Welcome to Our Summer Newsletter.

It has been a very successful and busy year for Military Family Support. Over the past year and a half since General Howgill stepped down from the Chairmanship, I have focused on reorganizing the

organization to prepare for the future and to transition it into its next phase. As part of that reorganization, we experienced a major change in our Board of Trustees and Advisors, reducing from fifteen to nine members, along with turnover in several staff positions. I believe we've now completed that transition, and with that, I will be stepping down as Chairman and returning to my primary role as Chairperson of the JROTC and Youth Leadership Programs.

It is my pleasure to welcome our new President and Chairman, Janet Taylor, USN (F), a long-time Tampa Bay area resident and active member of the American Legion. Janet will officially assume her duties on August 1, 2025. Congratulations, Janet!

This year has been incredibly rewarding in our ongoing support of military families and cadets. Through our various programs, we've supported over 145 JROTC cadets to date. We've provided assistance to military families through our scholarship program and trade school grants, and presented JROTC Leadership Awards to students at every grade level in high school. We were honored to recognize the Hillsborough County Cadet of the Year, and our new partnership with the Youth Civic Patriotic Leadership Program has gotten off to a strong start, with several students qualifying for the National Youth Civics Conference. We've continued our support for the Veteran Honor Flight Program to Washington, D.C., and sustained our annual contributions to My Warrior's Place and Dogs Inc.

Sadly, this past year we lost two beloved board members and donors of Military Family Support, Barbara Lauer and Barbara Amato. Our thoughts and prayers remain with their families. They are deeply missed.

Targan Wehye-Jones, our Outreach and Financial Manager, has moved on to start her own business but will remain as a consultant for MFS Career Development Grant program. She has been tremendously helpful in transitioning her responsibilities and we are grateful for her years of service and commitment to MFS. Thank you, Targan.

Tom Hart has assumed the role of Scholarship Chairman following the passing of Barbara Lauer. Together with Targan, he successfully transitioned our scholarship application process to an online system. This year, we were proud to award thirteen scholarships to a truly outstanding group of students. Tom also launched a new initiative to support twenty-five cadets attending a State Patriotic Youth Leadership Conference, and three students at a National Youth Civics Summit.

Advisor Colonel (Ret.) Sam Taylor took on the role of Committee Chair for New Projects and launched our Patriotic Youth Education Program. Jerry Brockmeier accepted the position of Treasurer and now serves on the Executive Committee. Lee Kermode assumed duties as Vice Chairman and was instrumental in guiding us through the recent reorganization.

And, of course, a very special thank you goes to Kristen Small, our Office Manager. Kristen is the glue that holds this organization together, and she has done so with determination and grace learning the role as she went.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed to this year's success. We look forward to continuing our mission of supporting veterans, military families and youth leaders in the years to come.

# JROTC – Youth Leadership Conference Summary



MFS JROTC Project in 2025 expanded its reach to include the Youth Leadership Conference for tuition support of Hillsborough County JROTC cadets. The Conference was held April 2–5 at the Warren Willis Conference Center, the 2025 YLC welcomed 43 students, including 25 MFS tuition funded JROTC recipients. Tuition was \$350 per JROTC student, totaling \$8,750. Students

represented 11 Hillsborough County high schools and the Naval Sea Cadet Corps. All MFS tuition supported students were high school juniors with three years of JROTC. Applications were submitted via DocuSign, and the MFS logo appeared on all materials. An additional \$1,200 supported three Hillsborough County JROTC cadets attending the 2025 National Youth Civic Summit.

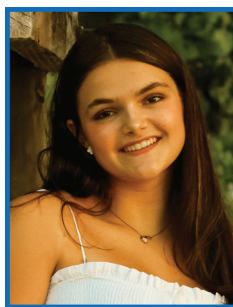

## Career Development Update

Our Career Development Grant program continues to grow due to the support of Community Foundation managing Trusts and Annuities on our behalf for funding, and Targan Wehye-Jones tireless efforts to build a successful program. In late 2024, MFS awarded \$7,450 for programs like Cosmetology, Microsoft Office Certification, and Cybersecurity. In 2025, we have awarded \$14,394 so far, with one more grant pending bringing the expected total to \$18,394. Supported fields include Diesel Tech,

Advanced Manufacturing, Lean Six Sigma, and Nursing prerequisites. Grants are paid directly to the program within 30 days of the start date, or earlier if a discount applies. Recipients have expressed heartfelt gratitude. We are also partnering with the Veteran Readjustment Counseling Center in Pasco County, the Bellini College of Cyber Security at USF and have built a relationship with the Mike Rows Works Foundation.

# Honor Flight Veteran Appreciation Letter

Thank You, Tom

I've assembled some thoughts I'd like to share with you. First, a little background about myself. I served as a B-47 bomber pilot in the 1950s with the Strategic Air Command (SAC). Our primary mission was to deter Russian aggression during the height of the Cold War. Much of my tour was spent at SAC bases along the western periphery of Europe, including time in England, Germany, and Spain.

Tom Hart, a Military Family Support (MFS) Board Member, had previously participated in an Honor Flight and spoke so enthusiastically about the experience that I was persuaded to join. Tom served as my guardian throughout the day, and I must say, the Honor Flight, for me, was truly the experience of a lifetime. While I had been aware of the program, I hadn't realized just how inspiring and impactful it would be. It felt like opening the door to a deep sense of patriotism, something I had taken for granted but never fully grasped until that day. Although I had visited the Lincoln Memorial before, I had never seen the World War II Memorial, nor the Vietnam or Korean War Memorials, or visited Arlington National Cemetery. Seeing these landmarks up close left a powerful impression on me. I was overwhelmed by the sheer number of our fallen heroes, millions of lives given in service, and I was deeply moved by the magnitude of their sacrifice. Standing before the WWII Memorial, with its tributes, bronze bas-reliefs, statuary, and stirring acknowledgments of all branches of our military, I was awe-struck with reverence. I felt profound gratitude for those who have served and continue to serve, and appreciation for organizations like Military Family Support, whose sponsorship makes this incredible journey possible for veterans and their guardians. One of the most touching moments came during the return flight, when we were surprised with a "Mail Call" event. Each veteran received a packet of letters and cards from schools, clubs, and various organizations expressing thanks for our service. I opened 74 cards that night. Each one a heartfelt reminder of the support and appreciation we still receive. Finally, upon arriving back home at St. Petersburg Airport, we were welcomed with a triumphant "Welcome Home"



celebration. Hundreds of well-wishers lined up to shake our hands and say, "Thank you for your service." The feeling was beyond words.

I hope this gives you a sense of how meaningful the Honor Flight program is, and why Military Family Support's funding of guardians is such a worthy cause.

Thank you for allowing me to share my experience.

## ***Military Family Support (MFS) Donates to My Warrior Place***

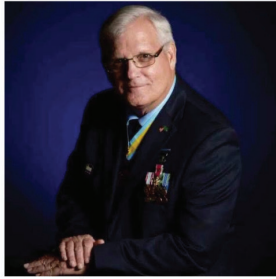
Members of Military Family Support recently presented a \$1,000 donation to Kelly Kowall, founder of My Warrior Place (MWP) in Ruskin, Florida. My Warrior Place was founded by Kowall in honor of her son, Corey, who, like so many other brave warriors, gave his life in service to our country. The retreat center serves as a safe haven for veterans, active-duty military, first responders, and Gold Star families.
