For 135 years, the Boys & Girls Club of Fall River has been a place where young people can belong, grow, and simply be kids. Yet rising costs and daily pressures mean that many families rely on the Club now more than ever. More young people are coming through our doors each day seeking a safe place to go, a meal they can count on, and the stability and encouragement that helps them succeed.

Our community is also evolving. We are proud to welcome a growing number of Spanish-speaking families, and we have intentionally expanded our team to include multilingual staff who can ensure every parent and child feels welcomed, informed, and supported.

Club Kids represent the very best of our community and our country. They are the next scientists, teachers, nurses, firefighters, and community change-makers. We are committed to equipping them with the skills they need today so they can become the leaders of tomorrow.

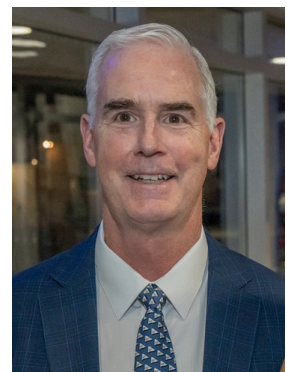

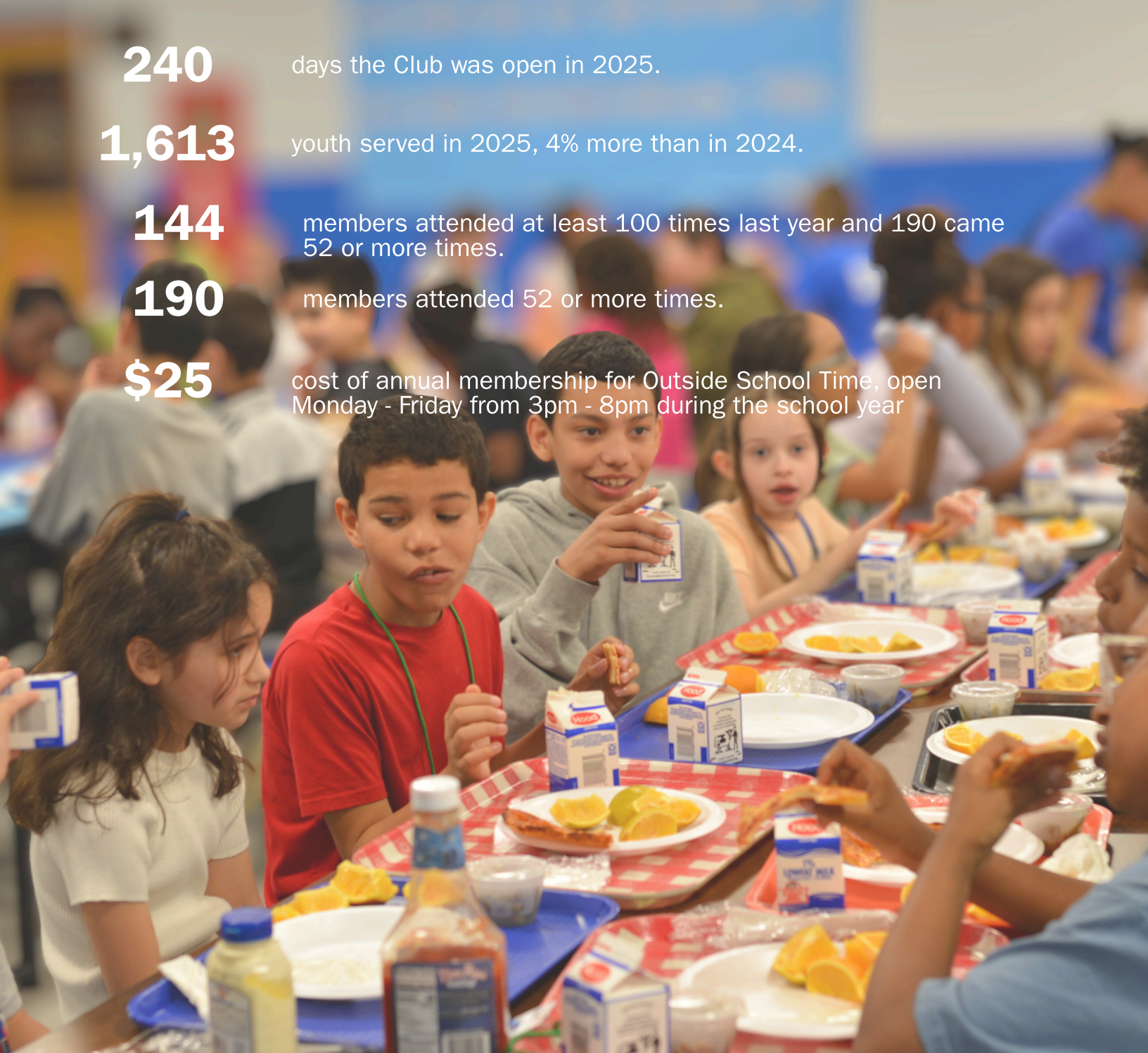

The Club serves a population that is more diverse than the city as a whole, reflecting the wide range of cultures and backgrounds in our community. The city's population is 71.7% White non-hispanic, compared to 42% of Club Kids. To better support this diversity, the Club has continued to hire additional multilingual staff to engage English Language Learner (ELL) families. By offering additional staff support, the Club ensures that all families can access opportunities that promote youth development, academic success, and overall well-being. The Club fosters a deep sense of belonging by creating a safe, inclusive, and affirming environment.



Health & Well-Being

The Club is committed to our members' mental and physical health, and their ability to make positive choices beyond their time at the Club, an approach focused on building kids' and teens' agency and skills to make healthy decisions. By offering safe, supportive environments, increasing access to healthy meals and snacks and providing health and wellness programming that promote physical activity, Clubs are helping young people learn and build healthy habits early, setting a foundation for lifelong health.

The Club offers nightly sports and recreational activities, geared towards all interests and age levels. Sports play an integral role in the fun component, reinforcing teamwork, fair play, and resiliency. Under the guidance and supervision of youth development professionals and mentors, targeted programs are provided that lead to a Positive Club Experience for members.



79% of Club members enjoy being physically active.

54% of Club members are physically active for at least 60 minutes, 5 days a week or more.

81% of Club members said that when they have problems with their peers, they talk things over with them.

Free swimming lessons are provided at the Club and Camp Welch, eliminating financial and transportation barriers for families, and giving Club Kids access to an essential life skill. Academic Success

The Club offers nightly homework help, STEM exploration, and arts enrichment programs that keep young people engaged in learning beyond the school day. Homework Help Power Hour is a structured academic support program, offered nightly in partnership with UMass Dartmouth's America Reads program.

Arts programming fosters creativity and self-expression through activities ranging from visual arts to music. In 2025, the Club began a partnership with Rawkstars and the Narrows Center for the Arts to offer music programming to our members.

STEM programming provides hands-on, collaborative learning opportunities such as Lego Robotics, science experiments, and 3-D printing that encourage curiosity and problem-solving. These experiences play an important role in preparing youth for long-term success.

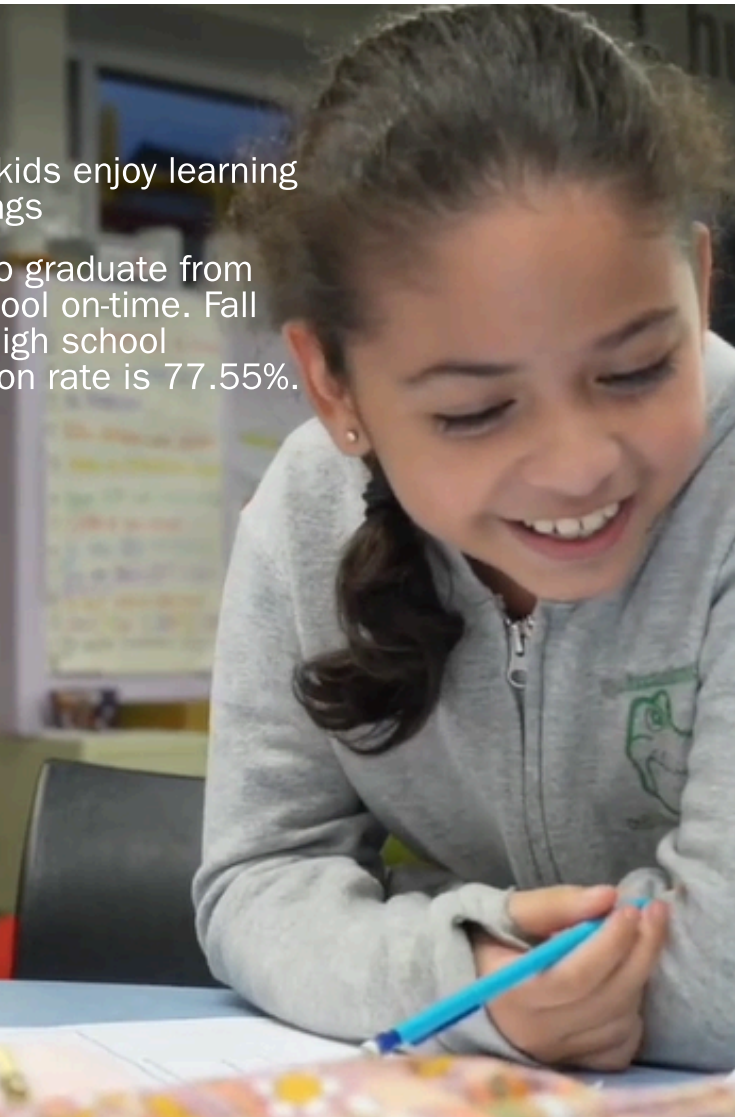

Character & Leadership

Building strong character and leadership skills helps young people prepare to meet the challenges and opportunities head on in a world that is increasingly complex. Through mentoring relationships, group activities, and youth-led initiatives, Club Kids develop self-leadership, learn to communicate effectively with others, and discover how they can make a positive difference in their community. Leadership groups like Keystone and Torch Club, allow members the opportunity to learn to lead with integrity, practice empathy, and make a difference in their community.

Life & Workforce Readiness

Life & Workforce Readiness programs prepare youth for a range of post-secondary pathways, including college, vocational training, and technical certifications, while fostering self-confidence, problem-solving, and resilience.

Targeted programs like those offered by the Club provide pathways to success, giving teens the mentorship, skills, and opportunities they need to transition successfully into adulthood and build sustainable futures. We look forward to further developing these programs in the coming years in our newly expanded Teen Center.

The Teen Center expansion provides additional space for Life & Workforce Readiness programs, creating a dedicated environment where teens can explore career pathways, leadership opportunities, and personal growth. By investing in Life and Workforce Readiness today, the Boys & Girls Club of Fall River ensures that Club Kids are prepared with the skills required to become the next generation of community leaders, professionals, and innovators, strengthening both their futures and the vitality of their communities.

At a time when our nation faces challenges in education, mental health, workforce readiness, and belonging - Club Kids are the answer. Club Kids are resilient, creative, compassionate, and prepared.

Camp Welch

Since 1896, Camp Welch has been introducing Club Kids to the benefits of the outdoors and holds the distinction of being the first Boys & Girls Club camp in the country. Camp Welch stands out for its combination of first class facilities, experienced staff, and inclusive programming on a historic 165-acre property. The 2025 season reintroduced the camp's youngest group, five-year-olds, who joined the community as the Finches troop. Camp Welch offers unmatched program variety, integrating over 25 activity areas throughout the day, including STEM, arts and crafts, Sprouts gardening, swimming, and a range of recreational activities including team sports (soccer, basketball, gaga ball, volleyball, street hockey, baseball, and more). Cohorts rotate through programming every 45 minutes, ensuring every child has consistent exposure to educational, social, and physical enrichment and opportunities to try new things.

Licensed Afterschool Care Program

Our Licensed School Aged Child Care Program (LSACC) is a state-licensed fee based program that provides up to 117 children, ages 5-13, from 13 elementary and middle schools in Fall River transportation from school to the Boys & Girls Club where they will participate in enrichment opportunities until 5:30pm. After 5:30pm, members are welcome to stay through the Outside School Time program after a check in with a caregiver. The transportation component of this program allows working parents the peace of mind knowing their children are well-cared for in the hours after school without their having to leave work. LSACC students receive a healthy snack, participate in enrichment and recreational activities.

172 members, ages 5-12, attended the LSACC program in 2025.

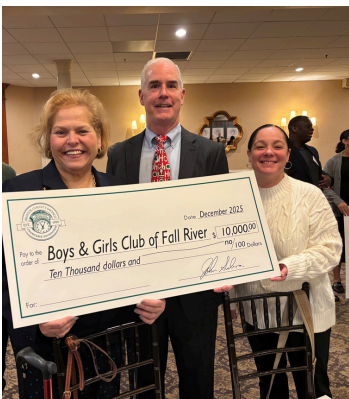
Katie graduated from Bishop Stang High School in 2025 and is currently studying nursing. She volunteers regularly and is always eager and proud to serve her community.

Thomas Chew Society

The Thomas Chew Society recognizes distinguished donors who make gifts of \$5,000 or more to the Club's annual giving funds. In 1890 Thomas Chew was selected as the Executive Director of the newly organized Boys Club of Fall River, a position he held until for 54 years. Mr. Chew served as President of the national movement from 1909 to 1914, and Vice President from 1914 until 1944.

Per the Boys' Club Round Table of 1931, referenced in Thomas Chew's American Boys' Club Associates Hall of Fame Inauguration in 1953:

"It is not the oldest of the Boys' Clubs in its record of continuous service, but it has the claim to distinction in the fact that **no single Boys' Club in America has contributed more to the progress of the Movement throughout the country**, and that **one man guided the destiny of the Boys' Club since the day it first opened its doors** in February, 1890. The history of the Boys' Club of Fall River is the story of Tom Chew's (54) years of modest and unassuming, but highly intelligent and progressive leadership."
