In ancient Mediterranean culture, the cross took on a symbol of shame. This meaning permeated the biblical accounts describing the saving work of Jesus Christ. Not everyone "deserved" the cross. Even if they did deserve death, other methods of execution were used. Among Christians, we also know of cases of beheading, such as St. John, who died at the hands of Herod, or St. Paul, who was—as he himself described himself—a Roman citizen. Thus, death by crucifixion meant more than just torture and a long, agonizing agony. Nor did the "exposure" of the dying to public spitting and insults constitute the greatest tragedy for the condemned. The cross itself—a sign of shame—sufficed for the most grievous humiliation. After all, it wasn't so much those condemned to death who were hanged on the cross, but rather those excluded from the group of people deserving of a dignified death. It was a double punishment. It wasn't just physical pain that mattered, but also psychological grief and bitterness. Christ was stripped of his human dignity. He stood "on the other side of the margin." The one who broke social conventions to show that all people are equal was himself considered an outcast. Indeed, he became one to the delight of his political and religious opponents.

Paradoxically, the cross, in the person of Jesus Christ, transformed into a sign of victory. In his Letter to the Philippians, St. Paul portrays the Savior as "emptying himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men." The Apostle further notes that the source of exaltation, as a consequence of the Son of God's earlier humility, was his obedience unto death, and—as he emphasizes—this death was on a cross.

For the Christian, the cross is no longer a sign of shame. Although, due to the natural striving of every human being for happiness, no one is obliged to seek humiliation or suffering, much less death, the cross will always remain a challenge for every human being, and this is the moment it appears.

In the history of Christianity, one can encounter many attitudes that have distorted the meaning of Christ's message of the cross. Some wanted to treat the means as the end. They sought suffering, mortified themselves—sometimes to the limits of human endurance.

"The Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross prompts reflection on the role of suffering in human life. Perhaps no one doubts that after Christ's death, one can incorporate one's individual sufferings into His saving mission and, together with Christ, hang them on the wood of the cross. No one has to seek suffering, but if one is subject to one's daily life's inconveniences, one can always seek a way to make sense of them. There is perhaps no better way to find meaning in suffering than by trying to connect it with what Christ accomplished". (Fr. Jan Dzielny)

When considering the truth about Christ's suffering and perfect sacrifice, we must not lose sight of His words: "I desire mercy, not sacrifice."


