## Patina, Jason Reynolds

Continue the story of Ghost and his track team with the second book in the series, <u>Patina</u>. If you are new to HR and have not read the first book, <u>Ghost</u>, please read it instead!

<u>I Am Malala</u>: How One Girl Stood Up for Education and Changed the World (Young Readers Edition), Malala Yousafzai

This is the story of Malala Yousafzai, a Pakistani activist who was shot by the Taliban for advocating for girls' education. It chronicles her family's life in Swat Valley, their passion for education, and Malala's journey from a young girl determined to go to school to an international symbol of peaceful protest. The book also explores the cultural and political landscape of Pakistan and the Taliban's impact on education.

## Treasure Island, Robert Louis Stevenson

This is the story of young Jim Hawkins, who discovers a treasure map and embarks on a voyage with a group of men, including the cunning Long John Silver, in search of a buried fortune. The journey to Treasure Island is fraught with danger as Silver leads a mutiny, creating a conflict between the treasure-seeking crew and the pirate infiltrators. A classic every middle school reader will enjoy!

## And Then There Were None, Agatha Christie

First, there were ten—a curious assortment of strangers summoned as weekend guests to a little private island off the coast of Devon. Their host, an eccentric millionaire unknown to all of them, is nowhere to be found.
