

MEMBER PROFILE – MEET JULIE HOHN...



I am Julie (Emerson) Hohn and a proud member of the Commerce City Historical Society. My Mom and I joined many years ago and are grateful for the opportunity to preserve some of our family's Johnson and Lindvall history from the Commerce City area since our ancestors were some of the earliest settlers in this area. My great grandmother immigrated from Sweden to this area and purchased land on 56th Avenue in 1899. Several of her siblings also immigrated to this area and were within walking distance of each other's homes located not far from the current day Walmart. She later married, and they operated a dairy farm. My grandparents also operated a dairy farm in Commerce City for many years and my uncle operated an alignment shop. We are fortunate that my grandmother and the Lindvall family

saved a lot of old pictures and memorabilia that we have been able to display in the CCHS Museum. We also have a strong connection with the schools in this area. My grandmother attended high school at Union High School in Commerce City until she had to quit to help out with the family farm. In those days, she would often ride her horse to school. Her brother graduated in the class of 1924. The school was later renamed Adams City High School where my dad ('52), my mom ('50) and my mom's two brothers graduated from Adams City High School ('43 and '56). My husband and I both graduated in the class of 1976, and my sisters were in the class of 1979 and 1982. We are proud of our early roots in this area.

National Night Out - August 1, 2023







Robert G. Hutchings April 3, 1930 -August 8, 2023



Bob is survived by his daughter Barbara (Jack) Nylin; son Carl (Debbie) Hutchings; grandchildren David (Andrea) Hutchings; Laura Hutchings; Matthew (Carissa) Nylin; Joanna (Stephen) Lavallee; greatgrandchildren Kavan, Keeley, and twins Kairi and Emiko Hutchings; Jack and Lily Nylin; Ella Leveille; Lila and Triton Lavallee.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 69 years, Dorothy, and sister Gloria Huber. Bob was born on April 3, 1930, to parents Gordon and Arline Hutchings. Bob lived in the family home for 93 years with the exception of his years of service in the U.S. Air Force.

He met Dorothy in Estes Park in 1944, the summer before their freshman year of high school and enjoyed 69 years of marriage. Bob (and Dorothy) continued the family trout farm that his father started in 1929, until 1981. This work stocked many lakes around the Rocky Mountain region and provided trout for the Brown Palace Hotel.

Bob was very involved in the South Adams County Volunteer Fire Department. He served as a volunteer fireman from 1950-1984. During this time, he held various positions including Fire Chief. He was also elected to the South Adams Fire Protection District Board from 1966-1993. He served in the executive leadership of the Colorado State Fireman's Association beginning in 1970 and ending in 1976 as president. He was appointed by the Governor of Colorado to serve on the Fire and Police Pension Association Board from 1980 to 1986. He served in leadership of numerous other associations and boards, received many awards, and had a tremendous impact on the firefighting community. In his later years he served as the unofficial historian of the South Adams County Fire Department.

Bob was an avid sports fan all his life. He especially loved the Broncos and CU football and shared his love of those games with family and friends. In the 1980's Bob and Dorothy began traveling and found a passion for experiencing new places and they


visited all 50 states together. Bob made friends wherever he went. His friendly spirit led to many lifelong friends. He was making new friends even in his final days.

Bob came to faith in Jesus later in life (75). His faith in Jesus had a profound impact on him. He was very involved in the churches he attended. He grew in his personal relationship with Jesus and looked forward to this day, being face to face with his savior.

Her famous saying was "Living Life to the Fullest", she always told her family four things.


- 1. You need an identity.

BACK IN TIME...

The Commerce City Veteran's Memorial History:

The Commerce City, city park was built in 1971, at 6015 Forest Drive, next to City Hall. The Commerce City Recreation Center was built in 1987 (now Eagle Pointe Recreation Center). Right on the heels of the new recreation center was the idea to build a Veteran's Memorial. The Chairman of this project was Joe Reilly, President of the Commerce City Business & Professional Association and other local residents from the VFW Post and the American Legion Post. Money was raised through donations and fundraisers. One of the largest fund raiser was a Rocky Mountain Oyster and Ham Dinner with a country-western band. It was held at Our Lady Mother of the Church on January 30, 1988.

The monument is dedicated to the men and women who served in times of peace and war, and especially to those who gave their lives. The memorial was dedicated on Memorial Day 1988, following the annual Memorial Day Parade.



In 2007 when the city hall moved to 7887 East 60th Avenue, city council members approved \$75,000 for the renovation of the deteriorating memorial. The design remained much the same, with a new feature honoring veterans with brick pavers that are put in the ramp walkway of the memorial. In 2010 the park was renamed Veteran's Memorial Park.



In August of 2020, city council celebrated the grand reopening of the newly renovated Veterans Memorial Park puttineg grass and walkways where 4 houses were located and puchased by the city. The 2.6-acre park site is home to the city's first all-inclusive playground. The site features a universally designed, sensory-rich environments for users of all ages and capabilities to enjoy. Amenities include:

- A nature play area and an all-inclusive playground
- ADA accessible features such as sidewalk ramps and picnic tables
- A labyrinth for reflection and meditation
- New picnic shelters and restroom

The \$3.2 million project was constructed by <u>Designscapes Colorado</u>, <u>Inc.</u> Designed by <u>DHM</u> <u>Design</u>, the new park features a bird theme inspired by the neighboring Eagle Pointe Recreation Center.
