Some days January 1, 2016 seems more like yesterday than seven years ago. Much has happened over that time. The landscape of Northwest Arkansas and beyond looks drastically different today than it did back then. One specific thing that has changed is the face of the food insecure neighbor. Frankly speaking, the cost of living is fast outpacing the average person's take home pay. This growing disparity is causing additional stress on already stressed household budgets, forcing the charitable food system to play a more prominent role in the lives of our neighbors in need. Hundreds of families who never needed our help are entering a food pantry each week for the first time. Another specific change that has occurred is the way the Northwest Arkansas Food Bank has stepped in to help. Since my first day on the job, my mantra to the staff has been to be better today than we were yesterday. I know we will never be

perfect, I am convinced that we can show, and have shown, continual improvement. As you read this annual report you will come face to face to some of the examples of that improvement.

While this annual report is a reflection on the past, I think it is important to take a few moments and look to the future. You might notice that our annual income is significantly higher than it has been in years past. That is because a few months ago we launched our Capital Campaign, Food for Today/Hope for Tomorrow. The \$25 million campaign will put us in a position to deal with the projected growth of Northwest Arkansas as well as helping us improve our services to our food insecure neighbors today. I'd like to share a couple of quick updates on our progress. Our new campus, located at the intersections of Honeysuckle Road, Pleasant Grove Road and Highway 71B in Lowell is under construction and on track to be completed in early 2024. I am also proud to announce that we have collected over 90% of our financial goal. While that in itself is an accomplishment, there is still more to be done. Construction costs are escalating as rapidly as food and utility costs, so we anticipate having to raise additional money to totally fund the construction of the new Center for Hunger Relief. I also want to point out that in addition to a new facility, we are investing heavily in some programming and our partner agencies, which when coupled with the new facility, will put us in a position to assure that all food insecure neighbors will have reasonable access to the food they need for many years to come. Normally, I would not include an appeal in the annual report, but as I said earlier, this is not a normal year. So, I would like to officially invite you to contact us about how you can participate in the Capital Campaign and put your name on the wall of donors who will have made the new campus possible.

Thank you all once again for your continued support of our mission. I can honestly say that I have never had a day when I woke up and dreaded having to go to work. I am so passionate about helping our neighbors that I look forward to coming to work with excitement in my heart. I also know that I speak for the staff who feel similar. I deeply appreciate your support and respectfully ask that, as you read this document, and reflect on how you are part of the solution, and reflect on the excitement you have in your heart as well.

A program of the Northwest Arkansas Food Bank and in partnership with St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, Feed Rogers was established in 2022. Feed Rogers is a free client-choice pantry that allows our guests to select their own food, rather than receiving a pre-packed or standard bag of groceries. We know that anyone can experience food insecurity, and welcome all to our center. It is our top priority to create an environment where neighbors feel safe and they are treated with dignity and respect by staff and volunteers.

Our GARDEN

From March 1st – November 30th, 2022 we had 78 unique volunteers at the garden who served 501.73 hours.

Our staff and volunteers planted over 5,000 plants including Carrots, Lettuce, Peppers, Squash, Melons, Potatoes, Okra, and Cucumbers.

Over 3,500 lbs of fresh produce was distributed directly to neighbors via partner agencies and Feed Rogers.



We love our volunteers and the support they give our organization! In 2022 we had 1,664 individual volunteers work a total of 12,263 volunteer hours. These volunteers helped pack boxes, worked our Mobile Pantries, helped out in our garden, volunteered at Feed Rogers, and so much more. We could not do what we do without our volunteers.
