

"PASTOR'S CORNER"

The True Fast: Lessons from Isaiah

Lent is all about sacrificing the things in our lives that separate us from God. And one of the most meaningful ways we do this is through the practice of fasting.

In Isaiah 58, we encounter a profound understanding of fasting, one that transcends mere abstention from food. The "true fast" is characterized by actions that reflect God's heart: loosening the bonds of injustice, setting the oppressed free, sharing with the hungry, sheltering the homeless, and clothing the naked. It



emphasizes not only individual devotion but communal responsibility—a call to dismantle systems of oppression and alleviate the suffering of others. This timeless challenge, forces us to examine the true nature of our spiritual practices—are they solely focused on personal salvation or do they extend to the restoration of our broken world?

The "true fast" beckons us to engage in acts of kindness, generosity, and advocacy, embodying the love and justice of God in tangible ways. In a world marred by inequality, injustice, and suffering, Isaiah reminds us that authentic spirituality demands active engagement in the pursuit of justice and mercy. May we heed the call to fast not only with our bodies but with our lives, striving to bring about a world where righteousness and peace embrace, and where the light of God's love shines brightly for all to see.

Rev. Dr. Langdon Hubbard will be our guest speaker on March 6, when he will present an overview of Spiritual Practices. "Pastor Buddy" has recently retired from the East Aurora Presbyterian Church. He has led workshops and courses on Spiritual Practices, and is in the process of writing a book, *Living a Life of Constant Prayer*. He will be sharing several Spiritual Practices that participants will be able to use throughout the remainder of Lent and beyond.

On March 13, Linda Babcock will lead us in further study with more hands-on practices, including Service to Others.

Pastor Hughes will conclude the series on March 20, with a guided experience in the practice of Meditation.

Almsgiving is a practice of generosity that Christians have long used to share resources with others. A basket in the Reception Room will be available for Supper Series participants to practice almsgiving with a donation to the World Food Program USA, which has been providing families with urgently-needed food assistance in Gaza, Ukraine, Syria, Afghanistan, and Haiti. Approximately 90 percent of Gaza's population has been displaced, and the World Food Program has provided food and cash to more than 1 million people in the region since the humanitarian crisis began. This organization has received a 4-star rating with Charity Navigator.



The somber season of Lent continues through March, and culminates in the resurrection celebration of Easter on the last day of the month. We are grateful for the work of our Tuesdays With Tools friends (Jim Wilson, Mike Morrow, Roger Murphy and John Beyer) who have constructed additional shelves in the second Blessing Box pantry. Thanks also to Roger Murphy who has donated a unit to help with organizing donations. These closets hold the non-perishable food items donated to the OPPC Blessing Box feeding ministry. The items are used to replenish the pantry in the Blessing Box located in the church entrance. Volunteers stock the Blessing Box and the BB refrigerator daily, Monday through Friday.

Of course, the items donated need to be kept current. Janine Kroon has and continues to help with this by sorting and labeling the items by expiration date so that closer expiration/ use by dates are at the forefront to be used first. This project is a work in progress.

A friendly reminder that all food donations should be left in the bin in the Door B vestibule and not in the Blessing Box itself. This allows us to keep foods current and fresh.




PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN'S SPRING PROGRAM

out of love in unexpected and often


hilarious ways. Hearts are broken. But bruises heal, and the hearts mend-almost- in this delightful midwinter night's dream."

WE ARE CALLED TO SERVE – IN WORSHIP, TOO

Our Sunday Worship services are beautiful experiences of prayer, music, and Scripture. We come together as a community to give thanks and praise for all we have been given, and to ask God's help as we navigate life.



Our Worship services are made possible through the leadership of our ministers and the participation of the congregation. Please consider giving a little extra time in Worship by helping during the service. We will have a brief orientation meeting on **Sunday, March 17** after each Worship service to show those interested what is involved – and to enjoy some Saint Patrick's Day refreshments. Here are the different ways you can make a difference:

8:30 Helper: One Elder is needed to prepare the Communion elements and to help distribute them during Worship. Stow the Offering and clean up Communion service after Worship.

Head Usher: Instruct the Ushers and Liturgist on their assignments before the 10:30 service, and manage the Offering.

Liturgist: Represent the congregation at the Communion Table during 10:30 Worship, and assist the minister by leading prayers and reading Scripture as needed. On Communion Sundays, help to distribute Communion.

Usher/Greeter: Welcome your church community to Worship with a greeting by handing out bulletins before the 10:30 service begins, then help collect the Offering after the sermon. On Communion Sundays, Elders and Deacons may also serve Communion.

Communion Table Dresser: The liturgical year follows a specific cycle of colors used on the Communion Table, the lectern, and in the Reception Room. Would you like to be part of the team that applies the tablecloths? We would love to show you what we do!

Synesthesia: A Collaboration of WNY Music, Art, and Community

On Saturday, March 9 at 1pm, Orchard Park Presbyterian Church will host its second installment of its new concert series Synesthesia: A Collaboration of WNY Music, Art, and Community. After a successful kickoff to the series in December with a showcase of Baroque chamber music by Buffalo's Royall Consort, this next event will be presenting 17th-century music for keyboard and will be performed on a harpsichord tuned in meantone temperament, a distinctive keyboard tuning of the period. Programming features colorful chromatic works from North and South Germany that blend Baroque influences from Italy, France, and the Netherlands.

Highlighted composers include Johann Jakob Froberger, Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck, Johann Sebastian Bach, Matthias Weckmann, Johann Caspar Ferdinand Fischer, Johann Pachelbel, Dieterich Buxtehude, Samuel Scheidt, and Georg Böhm.

Samantha Domagala, a watercolor artist (The Roaming Buffalo Art) who specializes in Buffalo architecture and portraits, will be creating live work during the event, seated in view of the audience.

The event will be hosted in a coffee-house setting (warm homemade food provided) with open seating in OPPC's reception area for free movement during the event. A free-will offering will be collected before and after the program to support OPPC's musical events and collaborations.

OPPC Book Group Presents

Mrs. Kennedy and Me by Clint HillTuesday, March 19 at 7pm in The Meeting Place

For four years, from John Fitzgerald Kennedy's election in November 1960 until after the election of Lyndon Johnson in 1964, Clint Hill was the Secret Service agent assigned to guard the glamorous and intensely private Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy. Looking back after fifty years, Clint Hill tells his story, from starting life in a North Dakota orphanage to become the most trusted man in the life of the First Lady who captivated the nation and the world.

To celebrate **Women's History Month**, Jackie Kennedy's life during those four years is fascinating. She was treated like royalty all around the world, JFK's greatest asset, charming crowds of admirers, queens, kings, international presidents and the Pope. Her knowledge of world history and art, her grace, poise and fluency in French, Spanish and Italian made her beloved all around the world. Mrs. Kennedy rode a camel, an elephant, many horses, and received interesting gifts, including a pair of tiger cubs and a Pakistani horse name Sardar, who became her favorite when he was brought to the United States. Clint Hill was by her side for all of her travels and adventures, as well as family gatherings in Palm Beach, Hyannis Port and Camp David. JFK trusted him to protect her 24/7.

Including many photos and written in a conversational style, this is a memoir of joy, humor, and sadness. If you want more, Clint Hill wrote a follow-up book ten years later, *My Travels with Mrs. Kennedy*, with even more photos and detailed stories.
