

SPIRITUAL BUT NOT RELIGIOUS: RELIGION OF RADICAL INDIVIDUALISM

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

During a conversation with a Catholic, who is no longer actively living the faith, I asked about his journey with the Lord. He told me, "father, I consider myself to be a spiritual person, but I am not really religious." He told me that he believes in God, but he does engage in the day-to-day rituals or expectations of the communal and doctrinal life of the faith. Our postmodern society sees this as a more sophisticated way to express one's spiritual life. But in actual fact, it betrays a deep lack of understanding of our life with God. Many of those who hold this view are often critical of the hypocrisy or scandal within the Church. The church does not shy away from the sins of its members or the failures of its leaders. The presence of sin does not disprove the Church's divine origins. Rather, it shows the need for ongoing conversion, penitence, and reform. We have the common saying in Latin, *Ecclesia Semper Reformanda*, which means, the Church is always in need of reform or renewal. Spiritual but not religious isan excuse for the refusal to meet the demands of Christian discipleship. It is a symptom of the individualism that affects our modern society. We want to do things on our own terms, even our relationship with God.

Spirituality, (concerned with things of the spirit as opposed to material or physical things) and Religion, (the life, teachings, and action about God) are not mutually exclusive; they are distinct but not opposite realities. While I cannot speak about other religions, I can categorically say that the idea of spiritual but not religious, is an afront to the Christian life. Christianity, especially our Catholic Faith, is a relationship of communion with God and with our neighbors. This involves active participation in the Church, the community of believers. Spiritual but not religious is a late twentieth century invention which would have been a strange and laughable idea to the apostles, their successors and also to the saints who have gone before us in the faith. Authentic Christian spirituality involves a relationship with God nourished by prayer, strengthened by the sacraments and movement towards mission. The Church is not just an institution. It is the Mystical Body of Christ. Spiritual but not religious signals individual autonomy, but there no solo Christian. Our Lord Jesus did not call people to be solitary seekers of "connection" with God. He gathered together a band of disciples and established a church; 'and so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it' (Matthew 16:18). The early Church "devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers' (Acts 2:42). This communal dimension is not a mere addition; it is essential for growth in holiness. The Church offers guidance, correction, and encouragement towards a perfect life of discipleship. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that "the desire for God is written in the human heart" (CCC 27) and God reveals Himself through creation, history, and, most fully, in Jesus Christ and the community of the Church. For us Catholics, the religious dimension expressed in liturgy, sacraments, doctrine, and communal life, is not an accidental or optional feature, but intrinsic to the way God has chosen to encounter humanity.

The spiritual but not religious attitude has led many people to a form of spiritual individualism that isolates them from God and the church. This is very evident in our own parish. Many parishioners have consciously or unconsciously bought into this ideology. Our families no longer faithfully attend Mass regularly or participate in the life of the Church. The man I spoke about earlier, told me, "father, I can worship God inside my own house." I pray and hope that we all worship God and pray individually. But, without the checks and balances of tradition, doctrine, and community, one's spiritual life becomes a projection of one's own preferences and desires. Rather than worship the God who created us in His image and likeness, we turn God into our own image. Instead of being conformed to the image of Christ, we conform Christ to our own desires. Moreover, religious practice provides structure, discipline, and accountability. Over time, the consistent rhythm of Sunday Mass (and Holy Days), prayer, fasting, and liturgical seasons shapes the heart of a Christian and opens the soul to God's grace. Frequent reception of the sacraments are not mere symbols or empty practices; they are the means of the graces which our Lord Jesus won for us to accompany us in our Christian journey.

Dear brothers and sisters, let us love God, strengthen our relationship with the Lord, participate, and build up the body of Christ and continue to learn from the Church as we walk in faith with each other towards the kingdom of God.








This process should allow for a variety of items to fill the backpacks. Monetary donations will be accepted to purchase these supplies.





This feast day commemorates Mary's body and soul taken directly to heaven.


