His Life

On September 13, 1933, in the East Thomas community of Birmingham, Alabama, a child was born who would grow to carry a louder voice than any obstacle. Calvin Wallace Woods, Sr., was the fourth of thirteen children born to Rev. Abraham Lincoln Woods, Sr., and Maggie Rose Wallace Woods. Though small in stature, he had a presence that could not be ignored.

From the time he was a boy, Calvin had a gift for leadership. He organized choirs, led groups in the neighborhood, and carried himself with vision far beyond his years. At Parker High School, he discovered the power of his voice, winning oratorical contests and quickly becoming known as someone who could inspire and persuade. He graduated at just sixteen years old, already walking the path of purpose.

He answered his call to ministry early, serving faithfully at Shiloh Baptist Church under his father's guidance. By his early twenties, he was pastoring East End Baptist Church, preaching with a wisdom and fire that amazed many in the 1950s. Over time, he would serve other churches, touching lives wherever God sent him.

But his ministry did not stop at the pulpit. The late 1950s and 60s brought a storm of injustice to Birmingham, and Bishop Woods stepped into the fight. He marched, he protested, he was jailed, and he endured beatings. His voice became a weapon against oppression, and his courage caught the attention of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. King trusted him to help lead efforts in Birmingham, appointing him as City Convener of the SCLC. For the next sixty years, Bishop Woods stood as a drum major for justice, not only in Alabama but across the nation.

His life was not easy; he lost jobs, had his car taken, and carried scars from police beatings. Yet, he never stopped preaching hope. He lived as a man determined to be a servant leader, no matter the cost.

His Love

"And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

1 Corinthians 13:13

During it all, Calvin found his queen. As a young man, he met a beautiful majorette named Lucille Grayson. She was radiant, full of life, and captured his heart completely. In December of 1950, the two became spouses.

Together, they built a family, thirteen children born of their union. Lucille, an only child, and Calvin, one of thirteen, seemed destined to create a family rich in love, discipline, and faith. Their home became a place of music, laughter, and prayer, where lessons of responsibility and respect were taught daily.

Bishop Woods' platform was always prayer and intercession. He believed deeply in the power of calling on God, and he taught his children from the earliest age to pray for strength, pray for one another, and even pray for the nation. He reminded them often that their role was to "fix things" through faith and to stand as what he lovingly called "Captain Save the United States." Their home was not just a house, but a sanctuary, a training ground for prayer warriors nurtured by the love of their father and mother.

Through hardships, arrests, and trials, Lucille stood by his side, and Calvin drew strength from her unwavering support. Their love was the anchor that held them steady while the world outside was often in turmoil. To their children, they gave not only guidance but also an inheritance of faith and resilience. Their love story was not just about affection, but about building a legacy of strength for generations to come.

Matthew 25:23


When you speak of Bishop Calvin Woods, you speak of a man who left more than memories left a movement, a ministry, and a model for how to live. He carried the mantle of his father and passed it down to his family. Ministers, leaders, and servants of God arose from his teaching and example, both within his bloodline and among those he mentored.

His legacy is not only in his family but also in his service. He worked in Birmingham City Schools, counseled with JCCEO, served on boards, and led conventions. For more than twenty years, he stood in Kelly Ingram Park, sharing the story of Birmingham's struggle with visitors from across the world.

But at the heart of his legacy was intercession; he was a man of prayer. His children and grandchildren remember his call for them to be repairers, to step in the gap, to fix things when others walked away. He believed that through faith and prayer, even a family could help heal a nation. And so, he taught them to pray, "Fix Things Captain - Save the United States," was more than words, it was a charge to everyone who carries his name and spirit.

Over the years Bishop Woods received honors and awards, but his greatest reward is not here on earth but in heaven, where he now rests with the Lord, receiving the joy and glory that come from a life lived in faithful service. His story lives on in his children, his community, and in every soul touched by his voice and his vision. He served faithfully under the pastorage of his son, Dr. Timothy J. Woods, Sr. at Hopewell Missionary Baptist Church.





His Legwork

Bishop Calvin Woods' journey was marked not only by his words but also by his work. His "leg work" carried him across pulpits, classrooms, streets, and cities each step a testimony to his calling as both preacher and foot soldier.

Ministry & Leadership

- Pastored several churches, including East End Baptist, Roby Temple A.O.H. Church of God, Believers Temple Baptist and Shiloh Baptist Church, Norwood.
- Served more than 60 years with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) on national, state, and local levels. Held positions such as National Vice President, National Chaplain, State President, and President of the Birmingham Metro Chapter.
- *President of the New Era Baptist State Convention of Alabama.
- *Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees, Birmingham Easonian Baptist Bible College.
- *Board Member of the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.
- *Active member of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.

Civil Rights Work

- -Stood on the front lines of Birmingham's struggle for justice, working side by side with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
- -Headed the Transition Committee to ensure that various sectors were integrated following the 1963 demonstrations
- Appointed in 1966 by Dr. King as City Convener for the Birmingham Ministers Leadership Conference following the U.S. Civil Rights Commission's findings against the city.
- -Filed the lawsuit with the United States Court of Appeals in Atlanta, GA, "Linda Cal Woods v. Theo R. Wright" after his three daughters and hundreds of other students were jailed during the Children's Crusade in 1963—securing their reinstatement in school.
- -Was jailed, beaten, and harassed numerous times for his activism, yet never wavered in his mission.
- For more than 20 years, he shared the Birmingham Civil Rights story with thousands of out-of-state visitors at Kelly Ingram Park.

Education & Community Service

Retired from Birmingham City Schools after years of service in Discipline & Administration and as Evening Supervisor for Parker High School's Community Education Program

Worked as a Counselor, Counselor Group Worker, and Center Director for JCCEO in assisting the poor in their quest for economic opportunity and equal justice

Honored in 2014 by the State of Alabama with a marker for more than 57 years of non-violent civil rights involvement stationed in Kelly Ingram Park -Guided and mentored generations of young people through both education and ministry.

Bachelor/Master/Doctoral degrees include- Miles College, Universal Bible Institute, Union Baptist Seminary, School of Truth, Birmingham Easonian Bible College, Morehouse College, Graduate studies -University of Alabama Birmingham, Urban Training Center for Christian Missions & Samford University Birmingham

Abraham Lincoln Woods Jr., Dr. Roy Woods Sr., Franklin Delorna Woods, and Dr. Dwight Edward Woods; his sisters Mary Ruby Woods Hutchinson, Melzer Woods Luke, and Lois Woods; his daughters Linda Cal Woods Holt and Shelia Vanessa Woods Minter; his son Dr. Freedom Progress Woods Sr.; his granddaughter Tamecia LaShun Woods; and several in-laws, nieces, and nephews.

Left to cherish his memory are his children: Jeanette Marie Woods Smith, Judy Kay Woods, Dr. Calvin Wallace Woods Jr. (Minister Constance), Carlton Wayne Woods Sr., Rev. Byron Elliott Woods, Christopher Wyatt Woods, Minister Joyce Elaine Woods Lewis (Dr. Tommie), Minister Angela Gay Woods McClure (Dr. Michael), Dr. Timothy Justice Woods Sr., Dr. Quintin Prescott Woods Sr. (Tramella).
