubber duckies at Halloween (cheaper and healthier than chocolate). Have fun this Autumn but Keep that back in good shape!
