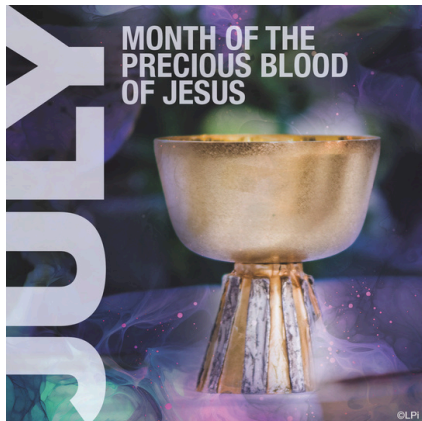

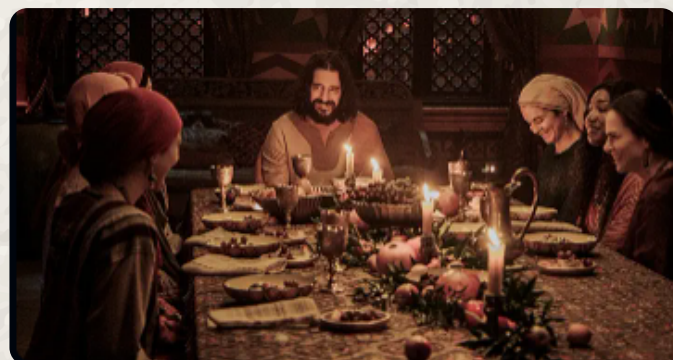

Maybe the Statue of Liberty should have been Mother Mary

I caught a glimpse of a cable news story this 4th of July week regarding the Statue of Liberty, touching on the challenges with its delivery, assembly, and the renovations since its dedication in October 1886. The vision of Lady Liberty, a goddess holding a torch in one hand welcoming visitors to the land of freedom and opportunity, directed my heart to the true Lady Liberty, our Blessed Mother Mary.

This led me to do a little research on if there is a “Catholic” connection between the two ladies. Both express a welcoming and loving presence but that is where the similarities end. One is an iconic secular symbol of America’s freedom while the other is the protector of souls, the consolation of the world, the ransom of captives, the joy of the sick, the comfort of the afflicted, the mirror of justice, the solace of migrants, the mother of hope, the Holy Mother of God.

I found this beautiful poem on Catholic365.com within a commentary written by Richard Horrell. His sentiments (and I concur) are captured in this poem dedicated to Our Lady of Liberty.

The Woman Who Should Be There -- It Should Have Been Mary A poem for Our Lady of Liberty



It should have been Mary, so gentle and bright,
Crowned with the stars and clothed with the Light.
The harbor would glow with her heavenly grace,
The Queen of all nations, arms wide to embrace.

She would not boast, nor rule from pride,
But lift our gaze to the Crucified.
Her torch would burn with eternal flame,
And every soul would know His name.

She'd whisper truth no tyrant could bend,
And guide the lost like a faithful friend.
Her robe would flow like waves of peace,
A sign that God's mercy will never cease.

She wouldn't promise wealth or fame,
But freedom through the Savior's Name.
Not liberty made by man's decree—
But freedom born on Calvary's Tree.

She would not stand for power or gain,
But for souls set free from sin and pain.
She'd say to the weary, the broken, the small:
“Come to my Son — He welcomes you all.”



Maybe the statue's sculptors knew America wasn't ready for Mary. Maybe we underestimate their wisdom. Maybe they realized that Protestant America in the 1880s would have torn down the real Queen of Liberty. So instead, they gave us a shadow -- a beautiful form but without the fullness of faith. Fortunately, we, the spiritual children of Mary know better. We know it should have been Mary.

I believe that America's Woman of Liberty was never meant to be a goddess. She was always meant to be a Mother. Holy Mary, Mother of God and patron saint of America -- pray for us.

Before engaging in diocesan, parish and school-sponsored activities for minors and vulnerable adults, all clergy, employees and adult volunteers are required to be in compliance with the diocesan Safe Environment Requirements which include:

- 1) A Background Screening
- 2) Safe Environment Training
- 3) Code of Conduct - **must be completed annually**

The Code of Conduct is **required annually** and is made available at the beginning of each fiscal year, **July 1**.

The Code of Conduct is to be read, signed, and submitted to the local Safe Environment Coordinator at the parish - Nickie Rivera

- For **new employees and volunteers**, to begin the process, an account must **first be created in VIRTUS**.
- There the Background Screening Application will be prompted and is now completed online through their VIRTUS account.
- The training, which includes "**Protecting God's Children**" and "**Mandated and Ethical Reporting**", are accessible through their VIRTUS account and are also completed online.

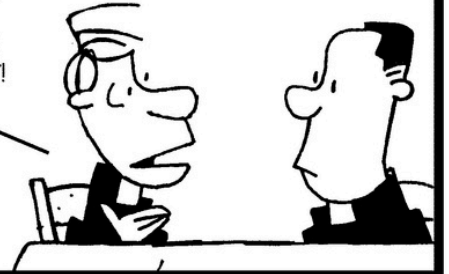

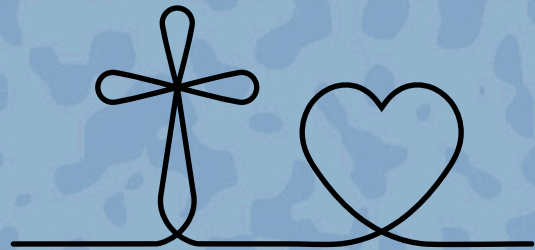

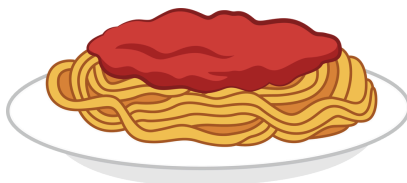
With our initial contributions from an anonymous donor and our council's own contribution, we had a \$10,000 head start. Also, our June appeal has brought in just over **\$8,000** already!

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In the days after the awful 2020 killing of George Floyd, a Catholic friend remarked, “Racism is today’s great evil. We should put all our energy into fighting it.” I admired her intuition that the church must stand firmly against evil. Amen, I thought. At the same time, something felt wrong. As months went by, I saw her steadily slide into bitterness and anger. Soon, despondency. She spoke of giving up the fight. Don’t we too wonder how to fight evil without losing our joy or energy?

Jesus’ words this week help. He says, **“Rejoice not that you have power over demons, but that your names are written in heaven” (Luke 10:20)**. Notice the asymmetry in where he wants our focus: on the latter, not the former. Should we confidently embrace our God-given power to overcome evil? Absolutely. But even more so, we should emphasize the positive element of our relationship to God. It is tempting but dangerous to define ourselves by what we oppose. It is better to define ourselves by—to rejoice in—what we celebrate: in Jesus, God has written our names in heaven. This sustains our battles.

This week, our marching orders are: fight evil. But more deeply, rejoice that God knows and loves us personally, individually. We allow this joyful knowledge to undergird our fight against the darkness of our day. Then we enjoy long-term stability to be cheerful warriors, who never forget the reason for the contests we are called to fight and win: love.

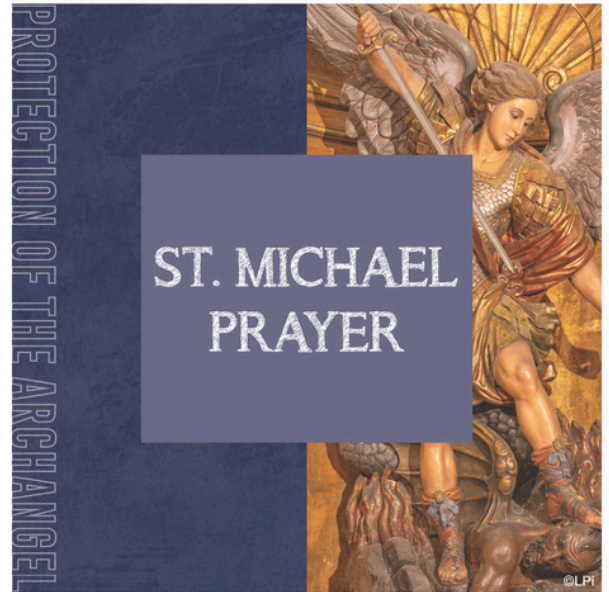

On Pilgrimage

Before I embarked on my trip to the National Eucharistic Congress last summer with a group from my archdiocese, we had an orientation meeting. At that meeting, the coordinator of the trip shared with us "The Five Rules of Pilgrimage."

If you're not familiar with them (I wasn't), here they are:

1. Don't complain.
2. Don't complain. (It's so important, it's listed twice.)
3. When you see a bathroom, use it.
4. When someone offers you something, receive it.
5. When someone asks you for something, give it.

It's great advice for a pilgrimage, but more than that, I think it's great advice in general. So when I read today's Gospel and I hear Jesus say essentially the same thing to his disciples as they set out to evangelize (well, minus the bathroom tip, but those weren't as much of a thing in biblical Judea), I come to an important realization.

The whole Christian life is a pilgrimage.

Too often, life falls short of my expectations. An opportunity didn't work out. A day didn't go the way I planned (like, *at all*). A person didn't accept me. And I ball up my fists and stomp my feet like a full-grown Veruca Salt, and I yell: *I cannot work in these conditions!*

And then, I imagine God, on his celestial throne, sighs and opens the Book of the Gospels (surely he keeps it handy, don't you think?) to Luke, Chapter 10. And he whispers in my heart what he said to his disciples 2,000 years ago.

Don't complain. Be open and give of yourself, and in turn, receive what comes your way, whatever it is. If it's good, rejoice. If it's not good, move on. And in the end, remember where you're headed — the place you're trying to go.

Oh, and again: don't complain.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

As Catholics, we talk a lot about "redemptive suffering" and "carrying your cross." What does that mean practically in daily life?

Answer:

When Jesus spoke these words, they would have sounded quite intense to his hearers. "*Pick up your cross daily and follow me.*" At the time, Jesus hadn't yet been crucified. A cross was a Roman torture instrument. "*Pick up the thing that tortures you the most,*" Jesus seemed to say. Unfortunately, most of us have no real shortage of these in our life. To take up the cross isn't to seek out new sufferings in our life. It's to accept the life we have.

Of course, unjust or unhealthy circumstances should be rectified when possible. But there are always circumstances that remain out of our immediate control. It could be pain management, the defiance of our teenage child, or an unhealthy work environment ... but you need the paycheck to pay the bills. In difficult circumstances, it can be easier to blame, complain, or daydream our way out of it. None of these are real solutions, since none of them accept the reality of the situation at hand. Those options only add to our suffering, since they damage relationships, fixate on the problem, or set up unrealistic expectations.

Instead, Jesus invites us to take up our cross — to look at the uncomfortable situation square in the eyes, take a deep breath, and do our best to be present to God's grace in the moment. To love those in our path. To take things one step at a time.



Bloom Where You Are Planted

If you could change one aspect of your life, what would that be? Financial instability? Arthritis? Addiction? A disruptive family member? Work's daily grind? Finding love? No doubt the answers are as varied as the people who answer the question.

Though the old poster advises us to “bloom where you are planted,” sometimes we can feel as if we’ve been planted among weeds—the people we’ve been given, the problems that continually pop up, the conflicts that all too often shut out the peace we seek. Just as Jesus sends disciples into every place he intends to visit, the reality for us may very well be that he sends us into the very lives we live even though we wish we could change them. Where we are is where we’ve been sent. It is in the lives we have that we

work out our salvation, for Jesus said, “The kingdom of God is at hand for you” (Luke 10:9).

St. Paul emphasized how important it is for disciples of Jesus to live out their identity as a new creation. British artist and sculptor Henry Moore made the observation that, in life, it is most important that we give ourselves over to a goal or dream, something so all-consuming that we live it morning, noon, and night. And the most important aspect of it, he said, is that it must be something we cannot possibly accomplish. For the followers of Jesus, it is the lifelong task to bloom where we’ve been planted. ●
