Jubilation from John

When I was 16 years old in the summer of 1969, I won a weeklong visit to the United Nations Headquarters in New York City. One of my most vivid recollections of that visit was walking past the Isaiah Wall across 1st Avenue from the headquarters each day. Etched into the blocks of the wall are the words: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. Nations shall not lift up sword against nation. Neither shall they learn war any more" (Is 2:4). These words literally jumped out of the stones to me because of the state of our nation at the time. The Vietnam War had escalated and was spilling beyond the borders of Vietnam, spreading overtly and covertly into Cambodia and Laos, and the heat of war had come to our home shores in the form of increasingly violent protests. Swords and spears seemed to be becoming sharpened, not being beat into instruments of fruitful agriculture.

As we begin the Season of Advent, we hear the same inspiring words of the Prophet Isaiah. However, with conflicts simmering in the Middle East and a prolonged war raging in Ukraine, Isaiah's vision of peace and harmony seems no closer to reality than when I read his prophecy etched in stone more than five decades ago. The immediacy of the reign of the Prince of Peace anticipated in St. Paul's letter to the Romans seems long delayed: "You know the time; it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep. For our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed; the night is advanced, the day is at hand" (Rom 13:11-12).

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus places the messianic prophecy of Isaiah and the eager expectancy of St. Paul into the proper timeframe: "Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come... So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come" (Mt 24:42,44). Indeed, the Season of Advent is a time of preparation—not just impatiently waiting to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace, but also patiently anticipating his everlasting reign of true peace and justice at his Second Coming.

The candles of our Advent wreaths are not birthday candles. Traditionally each candle has a meaning beyond the proximity of Christmas: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Hope that awaits the dawn; Peace that calms the storm; Joy that overcomes the darkness; and Love that warms cold hearts. As you light each candle over the next four weeks, I encourage you to meditate upon its symbolism as you offer up the blessing of Psalm 122:6-9:







GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

For many in the upper latitudes of the northern hemisphere, this is the darkest time of the year, the time when the duration of daylight is at its lowest. It's providential, then, that our first reading calls us to "walk in the light of the Lord!" Paul tells us that we do this by "throw[ing] off the works of darkness" and "put[ing] on the armor of light." While we might not struggle with the vices listed in Paul's Letter to the Romans, each of us has our own struggles against sin. As we begin this Advent season, let us take time to do a thorough examination of conscience to discern areas of weakness and sin – those "works of darkness" Paul talks about – in our own lives. Then, consider taking up practices that help you to foster the opposing virtues to arm yourself against these temptations. As you grow in these virtues, you'll certainly be on your way up the mountain of the Lord and walking in his light!

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel calls us to vigilance. Jesus tells us, "Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." While he is speaking about our need to be ready to meet the Lord when he comes at the end of our lives, it's also an invitation for us to always be ready to share our faith with others whenever the opportunity presents itself. As Scripture says, we should "always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you a reason for your hope." (1 Pet 3:15) We never know the moment when someone will come to us in need of prayer, a word of encouragement, or with questions related to their own spiritual hunger. We must always be ready to meet them where they are and offer a word of hope.

PRAY

Take a moment to pray this week for those "divine appointments" - those individuals who might come your way - seeking encouragement or insight into the spiritual questions in their lives. Ask for the grace to be "awake" so that you're ready to meet them when they come. We can't always predict when these encounters will happen, but we can prepare ourselves to receive these persons as Christ and offer them our full attention and love.
