Dear Friends in Christ,

Gratitude is a virtue that comes to us pretty naturally. We are pretty comfortable saying Thank You, Your Welcome, or we just response with the warm smile. Gratitude is a vital essence of our everyday life, but do we really live it to its potential? I found this quote from Thomas Merton: "There is something in the depths of our being that hungers for wholeness and finality. Because we are made for eternal life, we are made for an act that gathers up all the powers and capacities of our being and offers them simultaneously and forever to God." That is what gratitude does for us and in us, as long as it is sincere.

10 lepers, outcasts of the society, are looking for some handouts to support their life. They approach Jesus who simply sends them off to the priests. He does not give them what the world suggests but gives them what their whole being longs for – new hope, restores their dignity, reconciles them with the world and with themselves.

The Gospel does not tell us what has happened to the other nine, but we can presume that they probably went on to celebrate, to visit their old friends and relatives. We can presume that they were grateful too, as they shared the happy news of being healed. Jesus, however, is pointing to something more. True gratitude finds a reason for not only saying quick Thank you, or does not just call for a happy smile. True gratitude helps us to change our life, way we think and how we use the newfound gift of wholesome healing.

As the Samaritan returns to Jesus, he embraces two cultures, which for many reasons have been at odds with each other. He is not afraid to return and say Thank you to the one who is different, who at first seemed to be indifferent to him, and yet who has changed his life.

One of the ways we can say thank you for the great gifts God has blessed us with, is the goodness we share with each other. In the next few weeks, we will be preparing to celebrate our parish Fall Festival fundraiser. We will also share a time at the turkey dinner. These are great opportunities to reflect on our response to God and our neighbor, as we recognize many blessings in our life. I invite you to consider ways you can and are willing to sacrifice and to share the good things in our parish. Your generosity is amazing, and your kindness made real through your sacrifice is a visible way we give thanks to God for His mercy and blessings. Keep up the good work and give thanks to God – see you at the Fall Festival on November 01-02, 2025 – Feast of All Saints and The Faithful Departed.







GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

After his healing in the Jordan river, Naaman returns to Elisha. It's clear from their ensuing conversation that his miraculous healing had led to him recognizing the God of Israel as the one who had healed him. In thanksgiving, he desires to offer sacrifice, and pledges that he "will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any other god except the Lord." In the Gospel, we see the Samaritan returning to Jesus after his healing, falling at the Lord's feet and "glorifying God in a loud voice." It's clear from both Scriptures that when we recognize what God has done for us, our first response is to worship. That's why our central act of worship as a Christian community is called Eucharist - from the Greek word for thanksgiving. When we come to worship God, what is it that we're grateful for? If gratitude is the heart of worship, it's a fruitful practice to intentionally spend some time considering God's providence in our lives over the past week so we come to the liturgy prepared to offer thanks.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Something that has always struck me about today's Gospel is that Jesus heals all ten of the lepers, not only the one who returned to offer thanks. While we, as humans, can be tempted to withhold love when we know it will not be acknowledged or appreciated, Jesus heals all ten. God is good to us, even when we're ungrateful. As Paul says, "If we are unfaithful he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself." God can do only one thing: love. How powerful would it be if we worked to imitate the kind of gratuitous love we see in today's Gospel? Think about opportunities to practice this kind of love. What a witness this would be to the world if we were to imitate God's way of loving. As the Persian poet Hafiz wrote: "Even after all this time, the sun never says to the earth, 'You owe me.' Look what happens with a love like that. It lights the whole sky."

REFLECT

Take some time before Mass each Sunday to do an examine-style prayer, reflecting on where you've seen God's action in your life during the week. How has God provided for your needs? How has God accompanied you through challenges? How has the Spirit of God brought consolation and strength? Make a list of all the places you've experienced God's presence and grace and prepare to offer thanks to God for these gifts at Mass.





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
