It's hard to believe, but summer is already winding down, and the signs of fall are starting to show, cooler mornings, shorter days, and the changing colors of the leaves. While the shift in seasons brings a certain comfort, it also offers an important opportunity to pause and reflect. Let's be honest, this summer hasn't been easy as we've faced some significant challenges. These past few months have served as important reminders of how crucial it is to stay focused, consistent, and committed to the safety of ourselves and our coworkers. While we can't undo what's already occurred, we can learn from it. We can grow and move forward with renewed focus and purpose.

As Nebraskans, we know how unpredictable this time of year can be. Warm afternoons can quickly turn into cold evenings. Dressing in layers and being prepared for sudden drops in temperature is important. Exposure to the cold can increase the risk of illness and injury, especially as we push towards wrapping up projects at the end of the construction season. Reduced daylight hours also bring visibility concerns. If you're working during early mornings or late afternoons, please make sure high-visibility reflective clothing is worn and maintained. Staying seen means staying safe.

Historically, incident rates tend to increase in the fall, and it's no coincidence. As project deadlines tighten and winter starts

closing in, the pressure to finish strong can tempt even the most experienced among us to cut a corner or rush through a task. When speed replaces caution, the risk of serious accidents goes up. No deadline is worth putting yourself or your coworkers in danger. The safest way is always the right way.

If you spot a hazard or experience an incident, report it immediately to your supervisor and a member of the safety team. If emergency services are needed, call them without delay. Remember that after any incident, a completed report must be submitted to the safety department within 24 hours. Let's make the most of this season; not just by finishing projects, but by finishing strong and finishing safely. We may not be able to control everything that happens, but we can control how we prepare, how we respond, and how we support one another. As we head into fall, let this be a time of renewed focus, accountability, and care. Together, we can continue working toward our shared goal of an injury and accident-free workplace.
