Vestry Nominees

Tom Jones

1. What has been your involvement with St. Patrick's and why are you interested in serving on the vestry?

I've been involved in a variety of activities at St. Patrick's as well as for the broader Diocese of Southern Ohio. They include Bishop Search Committee (Diocesan), Commission on Ministry (Diocesan), Men's Group, Pledge Drive, Senior Warden, Usher, Vestry Member, Welcome Ministry, Choir, Garage Sale, Check



Signer, and Youth Group. I'm interested in serving on Vestry as our church is entering a very exciting phase. As St. Patrick's continues to grow, a focus on furthering the development of small groups is critically important for helping members feel valued and connected, as well as supporting our ministry leaders so that there are others available to step in before burnout takes its toll. Finally, we must champion the funding needed for us to continue to do God's work here in Dublin and the surrounding community.

2. What skills and insights do you bring to the task of serving on vestry?

I combine strong analytical abilities with empathy. Over the past five years as a consultant, I have leveraged these skills to drive successful growth for a start-up organization. Each new ministry can be likened to a start-up, requiring clear vision, deliberate planning, commitment, and thoughtful guidance. A concerning insight is that as successfully as we welcome new members through the front door, we lose some existing members through the back door. Enhancing connectedness within our community, particularly through improved small group engagement, can play a critical role in retaining members and fostering long-term involvement.

3. What do you envision for the church in the next three to five years?

I anticipate a vibrant church consisting of members who care for each other as well as the communities in which they live. I see growth commensurate with our ability to fund it. We will function in a world of continued political strife, both abroad but also within our own country and locale. We'll need to respect each other's differences of opinion while relying on Christ's requirement to love one another. Our strength will come from our collective commitment rather than individual leadership, as we aim to embody the best version of a beloved community.

1. What has been your involvement with St. Patrick's and why are you interested in serving on the vestry?

My involvement with St. Patrick's began in 2017, when my husband John and I started attending the 4pm services on Sundays. At the time, we were newly engaged and looking for a church home. Since then, we have grown to regularly attend worship, participate in parish events (such as Fish Fry dinners, and VBS), and have built meaningful relationships within the congregation. Through these experiences, I've come to appreciate the strong sense of community, faith, and service that defines St. Patrick's. I'm

interested in serving on the vestry because I care deeply about the future of the parish (particularly growing with young families) and want to contribute my time, skills, and perspective to support its mission. Serving on the vestry feels like a natural way to give back, help with thoughtful decision-making, and ensure St. Patrick's continues to grow as a welcoming and faithful community.

2. What skills and insights do you bring to the task of serving on vestry?

I bring strong listening, communication, and collaboration skills to serving on the vestry, along with a thoughtful and organized approach to decision-making. As a mother to young sons, and an elementary school teacher, I'm eager to help foster a community for our young families. I'm comfortable working with different perspectives to arrive at solutions that serve the best interests of the parish. I also bring a willingness to learn, a sense of responsibility, and a genuine commitment to supporting the mission and ministries of St. Patrick's.

3. What do you envision for the church in the next three to five years?

Over the next three to five years, I envision St. Patrick's continuing to grow as a spiritually grounded, welcoming, and engaged community. I hope to continue and build upon our vibrant, well-supported children's and youth ministries that help young people build a lasting relationship with God and feel a genuine sense of belonging in the church. I also envision the parish investing in leaders, resources, and programs that ensure these ministries are sustainable and responsive to the needs of today's families, strengthening the church for generations to come.

1. What has been your involvement with St. Patrick's and why are you interested in serving on the vestry?

During my nine years as a member of St. Patrick's, I have served across multiple ministries: most recently on the Stewardship Committee 2025, where I helped organize the church dinner celebrating 25 years of worship in our beautiful sanctuary. As a longtime member of Bread Ministry, I have welcomed many visitors seeking fellowship. I have been pleased to serve on the Newcomers Committee and to have led the creation of the Newcomers' Corner in the Narthex. I also served on the Discernment Committee and the Wellness Committee, helping to maintain the bulletin board in Smith Hall.

This breadth of involvement has given me a view of how our parish ministries interconnect—and also where they might be strengthened through more intentional coordination. I am drawn to vestry service because I feel called to move from supporting individual programs to helping discern the direction of our parish as a whole. Vestry work offers the opportunity to think prayerfully about how our resources, facilities, and people can best serve God's purposes in this community.



2. What skills and insights do you bring to the task of serving on vestry?

My academic background includes degrees in theology and public policy, and my professional work focuses on program evaluation and strategic planning—skills directly applicable to vestry responsibilities such as reviewing budgets, assessing ministry effectiveness, and planning capital improvements. I am a longtime reader of Christian philosophy and history, which grounds my understanding of how the church has navigated institutional challenges across centuries.

Insights from my life experience include understanding and helping families affected by addiction, especially through 12-step spirituality. This has taught me the importance of meeting people where they are and creating communities where vulnerability is welcomed rather than hidden.

3. What do you envision for the church in the next three to five years

St. Patrick's can help meet the spiritual hunger of this world by welcoming seekers of *all kinds*. My vision includes continuing our efforts to welcome newcomers and retain current members. Opening our doors to neighbors through contemplative offerings—meditation groups, discussion series, quiet days—would extend our reach while remaining true to our identity.

I would also like to see us expand aid to local families and enhance services to young families in our congregation. Achieving these aspirations will require careful stewardship of our physical plant and financial resources. I am prepared to engage with the temporal realities—budgets, maintenance, personnel—that make mission possible, understanding that faithful administration is itself a form of ministry.


3. What do you envision for the church in the next three to five years?
