Exhibitors must purchase an exhibitor pass or a membership ticket to enter items for the Fair. All tickets and entry fees must be paid by 5 p.m. Monday, Aug. 10 at the secretary's office or entries will be disqualified. Exhibitor tags may be picked up at the grandstand office starting Saturday, Aug. 8. Items for exhibit in departments 6 - 17 must be brought to fairgrounds on Monday, Aug. 10 between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. and tags may be picked up at Grange Building. **Livestock check-in times:** Sunday, Aug. 9, 2-8 p.m. and Monday, Aug. 10, 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. **ALL Jr. Fair Market Animals MUST check-in on SUNDAY - Steers 2-5 p.m., Lambs 2-4 p.m., Swine 5-8 p.m., All other market animals 2-5 p.m.** Open class animals may check-in Saturday, Aug. 8, 2-8 p.m. or Monday, Aug. 10, 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Rules for Candidates & Election

CANDIDATES: All potential candidates for Director MUST attend a minimum of two complete regular monthly meetings in the previous 12 months to be eligible to pull a petition. Qualified candidates MUST be a member of the Society to request a petition from the Secretary. The candidate MUST complete the petition by stating the specific board position for which he/she is seeking to be elected. The petition MUST be signed by 10 valid members of the Society and returned to the Secretary seven days before the annual election.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS: The Board of Directors of the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society shall consist of 18 members who shall be elected at large for a term of three years. Terms of one-third of the Directors shall expire annually. Not more than two Directors shall be from any one Township at any one time, except the Township in which the fair is held (Jefferson) that being not more than three.

ELECTION: The Annual Election of Directors shall be by ballot and will be held on Saturday, September 20, 2025, from noon to 4 p.m. at the Concession Building on the fairgrounds. Only members of the Society who purchased a valid 2025 membership ticket by 8 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 10, shall be entitled to vote.

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RULES & REGULATIONS

GENERAL INFORMATION:

1. The Fair Board will abide by all Ohio Department of Agriculture rules pertaining to fairs.
2. To aid in the handling of exhibits and avoid confusion, all rules governing entries will be strictly enforced.
3. The Fair Board reserves the sole and absolute right to construe its own rules and regulations and to determine arbitrarily all matters and differences in regard thereto, from which there is no appeal.
4. **"NO PERSON SHALL BE PERMITTED TO MAKE SOLICITATIONS OF ANY NATURE ON THE FAIR-GROUNDS EXCEPT IN CONTRACTED CONCESSION OR COMMERCIAL RENTED SPACES. NO PERSON WILL BE PERMITTED TO POST OR DISPLAY SIGNS, DISTRIBUTE HANDBILLS, OR ADVERTISE MATERIAL OR SELL OR DISTRIBUTE FREE, ANY MERCHANDISE, EXCEPT PERSONS UNDER CONTRACT."**

TICKETS:

1. General admission includes FREE ride wristband and grandstand admission.
2. All exhibitors in ALL departments must have a Membership Ticket or an Exhibitors Ticket (cash or check).
3. Membership Ticket - \$40. Available December 15 until Fair by calling the Secretary at 605-651-2773, and at the Secretary's office under the grandstand, scheduled hours from July 07 - until 8 p.m., Aug. 16.
 - A. May be purchased by any Ashtabula County resident 21 years or older and gives the owner the right to vote for Fair Board Directors. Election of directors is held the third Saturday in September from 12 noon to 4 p.m., at the Concession Office on the fairgrounds.
 - B. Includes six (6) admissions for member only to the fairgrounds (does not include rides or grandstands).
 - C. Owner may enter as many departments and classes as desired (entries in the cattle, goat, draft horse and tractor/truck pull departments also require an entry fee.)
4. Exhibitors Ticket - \$20 or \$30, cash or check at office.
 - A. \$20.00 Ticket includes three (3) admissions for exhibitor only, to the fairgrounds only (does not include rides or grandstands). This ticket is designed for those persons who enter open class events such as needlework, crafts or art who do not need, nor want to come to the fair all six days.
 - B. \$30.00 Ticket includes six (6) admissions for exhibitor only, to the fairgrounds only (does not include rides or grandstands).
 - C. All persons entering one to four animals in an open class event MUST purchase an Exhibitors Ticket for \$20.00 or \$30.00 or a \$40.00 Membership Ticket.
5. D. All persons entering five or more animals in an open class event MUST purchase a \$30.00 Exhibitor's Ticket or a \$40.00 Membership Ticket.
6. E. Junior Fair members who enter only one animal in one class must pay the entry fee but are not required to purchase an Exhibitor's Ticket. If more than one animal or more than one class is entered, an Exhibitor's ticket MUST be purchased.
7. F. Any exhibitor age 1 through 12 may enter a maximum of two (2) items total without purchasing an Exhibitor's Ticket. Items may be entered in departments: 7-8-9-10-11-12-13-14-16 or 17.
5. Week Pass - \$40 - A Week Pass includes six (6) admissions for bearer to the fairgrounds only (does not include rides or grandstands).
6. All tickets will be scanned at the gate.
7. Those persons with a ticket (other than daily admission ticket) who wish to leave the grounds and want to return the same day must get stamped at the gate upon entering the fairgrounds or they will be required to pay admission fee to re-enter.
8. Ride privilege for membership, exhibitor and patron ticket holders, 4-H and Jr. Fair members, senior citizens, children 4 years and under and other pass holders may be purchased for \$9.00 per day.
9. Grandstand admission is included in daily fair admission. Those with a week pass, membership ticket, exhibitor pass or 4H band will be required to pay \$5 per grandstand event for admission. It is not included in the price.

Pit Passes: Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday - \$25.00

10. Jr. Fair members will be allotted only their Jr. Fair admission wristband, which must be secured on wrist or ankle.

11. No Gate Refunds. No reissuing of lost season tickets. Gate admission ticket for adult may not be transferred to child for ride wristband.

CAMPERS - \$200 Fair week WEST lot (by horse show ring), \$200 EAST lot (by livestock barns). Electrical & water hookups may not be available for all campers.

1. Camping is on a renewal basis. Those not on renewal can be put on a waitlist for when a spot opens up. Please email info@ashtabulafair.com with any questions.

PAID PARKING - \$30.00 Fair week

1. SPACE AVAILABLE ON A LIMITED BASIS ONLY! Open class and Jr. Fair livestock exhibitors and Jr. Fair advisors, and concessions only. Must be mailed or brought to the secretary's office with entry fees by Aug. 1. ALL PARKING SPACES WILL BE ASSIGNED BY

THE SUPERINTENDENT. LIMIT: 2 SPACES PER EXHIBITOR FAMILY. Parking permits will be issued starting Thursday, July 31.

ENTRIES:

1. **Deadline for entries: All departments (except Floral) - July 28.**
2. Parties must decide for themselves in what class their animal or article should be entered, and no changes will be made, except on written order of the Department Superintendent.
3. Entries must include name, mailing address, articles being entered and signature of entrant.
4. An entry tag is given for each entry, which the exhibitor must attach conspicuously to the articles entered, and unless attached, the exhibit will receive no attention from the judge.
5. The Fair Board reserves the privilege to refuse or return any entry
6. When there is only one entry in a class, the judge shall decide if the animal or article is worthy of a premium.

EXHIBITORS:

1. Exhibitors of all stock whether from Ashtabula County or not, are eligible to compete for premiums, unless otherwise indicated.
2. No animal or article can be entered for more than one premium, except when specifically stated in special rules of a department.
3. Exhibitors of purebred stock shall exhibit to the Superintendent of the proper department written or printed registered pedigree of the animal before presenting it to the ring for exhibition.
4. All entries must be made in the name of the owner of the animal or article entered.
5. Articles exhibited singly cannot compete in collections unless allowed by the special rule of the class.
6. Exhibitors must study the order of the exhibition and have their animals at the proper place for showing at the proper hour. There will be no waiting or delay.
7. Riding or driving of horses in parking lots will not be permitted. Horses allowed in designated areas only.
8. **All deliveries of feed and supplies must be made before 10 a.m. No vehicles will be permitted in the cattle barns area after 10 a.m.**
9. **All unauthorized and non-permitted vehicles will be towed at owner's expense. No unoccupied vehicles during loading and unloading will be tolerated. All vehicles must be parked in designated areas. No exceptions.**
10. The Officers of the Society will take every precaution for the care and preservation of all exhibits after their arrival and arrangement, but will not be responsible for loss or damage that may occur while exhibits are on the fairgrounds.

PREMIUMS:

1. **No PREMIUM checks will be issued during the fair.** All premium checks will be mailed to winners by the Saturday following the end of the Fair.
2. Where there is no competition in non-stake races, no premiums will be paid and entry fees will be returned.
3. In case of shortage of funds, all premiums will be pro-rated.
4. Any exhibitor winning over \$600 premiums must complete a form W-9 at the Secretary's office. A check will not be released until this form is on file. A 1099 statement will be issued at the end of the year.
5. The Ashtabula County Agricultural Society reserves the right to cancel or modify, with or without notice, any or all of the provisions, premiums, or purses specified in our 2026 premium book without recourse if required to do so by strikes or other conditions beyond our control, which would in the opinion of the Board of Directors of the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society seriously interfere with the holding of the 2026 fair.

STALLS AND PENS:

1. No bedding or feed will be furnished.
2. The Speed Secretary will assign horses.
3. All other stalls and pens will be under the exclusive control of

the Superintendent of the proper department.

4. All animals must have proper feed and water.

JUDGES:

1. Judges will report to the proper department at the time specified by the department superintendent.
2. Judges will make out their reports, sign with name and mailing address, and return to the Secretary
3. Judges will award no premiums to objects not meritorious, although there may be no competition.
4. No person shall be allowed to act as a judge in any class where he is an exhibitor.
5. Unsoundness in animals must be carefully considered in making awards.
6. No notice will be taken of exhibits unless the exhibitor has complied with all the rules for competition.
7. Judges should carefully study the rules pertaining to their classes and should be careful in attaching the premium card and making their reports to correspond.
8. Judges will report to the Secretary the names of any persons who interfere with them while making their awards or attempts to talk to them in relation to the merits of any exhibit.

PROTESTS:

1. All disputed awards of premiums shall be decided upon the basis of the judge's report from which there shall be no appeal.
2. All protests must be made in writing and filed with the Secretary at 12 Noon of the day following the award, and must be accompanied by a fee of \$5.00 which will be retained by the Society if the protest is not sustained.

REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS:

1. No animal shall be removed from the grounds or buildings before 7 p.m. on the last day of the fair. Large animals (cattle, horses, sheep & swine) will be released from the buildings at 7 p.m. Small animals (rabbits, goats, poultry) may be walked or carried out to the parking lot between 7 - 9 p.m., but vehicles to remove small animals will not be admitted to the main fairgrounds until after 9 p.m.
2. All other open class exhibits may be removed after 9 a.m. Monday, Aug. 17 (unless authorized by department superintendent), and before 12 noon.
3. Jr. Fair clubs and schools may remove items from display booths in the Commercial Building on Monday, Aug. 17 ONLY, from 7 a.m. to 12 noon and 3-6 p.m.

PROTECTIVE MEASURES:

1. No unlicensed gambling, games of chance, or selling intoxicating liquors will be allowed on the grounds and laws prohibiting the same will be rigidly enforced. Every officer of the Society is appointed a special policeman to enforce this rule and any person violating the same.
2. Watchmen or police officers are on duty on the grounds during the continuance of the fair. The Society, however, is not and will not be responsible for damage to or theft of any property or injury to persons attending the fair at any time, whether indoors or outdoors.
3. The Society will not be responsible for theft or damage of automobiles, accessories, or contents.
4. The officers of the Society do not authorize, nor will they tolerate, dangerous driving or racing.
5. The Society will not be responsible for exhibits or displays.
6. A First Aid Station will be maintained on grounds.
7. No dogs, except service dogs, will be permitted on the grounds.
8. No unauthorized golf carts, ATVs or motorized vehicles will be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
9. Curfew: 1 a.m.
10. No skateboards, inline skates, scooters or paint ball guns will be allowed on the grounds.
11. No riding bicycles on grounds. Bicycles must be walked in for races on Tuesday.

CONSTITUTION
ASHTABULA COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Revised and Adopted 2023

ARTICLE I - TITLE

This association, an agricultural non-profit corporation, shall be known as the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society, Inc.

This Amendment, approved by a majority vote of the membership voting upon the proposed Amendment, will become effective upon the completion of the Society's filing for incorporation.

ARTICLE II - OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be to exhibit, to educate and to promote the encouragement of agriculture, horticulture, and the rearing of better livestock, improvement of domestic science and art, promote general community betterment, together with all other commercial and educational interests of the county.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Any resident of Ashtabula County may become a member by purchasing a membership ticket from the Secretary or a designated agency, the price which shall be set by the Board of Directors. This purchase of this membership ticket shall be made prior to 8 p.m. the closing day of the fair next.

Section 2. No person shall pay for or secure more than one membership in the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society and that membership shall be for himself or herself.

ARTICLE IV - DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of eighteen members, who shall be elected at large for a term of three years, and the terms of said Directors shall be arranged so that the terms of one-third of the Directors shall expire annually.

Section 2. Not more than two Directors shall be from any one township at any one time, except the township in which the fair is held, that being not more than three.

ARTICLE V - ELECTIONS

Section 1. The annual election of Directors of this Society shall be by ballot and shall be held in Jefferson on the third Saturday of September between the hours of twelve and four P.M.

Section 2. Any member of the Society may become a candidate for Director by posting with the Secretary, seven days before the annual election, a petition, signed by ten members of the Society.

Section 3. Only members of the Society, 21 years of age, and residents of Ashtabula County, holding membership tickets, purchased under the rules stated in Article 3, Section 1 of this Constitution, shall be entitled to vote.

Section 4. Candidates for Director must be members of the Society.

Section 5. All potential candidates for Director must attend a minimum of two complete regular monthly meetings in the previous 12 months to be eligible to pull a petition.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. Notice of an election of Directors shall be given by the Secretary no earlier than six weeks and not later than two weeks before the election is held and published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the county.

Section 2. A Director being elected from a township and moving into another township within the county may serve out the term for which he is elected and be credited to the township from which elected.

Section 3. Any vacancy on the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority vote until the next regular election, at which time a Director shall be elected to fill the remainder of the term vacated. The Director to be appointed or elected to the un-expired term shall be a resident from the Township where the

vacancy occurred.

Section 4. The term of the retiring Directors shall expire and that of the Directors-elect shall begin on the second Saturday of October each year, or at such time as their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VII - ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall meet annually, not later than the second week of October, and elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Speed Secretary and Superintendent of Grounds, or any other officer they deem proper, to serve one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 2. All officers shall be members of the Board except the Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent of Grounds, Speed Secretary, and Concession Manager, who may or may not be members of the Board.

Section 3. Before the election of officers, the newly elected Directors shall qualify by taking the following oath from competent authority: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Ohio, the rules and regulations of the Department of Agriculture, State of Ohio, pertaining to Agricultural Societies, and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of The Ashtabula County Agricultural Society, so help me God."

Section 4. If a member of the Board of Directors be absent from three consecutive meetings duly called, unless prevented by actual sickness of himself or immediate family, his place shall be declared vacant by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Directors and filled according to Article VI, Section 3.

ARTICLE VIII - MISCELLANEOUS

Section 1. The compensation of the Board members shall be fixed by the Board in accordance with the rules of the State Department of Agriculture.

Section 2. The board shall fix the salary of the Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent of Grounds, Speed Secretary, and Concession Manager in an amount as it deems proper.

Section 3. The Board shall be allowed to employ and compensate any member of the Board of Directors for services rendered.

Section 4. (In accordance with Ohio Attorney General Opinion 2013-023). The society may authorize the use of moneys to acquire alcoholic beverages and a liquor permit to sell the beverages at an event that is open to the public and conducted on the fairgrounds and retain the revenue derived from the sales.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of said Society by a majority vote of the membership, voting upon the proposed amendment.

Section 2. Amendments to the Constitution or Bylaws may be proposed by:

A. A majority of the Board of Directors, at a scheduled meeting, voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot.

B. Filing a petition with the Secretary at least fourteen days prior to the annual election of the Board of Directors, said petition must set forth the proposed amendment and be signed by not less than twenty-five members of the Society.

ARTICLE X - POLITICAL ACTIVITY

This society shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office or legislative activity.

ARTICLE XI - DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of this organization, any assets shall not inure to the benefit of any members, but shall be distributed to another 501(c)(3) organization of similar nature and exempt purpose.

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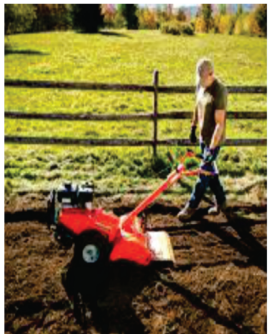
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ASHTABULA COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY HISTORY

On October 30, 1822, a group of pioneer citizens met at the old brick Court House in Jefferson to form the Ashtabula Agricultural Society. From the small group assembled, a committee was appointed to draft a Constitution for the Society, whose purpose it was to promote the interest of agriculture in the forest covered land of Ashtabula County.

At the first annual meeting held January 16, 1823, Nehemiah King was elected President; Eliphalet Austin, first vice-president; Edward Fifield, second vice-president; Matthew Hubbard, corresponding secretary; Jacob Austin, auditor; and Timothy R. Hawley, treasurer.

The First Annual Cattle Show and Fair was held in Austintown on the first Tuesday in October, 1823 featuring a total of \$40 in premiums. The top prize of \$10 was awarded to Jonathan Warner for the best improved farm of 50 acres. Mrs. Cybelia St. John won the first prize for the best grass bonnet in imitation leghorn. The Cattle Show and Fair was repeated the next year in Austintown and in 1825 moved to Ashtabula, in hopes of attracting greater interest; but the response was not successful and in 1826, the Fourth Annual Cattle Show and Fair was held in Jefferson. The first Fair in Jefferson was held on the town square with livestock displays tied to the hitching posts in front of the Court House. The people of Jefferson failed to support the project and the fifth Fair was planned, but never held.

The Society's activities ceased for the next 15 years. On March 7, 1842, the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society was organized under the leadership of R. W. Griswold. The First Annual Fair was held at the Court House on October 15, 1842. Mr. Griswold had this to say in his annual report: "While public attention in our day is so divided and directed to so many different objects, each claiming such a share of time, means and energies of individuals as to prevent any one being fully attended to, this Society presents a common platform where the whole community can rally as a citizen of common course and as a friend."

A special meeting was called on June 25, 1846, and the Society, as formed in 1842, was dissolved "for want of interest taken by the citizens of the county." On September 12, 1846, in answer to an appeal made by the Ashtabula Sentinel, a second organization was formed under the new regulations of the State Department of Agriculture.

The First Annual Fair of the re-born Society was held at the Court House on October 16, 1846. The present fairgrounds was acquired in the early 1850's. The records show in 1854 the Society expended \$2,500 to erect an Agricultural Hall and other improvements to the fairgrounds. The Fair of 1858 drew

a total of 5,000 people.

In 1861 the fairgrounds was turned into an Army Camp, known as Camp Giddings, where 1,500 men from Northeastern Ohio were camped. On Christmas Day they marched from Jefferson to Ashtabula where they were entrained for Columbus and were mustered into the Union Army. The 29th Ohio Volunteers were engaged in some of the most severe fighting of the Civil War.

The first race track, a third of a mile oval, was built in the early 1870's. In 1914 a balloon ascension was the highlight of the fair. In 1915 the newly built log cabin was dedicated. The logs for the structure were given by or in memory of local pioneers who had been born in a log cabin. Expansion and improvements proved impossible as a private concern, so sometime in the 1920's, the County took title to the property, but left it under the control of the Agricultural Society.

The 1945 Fair featured a display of 2000 German and Japanese mementos in the Octagon Building, souvenirs of local servicemen returned from World War II. VJ Day in 1945 brought one of the largest single day attendance records when 14,000 people jammed the midway.

The "Centennial Fair" in 1946 brought many improvements to the fairgrounds including the first paved midway. The 100th Ashtabula County Fair featured a historical parade with every township represented and a pioneer exhibit in the Octagon Building displaying relics of early settlers and a photographic display of the county's history presented by the Historical Society.

In June 1956 the new grandstand was completed by Southern Bleachers Construction Co. of Graham, Texas. The 1980's saw a burst of growth at the fairgrounds with many new facilities added including the Small Animal Building, Concession Office, Sheriff Patrol's Office, 4-H Saddlehorse and Draft Horse Barns, Entertainment Pavilion and Market Animal Barn.

The years have seen a lot of changes for the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society, but the goals of the Society remain constant: "to promote the encouragement of agriculture, horticulture, and the rearing of better livestock, improvement of domestic science and art, promote general community betterment, together with all other commercial and educational interests of the county."

With the support and dedication of local citizens the society has been able to continue their work to attain these goals as well as to provide a fun and exciting annual event for the community to enjoy.

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BYLAWS
ASHTABULA COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

ARTICLE I - QUORUM

Section 1. For the transaction of business, a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE II- MEETINGS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall meet monthly to conduct regular business of the Agricultural Society.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall meet not later than 21 days after the close of the fair to pass on premiums to be paid and to transact any other business that may come before the Board.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall meet in January of each year, not later than two weeks after the close of the State Convention for the purpose of settling business of the previous year.

Section 4. Special meetings may be called by the President or any five Directors.

ARTICLE III - COMMITTEES AND SUPERINTENDENTS

Section 1. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the October meeting: Executive - Three members; Finance - Three members; Auditing - Three members; Market Animal - Three Members

ARTICLE IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

PRESIDENT

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board, use such authority as the interest of the Association may require, and exercise such other duties usually incumbent upon such officer.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to act for the President in his absence or vacancy of office and to assist the President in any manner necessary for the success of the fair.

SECRETARY

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep all Minutes and set up board meetings. He shall take policy items from the Minutes, keep separate instruction books and keep a list of all members of the Society. The Secretary of the Society shall:

(1) Announce the filing requirements for the office of director and information as to how these may be fulfilled:

(a) Conspicuously in the annual premium list and;

(b) Twice in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the county or district concerned, no earlier than six weeks and no later than two weeks before the annual election of directors;

(2) Furnish blank petitions to any member of the Society who requests such petitions at any reasonable time;

(3) Maintain and post a current list of the membership of the Society in a public place or make a current list available for inspection at any reasonable time, upon request of any resident of the county or district concerned;

(4) Determine the adequacy, including a determination that at least ten signatories are members of the Society, of the nominating petition filed by a candidate before he orders the name of said candidate printed on the ballots for the election.

The Secretary of the Society shall be responsible for:

(1) Place memberships for the following calendar year on sale not later than December 15th of each year;

(2) Keep memberships on sale an average of thirty hours each week at a place or places specified by the directors, at least until five days before the annual fair of the Society

(3) Announce the days and hours when memberships may be purchased and the place where they may be purchased in:

(a) The annual premium list

(b) At least one newspaper of general circulation in the county or district concerned at least twice during the period of sale - once when the tickets go on sale and once no less than seven days before sale is terminated, but no earlier than twenty-one days before the sale is ended.

The Secretary shall be in charge of the annual report and posting notice in the newspaper; all government forms to be submitted; in charge of the Fair Catalogue; with the finance committee, regulate the use of complementaries and passes as directed by the Board; turn over to the Treasurer all monies collected by him; initiate all payment of premiums;

give satisfactory bond; over-see secretarial workers, and receive and disburse all correspondence.

TREASURER

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all monies of the Association and pay out all monies on decision of Board; supervise all people connected with the selling and taking of tickets; he shall receipt the Finance Committee for all admission and grandstand tickets turned over to him previous to the fair; submit a detailed statement of the fair to the Board by the first regular meeting after the fair; he shall keep an account of all receipts and expenditures, pay all bills after Board approval; prepare and issue all horse race premium checks, and set up accruals of income and payables in final month of year (September) as to comply with new state instructions.

SUPERINTENDENT OF GROUNDS

Section 5. The Superintendent of Grounds shall hire police department and Fairground workers with Board approval. He shall control the fair grounds and buildings, have complete upkeep of grounds, track, and buildings and all Board equipment. He shall supervise all fair ground maintenance workers, be in charge of obtaining material to work with and in charge of inventory of Fair Board property.

SPEED SECRETARY

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Speed Secretary to have general oversight of all races during the Fair and to secure the horses for the same.

CONCESSION MANAGER

Section 7. The Concession manager shall be in charge of rental of buildings and grounds all year, he shall write all rental contracts, coordinate with Superintendent of Grounds to insure grounds and buildings are ready, handle all inquiries for rent of buildings, take care of public relations, rent and locate concession space for the fair, he shall coordinate with the Electrician; enforce all rules; and answer all inquiries.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of the fair grounds and buildings, to see that they are kept in repair and in a neat and clean condition. They may recommend new buildings, repairs on old buildings or any improvements for the benefit of the Fair Board for its approval. In case of new buildings, they shall assume the duties of a building committee and perform any other duties as directed by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to turn over to the Treasurer all general admission and grandstand tickets before the fair, taking his receipt for same, also to receive all unsold tickets after the fair, giving the Treasurer a receipt for same. They shall OK all bills before an order can be drawn for their payment, also keep an accurate account of all passes and complementaries issued and supervise the execution of suitable bonds to the Secretary and Treasurer and refer them to the Board of Directors for approval.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee to inspect and audit the books of the Secretary and the Treasurer and report the result of its findings to the Board of Directors, said report to show an itemized statement of receipts and expenditures for the year. This report to be made at the January meeting.

Section 4. The President shall appoint a committee on special attractions, consisting of two Directors who, with the Secretary, shall secure special attractions, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. At the October meeting, the President shall appoint a committee of three to assign a superintendent to the various departments, whose report at the next regular meeting shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Market Animal Committee to oversee, operate, manage, or otherwise conduct the market animal sale, annually, during the course of the Ashtabula County Fair. The committee shall have the authority to establish a sub-committee to assist in or otherwise conduct the day to day operation of the market animal sale. The Market Animal Committee shall regularly report to the Fair Board its

activities. A financial report and accurate accounting shall be filed with the Secretary and Treasurer of the Fair Board no later than October 31 of each calendar year. The Committee shall have rule-making authority not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws to efficiently and orderly conduct the market animal sale. All rules adopted by the Committee shall be consistent with any applicable Ohio Revised Code, Ohio Administrative Code, Ohio Department of Agriculture regulation or rule, any United States Code, rule, law, or statute, and any rule or regulation established by FFA or 4-H concerning animal sales.

ARTICLE VI - MISCELLANEOUS EXECUTIVE AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Board of Directors may combine the Executive and Finance Committees as one, consisting of three members who shall perform all duties of both committees.

CONCESSION RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. **GENERAL RULES** - The Society through its authorized agent who shall be known as Concession Manager shall have the letting of all such privileges as are required to furnish the necessary wants of its patrons or that may add to their comfort, convenience and pleasure. Under no circumstances will privileges or concessions of questionable nature be sold or in any manner tolerated on the grounds or in the buildings. The Society further reserves the right to deny space to any concessionaire at its discretion.

The Society reserves the right to close any privilege or concession at any time and order its removal from the Fairgrounds and may, if it so desires, declare any concession or privilege fee which may have been paid as a forfeit.

The abuse of any concessionaire of any privilege granted, by extortion, sale of impure or un-wholesome food, or dishonest goods or untidy or unsanitary appearance of booths or of their helpers, or other acts or practices objectionable to the directors of the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society will forfeit all rights and privileges without recourse.

The selling, dealing, bartering in, or giving away of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors will not be allowed.

2. **DELIVERIES** - ALL DELIVERIES OF SUPPLIES MUST BE MADE BEFORE 11 A.M. NO TRUCKS OR PRIVATE CARS OR GOLF CARTS WILL BE PERMITTED ON THE MIDWAY OR IN THE AREA OF THE EXHIBITION HALLS AFTER 11 A.M.

3. **HEALTH DEPARTMENT** - All dining halls, lunch booths and other stands shall be substantial in structure and when serving or dispensing foods, drinks, confections etc. shall be subject to supervision of the Dairy and Food Division of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the Ashtabula County Health Department.

4. **FAIR HOURS** - Midway and Exhibit buildings open at 9 a.m. daily. Closing hour is 11 p.m. Closing time of last night is 10 PM

5. **PAYMENT OF FEES** - Lessee is required to pay all privilege fees in advance prior to concession set up times.

6. **INSTALLATION OF EXHIBITS** - May be set up anytime three days prior to the opening of the Fair. All Exhibits and concessions must be in place the day previous to opening day.

7. **BOOTH EQUIPMENT AND CONSTRUCTION** - All exhibits must be maintained in complete form from the opening to the closing of the fair and must be adequately manned during the period that the fair is open to the public. The Lessee must, at all times, have a designated employee at each stand with ability and authority to handle any and all situations as they may arise. Courtesy and politeness to the public is mandatory. Exhibits cannot be dismantled until after the close of the show Sunday night at 10 p.m. No nails or screws may be driven into the building walls, floors, ceilings, or columns, and no damage of any nature may be done to any building on the grounds. All backdrops must be parallel with the rear walls and not more than eight feet in height. All structural work, such as extra shelving, display racks, etc., must meet the approval of the Concession Manager. All exhibitors

will be required to furnish all booth setup, decorating and extra light fixtures and bulbs. All food concessions must have a fire extinguisher.

8. **PARKING** - All vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas. Concession parking on grounds is very limited and parking stickers are needed. Vehicle traffic to and from the midway area is strictly prohibited during fair hours.

9. **SOLICITING** - No solicitation or distribution of literature shall be permitted on the fairgrounds except by qualified exhibitors who may use this privilege only from within the confines of their own booths.

10. **HOUSEKEEPING** - All aisles must be kept clear. The Lessee is responsible for the proper storage and disposal of refuse pertinent to the operation of his concession. Concessionaires must rake and clean up around their concessions immediately after closing each night.

11. **SUBLETTING OF SPACE IS PROHIBITED.**

12. **ELECTRIC SERVICE** - Electric charges will be established during the fair based on the service and amount of electricity used. Charges for this service will be collected before the close of the fair. 110 volt single phase available in all buildings- 220 volt single phase only in certain booths. No electrical connection shall be made without the approval of the Concession Manager. **Only the Fair Board's authorized electrician may connect & disconnect electrical hookups.**

13. **EXHIBITORS PASSES** - The fair reserves the right to limit the number of passes.

14. **PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS** - Not permitted in permanent buildings.

15. **DRAWINGS** - Free drawings, balloons, giveaways must be approved by the Concession Manager. Immoral shows, lottery devices, games of chance or gambling of any kind will not be permitted. **No raffles that include exchange of money will be permitted during the fair.** No exceptions. (Ohio Revised Code 1711.09).

16. **EXCLUDED ITEMS** - Energy drinks, glass bottles, string putty, toy guns, tasers (in any form), knives, laser pointers and animals (with the exception of gold fish) are not allowed to be sold at concession stands or given out as game prizes.

17. **WORK LAWS** - Lessee shall comply with both State and Federal minimum wage and hour laws, child labor laws and agrees to hold harmless the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society from any claim presented by any person entitled to benefits under these laws. **The lessee will be held responsible and accountable for actions of Lessee's employees.**

18. **CANCELLATION** - It is mutually understood and agreed that in the event of fire, wind storm, disaster, Act of God, Act of War or Public Authority, riot, accident, strikes, scarcity of energy or fuel, or any act beyond the control or power of either party, preventing the holding of the Ashtabula County Fair in full or part, neither party shall hold the other liable for any damages of any kind. **Failure of lessee to cancel by 60 days prior to Fair will result in forfeit of one-half of funds paid. Failure of lessee to cancel by 30 days prior to Fair**

will result in forfeit of all funds paid. Lessor shall retain the payments as liquidated damages. Both lessee and lessor agree that such amounts are not a penalty.

19. **LAWS AND REGULATIONS** - The Lessee agrees to abide by and conform to all Laws of the State of Ohio, the Laws of the Village of Jefferson, Ohio, the Laws Rules and Regulations of the State of Ohio Agricultural Departments and the Rules and Regulations of the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society.
20. **INSURANCE** - The Lessee is required to carry **Public Liability Insurance in the minimum limits of Bodily Injury \$500,000 and Property Damage \$5,000, evidence of such insurance to be supported by a Certificate of Insurance, issued by the insuring company. The Lessee agrees to indemnify and hold harmless**

the Ashtabula County Agricultural Society for any claims, demands liabilities, cost or attorney fees arising from, or in any way connected with Lessee's concession at the Ashtabula County Fair.

21. The Board of Directors, upon identification, at any time reserves the right to visit, without charge, any exhibition on the grounds or in the buildings.
22. **WARNING** - No person at any time may operate any side show, amusement, game or device, or offer for sale any novelty by auction or solicitation, on such fairgrounds who has not first obtained from the Director of Agriculture such license as is provided by Section 1711.11 of the Revised Code.

All animals requiring official health papers MUST be accompanied by those papers upon arrival at the Fairgrounds. Those without papers will be sent home.

2026 SEASON/OHIO'S LIVESTOCK HEALTH EXHIBITION RULES

901:1-18-01. CHAPTER'S APPLICATION.

- (A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- (B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter.

- (A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code; or the Ohio State Fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- (B) "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Approved Veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services.
- (D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the State of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- (F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules - Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication," and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03. EXHIBITIONS: SANITATION, INSPECTION

AND RECORDS.

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
- (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any contagious or infectious diseases;
 - (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of contagious or infectious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04. EXHIBITORS.

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of

the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

- (D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Industry.

901:1-18-05. POULTRY AND FOWL.

A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

- (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph- or
- (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/ fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph- or
- (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph- or
- (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and found negative.

(B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A) (2), (A) (3) and (A) (4) of this rule.

(C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06. CATTLE.

(A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.

(B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

- (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
- (2) Originate from a tuberculosis - accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
- (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
- (4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
- (5) If from a Brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official Brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
- (6) If from a Brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.

(C) Cattle from a Brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be Brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07. GOATS.

(A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined

in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
- (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02(G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
- (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.

(C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08. HORSES, MULES AND PONIES.

(A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for Equine Infectious Anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.

(B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for Equine Infectious Anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09. SHEEP.

(A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age or older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued

within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and

- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

901:1-18-10 SWINE.

(A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
- (3) Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage IV area shall:
 - (a) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (b) Originate from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.

(B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (a) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage IV area; and
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.

901:1-18-11. LLAMA.

(A) Camelids including, but not limited to llamas, alpacas and vicuñas moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious or infectious disease.

(B) Camelids including, but not limited to llamas, alpacas and vicuñas imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification.
- (2) When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

**ASHTABULA COUNTY FAIR
LIVESTOCK EXHIBITION HEALTH REGULATIONS
ALL EXHIBITION LIVESTOCK, EXCEPT TERMINAL MARKET PROJECTS AND POULTRY, ARE TO BE INSPECTED AND HAVE A CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (HEALTH PAPERS) AND BE REVIEWED BY THE FAIR VETERINARIAN PRIOR TO BEING UNLOADED AT THE FAIRGROUNDS**

- (1) All Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Sheep, and Market Goat Animals, all Lactating Dairy Cattle and Lactating Goats are to be **free of any drug residues upon arrival at the fair** or delivery to the slaughter house for the carcass shows.
- (2) All Junior Fair exhibitors with Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Sheep, Market Goat, Market Poultry, Lactating Dairy Cattle, Lactating Goat, Rabbit, Dairy Beef Feeder and Beef Feeder projects will be required to attend a Quality Assurance course sponsored by the Junior Fair Organizations.
- (3) All Junior Fair Exhibitors with the above projects will be required to complete a Drug Use Notification Form and submit the correctly completed form to the Fair Veterinarian before unloading these animals at the fair. **Failure to correctly submit this form will result in disqualification from Junior Fair Competition and, unless entered in open class competition (Dairy Cattle Only), will be sent home.**
- (4) Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Goat, Market Sheep and Market Poultry carcass projects will be required to submit a completed Drug Use Notification Form to the MAC Fair Board Superintendents or their designate upon delivery to the slaughter house. Failure to provide a correct and complete form will result in disqualification from participation in the carcass show.
- (5) All cattle, including dairy beef feeders, except for terminal market steers, are to be vaccinated for BVD-IBR-P13-LEPTO 5 **no later than two weeks before the start of the fair.** Dairy Beef Feeders and Beef Feeders are required to have an Enforce 3 vaccination also. Date of vaccinations to be on health papers.
- (6) The use of Clembuterol and any other unapproved drugs is prohibited.
- (7) No tranquilizers may be used on animals at the fair, including products such as Calf Calm and diuretics for cosmetic purposes.
- (8) (a) All horses, mules and ponies in state must have a health certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening day of the exhibition.
- (b) All out of state horses, mules and ponies must have a health certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening day of the exhibition plus a negative Coggins test.
- (9) Horses, mules and ponies are strongly recommended to be vaccinated for the following: Eastern Equine Encephalitis, Western Equine Encephalitis, Tetanus, Rhino pneumonitis, Equine influenza & Rabies
- (10) Llamas and alpacas must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibitor opening date.
- (11) Goats: (a) Market goats and market lambs will need an official scrapie identification tag in Ashtabula County.
- (b) All other goats and sheep will need an official scrapie tag or official registry tattoo with accompanying papers to prove that it is an official state premises tattoo. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- (c) All goats and sheep, except market animals, need an official certification of veterinary inspection issued within 30 days of the opening day of the exhibition. PENDING PAPERS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED.
- (d) **NO INTACT MALES WILL BE PERMITTED.**
- (12) **ALL LIVESTOCK must enter the fair from the race track gate off of West Walnut on Sunday, August 9 between 2 and 8 p.m. and on Monday, August 10 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.**
- (13) **Market Animals that must arrive on Sunday, August 9 are Steers & Feeders; 2-4:30 p.m., Goats & Lambs 2-4 p.m., Hogs 5-8 p.m. Market Animals arriving on Sunday must be checked in, weighed, and in their assigned space by 8 p.m. Poultry and rabbits are to arrive on Monday, August 10 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. Market Animals arriving on Monday must be checked in, weighed, and in their assigned place by 3 p.m.**
- (14) **IMPORTANT! ALL MARKET ANIMAL EXHIBITOR PARENT OR GUARDIAN MUST have attended one of the MAC Parent meetings and have signed in at that meeting. Failure to do so will result the member being ineligible to bring a Market Animal to fair this year.**

OHIO LIVESTOCK TAMPERING EXHIBITION RULES

The Ashtabula County Agricultural Society adheres to, and requires that all individuals and organizations participating in activities involving the Ashtabula County Fair, which may be governed under it, to adhere to the Ohio State Exhibition tampering rules detailed in chapters 901-19 of the Ohio Administrative Code. The Ashtabula County Senior Fair Board recommends that all exhibitors and interested parties become knowledgeable in the rules. The Ashtabula County Senior Fair Board will make copies of the Ohio Administrative Code, chapters 901-19 available upon request.

EXHIBITOR CONDUCT

Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in an orderly and courteous manner. Harassment, profanity, and unsportsmanlike conduct toward fair officials, judges, show managers, help or exhibitors will not be tolerated. Violators will be dismissed from the show, asked to leave the premises, may forfeit all premiums won, and may be barred from further participation at future fairs.

RULE VIOLATIONS

- (1) Any individuals involved in a violation of the rules or regulations of the Ashtabula County Fair will be barred from exhibiting or participation at this fair and will forfeit all premiums, prize money and awards won in any junior fair and/or open class divisions.
- (2) In the question of a rule violation, the following due process will be used: The exhibitor and/or parties involved will be questioned by fair

officials. If it is felt that a violation has occurred, fair officials will make recommendations to the designated committee of the Senior Fairboard that is appointed to that particular department. After the committee hears the allegations and/or evidence, they will decide if the case should be brought before the full Board of Directors.

- (3) In the decision of allegations being brought before the Board, all parties involved will be notified of a meeting date with all parties having the right to present their views and/or evidence.
- (4) Upon hearing the case, the Fair Board will make a ruling.
- (5) The Fair Board reserves the right to impose penalties and take disciplinary action for any rule or policy violation occurring during the fair and at all fair related activities throughout the course of the year. These penalties may include, but are not limited to disqualification, loss of awards and premiums, as well as banishment from future fairs.

CATTLE DEPARTMENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Entry fees must accompany entries. Fees are for each animal or group entered.
2. Livestock will be checked into fairgrounds only between 2 and 8 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 9, 2026 and 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday, Aug. 10, 2026. Please enter fairgrounds on Sunday and Monday using the racetrack gate off of West Walnut Street. All animals must be checked by the fair vet at the gate before unloading.
3. All animals must be secured to the satisfaction of the superintendent.
4. Every female over twenty-four months must have produced a living calf within 12 months or prove to be with calf. A freemartin heifer shall be barred from showing until she has become of such age as to have proven a breeder. No animal which is not entered in single classes shall be permitted to show in groups.
5. Registry Certificates must be furnished when requested by the judges or superintendent. An animal of the Holstein breed will be considered registered if certificate shows at least 90% Holstein ancestry.
6. Ages of cattle under two years shall be stated in months on entry tag.
7. **All cattle must be in their proper places on the grounds by 3 p.m. Monday, Aug. 10, 2026.** Stalls for cattle will be allotted by the Superintendent of Cattle only, and not until entry is made and the fee paid.
8. Judging - See Schedule.
9. No grade classes (except for beef). All animals must have Registry Certificate and be purebred to enter. **No papers pending - papers in process will not be accepted. Copies of registration MUST accompany beef entries.** Any falsification by exhibitor, breeder, or previous owner will result in permanent barring from the Ashtabula County Fair.
10. The Society reserves the right to withhold the payment of premium money to any exhibitor who does not present his cattle in show condition, and if the premiums exceed the budget, the money will be prorated.
11. An exhibitor making a false or misleading statement, exhibiting cattle that have been artificially fitted or treated, showing an animal out of proper class, substituting one animal for another without correction of the records at the Cattle Superintendent's office before entering the ring, or for any other dishonorable practice, shall forfeit all premiums.
12. **Judges shall not award a prize to any unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given any animal that is not deserving of that award.**
No Junior or Senior Champion Awards will be made in classes where there are not at least two competing first-place winners unless the first-place winner is an outstanding animal, considered worthy by the judge, of the championship.
No Grand Championship will be awarded where there is not a junior and senior champion competing, unless the judge considers the one animal worthy of a Grand Champion.
In no cases will a Junior, Senior or Grand Champion be awarded to any animal which the judge does not consider worthy of the award.
13. No cattle will be released before 7 p.m. Sunday.
14. Genetic Recovery - only final step will be accepted.
15. All cows must be milked by the owners. The parlor manager is not responsible for milking.
16. On open show day, the parlor will be open at the completion of the cow classes. If you choose to use it at this time, it is your choice.
17. All animals in dairy lot # 1-6 MUST be in lactation.
18. Each open class animal will be given 3.5 feet per animal.
19. Exhibitor tack areas will only be assigned by superintendents if space is available.

Main ingredient and variety must be stated on entry blank for each entry. (Example, elderberry, concord etc.). Level of sweetness (dry, semi dry etc.) must be indicated on entry blank.

2. Ingredients may be fresh, dried, canned, concentrated, or otherwise preserved.

3. Wines must be amateur, homemade by the exhibitor by the process of fermentation and must not be blended with commercial wine or spirits.

4. Only one bottle may be entered in each class by exhibitor named. If a family makes wine, only one may be the exhibitor and the winner.

5. All wines in this department must be made by the exhibitor named.

6. Still wines must be submitted in bottle that were made to hold wine and that are standard 750ML, typical Rhine, Burgundy, or Bordeaux style. Bottles must be closed with a standard cylindrical wine cork. No capsules. Bottles are to be filled 1/2 to 3/4 inch of the cork.

7. Wines should be clear and free of suspended particles (not cloudy) and free of effervescence.

8. DO NOT label bottles. Label will be provided once wine is brought to the fair.

9. Wines should be room temperature (not chilled).

10. White or red dessert sweet wine is the ONLY category permitted to be fortified (alcohol added) and/or oxidized.

11. Option of the judge to move wines to another class, if entered in the wrong class.

The Royal Court is made up of a Junior Fair King, Queen, Prince and Princess. Entry forms can be picked up from the Ohio State University Extension office. These forms are to be completed and returned to the Extension office by the deadline specified on the application. Contestants will be interviewed at a scheduled time during a designated week in July. The royal court will be crowned on the Monday evening the night before fair opening. This will take place at the fairground grandstands during the Youth Parade. Professional attire should be worn for the interviews. For the pageant, queen and princess contestants should wear a formal gown. The king and prince contestants should wear a suit (note: tuxedos are not necessary).

Each contestant must be a youth member of a recognized Ashtabula

County youth organization; 4-H, FFA, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, FHA, Farm Bureau Youth or Grange Youth. Each contestant must have a complete project or display exhibited at the fair. Exceptions must be pre-approved by the Royal Court Committee. Failure to comply will result in disqualification. Each contestant must be a resident of Ohio. King and Queen contestants must be between the ages of 15-21 years of age as of January 1 of the current fair year. Prince and Princess contestants must be between the ages of 12-14 years of age as of January 1 of the current fair year. Contestants may not be married, nor be the parent of a child. If between the ages of 16-19 the Junior Fair Queen must enter the Ohio Fairs Queen Contest at the Ohio Fair Manager's Association Convention after being crowned.

ROLE OF THE JUNIOR FAIR BOARD AND JR. FAIR COMMITTEE:

The Junior Fair Board is organized with representation from Junior Fair youth group participants, including 4-H, FFA, Grange, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and is responsible for planning, conducting and evaluating various activities of the Junior Fair.

The Junior Fair Board is accountable to the Senior Fair Board. The Junior Fair Board may have advisors representing the various youth groups participating.

Perspective members must be 15 by December 31 to apply for membership. Applications are available during the fair at the Junior Fair office in the MAC Arena or from the OSU Extension office at other times. Applications are due September 1.

Ashtabula County Junior Fair

The county fair is a week filled with many activities and judging events. In order to receive a fair pass, members **MUST EXHIBIT** their projects in some way. Members can exhibit their projects through livestock judging events, club display booths, and the clothing style revue. The fair is the biggest display of Ashtabula County 4-H of the year and provides a lot of fun events and a chance to meet many new people. It is an excellent opportunity to show the general public what 4-H is all about. Attendance or exhibiting at the fair is not required for a member to complete a 4-H project; it is only required in order to receive a fair pass.

Fair Passes

The Senior Fair board graciously provides fair passes to members and advisors. Junior Fair Members participating in the Fair will receive one pass. 4-H Clubs will be given passes for their advisors based on their club membership. Wristbands will be distributed to Jr. Fair Club Advisors on Sunday, Aug. 9, 1-4 p.m. and Monday, Aug. 10, 9 a.m.-Noon at the Commercial Building.

2026 SUPER SHOWMAN CONTEST RULES

Sunday, Aug. 16, 2 p.m. - MAC Arena and Show Arena

2026 Rotation: Small Equine, Dairy Beef Feeder, Beef Feeder, Goat, Sheep, Dairy Cattle, Rabbit, Chicken, Hog

The Super Showman Contest is to be a fun contest in addition to a learning experience for contestants and spectators alike. All contestants and spectators are asked to practice only supportive showman ship and spectator behavior, before, during, and after all contests, good sportsmanship is an important part of all Junior Fair events.

This contest is open to the top youth showman for each animal species group. Both market and non-market animal projects are eligible to compete for representing their species group. A limit of one youth showman representative from each of the species groups included in that respective years rotation will be able to compete each year. Youth should be appointed by the species judge in a separate Showman of Showman class on each species respective show day as Showman of Showman classes allow all other Showmen for that species who took that project for the current fair to count it as finishing their second year in the project, consequently allowing more showmen to become eligible.

Each project area Species Chair is responsible for arranging for an adult judge whom is not a species chair and/or related to any participant. They are also responsible for submitting the representative form to the Jr. Fair Office by Saturday 9am or the species will not be represented in that year's Super Showman contest. The Species Chair is responsible for getting a maximum of 10 animals for use in the contest. Table judged animals involved in the respective years rotation are responsible for 2 animals for use in the contest. Judges should be from a non-participating club if possible. Youth may not enter the ring with their own project animal.

All youth who meet the following qualifications can participate in the Showman of Showmen classes:

- The Contestant must have completed at least two years in their

species group,

- The Contestant must be a minimum age of 13 years old as of January 1st of the current year and have taken the project they are to represent to the current fair.

- The Youth may not represent the same species for 2 years.

- A contestant may represent a different species after 1 year of not competing in the Super Showman contest.

- The Youth has not been chosen as the "Super Showman"

- These rules apply to any youth unable to complete the contest after beginning the contest.

All contestants will receive a Super Showman shirt and will wear proper show attire: pants, boots and numbers for identification purposes. A \$50 award will go to the overall Super Showman. In case of a tie, the tying contestants will both be named Super Showman and duplicate awards presented.

On the day of the Super Showman contest each judge will rank the contestants, with a 1 representing the best score, a 2 representing the second best score, etc. The contestant with the fewest total points is the winner of the contest. Each judge will state what is important in showing a particular species and the reasons for placing the winner at the top of the class. Scores of all contestants will be kept by an official scorekeeper. Scores will be read after each class. The judges' decisions are final. Table judged animals will be judged between prior to the 2 pm start of the arena judged animal show. Placings for the table judged classes will be announced at the beginning of the arena animal show. Representatives are to report to the Show Arena an hour before show time on Sunday.

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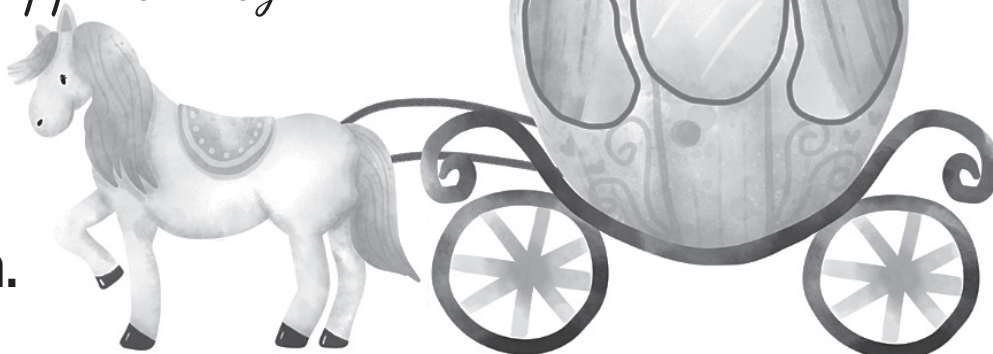
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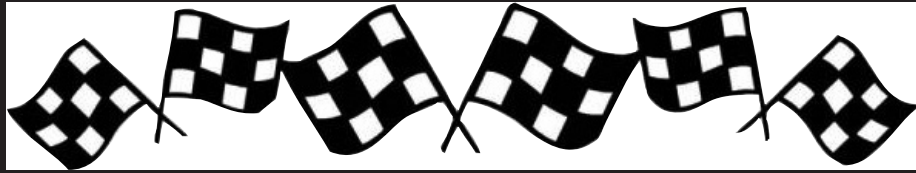
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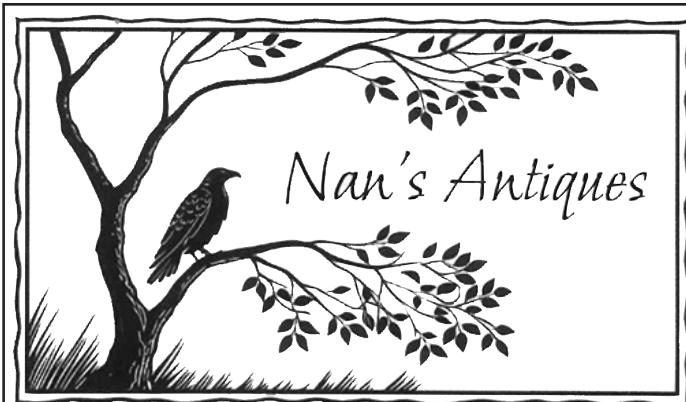
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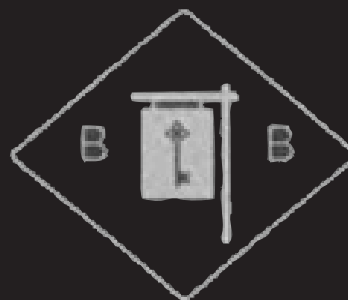

MEMBER AND ANIMAL REQUIREMENTS

1. All youth with lactating dairy animals must attend an entire 2 hour Assuring Quality Care for Animals/Quality Assurance (QA) session by June 1 of the current year. Doors close 10 minutes after the start time. There is no entry after that time. Virtual events may be offered. Watch your email and the 4-H Calendar for dates.
2. First year exhibitors are encouraged by the 4-H Dairy committee to take a calf project, but the final decision is by the parent and advisor working together to decide what is best for the member. First year members only are limited to exhibiting two dairy animals.
3. Female dairy animals only will be accepted. This show is for both 4-H and FFA. Members may show grade animals. All animals must be permanently identified, ear tags or tattoo, to verify health papers. No pen reservations will be accepted after the deadline. AT NO TIME will registration papers pending be accepted. If papers are pending then a DAIRY ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION form will need to be completed.
4. All animals must be permanently identified by following means at the time pen reservation are submitted. **The pen reservations must be submitted by 4:30 p.m. July 1.** No pen reservations will be accepted after the deadline.
 - a. Holsteins, Ayrshires & Milking Shorthorns may use any of the following: registration number, photo ID, calf hood vaccination #, permanent farm ear tag # or tattoo.
 - b. Guernsey, Jersey & Brown Swiss may use any of the following: registration number, calf hood vaccination #, and permanent farm ear tag # or ear tattoo.
 - c. Any animal NOT registered (grade animals) through a breed association MUST submit a Dairy Animal Identification Form (available in forms sections of guidelines) to receive an ID number. This number will then be used on the health papers.
5. Under extreme circumstances when a member has a single animal entered which dies a replacement may NOT be allowed. Each case will be reviewed by the 4-H Dairy Committee and Extension personal and they will make the final decision.
6. Under extreme circumstances if a member becomes disabled another 4-Her may be allowed to show his or her animal but no showmanship score will be given. Each case will be reviewed by the 4-H Dairy Committee and Extension personal and they will make the final decision
7. Any member exhibiting a lactating or market animal must attend a QA session by June 1.
8. If a member is taking a lactating cow and is using the parlor, the member is responsible to clean up any mess between the barn and the parlor
9. Under extreme circumstances the 4-H Dairy Committee will consider if a member's sole project cannot attend fair then the member may use another member's dairy project animal for showmanship. Each case will be reviewed by the 4-H Dairy Committee.
10. Any 4-H member leasing a dairy project animal must submit an animal lease form by June 1.

Health Regulations

1. Check Junior Fair Livestock updates regarding health regulations for checking animals onto the fairgrounds.
2. All Junior Fair cattle, regardless of age, will be required to have health papers done by the veterinarian within 30 days of fair.

3. AT NO TIME will registration papers pending be accepted.

4. No horns are permitted except for Junior and Intermediate calf.

JUNIOR FAIR SHOW REGULATIONS

1. Order of Classes and Class Description – Due to the combined nature of the Junior and Open Dairy Shows, the dairy classes will have all animals placed with Junior Members pulled ahead/forward for junior recognition and junior awards.  4. Each 4-H and FFA member will receive a project ribbon (A, B, C) sponsored by the Junior Fair Board. Project grading is based on Dairy Skill-a-thon, type and showmanship, 33 1/3%, 33 1/3%, 33 1/3% each. The judge's decision is final and uncontestable.
 5. All animals must be clipped prior to entering the show ring. The clipping of heads must be done prior to fair for the safety of the exhibitors and fair visitors. Any other clipping is encouraged to be done prior to the fair.
 6. The top line of an animal is to be done by junior fair member only. Advice maybe sought from an older 4-H/FFA member/advisor/parent.
 7. The majority of the work is to be done by the member but assistance of an adult can be given if needed.

Showmanship Contest Rules

1. Members must show in showmanship to complete their 4-H/FFA project to be eligible for best total score. All breeds show together. Classes determined by years of experience of showman in dairy. These classes are subject to change per the 4-H Dairy Committee based on yearly project enrollments.

By years of experience in the following order:

- A. 7 yrs. of experience and over
- B. 5 & 6 years of experience
- C. 3 & 4 years of experience
- D. 2 years of experience
- E. 1 year of experience
- F. Supreme Showman Class

- a. The winners of previous classes compete. The Judge will pick a Supreme and Reserve Supreme Showman but will rank all five participants. Only Supreme and Reserve Supreme Showman will be announced. Ranking will determine Super Showman representation
2. When a member wins any age group one year, the following year they will move to the next age group. Once a winner in the most experienced group (7 yrs. of experience and over), the winner will continue to compete in 7 yrs. of experience and over.
3. Required show attire for exhibitors is black pants, a club or white shirt and hard shoes or work boots. No tennis shoes will be allowed.

Dairy Skill-a-thon:

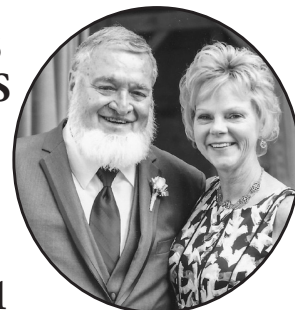

1. All dogs must be licensed according to State Law.
2. 2026 Dog Registration and the 2026 Ashtabula County Dog Project Identification Form and Vaccination/Health Certificate side must be filled out by the vet and be turned in by May 1 to the OSU Extension Office.
3. All dogs must be current on Vaccinations until Aug. 16, 2026 and must have their rabies shot by May 1, 2026. The committee recommends the Kennel Cough Vaccine because your dog will be around other dogs.
4. Dogs must be six months old by Aug. 1st of the current year.
5. **NO WOLF OF WOLF HYBRID WILL BE ALLOWED**
6. All Dog 4-H project members must take Obedience.
7. All Dog projects will go through the Dog Skill-a-thon on Saturday, July 11 (except for 201D; which will be judged at general judging. Please see Skill-a-thon Sample Score Card for information on what to expect.
8. Show levels: Obedience, Showmanship, Rally, and Agility (performance)
 - Beginner: first or second year showing a dog.
 - Intermediate: third and fourth year showing a dog.
 - Advanced: five or more years showing a dog. (exceptions to these levels may be made by the Specie Chair and Extension Educator)
9. The Ohio 4-H Dog Show Score Sheets will be used for all classes.
10. Member's scores from all their classes will be added together for the Best Total Score Award. This includes: Skill-a-thon, Obedience, Rally, Showmanship, and Agility. This award is given in each level (beginner, intermediate, and advanced)
11. Awards will be presented at the Show.
12. **DRESS CODE** - Exhibitors must be neat, clean, and well-groomed in appearance. Youth with long hair should tie it back. No flip flops or sandals, closed toe shoes are to be worn. Examples of appropriate show

attire includes: slacks and a nice blouse or collared shirt. More details on clothing for the show will be covered at the clinics. Violation of this rule will result in the member being dismissed from the judging.

13. There will be NO foul language permitted at any time during the Judging or Awards. Any member or adult using foul language will be dismissed.

IMPORTANT! See page 26 FOR ASHTABULA COUNTY FAIR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITION HEALTH REGULATIONS

Junior Fair equine health certificates must include the project's Body Condition Score and Lameness Grade. Body condition and lameness scores prepared by a licensed veterinarian within thirty days of fair are required in order to have a professional opinion on the project animal's fitness for competition.

Approved ASTM/ASTI helmets must be worn by all youth and adults at 4-H/Junior Fair functions during any riding or driving activities.

Equine Skills will be measured by:

1. Completing the REQUIRED Skill-a-Thon Test, typically administered on Super Saturday. (See calendar for date.) Participants may earn up to 100 points for the Skill-a-Thon Test. All efforts should be made to attend the scheduled Skill-a-Thon, as no makeups will be permitted.
2. Barn judging, project review and interview will be conducted Monday night before fair. Participants with a project horse may earn up to 100 points for

this portion. Participants taking a horseless project may earn up to 80 points for barn judging and 20 points for the knowledge test taken the same day as Skill-a-Thon.

3. Completed project books, 100 minimum word report for juniors or 200 minimum word report for seniors. Project books and reports will be turned in at Skill-a-Thon to be judged. Posters or Trifold will be judged during barn judging and displayed at the fair.

Equine Skills will be judged according to the following divisions:

- Beginner A member that is 8-10 years old as of January 1 of current year, regardless of years in horse 4-H
- Junior A first- or second-year member in Horse 4-H and is 11 years of age or older
- Intermediate A third- or fourth-year member in Horse 4-H and is 11 years of age or older
- Senior A fifth year and up member in Horse 4-H

*There is no separate horseless division. Horseless projects will compete in the appropriate skills division for their age and experience.

Equine Barn Judging

PROJECT BARN JUDGING CRITERIA

1. Project horse grooming
2. Skills interview
3. Project Books will be scored at Skill-a-Thon.
4. Poster with report or trifold display (whichever applies to the project you are taking).
5. Tack cleanliness & Knowledge

SKILLS INTERVIEW

BEGINNERS AND JUNIORS

(Horseless members will have the same skills interview)

1. Members will be asked to locate 5 parts of the horse from the Skill-a-thon kit.
2. Ability to pick up horse's feet.
3. Safety knot (all horses should have a halter on and a lead rope without a chain).
4. Two questions from the Supplemental Skills Division Form.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIORS

1. Members will be asked to locate 10 parts of the horse from the list in the Skill-a-Thon kit.
2. Ability to pick up horse's feet.
3. Safety knot (all horses should have a halter on and a lead rope without a chain).
4. Two questions from the Supplemental Skills Division Form.

EQUINE PERFORMANCE

EQUINE PERFORMANCE WILL BE MEASURED BY:

1. Members select a minimum of 4 and maximum of 6 classes from the class registration form in order to complete your project.
2. Classes are judged by an independent judge and placed through six places. Points will be assigned as follows: six points for first place, five points for second place, four points for third place, three points for fourth place, two points for fifth place, one point for sixth place.
3. Points for up to 6 classes will be recorded and tallied for week-end awards. If there are any ties, they will be broken by the most first places, second places etc.
4. Each member will have the opportunity to add additional non-point classes to their list of classes taken. These classes will give the members the chance to try another discipline they normally would not take. The youth could possibly place in that class, but no point will be given towards the week-end awards.

Equine Performance will be judged according to the following divisions:

- Beginner Walk /Trot 8-11 and 1st or 2nd Year with small equine.
- Intermediate Walk /Trot 12 & up and 1st or 2nd Year with small equine. *Once the weekend awards have been won twice with the same horse; members will no longer be eligible to receive the weekend awards in the Walk/Trot Divisions. Member may show in the division in subsequent years if a new horse is acquired, then they would be, again eligible for the awards in the Walk Trot division.*
- Novice: A member who is competing in their 1st & 2nd year with a canter or loping project, or 3rd & 4th year competing in small Equine.
- Senior: A member who is competing in their 3rd & 4th year canter or loping project or 5th & 6th year competing in small equine.
- Advanced: A member who is competing in their 5th year canter or loping project or 7th year and up competing in small equine.

Classes will be assigned based on enrollment.

- Regardless of age, members can be put in a division determined by their skill of riding or horsemanship. The advisor of each club will make the determination. If one cannot be agreed upon, the Executive Committee will make the final decision.
- If a 4-H member is cantering or loping their project at any 4-H show, Open show, Fun show, or work session they cannot be in a walk-trot division with their project and must canter their project for the fair.

A list of classes will be available on the Horse Fair Class Registration Form.

RULES SPECIFIC TO COUNTY FAIR

1. Decorations may not be removed until after 9 p.m. the Sunday of fair.
2. The Equine Executive Committee will decide what procedure to follow should weather or other conditions prohibit a safe fair judging.
3. Ashtabula County Fair Board will not furnish a veterinarian to 4-H members for treatment of animals, but the fair vet may be called for emergency situations, at a cost to the member or member's family.
4. No parking in designated fire lanes between ring and barn, camper areas or in specifically posted no parking areas. Violators will be towed at their expense. See map for guidelines of no parking areas.
5. Anyone remaining on the fairgrounds until Monday after fair MUST still abide by fair and 4-H rules.
6. Any horse project may be home judged. Home Judged projects cannot compete for any riding award, but the 4-H member may compete for the skills award for their age division.
 - The home judged project must be completed by **Sept. 1**. Member will be judged by a barn judge of the current year.
 - This project will ONLY be home judged with a written excuse either from a Doctor for the member, or veterinarian for the project. The home judged project will receive an A, B, or C grade ribbon/score.
 - The home judged project is not eligible for any other awards: i.e. Equine Royalty, Eddie Hauff, Riding Awards.
 - The member's home judge cannot be an advisor from their own club.
7. All horses must be on the fairgrounds by 8 p.m. on the Sunday of Fair. Late arriving animals will not be allowed to stay at fair.
8. Should an animal have to leave the grounds for health reasons, the fair veterinarian and a designated member of the Senior Fair Board must give permission via release form. Club advisor and 4-H Educator must also be notified.
9. Tack boxes size cannot exceed 36 inches width by 50 inches height and 30 inches depth.
10. Tack boxes cannot be brought in before 9 a.m. on the Saturday before fair.
11. Animals may not leave the fair prior to 7 p.m. on Sunday of fair. Early departure without permission will result in the exhibitor being barred from showing the following year.
12. All shared horses must have lease papers unless they are owned and shown by members of the same family. Each member may only share one horse. If a member is approved by the Equine Committee to take two horses and want to lease and share a horse with another member, the horse may be used as a points horse for the equine performance awards by either or both members. Equal care for the horse must be provided by both youths. Members must compete in different classes, except for Reining, Trail, Dressage and Gymkhana classes. Only one member may try out for state fair. That member must be designated by June 1.
13. It is strongly recommended that horses going to fair have yearly inoculations. Horses should have Rabies and 5 way shot (tetanus, Eastern and Western Encephalitis, Rhine, Influenza) with record of the inoculation. Shots should be given at least 30 days prior to fair.
14. One Equine Representative for Super Showman will be selected based on the rules specified in the Fairbook. Once selected as the Super Showman for horses, 4-H members may not compete again for two years.
15. OA schedule will be available for the front ring usage during the fair.
16. Any member working with an Equine project must have a parent or guardian with them while working with their animal.
17. Front small ring is designated primarily for Draft Horses and Small Equine ONLY. A schedule will be posted for available times for both Small Equine and Drafts.
18. All equine projects must be stalled during the draft hitch classes on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday nights.

19. The West Ring is designated for Junior Fair exhibitors riding horses, except when Draft Horses are showing.
20. While we encourage 4-H members to receive outside instruction, at fair no trainers shall be riding, lunging or schooling 4-H member or horse in the ring. This applies to the entire week of fair.
21. **If, for safety purposes only, a 4-H member needs assistance with an unruly animal, an alternative handler, designated by the Equine Executive Committee, may assist the member in calming the horse. This may include riding or lunging. The member and the club advisor must be present during this time. This rule applies to the time the horse arrives at fair until the end of Project Judging (typically Thursday afternoon after Super Showman Class). After project judging is complete, no adult should be riding a 4-H member's horse, except for the Parent Advisor show.**
22. Barn lights will be turned off at 12:30 a.m.
23. ALL STALLS must be clean and empty by 9 p.m. the Monday following fair. A stall deposit of \$25.00 will be due at the time of Skill-a-Thon. The deposit will be returned when stalls are clean & other close out projects that need to be completed are done. A sign-up sheet will be available for all horse members taking a project to fair. Approximately two work hours per family need to be completed before the \$25.00 deposit will be returned. If the above is not completed the money will be forfeited.
24. No full-sized refrigerators or other full-sized appliances are permitted in the camping areas.
25. All families camping are reminded to remove all items from their campsites when they leave.
26. **Small equine projects may only use hay bags, not hay nets.**
27. **Draft horse projects may be handled and shown in the Draft Horse program by someone other than the 4-H member, but it will NOT affect the members project, this includes the parade.**

FAIR CLEAN AREA/CLEAN AISLE AWARD

Exhibiting a project at the Ashtabula County Fair is a reward for the hard work put into a project and horse for the entire year. While the week of fair is a fun week, animals and project areas must be cared for and members should strive to portray to visitors a clean, well-fed and cared-for animal, and clean area surrounding the animal.

Each day of fair between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., two representatives assigned by the Equine Committee will walk through the barns and evaluate the cleanliness and care for the animals. The following items will be judged.

Each item has 20 possible points, with 100 total points available each day.
Aisle and Area: Area is free of litter, paper, hay, straw, shavings, and manure. Aisles need to be clean.

Clean Fresh Water: Water buckets must be at least half full and free of dirt, hay, or debris. Buckets should be in a place that can be visible without going into the stall.

Tack in Tack Box: Pitchforks, rakes and shovels should be in the tack stall. Cleaning and grooming supplies for your horse must be neatly put away in tack boxes.

Clean Stall: Two piles of manure are allowed. Stalls should be dry, free of debris, clean and neat

Horse Cleanliness: Horses should be well groomed, clean, and in healthy condition. Horse pajamas, sheets, and sleazies are okay, but the horse must be clean underneath. These covers should not be used to hide sweat marks or dirt. If the horse is not in the stall due to showing, bathing or being loved on by their kid, full points for the horse will be given.

50 points will be deducted from a score if any parents are seen cleaning the members stall or area!

Clubs are divided by Big Club, 10 horses and over, and Little Club, 9 horses and under. The previous day's winners will be announced at the morning advisor meeting. At the awards ceremony, the winner for the entire week will be recognized and receive a \$100.00 donation to a charity of the winner's choice.

The Equine Committee will purchase pizza for the winning club and recognition will be provided. Decorations MUST remain in place until 7 p.m. the Sunday of Fair. Judging criteria for the 4-H Horse Decorations Award will be available on the Ashtabula.osu.edu website.

Goats may be raised for market, dairy or breeding purposes. Dairy goats and harness goat projects are offered in 4-H and FFA to help the member learn the science of raising a dairy or harness goat. The project involves obtaining a dairy type doe for a dairy goat project or a heavier harness type doe or wether (altered male animal) for a harness project. Members are judged at the fair on the dairy character of the animal they chose, or the suitability of the animal they chose for harness. They are also judged on the condition, care, knowledge and showing of the animal. This judging takes place at the fair during the Dairy Goat Show and the Skill-a-Thon is conducted prior to the fair. Members wishing to learn more about the responsibilities of owning a goat should take this project.

Requirements:

1. Those exhibiting at fair must bring project and record books and participate in the Skill-a-Thon prior to fair.
2. To participate in the fair members must correctly enter their project animals. Advisors must make pen reservations by July 1.
3. It is not necessary to bring a goat to fair in order to complete the project. Members may be home judged.
4. Animals should not be kidding during fair.
5. **NO HORNS** on dairy goats or crosses. Horns are allowed on pygmies, Boers, angoras and pigoras, but it has to be stated on pen reservation form. If animal is aggressive with horns then the goat will need to be tied.
6. **NO BUCKS.**

Junior Fair market goat projects will be tagged or tattooed for identification at the Ashtabula County Fairgrounds the first Saturday in May. Only animals identified on this date will be eligible to participate in the fair and sell in the MAC sale. Members may identify up to four (4) animals as project animals, but will be allowed to sell and show only one animal for the MAC Sale. Market Goats will be weighed at tagging for Rate of Gain. No unidentified animals shall be allowed to enter the fairgrounds for exhibition at the County Fair. Call the OSU Extension office for assistance (440) 576-9008. **Goats must have this Scrapie identification, be castrated by tagging.** Pen reservations will not be accepted for animals without scrapie identification. All pen reservations are due July 1.

Carcass Goat forms are due to the Extension Office by July 1; Carcass Goat Entries will be responsible for the processing fee.

WEIGH IN: Market animals must be brought to the fairgrounds between 2 and 4 p.m. on Sunday prior to fair. Goats will be weighed as soon as they arrive. Underweights and over weights must leave the grounds immediately. The minimum weight to be eligible for the Market Animal Sale is 60 lbs. The maximum weight is 125 lbs. ideal market weight is 60-80 lbs. Goats need to be market shaved by weigh-in.

Skill-a-thon: All Junior Fair members are required to participate in the Skill-a-Thon on Super Saturday. Failure to participate will result in an incomplete project. Members are required to have their current project book and completed record book on hand for the Skill-a-Thon. All members taking a market goat project must complete Skill-a-Thon to be eligible for Grand and Reserve Project Exhibitor. All Non-Market projects are eligible for Best Total Score. This award combines the Skill-a-Thon, animal and showmanship scores. Only youth that participate in Skill-a-Thon on Super Saturday and the County Fair are eligible. Animal scores and showmanship scores will be weighted as follows: 1st = 100, 2nd = 95, 3rd = 90, 4th = 85, 5th = 80, 6th = 75 points.

SHOWMANSHIP: Showmanship is recommended for all members. To compete for Grand and Reserve Champion Project a member must participate in showmanship. All members must show their own animal. Market exhibitors who have had their animal sent home or participated in the carcass show may still compete in showmanship using another

market type animal owned by another exhibitor. MAC guidelines must be followed and forms filled out.

FITTING: Market goats should be "slick shaved" from base of skull to tail head and down the legs to the knee and hock. Market breeder does should be show fitted- not "slick shaved".

WHAT TO WEAR SHOWING ANIMAL:

Dairy goat exhibitors are to wear white pants and a white shirt. No flip flops or open toed shoes while showing goats. Youth with a pack goat project must also wear whites except during pack obstacle. During that class, trail attire is allowed except shorts, tank-tops or open toed shoes.

Dress code for the Tuesday Market Goat and Market Breeding show will be solid color slacks or clean blue jeans with no holes and a belt if needed; Button down shirt or polo shirt, closed toe boots or shoes. Please remember your appearance counts for showmanship so remember to pull back your hair and look your best.

ALL Youth taking 4-H/FFA/Jr. Fair MARKET and LACTATING Dairy Animals must have Quality Assurance complete by June 1. All youth taking a Jr. Fair Livestock project must have a parent/guardian attend the online virtual meeting by Aug. 1. You must go through the entire presentation and verify your attendance at the conclusion.

ORDER OF SHOW

A. Market Showmanship – classes will be determined by number of exhibitors

B. Market Weight Classes – to be determined by MAC

C. Market Breeding Showmanship – classes will be determined by number of exhibitors

D. Market Breeding Class

1. Under one year of age (cannot be a market project)
2. This class may be divided according to number of entries
3. One year old and under two
4. Two years old and over (must have previously kidded)
5. Production - Dam and Daughter (Daughter may be a market goat project)

Non-Market Classes- following Market

A. Showmanship - classes are mandatory for all exhibitors including pygmy, pet goats and pack. EACH CONTESTANT MUST HELP FIT AND SHOW HIS OWN ANIMAL. The judge may ask the members to switch animals. Showmanship classes could change depending on number of youth.

1. Experienced -
 1. Senior – 4 yrs. & over
 2. Junior – 3rd yr. (ages 14 – 18)
 3. Junior – 3rd yr. (ages 10 – 13)
 4. Junior – 2nd yr. (ages 12 yr. & over)
 5. Junior – 2nd yr. (ages 9 – 11)
2. Inexperienced – first year 4-H goat member
3. Top Showman – first & second place from all 6 Showmanship classes

B. Milking Goat Classes

1. Milking Yearling – under 2 years old at show time and in milk.
2. Milking Does – 2 years and under 3 years in milk
3. Milking Does – 3 years and under 4 years in milk
4. Milking Does – 4 years and under 5 years in milk
5. Milking Does – 5 years and older in milk
6. Best Senior Doe in Show

NOTE: If classes are large, they may be split following which first place

animals will return for Best of Class.

C. Production – Dam and Daughter -for 4-H, daughter may be any age

D. Non-milking Goat Classes

1. Jr. Kid – born April 1 through June 30 of current year
2. Int Kid – born in March of current year
3. Sr. Kid – born from Jan. 1 through Feb 28 of current year
4. Yearlings – over 12 months and up to 24 months, but never milked.
5. Best Junior Doe in Show

E. Pygmy Goat Classes

1. Over 1 year old
2. Under 1 year old
3. Best Pygmy in Show

F. Pet Class - may be divide due to number of entries

1. Exhibitor will compete in appropriate Showmanship class and Skill-a-thon.
2. This is a class for exhibitors with goats that DO NOT FIT into any other class.

G. Harness Goat & Pack Goat Classes

1. Beginner – goat can be lead and must demonstrate knowledge of commands
 2. Second year – must be in harness and demonstrate commands
 3. Third year – must have harness with cart and helmet and pull appropriate load
 4. Beginner Team – goats lead as a team
 5. Second Year Team – goats in harness with driver behind
 6. Best in Harness
- Pack Goat *see above rules*
7. Beginner – no pack required
 8. Second year – empty pack required
 9. Third year and over – full pack required
 10. Best in Pack

Classes may change depending on the number of goats & class size)

****BEST TOTAL SCORE** - total of Skill-a-thon, Showmanship & animal judging** across all projects, each project will have a total, in the event of a tie Showmanship scores will determine the winner followed by Skill-a-thon

Goat projects are offered in 4-H and FFA to help the member learn the science of raising a dairy, market, harness, or pack goats. The project involves obtaining a dairy type doe for a dairy goat project or a heavier framed type doe or wether for a harness or pack project. A market breed or cross should be used in the market project. Members are judged at the fair on the character of the animal they chose, or the suitability of the animal they chose for harness or pack. They are also judged on the condition, care, knowledge and showing of the animal. This judging takes place at the fair during goat shows and the Skill-a-thon is conducted prior to the fair. Members wishing to learn more about the responsibilities of owning a goat should take this project.

Requirements:

1. Those exhibiting at fair must bring project and record books and participate in the Skill-a-thon prior to fair.
2. To participate in the fair, members must correctly enter their project animals by making pen reservations online by July 1.
3. It is not necessary to bring a goat to fair in order to complete the project. Members may be home judged.
4. Animals should not be kidding during fair.
5. NO HORNS on dairy goats or dairy crosses. Horns are allowed on pygmies, Boers, angoras and pigoras, but it has to be stated on pen reservation form. If an animal is aggressive with horns then the goat will need to be tied.
6. No intact bucks are permitted.

Market Goat Tagging & Identification: Junior Fair market goat projects will be tagged or tattooed for identification at the Ashtabula County Fairgrounds the first Saturday in May. Only animals identified on this date will be eligible to participate in the fair and sell in the MAC sale. Members may identify up to four (4) animals as project animals but will be allowed to sell and show only one animal for the MAC Sale. Market Goats will be weighed at tagging for Rate of Gain. No unidentified animals shall be allowed to enter the fairgrounds for exhibition at the County Fair. Call the OSU Extension office for assistance (440) 576-9008. Market goats are required to have an official scrapie identification number. Goats must have this Scrapie identification, be castrated by tagging. Pen reservations will not be accepted for animals without scrapie identification. All pen reservations are due July 1.

Carcass Goat forms are due to the Extension Office by July 1.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: The fair veterinarian will review papers at the entrance on Poplar Street. Lactating goats and market goats must have completed Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNF) as well as a Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection for all animals which require one. Market goats are a terminal sale animal and do not require a health certificate. Market breeders do require health certificates. Check the county fair handbook for the current year for up-dated information on health requirements. All animals must be on the fairgrounds by 3 p.m. on the Monday of fair week. 4-H volunteers will be notified of specific check in times for each project and will relay the information to the members.

WEIGH IN: Market animals must be brought to the fairgrounds between 2 and 4 p.m. on Sunday prior to fair. Goats will be weighed as soon as they arrive. Underweights and over weights must leave the grounds immediately. The minimum weight to be eligible for the Market Animal Sale is 60 lbs. The maximum weight is 125 lbs. ideal market weight is 60-80 lbs. Goats need to be market shaved by weigh-in.

Skill-a-thon: All Junior Fair members are required to participate in the Skill-a-thon. For Market Goats, Skill-a-thon will be on Aug. 3 from 5-6 p.m. For all non-market projects, Skill-a-thon will be on Saturday, July 12 from Noon to 2 p.m. Failure to participate will result in an incomplete project. Members are required to have their current project book and completed record book on hand for the Skill-a-thon. All members taking a market goat project must complete Skill-a-thon to be eligible for Grand and Reserve Project Exhibitor.

SHOWMANSHIP: Showmanship is required for all members. To compete for Grand and Reserve Champion Market Project a member must participate in showmanship. All non-market members must show their own animal. Market exhibitors who have had their animal sent home or participated in the carcass show may still compete in showmanship using another market type animal owned by another exhibitor. MAC guidelines must be followed, and forms filled out.

FITTING: Dairy goats should have a full body shave. Market goats should be “slick shaved” from base of skull to tail head and down the legs to the knee and hock. Market breeder does should be show fitted- not “slick shaved.” Pygmies do not have to be shave but should be trimmed to present a neat appearance. All exhibition animals should be clean and have feet trimmed.

WHAT TO WEAR SHOWING ANIMAL:

Dairy goat exhibitors are to wear white pants and a white shirt. Youth with a pack goat project who are not exhibiting a dairy goat are permitted to wear trail appropriate attire. No flip flops or open toed shoes, tank tops, shorts, leggings, capri pants, or hats may be worn while showing goats. Please be sure hand off phones, lanyards, and any other non-secured items to someone before entering the ring. Dress code for the Market Goat and Market Breeding show will be solid color slacks or clean blue jeans with no holes and a belt if needed; Button down shirt or polo shirt, closed toe boots or shoes.

ALL Youth taking 4-H/FFA/Jr. Fair MARKET and LACTATING Dairy Animals must have Quality Assurance complete by June 1st. All youth taking a Jr. Fair Livestock project must have a parent/guardian in attendance at a Required Livestock Parent Meeting provided by the Senior Fair Board by July 1.

HARNESS GOAT

1. A member may exhibit a wether or a dry doe. Milking does are not recommended for harness projects.
2. Members taking this project must also complete showmanship and skill-a-thon.
3. Training information is available in your resource manual. An additional manual is available at [http://www.ansci.cornell.edu.4H/goats/harness goat.pdf](http://www.ansci.cornell.edu.4H/goats/harness%20goat.pdf) or a copy is available for viewing at the extension office.

4. Carts must be relative in size to the goat.
5. Carts may be brought the day of judging but should be taken home after judging.
6. Project year is based upon the goats experience not the exhibitors.

Project is meant to show progression.

1. **First Year** – Goat of any age. Must have a fitting face halter and lead rope. Goat will walk next to exhibitor and demonstrate knowledge of basic commands.
2. **Second Year**- Goat must be at least one year old! Prefer that goat has completed first year project requirements. Goat must have full harness. Exhibitor will demonstrate animal's ability to follow commands while driving from behind. Animal does not have to be attached to empty cart but placing preference will be given according to skill level. *Please note your animal must be able to demonstrate backing up with your cart.*
3. **Third Year** – Goat should be two years old. Must have completed at least one previous year of

The harness project. Must have full harness and driving cart. Goat should be able to pull appropriate load in cart driven by exhibitor from behind. For example a full grown wether should be able to pull approximately twice their weight. A full size Doe should be able to pull her own weight. So an Alpine wether could pull an exhibitor in a cart, or a Nigerian Doe could pull a bag of grain in a cart. Goat must be able to demonstrate driving commands and some easy obstacles.

4. **Harness Team** – Goat should be at least two years of age, and meet requirements set forth for third year project. Exhibitor will choose two animals that can pull together. Animals in this project can not compete in single classes.

HARNESS GOAT MANDATORY HELMET USE POLICY

All youth 19 years and under, participating in any 4-H goat activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI

(Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving goat. It is the responsibility of the member, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use and is properly fitted and in good condition.

PACK GOATS

1. A member may exhibit a wether, dry doe or milking doe of any breed in this category.
2. Members taking this project must also have to complete showmanship and skill-a-thon.
3. Each team will answer questions based on the exhibitor's number of years in the project. They will participate based upon the goat's skill level.
4. Information on how to train your pack goat is available in your resource manual. Species chairs will attempt to publish the pack course prior to super Saturday.
5. Animals are expected to walk at ease with the exhibitor. Points will be deducted for skipping, shying away from and knocking over obstacles.
6. Second and third year exhibitors will enter the ring, attach their goat to a tie off and put on their own packs. Third year exhibitors will put in appropriate weights.

AFTER THE FAIR

1. You cannot drive onto fairgrounds to take animal home until 9 p.m. Sunday evening. You can walk goats and tack out at 7 p.m.
2. Take home everything that you brought to the fair.
3. Pens should be cleaned after fair, not Sunday of fair. Your pen must be stripped of all bedding (sawdust and straw or hay).
4. All items must be removed from tack and hay areas. Any items left at the time of mac clean up (the Saturday following fair) will be disposed of.
5. All items must be removed from tack and hay a

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FFA DIVISION CROPS SHOW

1. Entry open to FFA members enrolled in agriculture science and leadership development during the previous school year.
2. All exhibits must be from projects regularly elected and conducted by the exhibitor.
3. Entries in this division are limited to one in each class by an exhibitor or for a chapter project.
4. Containers must be furnished by exhibitor.
5. Variety name must be on all tags for each entry.
6. Classes: Current Year Crop
 - B. Oats1 quart
 - C. Barley1 quart
 - D. Soybeans5 stalks
 - E. Corn.....3 stalks current crop
 - F. Corn.....6 ears dry grain
 - G. Hay.....1 bale or 10 lbs. chopped
7. Horticulture Crops - Current Year Crop
 - A. Vegetables - One plate of vegetables (not mixed) or one large vegetable (example: pumpkin) per project.
 8. Exhibits in each class will be placed on an A, B, C, or blue, red, white basis.
 9. Top entry in each class will be awarded blue rosettes.
 10. Agricultural science and leadership development students are encouraged to compete for cash prizes for crop exhibits by entering in the Open Class department 6 & 7. Open class entries must be submitted along with entry fee on or before July 29.

1. An FFA member may show during their year of graduation, regardless of age.
 2. All exhibits must be from projects completed during the previous school year.
 3. A completed entry tag must accompany each project stating in which class the project is to be entered.
- Class I: Woodworking**
- A. Small Projects:
Examples - Milk stool, mail box, tool tray, wood float, hog hurdle, and other similar items.
Replacement value - \$10 or less
 - B. Medium Projects:
Examples - Farm gate, mineral box, self-feeder, sheep feeder, calf stall, saw horse, and other similar items.
 - C. Large Projects:
Examples - Brooder house, hog house, wagon bed, truck rack, feed bunk, self-feeder, and other similar items. Replacement value - over \$50
 - D. Restoration: The overall and/or refinishing of wood agricultural tools or materials.
- Class II: Metal Working and Welding**
(Replacement Values and Premiums are consistent with woodworking projects.)
- A. Small Projects: Examples - Feed scoop, hog trough, funnel, mail box, sack holder, and saw horse.
 - B. Medium Projects: Examples - Feed cart, wheelbarrow, milk cart, barbecue grill, farm sign and bracket, picnic table, work bench, and other similar items.
- Class III: Reconditioning of Tools and Equipment**
(an itemized list of skills and tasks must accompany each entry.)
- A. Mechanical:
Examples - Repair and overhaul of engines, transmissions and small farm equipment
 - B. Tractor Overhaul:
Examples - Repair, reconditioning, overhaul or repainting of tractor
 - C. Trailer/implement Overhaul
Examples - Repair, reconditioning, overhaul, or repainting of plows, trailers, etc.
- Class IV: Electrical**
- A. Electrical panels: wiring demonstration mounted on 24" x 24" wood sheets.
 - B. Electrical Projects:
Examples - Lamps & tools, motors, pumps.
- Class V: Miscellaneous - other equipment for the home and farm.** Replacement Values and Premiums are consistent with woodworking projects. The judge will determine the class (small, medium, large).
Examples - Glazing, concrete masonry units, mechanical drawing, ropework display sign painting, and other items not included elsewhere in this division.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS-

All birds brought onto the fairgrounds must have proof that they are salmonella free by having proof that they were pullorum tested 90 days prior to fair. All market birds have to be purchased from a certified pullorum-typhoid free hatchery or hatched on a certified pullorum-typhoid free farm. Waterfowl, doves, and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

The species chair will pullorum test birds at the Small Animal Clinic and on a second date to be released at a later date from 9-12 all fancy poultry except for waterfowl must be pullorum tested. Turkeys will go to a local vet clinic for this testing.

PEN RESERVATIONS- Must be submitted by July 1st by 4:30 pm. No animal will be permitted to exhibit at the fair without a pen reservation for that animal. It is the responsibility of the Junior Fair members to assure that the correct information is submitted to the Species Chairman.

Once pen reservations are made with your 1st, 2nd, & 3rd choices there will be no substitutes if a loss occurs. Each child will only need one book for all poultry projects. Youth may only bring one project per child times the number of years that they do that book. (Year 1=1 project, year 2=2 projects, year 3=3 projects...) This applies to all fancy projects including turkeys.

ANY EXTRA SPACE AVAILABLE WILL BE BY SENIORITY TO FILL THE BARN from your 2nd & 3rd choices. If there are a lot of children coming to fair in a given year then each child may be limited to one project in that given year. We will then look at any extra cages/space and notify children that they may bring their next choice in birds as well by seniority in years of doing poultry projects.

PROJECTS

150 CE Chicken, Exhibition (Fancy) - a maximum of one pen consisting of up to two chickens in one pen. (1 hen & 1 rooster or 2 hens*)

150 CM Chicken, Market- a maximum, one pen consisting of FOUR chickens, & the cage will be one double cage that is turned into one single cage.

150 CEP Chicken, Egg Production: Hens and Pullets- a maximum of one pen consisting of up to two birds in that pen. (2 hens only*) **MUST TAKE QA**

150 DE Ducks, Exhibition- a maximum of one pen consisting of up to three ducks in that pen. (2 hens & 1 drake or 3 hens*)

150 DM Ducks, Market- a maximum of one pen consisting of TWO ducks.

150 GE Goose, Exhibition- a maximum of one pen consisting of up to two geese in one pen. (1 goose & 1 gander or 2 geese*)

150 GM Goose, Market- Not Available at this time. If anyone is interested in doing this project please let the chairs know for future years.

150 TE Turkey, Exhibition (Fancy)- a maximum of one pen consisting of one turkey.

150 TM Turkey, Market- a maximum of one pen consisting of two turkeys.

150 H Helmeted Guineas Fowl- A maximum of one pen consisting of up to 3 birds. (2 hens & 1 cock or 3 hens*)

168P Pigeons- a maximum of one pen consisting of up to two birds in that pen. (1 hen & 1 cock or 2 hens*)

365 Self Determined - Exotic Poultry- a maximum of one pen consisting of a project-by-project space determination. Each youth should contact the species chair doing the pen reservations so decide on appropriate

number of birds to the size of cage available for that year. *Special exceptions will be made if species chairs are contacted prior to pen assignments and there is deemed adequate room in pens. Self-determined projects must be completed by attending General Projects judging.

ADDITIONAL FAIR REQUIREMENTS

- Animals must be reviewed by the Fair Veterinarian prior to unloading. All animals will be brought in on the Monday of fair week. Members must have their dated certificates of purchase and Pullorum-Typhoid certificates (NPIP), and Quality Assurance papers (DUNF) out to show the Fair Veterinarian before unloading animals into the barns. Keep your DUNF forms on you; need to give to species chair for weigh in to write down the tag numbers and weight.
- All market animals must be weighed in on **MONDAY** prior to fair week, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- All market birds will be tagged with a wing band. All Jr. Fair youth must be at weigh in to take their birds to the scale. All poultry must be healthy and free of deformities such as missing extremities, curly toes, clipped wings, or parasites. Birds with mites, lice, or disease may not be brought to the fair.
- **MARKET CHICKENS**-Members will be allowed to sell only 1 pen consisting of **FOUR CHICKENS**
- **MARKET TURKEYS**- Members will be allowed to sell 1 pen consisting of **TWO TURKEYS**
- **MARKET DUCK**-Members will be allowed to sell 1 pen consisting of **TWO DUCKS**
- **Nonmarket WATERFOWL and FANCY POULTRY**- are considered breeding projects and will not be tagged

SALE REQUIREMENTS:

- **Market Chickens**- Minimum sale weight, 16 pounds total pen weight; Maximum sale weight, 32 pounds total pen weight. (We still recommend 4-7 lbs. each bird, for ideal weights.)
- **Market Turkeys**- Minimum sale weight 30 lbs. total pen weight; Maximum sale weight 70 lbs. total pen weight
- **Market Duck**- Minimum sale weight 10 pounds pen weight; Maximum sale weight 30 pounds pen weight. (We still recommend 5-15 pounds per bird)

WEIGH IN- market poultry only

1. All animals must be weighed in on **MONDAY** prior to fair week, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.
2. Under-weight and over-weight animals will be sent home immediately following weigh-in. If the first animal is under/over, the exhibitor will be allowed to weigh in one different identified/tagged animal in the allotted time frame. Except for chickens, up to 2 chickens can be substituted in the pen of 4. Once a chicken is pulled from the pen it must go home, if the first pen makes weight that is the pen that stays at fair.
3. Members are to be present for weigh-in and for project photos unless other arrangements are made with the species chairperson. All members must have a photo taken for distribution to the buyers.
4. Each project animal will be officially weighed by the weigh master or designee once.

MARKET ANIMAL SALE (MAC)-

- The Market Poultry project is a terminal project. Although any Chicken,



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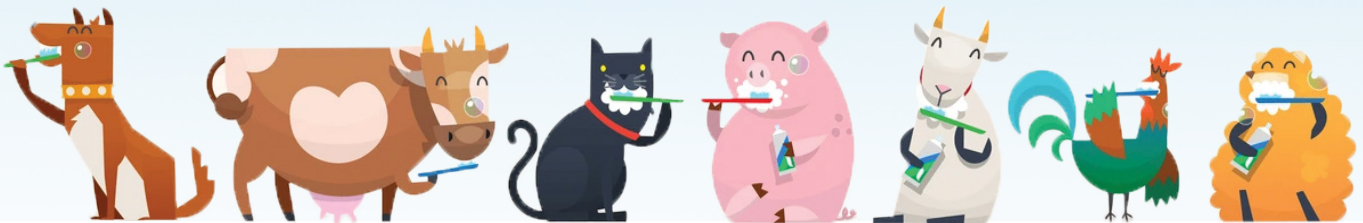
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Duck or Turkey, except the Overall Best Exhibitor, Grand and Reserve Champion Projects, may be withdrawn from the sale within one hour of the completion of the show, all poultry, turkeys and ducks must be harvested by a MAC approved meat processor.

- All Market Poultry exhibitors must be present to sell their animal, unless otherwise specified by the MAC committee representatives and Department Superintendents.
- Participating Junior Fair members agree to a deduction of 4% for all animals of the sale. Proceeds to the MAC for the expenses of the sale operations.
- The order of sale will be as followed; Best Overall Project Exhibitor, Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, the judge will then place the rest of the top 10 animals if there are greater than 10 animals to sell then it will go by overall scores from project 11 down

SHOWMANSHIP-

- Showmanship is optional, however to compete for Best Overall Project Exhibitor, a member must participate in showmanship. All members must show their own animals.
- Showmanship is at fair on judging day. Show dates: TBD
- Members must bring their up-to-date project books at drop of for animals, SIGNED BY THEIR ADVISOR and Completed books are worth up to 10 points toward the showmanship score.

All Chickens, Waterfowl and Exotics Showmanship

YOUTH WILL BE CLASSIFIED ACCORDING TO AGE;

- BEGINNERS: Age 8-12, or never participated in a poultry project.

Never participated = 1st year chicken project, or 1st year waterfowl project.

- INTERMEDIATES: Age 13-15
- ADVANCED: Age 16 years and older.

All Turkey Showmanship: Inexperienced and Experienced classes divided into age groups depending on how many kids there are.

DRESS CODE-

All youth participating in the poultry shows are required to follow the dress code.

- Clean nice pants with no holes. Shorts are not permitted to be worn by an exhibitor in the show ring
- Socks and clean closed-toed shoes.
- Shirts: Polo, dress shirt or club shirt. (Lab coats are permitted over the dress code if the coat only represents the club or organization that the youth is representing)
- Hair must be pulled back and out of the face.
- No sunglasses, hats or jewelry are permitted in the show ring.

PROJECT PLACINGS-

- Each exhibitor is to receive a grade from the species judge, which is to be based on the animal only.
- Members will be required to participate in their species Skill-a-thon to be eligible for the Overall Best Project Exhibitor A listing of Skill-a-thon requirements is available at the Extension Office.
- Grand and Reserve Champion Project Exhibitor:
- Any ties for championship are broken by asking additional Skill-a-thon questions.

Each 4-H and FFA member will receive a project ribbon (A, B, C).

- In picking the species for Grand and Reserve Project the judge will make his choice.
- All animal exhibitors who won an award medallion, plaque, etc. it is an expectation that the exhibitor will mail a "THANK YOU" to whoever sponsored the award!

EXHIBIT-

- It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to comply with the Exhibitors Code of Ethics and to maintain proper barn etiquette. Each exhibitor

must comply with the Junior Fair Livestock regulations as specified in the fair book. Responsibility for your animal and your exhibit does not end with the sale of your project animal. Correct care of the project animal is the responsibility of the exhibit until the animal is released to the buyer. Failure to provide proper care will result in warnings, fines and potential disqualification for future fairs. Each exhibitor is responsible to clean their pen area after the project animal is gone within one week of the completion of the fair.

- ALL POULTRY PENS MUST be cleaned by 9 AM and again by 6 PM DAILY!
- ALL POULTRY MUST BE FED GRAIN ONCE IN AM & ONCE IN PM!
- ALL POULTRY MUST HAVE WATER ALL DAY LONG! It's very hot at the fair and they need water so they don't dehydrate!
- For Fancy cages the Species Advisors will inspect cages daily to ensure that all birds are properly cared for by the exhibitor (i.e.: - fed, watered, clean bird and pen, etc.). Pens and/or birds not cared for will be tagged with a colored sticker/mark (yellow- 1st warning, orange - 2nd warning, and red - 3rd warning). Exhibitors whose pens are red flagged will forfeit all awards. All animals MUST be properly cared for daily by 4-H and FFA members (fed, watered, cleaned as needed).
- For Market Cages MAC guidelines state that if the cage is not cleaned and animals taken care of then the youth will receive one warning and then the youth will be charged \$10.00 per offence that must be paid prior to obtaining your check on MAC clean-up day.
- NOTE: Manure/bedding is to be placed in wheelbarrow ONLY - wheelbarrow is to be emptied at the manure bin located on the west side of the block show barn. Emptying the wheelbarrow is everyone's responsibility! Please clean up after yourself and help keep the aisles clean and clear. It is an expectation of every 4-H and FFA member to participate in barn duty, there will be a sign-up sheet for each barn and it is expected that the member sign up for 1 slot per project.

No animals may leave the Barn before 7 pm. Sunday Night.

FAIR EXHIBITION GUIDELINES FOR RABBITS.

First Year Exhibitors:

- May bring only one breeding, show or commercial meat rabbit to the fair.
- May enter one Market Rabbit Meat Pen project and/or Single Roaster class
- May enter one Doe and Litter project.

Second Year Exhibitors:

- May bring two breeding/show rabbits to the fair.
- May bring additional rabbits to compete in one Doe & Litter Class
- May enter one commercial rabbit breed in the Single Roaster Class
- May enter a Market Rabbit Meat Pen Project

Third Year & Over Exhibitors:

- May bring three breeding rabbits to the fair.
- *Note: If cage space is limited in the rabbit barn exhibitors will only be able to bring two rabbits unless they are entering a Breeder's Herd. If this happens you will be contacted by the species chair prior to fair.
- May bring additional rabbits to compete in one Doe & Litter Class
- May enter one commercial rabbit breed in the Single Roaster Class
- May enter a Market Rabbit Meat Pen Project

IF exhibitors have additional rabbits/cavies they wish to show a pen reservation MUST be made in order for the animal to be on the fairgrounds. Please add "extra rabbit/cavy" to the comment section on your reservation. Space will be given out equally with consideration to the size of the breeding class. IF additional rabbits/cavies are brought to fair, the exhibitor must have assistance at the show table in order to keep the show moving in a timely manner. Approval will be made by the end of July.

The Doe & Litter Class:

- 1st, 2nd and 3rd year members can enter one Doe & Litter Project per Jr. Fair exhibitor.
- 4th year and above may enter 2 Doe & Litter Projects providing there is space in the barn (the Rabbit Species Advisor will advise the exhibitor after Pen Reservations have been processed). One doe per project – mothers with a large litter cannot be entered twice.
- Litters MUST be 10-12 weeks of age and WEANED separated from their mother) by fair check in. Suggested breeding dates: April 11-April 25, 2025. Must be born between May 12-May 26, 2025.
- Exhibitors must provide birth date of litter and a Proper Care Pamphlet. (This will be released once pen reservations are complete)
- A doe and two of the litter will compete for judging. The doe, and her offspring will all be housed in separate cages.
- Rabbits shown in this class **CANNOT BE SHOWN IN ANY OTHER CLASS.**
- Those taking a Doe and Litter Project must attend/complete Quality Assurance by June 1, 2025.

The Breeder's Herd Class:

- Consists of the three breeding rabbits already being shown by the exhibitor. May use Single Roaster but NOT Market Pen.
- Doe and Litter projects may NOT be entered into this class.
- Requires any combination of 3 rabbits with a first-generation relationship. Two parents (Sr Buck & Doe) and an offspring
- (Jr Buck or Doe) or one parent (Sr Buck or Doe) and two offspring (Jr Bucks and/or Does).
- May bring "extra rabbits" if space permits. Please indicate them on your pen reservation.

JUNIOR FAIR RABBIT & CAVY SHOW:

THURSDAY – MAC Arena 5 p.m. • Jr. Fair Rabbit Meat Pen Judging, Commercial Single Roaster Class, Showmanship Results Announced, Cavy Judging, Rabbit Breed Judging, Best of Show, Breeder's Herd, Doe & Litter.

Single Roaster Class (228MA):

(This is a non-terminal Market Rabbit Project.)

- See separate Market Animal Committee (MAC) Guidelines for specific project information (attached)
- Exhibitors may have 2 entries in the Single Roaster Class
- Target weight: 5-9 pounds (Rabbits that are under/over the target weight will not be disqualified)

Rabbit Meat Pen Project (228MA):

- Meat Pen Rabbits are now Roasters and will consist of a pen of two (2) rabbit 4-6 months of age. See Market Rabbit Guidelines at the end of this document and separate Market Animal Committee (MAC) Guidelines for specific project information.

****NEW THIS YEAR****

Cross-Breed Rabbit Class:

ANY CROSS-BREED RABBITS ARE CONSIDERED TO BE PET RABBITS.

- They do not compete in the breed classes and are not eligible for Best in Show

Replacement Class:

- This class is only open to those exhibitors with single rabbit entries. If project animal is ill or has passed away after the May 1st possession deadline. Please notify the 4-H Extension Office or Rabbit Species Chair if this occurs and a replacement animal was obtained. This class is not eligible for Best in Show.

Bred and Raised Class:

- Bred and Raised entries may be a buck or doe and may be juniors 6-8s, or seniors. Exhibitors must have produced the rabbit from rabbits they own and the rabbit must have been raised in the exhibitor's rabbitry. Exhibitor must provide a pedigree for the rabbits well as pedigrees of both parents. Pedigrees must be provided at time of entry. Exhibitors may enter only one rabbit for the Bred and Raised Class. This rabbit may not be shown in the Meat Pen and Roaster.

FAIR EXHIBITION GUIDELINES FOR CAVIES (#215)

All ARBA (American Rabbit Breeder Association) breeds of Cavies will be accepted along with breeds with COD's (Certificate of Development) Any Cavy not purebred will be judged in the class of the breed class that they represent the closest.

First Year Exhibitors:

- One cage per exhibitor that can house up to 2 cavies.
- One Sow and Litter

Second Year Exhibitors:

- Two cages per exhibitor that can house up to 2 cavies each.
- One Sow and Litter

Third Year Exhibitors:

- Three cages per exhibitor that can house up to 2 cavies each.
- One Sow and Litter

Fourth Year Exhibitors:

- Four cages per exhibitor that can house up to 2 cavies each.
- Two Sow and Litters

Sow and Litter Class:

- Sow must be separated from Boar 12 weeks before fair check in.
- Babies must be 4-8 weeks old to be exhibited. Suggested breeding dates April 4th-May 2nd and born between June 9th-July 7th
- A proper Care Pamphlet must be completed.
- Exhibitor will choose best two offspring to exhibit with Sow.
- The complete litter may come to fair.
 - Sows shown in this class **CANNOT BE SHOWN IN ANY OTHER CLASS.**
 - Members anticipating entering the Sow & Litter Class must include

appropriate info on pen reservation. **If a sow does not farrow or loses the litter, please contact the 4-H Extension Office or Rabbit Species Advisor as soon as possible to cancel your entry.**

- F. Those taking a Doe and Litter Project must attend/complete Quality Assurance by June 1, 2025.

The Breeder's Herd Class:

- Consists of the three Cavies already being shown by the exhibitor. Sow and Litter projects may NOT be entered into this class.
- Requires any combination of 3 Cavies with a first-generation relationship. Two parents (Sow & Boar) and an offspring (Sow or Boar) or one parent (Sow or Boar) and two offspring Sow and/or Boars).
- May bring "extra cavies" if space permits. Please indicate them on your pen reservation.

(The number of entries above may be subject to change depending on cage availability and will go on a seniority basis for cage space.)

Additional Cavies can be added to your Pen Reservation for display purposes. The Species Chair will notify exhibitors if there is enough room.

RABBIT/CAVY Skill-a-thon

- All Junior Fair exhibitors are **REQUIRED** to participate in Skill-a-thon and Showmanship (which is held during the fair). The project is considered incomplete if requirements are not met.
- Members are required to have their completed project record book on hand for judging or points will be deducted from the total score.
- Books must be signed/dated by the exhibitor's club Advisor to verify that they contain current information and that the required pages for the project year are complete.
- Parents or Advisors need to contact the Rabbit or Pocket Pet Species Advisor if they have a participant with a learning or physical disability.
- **Winning 4H Plans must be turned into the Extension Office by June 1st.**
- Rabbit Exhibitors will need to be familiar with all chapters of their project book. During Rabbit Project Judging, exhibitors will be interviewed or asked to perform skills on the knowledge they gained while enrolled in their rabbit project. See study guides posted online.
- Cavy Exhibitors must complete Skill-a-thon and Create and bring a poster that will be hung in the educational area of the Small Animal Barn. **See General Project Guidelines**

PRE-FAIR INFORMATION:

1. Rabbits must be in member's physical possession by May 1, 2025. Does that will produce litters for the doe and litter classes or junior stock must be in member's possession by May 1, 2025.
2. ALL Rabbit/Cavy exhibitors WILL be required to pay a cage deposit of \$35 PER EXHIBITOR. The cage deposit will be due upon fair check in. The cage deposit will be returned after the Species Chair has inspected each of the exhibitor's cages for proper sanitation. If the Species Chair does not deem the cage properly sanitized, the deposit will not be returned until the cage has been properly sanitized. **ALL CAGES MUST BE PROPERLY SANITIZED BY MAC CLEAN UP ON AUGUST 16, 2026 AT 10AM IN ORDER FOR THE DEPOSIT TO BE RETURNED.** Checks will be distributed between 9am-10am. Any checks that are not picked up on this date will be destroyed. IF you need your check returned via mail, you must provide a self-addressed envelope with a stamp to the Species Chair by the end of fair. Any exhibitors who's cages are not properly sanitized by the deadline, will have their deposited forfeited, and will be deposited into the Rabbit/Cavy bank account.

Rabbit Age Classes

- Senior Bucks/Does – Over 6 months of age.
- Intermediate* Bucks/Does - Between 6-8 months of age in 6-class rabbits (breeds that have an ideal weight of nine pounds and over).
*Addition of this class will be determined by the judge depending on size of class.
- Junior Bucks/Does – 12 weeks to 6 months of age. **NO PRE JUNIORS MAY BE SHOWN**

Cavy Age Classes

- Senior Boars/Sows - Over 6 months of age or weight over 32 ounces
- Intermediate Boars/Sows - Up to 6 months of age, OR weight over 22 ounces and maximum weight of 32 ounces.
- Junior Boars/Sows – 4 week to 4 months of age, minimum weight of

12 ounces, maximum weight of 22 ounces.

- All project Cavies must be in the possession of the exhibitor by May 1 to be able to show at the Ashtabula County Junior Fair. Exceptions are: Intermediates, Juniors, and Sow & Litter projects which are raised by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must have sow by May 1.
3. If leasing an animal(s) for 2026 please fill out a lease form (attached) and show your Species Chair at Skill-a-thon.
 4. Exhibitors must turn in pen reservations ONLINE by **JULY 1st.**
 5. If you plan to enter rabbits for a Doe & Litter and/or Sow & Litter mark them on the pen reservation but remember these classes require the young to be of a certain age. See guidelines provided and breed accordingly. If your breeding was unsuccessful, please contact the 4-H Extension Office or Rabbit Species Advisor as soon as possible to cancel your entry.
 6. **The age, sex and variety (color) of your rabbit/cavy will be required for the Jr. Fair Rabbit Show. Please try to know this information prior to fair week. Ask a breeder, take your rabbit to a show, or attend one of the many Small Animal Rabbit clinics offered to find out this information.**
 7. Project grades are given on the combined scores of rabbit/cavy project judging and showmanship.

ADDITIONAL FAIR INFORMATION

1. All animals must enter the fairgrounds at the Poplar Street Ambulance entrance (between the Track and Race Barn). You must first speak with the fair veterinarian and market rabbit exhibitors must turn in their Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNF) online and must be submitted PRIOR to check in. Then proceed to the rabbit barn. All rabbits/cavies must be checked in by the Rabbit Species Chair or designee according to fair guidelines **NO EXCEPTIONS.** You must provide a signed Check In Slip from the vet to the Species Chair.
2. All animals must be visually inspected by the appropriate Rabbit Species Chair or designee upon entry to the rabbit barn. Animals must be free of disease and in good physical condition, no injuries, mites, lice, or wolf's teeth. A second opinion will be given by the Fair Veterinarian before rejection of any animal that shows any health-related issues or concerns.
3. Exhibitors are encouraged to permanently tattoo their rabbits. If a rabbit is not permanently tattooed at the time of check in, the exhibitor will be required to manually mark their rabbit with a black marker. Cavies will be stickered prior to the show.
4. Cages will be assigned by the appropriate Species Chair at check in. **Cages will NOT be marked prior to check in as in previous years. Cage assignments will NOT be changed after being assigned. Special requests will not be accepted.**
5. Only appropriate toys and resting boards will be permitted in the cage. Rabbits should not be given soft plastics and/or rubber objects. Carpet is unacceptable. Rabbits may eat the synthetic fibers, which causes digestion problems and/or death. Wood, slate, and hard plastic grates are acceptable options. **The Rabbit Species Chair reserves the right to remove any/all inappropriate items. This is for the safety of the rabbits and the exhibitors. Same applies for Cavies.**
6. Decorating cages: Clubs may decorate their sections of cages, however, please use paper, wood, or fabric only and limit the decorations to areas inaccessible to the animals. The Rabbit Species Advisor reserves the right to remove any/all inappropriate items/decorations. This is for the safety of the rabbits and the exhibitors. Please cover the bottom on your tack area with fabric, plastic, etc. All staples and zip ties used to attach decorations/equipment **MUST** be removed when the rabbit is removed.
7. Bedding will need to be provided by the individual 4-H exhibitor and/or club. Remember you only need to remove the heavily soiled/wet areas in the tray. This will help conserve bedding. **CEDAR SHAVINGS ARE PROHIBITED!**
8. Bring your own feed. Because of limited space, store feed in a small container similar to a 3 pound coffee can. If you bring hay it must be in some type of container. Feed on the same schedule as you do at home. Do not overfeed. Water must be available at all times. Please check or have someone check on your rabbit(s) often throughout the day. All small items should be stored in a club tote or tack box labeled with your name or club. Items should be waterproof due to wet floors.

9. ***NEW THIS YEAR* NO LOOSE HAY IS PERMITTED TO BE USED! We ask that you please use hay cubes.**
10. You will be subject to disciplinary action if you feed any other animals but your own!
11. No one is to handle a junior fair member's animal(s) without the permission of the junior fair exhibitor unless there is an emergency. Committee members may handle animals during the normal course of their duties (i.e., show, sale, weigh-in, pictures, loading, unloading).
- **All cages must be cleaned daily and rabbits/cavies fed and watered before 9 a.m. and again by 6 p.m.***
 - ***The Species Chair will inspect cages daily to ensure that all rabbits/cavies are properly cared for by the exhibitor (i.e.: - fed, watered, clean animal and pen, etc.). All animals must be properly cared for daily by 4-H and FFA members (fed, watered, cleaned as needed) or they will be sent home.**
 - **Pens and/or rabbits/cavies not cared for will be tagged with a colored sticker (yellow- 1st warning, orange – 2nd warning, and red – 3rd warning). Exhibitors whose pens are red flagged will forfeit all awards including Jr. fair Auction.**
- *NOTE: It is only necessary to remove the wet/soiled areas in the tray.** Emptying the wheelbarrow is everyone's responsibility! Please clean up after yourself and help keep the aisles clean and clear. Clubs will be assigned "Wheel Barrow Duty" and will be the ones responsible for emptying the wheel barrows throughout the day.
12. Each participant is responsible for at least one day of Barn Duty. See guidelines posted in rabbit barn for barn duty responsibilities and assignments.
13. Grooming tables are provided for you to work with your rabbit/cavy. Please be courteous and clean up after yourself and your animal. **DO NOT** use picnic tables for grooming or to practice showmanship. It is recommended that all animals are groomed PRIOR to animal check in!
- *AT THE TIME OF CHECK IN, ANIMALS MUST ARRIVE IN PROPER SHOW CONDITION! Example: NO wet, or soiled animals. Animals will not be checked in, in this condition. Please plan accordingly. YOUR ANIMALS DO NEED TO BE BATHED AS THIS IS DAMAGING TO THEIR COAT**
14. Carrying cages are **NOT** to be stored at fair. They must be removed after check in, and can only be brought back in 1 hour BEFORE each show, then brought home. They may be brought back 1 hour BEFORE check out.
15. Exhibitors are limited to the space underneath their cages, please be mindful of others! You may only have 24 inches by 24 inches to store tack boxes, anything larger will cause other exhibitors items to be pushed into the aisle, causing a danger hazard. The Species Chair is at the discretion to ask exhibitors to downsize.
16. Animals cannot leave the fairgrounds unless written permission is obtained from the Fair
17. Veterinarian and/or the Sr. Fair Board member in charge of rabbits. The Jr. Fair Office or Rabbit Species Chair should also be notified. If animals are removed early, without permission, Junior Fair exhibitors may be banned from showing at the fair the following year.
18. If animals become sick at the fair, all club Advisors will be notified of the circumstances by the appropriate Rabbit Species Chair. It is suggested that fair exhibitors quarantine their animals for 2-3 weeks once returning home.
19. Does/Sows that kindle during fair may be sent home. Manage breeding schedules to prevent this.
- **NO "For Sale" signs may be posted until after the Rabbit/Cavy Show. The Species Chair has the right to remove postings BEFORE the permitted time. NO EXCEPTIONS!! You must use the approved FOR SALE signs available.** The collection of fees and writing of receipts will be the exhibitor's responsibility. Buyers must be informed that animals may not leave the fairgrounds until 7 PM Sunday night. A sign-up sheet will be posted on the rabbit barn bulletin board for exhibitors wanting to advertise rabbits/cavies for sale. An animal care sheet and bag of transitional feed **MUST** be provided to your buyer. Your care sheet **MUST** be approved by the Species Chair at check in.
 - Practice Good Sportsmanship: The desire that the activity will be enjoyed for its own sake, with proper consideration for fairness, ethics,

respect, and a sense of fellowship with one's competitors.

RABBIT & CAVY SHOWMANSHIP GUIDELINES:

- A. Pre-registration required at check in.
- B. Participation in a showmanship class is **REQUIRED** for all rabbit/cavy projects to be eligible for a project grade ribbon. Exhibitors should have a good understanding of what is expected of themselves and their animal before entering showmanship classes. Watch for clinic dates.
- C. Rabbit Exhibitors are only required to compete in showmanship once. If you take Market or Single Roaster you do not have to complete showmanship again for your breeding/show rabbit project unless you want the opportunity to place in your age/skill level. Market and Roaster exhibitors should refer to Market Rabbit and MAC guidelines.
- D. Exhibitors must show his/her **OWN** project animal. (See I. for exceptions).
- E. **The following Dress Code is required for all Showmanship Judging:**
- Long sleeve shirt OR show/lab coat.
 - Clean, long pants with no holes.
 - Socks and clean, closed-toed shoes.
 - Hair must be pulled back and out of the exhibitor's face.
 - No sunglasses, hat, or jewelry are permitted at the judge's table or in the show ring.
 - **PROPER WIRE CARRYING CAGES ARE REQUIRED!! (See the last page of the guidelines for examples) Points WILL be deducted from the exhibitor's score for improper carrying cages.**
- F. Showmanship Classes are determined by exhibitor's age as of Jan. 1, 2025.

Rabbit Showmanship Classes are as follows:

- Beginner – 1st year projects Ages 8 – 13
- Beginner - 1st year projects Ages 14 & up
- Experienced Ages 9 – 11
- Experienced Ages 12 – 14
- Experienced Ages 15 & up
- Market Rabbit Exhibitors (separate age classes)

Cavy Showmanship Classes* are as follows:

- Junior Ages 8 – 11
- Intermediate Ages 12 - 14
- Senior Ages 15 & up

**These classes are subject to change depending upon the number of exhibitors entered in the project.*

- G. ARBA and ACBA Showmanship score sheets will be used, sample provided online.
- H. During judging, showmanship presentations are limited to a maximum of 10 minutes per exhibitor.
- I. Scores that result in a tie for 1st place will require both exhibitors to compete in a Tie-Breaker Question(s). The winner will be chosen from the exhibitors present at the time of the tie-breaker questioning.
- J. If unable to exhibit your rabbit/cavy at the fair, you may use another animal already housed on the fairgrounds for showmanship. You must advise the SAC Species Chair and the showmanship judge the night of the show (exhibitors will be ineligible to compete for Super Showman). Thus you can still complete your project and earn a project grade ribbon.
- K. **No one but the exhibitor and judge may be at the showmanship table during judging. The exhibitor will lose points if assistance is required to bring the rabbit/cavy to the table. Exhibitors must bring the rabbit/cavy to the table using an approved carrier so the judge can see how you handle your animal. EXCEPTIONS MUST BE LISTED AND APPROVED IN A WINNING 4H PLAN.**

ADDITIONAL SHOWMANSHIP INFORMATION

- A schedule will be posted in the rabbit barn at the start of animal check in for pre-registration for a showmanship time slot. Some showmanship classes are shorter than others, and judges will **NOT** be expected to wait. The show **WILL** move on without you!!
- If you are not present when your name is called the next exhibitor on the list will be called. You will then have to wait for the next opening. **If there is a conflict due to other Jr. Fair obligations, contact the rabbit species chair so we can accommodate your needs.**
- Tables will be identified with signs that correspond to the above showmanship classes.

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- Scores/placings will be announced at the Rabbit Show on Thursday. The eligible breeding rabbit and market rabbit exhibitors with the highest scores will complete showmanship again for a different judge to determine Super Showman.
- Show stands for cavies will be available at the judge's table (and registration table for long-haired cavies). The Senior Cavy Showman winner will now be eligible to compete in the Super Showman contest Sunday of fair week.

SUPER SHOWMANSHIP / SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN

- Cavy and Rabbits only receive one representative for Super Showman. To compete in Super Showman participants must be 13 years old and shown in their respective species for 3 years. The Species Chair will notify you if you are eligible. The top showman who is eligible in each age class will compete at the end of showmanship for the Showman of Showmen.

PLEASE NOTE: Participants will be asked to do showmanship with a Cavy **AND** Rabbit. The animals will be chosen by the Species Chair.

JUNIOR FAIR RABBIT & CAVY SHOW

Jr. Fair Rabbit Meat Pen Judging, Commercial Single Roaster Class, Cavy Judging, Rabbit Breed Judging, Best of Show,

Breeder's Herd, Bred and Raised, Doe & Litter, Showmanship Results, Costume Contest to follow.

- A. Exhibitor must show his or her own rabbit/cavy except for the following reasons:
- A natural occurring circumstance such as sickness, accident, family death. If sickness, etc. occurs after a rabbit is brought to fair another Ashtabula County Junior Fair exhibitor may show the project rabbit. If something occurs before the fair, the rabbit must be home judged and may not be exhibited at fair.
 - Fair/Judging schedule conflict - In this case another Ashtabula County Junior Fair exhibitor may show the project animal. Rabbit species chair must be notified.
 - All Market Rabbit and Roaster exhibitors should refer to Market Animal Guidelines.
 - Additional 4H exhibitors may assist exhibitors with multiple animals.

B. Dress The following Dress Code is required for showing in the ring:

- Long sleeve shirt OR show/lab coat.
- Clean, long pants with no holes.
- Socks and clean, closed-toed shoes.
- Hair must be pulled back and out of the exhibitor's face.
- No sunglasses, hat, or jewelry are permitted at the judge's table or in the show ring.

- C. On show night take your animals to the MAC Arena in a PROPER wire carrying cage –

NO cardboard boxes or soft sided carriers.

- D. The show will run like an ARBA sanctioned show. Breeds will be posted and each breed will be broken down by age and sex. A judging schedule will be posted at the show and in the barn for your convenience. Please check the order of the show to see when your breed is being judged and plan accordingly.
- Listen for your breed and class to be called. Then take your animal to the judging table, place your rabbit/cavy on the table in one of the slots provided and wait there. A limited number of cavy platforms are available for long haired breeds to prep for the show table.
- E. Remember only Junior Fair exhibitors and designated show officials are allowed at the judging table with the judge. If assistance is needed for some reason, ask an Advisor or show official to help you not a friend/family member. **PLEASE NOTE-EXCEPTIONS MUST BE LISTED AND APPROVED IN A WINNING 4H PLAN.**
- The judge will evaluate all animals and then award places. Please be attentive and listen to the judge's comments. When the judge has finished placement, you may return your animal to its carrying cage. If your animal does not receive a Best of Breed placing it can be returned to the rabbit barn. Please return to the front of the show ring to pick up your comment card(s)/ribbons
- F. Rabbits/cavies chosen as Best of Breed will compete again at the end of the show for Best of Show and Reserve Best of Show. Cross-Breed or Replacement Class animals are not eligible for Best of Show. After

the show, animals should be returned to the rabbit barn and carrying cages should be taken home.

G. If you win a trophy or plaque, please send a thank you note to the sponsor.

AT THE END OF THE FAIR - GOING HOME

- All animals will be released at 7 P.M. IF YOU ARE CARRYING THEM FROM THE MAIN FAIRGROUNDS TO A VEHICLE IN THE PARKING LOT WEST OF POPLAR STREET. You may not drive a vehicle onto the fairgrounds until after 9 P.M. on Sunday night to pickup animals or equipment. If animals are removed early, without permission, Junior Fair exhibitors may be banned from showing at the fair the following year. **NO ANIMALS MAY LEAVE THEIR CAGE BEFORE 7 P.M.!!!**

ALL ANIMALS MUST BE PICKED UP BY NOON THE MONDAY AFTER FAIR.

NO CAGES CAN BE CLEANED SUNDAY NIGHT AFTER 10 P.M. PER SENIOR FAIRBOARD! Please make arrangements to clean your cages by Saturday at 10 a.m.

- All score sheets and project ribbons will be available to the Advisors/exhibitors the night of the rabbit/cavy show.
- Any unclaimed score sheets/ribbons will be turned in to the Extension Office. Market Rabbit awards/ribbons will be awarded at the MAC awards on Sunday.
- NOTE: If any concerns or problems occur during the fair, club Advisors, a species Advisor, or the 4-H Educator will make a ruling. They may contact Fair Board members or members of the 4-H Committee for additional input

MARKET RABBIT MEAT PEN & SINGLE ROASTER PROJECT GUIDELINES

Market Rabbit Projects are offered to 4-H and FFA to help members learn the science of raising a Market Rabbit Meat Pen.

The project involves raising one or more litters to market weight. Members are judged on the quality of the market rabbit meat pen produced as well as the knowledge gained from the project. The sale of the project is not a requirement for

project completion, animals may be shown at the fair or be home judged, in the event the animal(s) cannot come to fair.

The main emphasis should be on learning and the development of the project not the sale or using the project to make money.

Eligibility

- All first year 4-Hers and FFA members are eligible with proper guidance given.
- Members may purchase or breed for this project so long as other requirements (age) are met. (See Obtaining Stock)
- Only one market animal project is eligible to be exhibited.

MARKET RABBIT MEATPEN & SINGLE ROASTER REQUIREMENTS

- Project Requirements (Age & Weight)
 - Meat Pen Rabbits are Roasters and will consist of a pen of two (2).
 - A Market Rabbit Meat Pen is to consist of two (2) rabbits. The rabbits must be of the same breed and variety and they may NOT exceed six months of age* at the time of weigh-in at fair. ***Meat pen entries and single roasters are permitted to be between 4-6 months of age and 5.5lbs-9lbs.**
- Requirements for the single roaster project are the same as the meat pen project with a few exceptions: A single roaster is a single market rabbit and is a non-terminal project that does not go through the MAC Sale. It is a class generated to gather interest in the market rabbit meat pen project. Single roasters are not required to be tattooed, but they must be designated as such at the time of check-in of fair and will be weighed after your market rabbit meat pen entry. Exhibitors entering a single roaster are required to participate in Market Rabbit Project Judging and Market Rabbit Showmanship to complete project. Please consult the Market Rabbit Species Chair for project clarification if needed.
- Each rabbit in the meat pen must weigh between 5.5 and 9 pounds at the time of weigh-in. If one rabbit in the pen is under/overweight, the entire pen is considered to be underweight or overweight.

- Rabbits must be of a commercial breed. Suggested rabbit market breeds include: Champagne d'Argent, Crème d'Argent, Californian, American Chinchilla, Cinnamon, New Zealand, Palomino, Satin, or a cross of a previously listed breed. Please consult the market species chair for guidance if you are considering a non-listed breed.

Obtaining Stock

- The Market Rabbit Pen and/or Single Roaster must be in possession of the owner by
- May 1 Suggested Breeding for the 2026 fair is January 4–March 4 to be four-six months old at fair.
- Breeding and rearing your own stock is preferred for the project and the exhibitor's experience. If breeding does not go as planned and an exhibitor needs to complete a pen of two rabbits of the same breed/variety a combination pen of bred and purchased rabbits is allowed.
- **If purchasing rabbits for this project, they CANNOT be born prior to February 4, 2025**
- **A Bill of Sale receipt with date of birth is required for any purchased animals. A receipt is attached to the rules for your convenience. A pedigree is encouraged if the breeder can provide one.** These documents must be presented at the time the animals are tattooed.
- The young are not to be over six (6) months at the time of weigh-in at the fair.
- The young must be of the same breed and variety (color).

Tattooing/Tagging

- Meat pens will be tattooed at fair check in. A parent or legal guardian must be present at the time of tagging.
- Breeding projects may tattoo
- Purchasing projects may tattoo
- Rabbits may come with a personal rabbitry tattoo.

Competition Requirements

- Please consult the 2021-2025 ARBA Standard of Perfection for a list of disqualifications (available at the Extension Office with the other study materials).
- If one rabbit in the pen is under/overweight, the entire pen is considered to be underweight or overweight. Underweights and overweight's will be sent home Sunday after weigh-in and will not show or sell at fair (see MAC guidelines). Exhibitors will be eligible for a project grade ribbon if they participate in market rabbit project judging and showmanship. See Rabbit Species Advisor for further information. Underweight/overweight Roasters may stay and will show at fair with their class.

Pen Reservation

- Each exhibitor must ensure that a pen reservation made online before July 1st. The Advisor or FFA Instructor must also ensure that these reservations are returned to the extension office no later than July 1st. No animal is eligible to compete at the fair without a pen reservation.
- Qualtrex is designed to give you an email that your pen reservation was received. Please save the submitted PDF and email to verify your pen reservation. Prior to July 1st all advisors are emailed a list of completed pen reservations. Consult with your pen reservations is on the master list.

Entrance and Health Requirements

- **PLEASE NOTE, ALL MARKET RABBITS MUST FOLLOW MAC GUIDELINES FOR CHECK IN.**
- Market Rabbit Meat Pens will go through a brief health check PRIOR to being placed in their designated pens. Please allocate time for this health check to be performed. Each rabbit must be free of cold symptoms, parasites, and any other illness. If questions arise as to the health of the animal, the fair veterinarian will be notified to examine the animal(s) in question.
- Please check the fair handbook for any other further updated information or clarifications on health and exhibition requirements.

Exhibition

- All market animals must be watered and cared for by 9 a.m. and again by 6 p.m. The first failure to comply will result in a written warning by the Species Chair, and if it continues, the Department Superintendent may levy a fine of \$10.00 for each occurrence. See MAC Guidelines.

- **Please ensure your animals have enough water and ice bottles (if needed due to heat) throughout the day.**
- Exhibitors must provide appropriate carriers to transport their animals to the judging area. Please consider that heat could play a factor at the time of fair since rabbits do overheat rather easily. Carriers must be taken home when not in use.

Project Judging

Quality Assurance

- All members exhibiting a Market Rabbit Meat Pen are required to attend Quality Assurance by June 1, 2026. No late entries will be permitted. Please check the 4-H Insight or county website for a listing of offered sessions.

Project Judging

- All members are required to participate in Market Rabbit Project Judging in order to be eligible for completion. Judging will be conducted on Skill-a-thon in conjunction with all the breeding rabbit and cavy projects.
- Bring your completed, signed project book to project judging, as this will be part of your grade, along with a signed copy of these Guidelines and the Market Animal Committee (MAC) Guidelines. Points will be deducted from your score if you are missing information.

Showmanship

- Market showmanship is required to be eligible for project completion.
- Showmanship will be conducted on Wednesday during the fair.

Judging

- All animals in the Market Rabbit Meat Pen will be judged at the Rabbit Show on Thursday during the week of fair. Once again, please check with your Advisor, instructor, or Species Chair for more information.
- Weight classes will be established if there are more than six meat pens entered for judging. These classes will be determined by the number of meat pens being shown and may vary in ¼, ½, or ¾ pound increments. The exhibitor will be notified by the rabbit species advisor of their proper weight class prior to the show.

Pre-Sale

- All Market Animal Exhibitors are **REQUIRED** to be at their pens to greet potential buyers ONE HOUR before the sale begins ALL MARKET ANIMAL EXHIBITORS SELLING AT THE SALE ARE REQUIRED TO HAVE A GENERIC THANK YOU CARD WRITTEN AND TURNED IN AT THE TIME THE EXHIBITORS ENTER THE SALE RING.

Sale

- **All animals in the meat pen are terminal** and are therefore required to be processed through a MAC approved processor.
- Grand Champion Project, Reserve Champion Project, Best of Show and Reserve Best of Show must sell at the sale. All other properly tattooed animals may withdraw from the sale within one hour after the end of the rabbit show by contacting the species chairperson. (See MAC Guidelines for further information).
- Grand Champion Project and Reserve Champion Project will be first through the sale followed by Best in Show and Reserve in Show. The remainder of the pens will be sold in order of project judging score. In the event that the project exceeds fifteen (15) pens, the top five (5) pens after Best in Show and Reserve in Show will be sold according to placement by the judge and the remainder of the pens will be sold by project judging score.
- Members must show their own animal for the sale. If a member is unable to show his or her own animal for the sale, that members must notify the species chairperson before the day of the sale. The livestock superintendents along with the species chairperson and the 4-H Educator will then determine whether or not that member's animal can be sold.

As a reminder, these rules are meant as a guideline for the Market Animal Project. All rules and guidelines are subject to the MAC and must also comply with any other rules regarding the Jr. Fair and MAC Sale. These other rules can be found in the Fair Handbook.

2. Market Lambs must be meat-breed type ewes or wethers only (no rams) with a minimum weight of 90 lbs., maximum weight 150 lbs. born January of February of the current year.

JUNIOR FAIR SHOW SCHEDULE

1. Showmanship
 - * Experienced - Has shown sheep
 - * Inexperienced - Has never shown sheep
2. Breeding Sheep Projects
 - * Breeding Ewe lamb (less than 1 year old) (Ewe market lambs are not eligible for this class)
 - * Yearling Ewe (1-2 years old)
 - * Breeding Ewe (2 years old or older)
 - * Best of Show/Grand Champion Project (selected from 1st place breeding ewe lamb, yearling ewes and breeding ewes)
3. Market Lambs
 - * Light Weight lamb
 - * Medium Weight lambs
 - * Heavy Weight lambs
 - * Best of Show/Grand Champion Project
 - * Grand and Reserve champions must sell at the Sale. All others have within one hour after the sheep show to officially withdraw from the sale. Contact the sheep species chairman.

SHOWMANSHIP: One showmanship contest will be held and includes showmanship judging for both Market Lambs and Breeding Sheep Projects. To compete for Outstanding Project Exhibitor a member must participate in showmanship. All members must show their own animal per the Market Animal Guidelines. Market exhibitors who have had their animal sent home or participated in the carcass show may still compete in showmanship using another market type animal owned by another exhibitor. See MAC guidelines for additional information, must be followed, and forms filled out.

MARKET LAMBS: Important: This list are a few highlights ONLY, you must be familiar with the entire MAC Guidelines Market Lambs should

be born between January and February of the current year. Market lambs must be meat breed type ewes or wethers (no rams). Popular breeds used for this project are Suffolk and Hampshire's. For reference see the OSU Extension #194R Resource book for other breed options. The animal must be a wether or ewe.

DRUG USE NOTIFICATION FORMS: Market Lambs must have completed electronic Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNF) and Breeding lambs a Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection upon arrival to the fairgrounds. Quality Assurance: All youth (4-H/FFA) taking Jr. Fair Market and lactating dairy animals must have Quality Assurance completed by June 1.

WEIGH IN: All market animals must be weighed in on Sunday prior to the fair week: Market lambs are encouraged to arrive between 2-4 p.m. on Sunday (Check MAC GUIDELINES for date, time and all weigh in and arrival requirements). Market Sheep Weight Requirements: Minimum 90lb. Maximum 150lbs.

WEIGHT CLASSES: Can only be determined after weighing in and prior to the show. Typically, sheep will be placed in classes: light weight, medium weight, heavy weight

BREEDING SHEEP:

BREEDING CLASSES: Will be determined after check-in and before the show, will be sorted by age and/or breed dependent upon quantity of entries. If you have more than one animal in the class, only another Junior (4-H or FFA) member may show for you. Ewe market lambs, rams or wethers are not eligible for any breeding classes. Market lambs may not be entered into the breeding show.

- Breeding Ewe Lamb (less than 1 year old)
- Yearling Ewes (1-2 years old)
- Breeding Ewes (2 years old or older)

Breeding animals may arrive to the fairgrounds between the hours of 2-8 p.m. on Sunday & 10 a.m.-3 p.m. on Monday. All animals must be on the fairgrounds by 3 p.m. on the Monday of fair week. Breeding Projects are to be in member possession by May 1 of current year.

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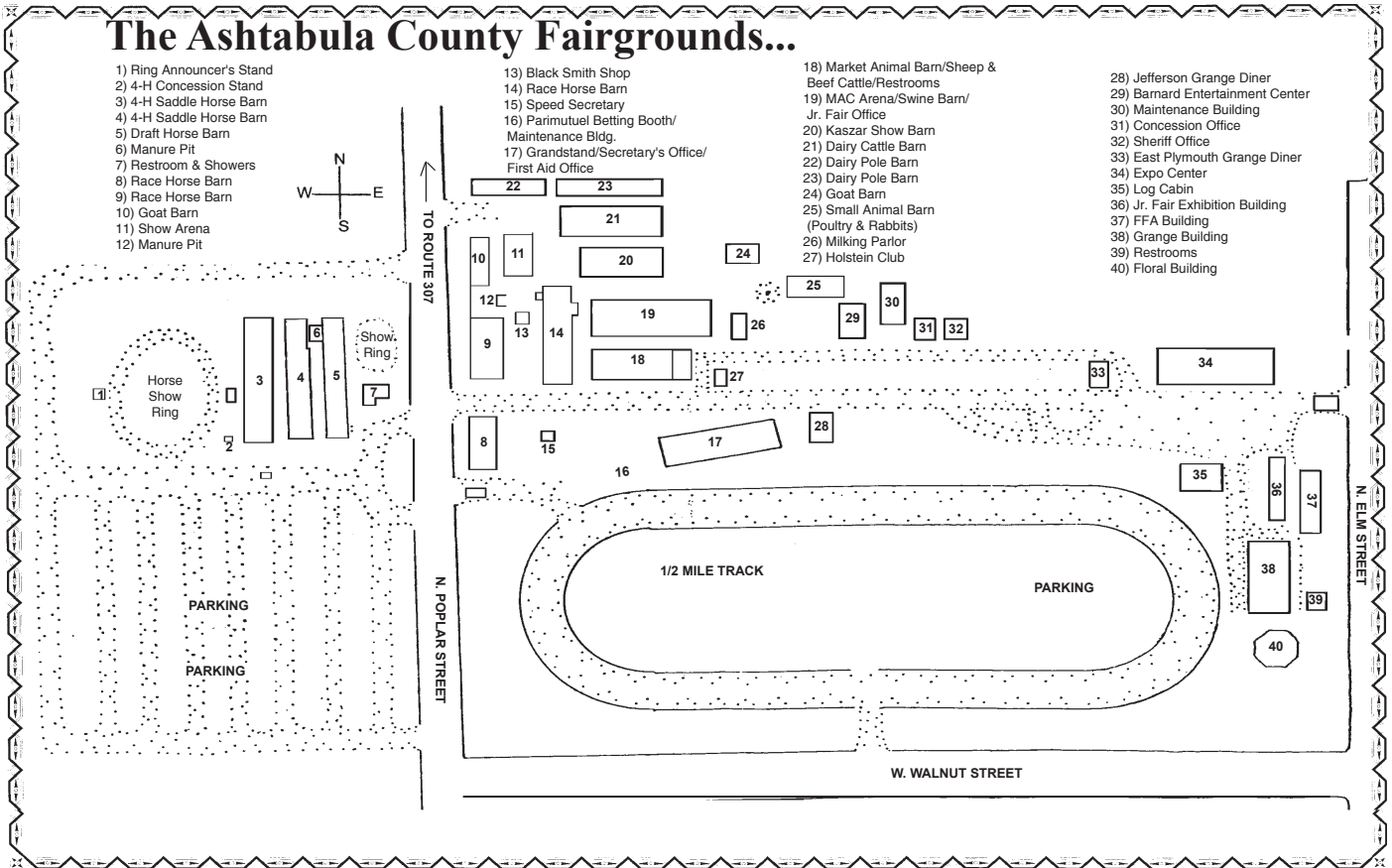

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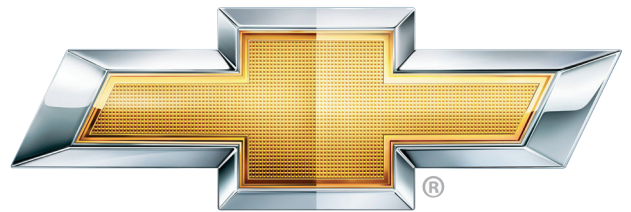


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
