

TUC FREE HOT DOG TUESDAY

When I first arrived in Thornhill from Vancouver last year, to work and serve at Thornhill United Church, I noticed that the high school students next door passed by our church every day but never bothered to look at us. I would love to say hello and ask them 'How's school?' What if we take the first step to practicing what it really means to love your neighbour as yourself?

Jesus invites everyone to his banquet table. We see Jesus feasting with his followers. There are many beautiful images of the overwhelming indulgence of God's grace. We gather to eat with people and to serve others because Jesus has done so. That's how our 'Hot Dog' ministry begins.

After meeting with the principal of Thornhill Secondary School, doing research, and getting support from the Council, we decided to hold our very first TUC FREE HOT DOG TUESDAY in February this year. When we announced this idea, many people stepped up to volunteer! Some people bought and contributed ingredients, supported financially, prepared posters and branding design, spread the news, prepared hot dogs and other snacks, arranged tables, called sponsors, and looked into details. When everyone works together to serve our neighbours as ourselves, it is such a gorgeous thing to reflect the love of God.

Regardless of how many people we serve, we are still coming together to bring God's glory. Many volunteers who served in February would recall the following scene. In the first ten minutes, around ten or twelve students and teachers came in. We were thrilled to see them and served hot dogs to them enthusiastically, even though one hundred hot dogs were prepared. God did miracles. When the clock turned 11:10 am, we started to see the crowds. The high school students rushed in. Students were lining up all the way from the back of the auditorium through the stairs to the main entrance. One hundred and eighty students passed through the door and came to the church. We ran out of hot dogs! What a happy problem we had! Our volunteers quickly ran

out to buy ingredients and refilled them. With God, everything is possible.

Since then, we have served hot dogs every month. From February to June, 678 people experienced TUC FREE HOT DOG TUESDAY and 780 hot dogs were served. We are not only grateful to serve many students but also to have a chance to get together with all our volunteers. We have more than 23 volunteers and 20 contributors to make the mission possible! Some of the volunteers are not our church members, including people who saw the posts on 'Facebook' and came to help out. We are grateful for the support of our major meat sponsor, Stuart Carroll, as well. The joy fills our hearts seeing how everyone on the team is up and engaged.

Some students said "Thank you, Jesus!" and "Amen" when they left the church. Some of them came to the worship services, brought their parents to our services and the youth group activities, asked for pastoral care, and served hot dogs too! The wonderful bonus is that the news of serving hot dogs to the secondary school next door has been spread by word of mouth to the wider community, including churches in the GTA and across the provinces. Thank you to all our volunteers and contributors! We couldn't have done this amazing TUC FREE HOT DOG TUESDAY without their support!

TUC's FREE HOT DOG TUESDAY will resume on September 26. We look forward to your continued support! Everyone is called to serve God by serving others. We can't wait to see you again!

UPDATE FROM COUNCIL

Council wishes you a warm and enjoyable summer!

While Council doesn't meet again formally until September, most of us are around and/or available between now and then if you need us. In the meantime, here are a few items for consideration:

1. Dream Tree Montessori has completed construction, received their permits and began operating in TUC in July downstairs in what was formerly the classrooms and nursery. Students, families and staff will use the entrance at the north side. We welcome them warmly as they begin their operations. You can learn more about them on their website:

- 2. Vulnerable sector screening: In order to meet the objectives of the United Church of Canada's duty of care recommendations outlined in their Faithful **Footsteps** Screening Procedures handbook, we will be requiring volunteers who work with vulnerable persons – such as Sunday school teachers, youth leaders, Club Handi volunteers and pastoral care volunteers - to provide a police vulnerable sector (VSS) record check once every three years. TUC will provide the request on church letterhead and will reimburse the cost of the screening when provided with the receipt. If you are a volunteer recognized as working with potential vulnerable people, you will be contacted during the summer to determine if you already have an active VSS screening (within three years of your expected participation). If needed, a letter recommendations for screening locations will be provided. Please stay tuned.
- 3. Countrye Faire call for feedback: May I draw your attention to Jeff Knowles' announcement within this issue asking for your guidance in areas of interest for the Countrye Faire, scheduled for October 21st? We are hopeful that the Faire offers much more than pies and preserves this year, and we'll happily organize something fun that fits well with our space and resources.
- **4. Save the date photo directory shoot October 23-28th:** Coming late October, we will be inviting all members to pop by and have their pictures taken. Anybody participating receives a free photo directory and an opportunity to have professional pictures just

- in time for Christmas (with no obligation to purchase). Volunteers will be calling you shortly to schedule your time between Monday, October 23rd and Saturday, October 28th (make up dates and accommodations will be possible the following week where needed).
- **5. Volunteers sought** live and remote: We are actively looking to fill the following positions:
- One or two Shining Waters Regional volunteers. The scope of this position is attending scheduled Shining Waters (SW) and United Church of Canada (UCC) meetings periodically, almost always remotely, and distilling the essence of all communications from SW and UCC to Council and the congregation. Usually this culminates in a monthly summary for Council, and sometimes accompanies weekly eBlasts where appropriate. This is an ideal position for remote volunteers.
- *Prayers of the People volunteer*. Those offering Prayers of the People volunteer roughly once every six weeks; this can be done either in person or remotely.
- Ministry and Personnel Committee member. While we are happy to be three-strong, the recommended number of members is four or more. M&P typically meets less often than monthly, but will have bursts of activity annually, such as when doing performance reviews, or any periodic HR involvement. Live participation is preferred over remote.
- Treasurer assistant. We are looking for somebody to work with and support Lyle, with the prospect of greater involvement over time. Accounting and Quickbooks experience is ideal, and the position could be remote, provided appearances are made at congregational meetings.
- Vice Chair. If you are a strong coordinator and would like to see the inner workings of the church in a supporting role, this may be the role for you. Obligations include monthly meetings September through June and the coordination of tasks following the meetings, well supported by all Council members. The position could be remote, provided appearances are made at congregational meetings.
- Intercultural working group member. We are looking for somebody to backfill Elizabeth Gartner who recently took on the role of the Celebrate Together pillar lead. The group meets monthly from Sept-May, and occasionally prior to a big event. The volunteer is asked to join brainstorming sessions around our various

intercultural events (Black History Month, Asian Heritage Month, the Indigenous Day of Prayer, and/or Faith Journey videos, etc.) The group thinks about how and what is to be presented. Both 'big ideas' people and tactical people are welcome, either in-person or remotely.

Please ask any Council member for greater detail about any position and they will provide an overview of time commitments and involvement. Thanks for your consideration.

6. Changes to the Village Groups are coming:

With a special thanks to our Village Group leaders who recently enjoyed a long overdue appreciation lunch, we've heard feedback regarding the needs for redistribution of active participants, and significant interest in a dedicated Zoom-members village group. We are hopeful this reorganization will help people stay in touch and feel a sense of community within our larger TUC community. Please stay tuned for 'local' news from your Village Group lead in the near future.

MY STUDY LEAVE DOWNTOWN

From July 2-6, I attended "A Festival of Pipes" – a conference hosted by the Royal Canadian College of Organists (of which I am a member) and the Organ Historical Society. It is usually presented biennially and this summer it was held in Toronto. The week included a variety of workshops, services, Convocation and I even climbed the 130 steps for a demonstration of the carillon at Metropolitan United Church. We heard many talented young organists compete for prizes and scholarships on a variety of organs.

Each day I went to four or five different churches for recitals and full evening concerts by international concert organists, which were open to the public. I even had the pleasure of seeing Ruth Noble, one of our former ministers, who was taking tickets at these concerts. Ruth reminded me that she loved organ music and was glad to volunteer in this way.

This was the first in-person organ festival we have been able to hold due to the pandemic, since the one that I attended in Halifax in 2019; it was a busy but inspiring study leave.

PRAYER SHAWL KNITTING/CROCHETING GROUP

Just a reminder that prayer shawls are available for the taking from the table in the narthex. If you know someone who could use a warm hug to let them know that they are not alone, whether it be in time of illness, grief, or celebration, please feel free to take a shawl and donate it to them. The shawls are free and are bagged in Ziploc bags labeled either rectangle, triangle or crescent. Also included in each bag is a card. The exterior of the card varies but the verse inside is identical in all the cards. The shawls come in a variety of colours and patterns and have been made by a small dedicated group of knitters and crocheters from the congregation.

The group usually meets on the first Friday of the month from 10:30 a.m. to roughly 12:00 p.m. in the Gathering Place. However because of Civic and Labour Day weekends our next meetings will be August 11 and September 8. The meetings are a chance to socialize and discuss methods and patterns as well as knit and crochet. The members then work on their projects at home at their leisure. If you think you would like to be part of our group, please come out and join us at one of our meetings and see what we are all about. Everyone is welcome regardless of your level of expertise.

Since the inception of the group in 2013 we have produced 343 shawls and 285 of them have found homes with congregants and friends of church members. If you do the math, you will see that we have an inventory to select from and continue to produce new ones on a monthly basis.



After being elected to the TUC Council as lead for the Celebrate Together Pillar in March 2023 I began to review the role of lead and the different groups making up this pillar. Some familiar groups are: Village Groups (VG), Welcome and Affirming Working Group (WAWG), Intercultural Working Group (IWG), Refreshments and Conversation, Library Administration and Woodworkers.

Village Groups Update

As part of my new role, I have been working with our ministerial team to review the Village Groups. We are working in phases.

Phase 1 - contacting people in the VG to determine their current connection with TUC, has been completed. We have reviewed the membership for VG lists 1 to 8. Some people have moved on, others have remained on Zoom and many are back in the sanctuary for weekly worship.

Phase 2 - restructuring the 8 VG, into 5 VG. This decision made with input from VG leads is an effort to adjust the groups to better reflect active members, make recruiting Sunday morning volunteers easier and with fewer VG we hope there will be enough volunteers for each group to have coleads.

Phase 3 - forming a VG for those regularly worshiping on Zoom. Margaret Wilson has agreed to be a lead.

Phase 4 - recruiting additional VG leads! If you are interested, please let me, Leigh or Mini know.

Phase 5 – implementing the roster for ushers/greeters for September 2023 to January 2024. With thanks for volunteers!
