Happy New Year



"It is time to return to the right way of thinking. The Creator's Good Road from above is close. It is time to begin walking it."

Matthew 3:2 (First Nations Version)

These past few weeks, I have been sitting with this passage from Matthew and find it so fitting for the moment we are in together. Our journey together through the cycles of life

never ceases. It seems each winter we are faced with new challenges and new opportunities. As we move into this new year, continue through this Christmas season, and into the season of Epiphany, I am eager to see what God calls us into next.

We have been through a lot this past year, and I am excited for the many new things God is doing in our life together. We have supported each other through the heartache of so many deaths in our community, the loss of both physical, social, and personal realities as people transitioned from houses to assisted living centers – moving their home from one place to another – and we have supported each other through the ongoing social and political division that continues to cause harm to our neighborhoods, city, and the world.

But we have also seen so many new things spring up as well! We welcomed new friends who found their way to Messiah. We have grown our staff and our program opportunities. We have seen more people join our serving ministries – including our SAM and visitation ministry. We dedicated our solar panel array, we returned to glass communion cups, we planted a Wisconsinnative prairie. We watched as our Sunday School and our youth programs grew, including reimagining our high school ministries (Waffle Wednesdays!). We have done so much together, and Pastor Jeff and I could not be more proud of all you have accomplished!

As we look to this new year, I am eager to discover what God has for us next. So often the new year comes with a desire to 'reset' or 'begin anew.' People set goals or resolutions, noticing the places in their lives that need attention, growth, or challenge. As I am hearing from some of their

goals, I am reminded of the words of John the Baptist we heard just a few weeks ago during Advent. I shared about this in my homily, how the First Nation's Version of the New Testament translates John's words: "It is time to return to the right way of thinking. The Creator's Good Road from above is close. It is time to begin walking it."

This is a time where we have the opportunity to reflect, reconsider, and reimagine how we want to live in the world around us. What in your life needs attention? What in your life needs growth? What needs challenge? This will look different for each of us. The answer to these questions will be different for each of us. But the beautiful thing about it all is that even though we have different needs, we are all journeying the same road, and we get to support one another in that shared journey. Something I have seen you all do so well already.

And I know I've said this in the past, but it is important to remind each other of it. These goals we set, the resolutions we make, do not define us. Whether we feel we accomplish them by the end of the year does not determine our worth. You are constantly becoming who God made you to be. Your journey does not end with the calendar year, and neither does our mission as Messiah.

It is my hope, in these next couple of weeks, that we can wonder and discover together where and what God is inviting us into, for this new year. What in our life together needs our attention? What or who in our neighborhood, city, and world, needs growth that we could be a part of? What has been a challenge for us as Messiah that we need to address? I'm not sure what the answer to those questions are just yet, I need your help with that. So let us walk the Creator's Good Road from above that has come close, boldly and courageously – together. And who knows? We may be surprised where it takes us.

With gratitude, Pastor Dan **2025 Year End** - Both December and all of 2025 are ending with our church finances in good shape. Your thoughtful giving to the General Fund exceeded our expectations, thank you! The Pledged Offering received through 50 weeks (Dec. 17th) was \$864,347, while the budget for the full year was \$803,336, so we are \$61,011 ahead of the budget with two Sundays remaining. This generous giving, combined with our spending within our budget, means that at the end of the year, our revenues will exceed our expenses.

2025 Excess Revenue Distribution Plan - At our most recent Council meeting, we discussed what should be done with the excess revenues over expenses, currently \$81,000. Similar to what we have done in the past eleven years, we formulated a plan for these funds. This year, council approved a plan to recognize the work of the church staff and to use 10 percent of the excess for staff bonuses. In addition, the council would like to add \$21,000 to the Reserve Fund to cover two months of operating expenses. The remaining funds would be used for our mission partners: Campus Ministries, Domestic Abuse Intervention Services, Jail Ministry, Just Dane, Porchlight, The Road Home, Project Home-Serving Those Who Served, NAMI Dane County, Pierre Outreach Services Safe Home and South Central Synod Lutheran Camps. The final amount available distribution will be determined after the close of the calendar year.

2026 Pledge Results - The Pledge Fund drive results through December 15th: 333 families have pledged \$630,174 to the General Fund for 2026.

2026 Budget - Pledged Offering in the budget is based on the following factors: Current Year collections, 2026 Pledges, and past giving history. Based on these three factors, we have set the amount at \$854,653, which we believe is a realistic amount based on the information provided. There are a few areas that have increased budget amounts from 2025.

One of those areas is salaries. We increased the Pastor's salary, staff salaries and Mission Support by 4 percent. You will see that Pastor Dan's increases were higher than Pastor Jeff, this was necessary to keep both pastors within the Synod guidelines. In addition, you will see that the council raised the salary of the Coordinator of Youth and Families by 11 percent. This is to acknowledge the extraordinary work Teresa has done to build community with our youth and to bring her salary closer to what other churches are compensating for similar, and sometimes less, programming than she offers. The budget now includes the position approved at the June Congregational Meeting, Coordinator of Adult Ministry.

The 2026 budget also increased the number of Ministry Groups. Historically, several groups would fall under the catch-all "Evangelism" line. But we decided to split them out to now have: Adult Formation, Family Ministry, Outdoor Ministry, along with the continued Senior Adult Ministry, and Evangelism lines. Collectively this group of expenses increased the budget by 28 percent (\$20,450 to

\$26,300). Maintenance increased 16 percent (\$18,000 to \$21,000), Coffee/Donuts increased 25 percent (\$4,000 to \$5,000). One item that we may look at from Capital Projects is to redo the sound system in the Sanctuary in 2026 or 2027.

Annual Meeting - The excess revenue distribution plan and the 2026 budget will be discussed and voted on at the Annual Meeting on January 25th. If you have any questions, feel free give me a call at (608-222-0503) or send me an email at *timc@messiahchurch.com*.



Women's Book Study - Thursday, January 8, 2026, we will begin reading and discussing Philip Yancey's book, *What's So Amazing About Grace? In this book, Yancey explores the radical, unsettling, and life-changing nature of God's grace. He contrasts grace with the judgmentalism, hypocrisy, and "ungrace" often found in the modern church. Yancey calls Christians to rediscover grace as the central message of Jesus — the kind of grace that welcomes prodigals, forgives enemies, and heals broken lives.*

Senior Adult Ministry (SAM)

Virtual Apple Pie Sale Benefits Many

To everyone who purchased one or more virtual apple pies in November, I say "thank you" from the bottom of my heart. Your purchase led to a record-setting sale. SAM raised \$25,530.36 in virtual pie sales in 2025. The previous record was \$14,752.00 set in 2024.

A very special "thank you" goes to the Gundlach Family Fund for matching the virtual pie donations. SAM did reserve \$2,500.00 for the food pantry at Christ the Shepherd Lutheran Church-ELCA in Altadena, California, which suffered through the Los Angeles fires. The Gundlach Family Fund graciously matched this amount so Christ the Shepherd Lutheran Church-ELCA will receive \$5,000 for their food pantry.

The remaining balance of \$46,060.72 was presented to Second Harvest Food Bank during a live WMTV15 broadcast on December 10th during the Share Your Holidays 30th Grand Finale. A special "thank you" to WMTV15 sponsors for doubling this amount to become \$92,121.44. This equates to more than 200,000 meals for over 300 pantries in 16 south central Wisconsin counties.

How did this all happen? It started with YOU! One Person. One Pie. Working Together.

The Boomerang Bag Group will next gather on Tuesday, January 20 from 10:00 AM - 12:00 noon in the Social Hall.

Since our Boomerang Bag group started a few years ago they have made over 2,000 Boomerang Bags. That is a lot of material saved from ending up in the landfill.



Here is a breakdown of where all those bags have gone:

- 600 Craft & Bake Sales (last year and this year) 300 at each Craft & Bake Sale.
- 12 Activity Bags for children to use in the Sanctuary
- 10 Given to St. Paul's AME Church
- 500 Given out at Messiah in Fall 2023, Earth Day 2024 and Spirit Day 2025
- 36 Given out at the Ladies Lunch Bunch
- 50 Given out to individuals
- 50 Given to camp participants
- 24 Given to St. Stephen's Food Pantry

They are now preparing 400 bags to be given out at Synod Assembly in May

As of December 11th, Messiah's Solar has produced 40.7 MWh, which equates to 63,141 pounds of CO2 emissions saved!

Human Trafficking Awareness Speaker

The team works for long-range change in the intersection of racial justice and homelessness, and responds to immediate needs through our community outreach team.

Jevon Diming co-preached and hosted a conversation about Pierre Outreach Services Safe Home. Her work centers on healing generational trauma with mothers and teen girls. Jevon received \$10,000 from our 2024 funds and over \$10,000 through donations and a GFF match

Pastor Jeff was a featured speaker at a Safe Harbor Child Advocacy Center fundraiser. They reduce trauma and promote healing for children and adults with intellectual disabilities who are victims of or witnesses to crime. We invited director Jennifer Ginsburg to speak at the services who told us staggering statistics about child abuse. Child abuse, domestic violence, trafficking— it's all part of the same problem.

Briarpatch received \$3,738 from the Craft and Bake Sale funds. Briarpatch assists youth and young adults experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity.


