#### Winter Health ... By Tennille Cline, RN

We are asking for your cooperation in trying to keep everyone healthy through this cold and flu season... In order to do our best to maintain a healthy environment, we are asking everyone to be reminded of some simple steps and guidelines when it comes to the prevention and spread of illness. Proper handwashing with soap and running water for 20 seconds and covering your coughs and sneezes are some important ways to help decrease the spread of germs. We have protocols in our school for handwashing and disinfecting surfaces to help control the spread of germs year round.

For many individuals with developmental disabilities, a cold or flu virus can lead to a more serious illness such as bronchitis or pneumonia. If an individual you are caring for is showing signs of illness, please keep them home until they are well. Illnesses can spread easily to others. We also know that sometimes illnesses come on quickly. If that happens, it is best for that person to be picked up or brought home. Please be sure to have an alternate drop off that could care for your loved one in the event that you are not at home.

In order to reduce the spread of illness, please follow these guidelines in making the decision to keep your child or adult home:

- Fever- a temperature over 100 degrees. Must be fever free without the use of fever reducing medication (Tylenol, Advil, Motrin, ect) for 24 hours before returning to school/work. Please do not give them medication for a fever and send them to school/work. The medication is only masking the fever and they are still contagious.
- Vomiting and Diarrhea- More than 1 abnormally loose stool or any episode of vomiting. Must be free of any vomiting or diarrhea for at least 24 hours before returning. Usually the viruses responsible for vomiting and diarrhea are highly contagious and can be transmitted to others for days.
- Severe colds- frequent coughing, sore throat, runny nose, sneezing
- Unusual behavior- excessive sleepiness, irritable, crying
- Eye infections- redness, irritation, swelling, and discharge from the eye could mean a contagious eye infection

Remember these are guideline to help you make the decision whether your loved one should stay home. If you are still unsure, please call your family physician for advice.

Because Holmes DD is committed to the success of our local providers, we have partnered with MEORC (Mid East Ohio Regional Council of Government) to provide a wide range of support at no cost to our providers. Providers can get help from MEORC to submit initial certification, prepare for compliance reviews, learn how to bill, take required online trainings, get help with incident report tracking, receive leadership training and much more. If you are an independent provider or an agency provider and would like some support, please contact me so I can put you in touch with MEORC.

Speaking of providers, Holmes County is facing a shortage. We have quite a few people who are not receiving waiver/provider services due to staffing shortages. If you or someone you know has a caring heart, some time, and would like to make a difference in the life of a person with a developmental disability, contact me. I can put you in touch with MEORC if you are interested in becoming an independent provider, or I can put you in touch with an existing agency provider who will serve as your employer and provide you with necessary training.


Our staff would like to wish everyone Happy Holidays. They would also like to thank everyone for the support that has been shown through the new changes that we have been going through.

#### **Superintendent's Message**

In October 2022, Holmes DD published our 2021 Annual Report which showcases progress made in the last year.

Highlights include:

Grants from 8 different sources.

Increased Community Awareness through use of Facebook, WKLM radio, and the Bargain Hunter and Daily Record.

Development of a website and Facebook page for the Holmes County Transition Partnership Network.

Used \$500,000 of local tax dollars, along with State and Medicaid dollars to purchase 2.7 million dollars' worth of Adult Day Services, residential services and transportation.

Expanded the Advocacy program from 4 participants to 8 participants.

Students and adults contributed to the community by volunteering for the Love Center Food Pantry, Church of God Food Pantry, Holmes County Dog Warden, Harvest Thrift Shop, and Holmes County Chamber of Commerce.

Bucks Basketball team served as ambassadors as they connected with local churches and businesses on the basketball court.

Holmes DD's first Provider Fair highlighted six providers in Holmes County.

GentleBrook and Sacred Ground, provider agencies, were welcomed to Holmes County and began providing adult services.

100% of Early Intervention families were satisfied with the help they received from EI staff and feel better able to understand their child's strengths and needs.

There are now 27 adults with developmental disabilities employed in the community earning minimum wage or higher.

Services were expanded for 3-5 year olds who have aged out of Early Intervention and still require inhome supports.

Summit Housing became the property manager of homes in Millersburg housing DD adults and received \$234,000 from the Ohio Dept. of Developmental Disabilities for renovations and improvements.

Technology expanded including the purchase of 6 iPads, 18 computers, 4 communication devices, 18 communication tools, development of a Technology First policy and transition to a cloud based server.

A new Employee Development process was created and piloted.

Improving Employee Engagement was an area of focus.

#### 10 Critical Holiday Home Safety Tips by Dave Crilow

- 1. GIVE CANDLES CLEARANCE. Beautiful candles light up the holidays with a special glow, but they can quickly become a fire hazard. Give candles at least 12 inches of clearance on all sides, and display them on sturdy bases protected by hurricane globes.
- 2. COOK WITH CARE. Between family feasts and cookies for Santa, the stove and oven work as hard as you do during the holidays. Always cook with care, and remember that kitchen equipment is the leading cause of home fires year-round.
- 3. STAY WARM SAFELY. Be sure that a professional furnace checkup stays high on your holiday to-do list, and schedule it before your technician's season gets busy. Don't turn on the space heaters until they've passed your inspection. When you're sure they're safe, use with caution.
- 4. WATER THE TREE. A fresh-cut Christmas tree adds a wonderful aroma to the holiday household. A tree that isn't watered every day dries out quickly and can ignite in just a few seconds. Pamper your fir with a sturdy, deep stand that holds plenty of water, and never decorate it with candles. If you decide to play it safe and celebrate the season with an artificial pre-lit tree, make sure you choose one that's certified as UL-rated.
- 5. CHECK THE LIGHTS. Some family favorites are a beloved tradition on the tree, but be extra careful with older strands of lights. Check for cracks, frays and loose connections that can overheat. When you replace bulbs, be sure to match voltage and wattage, and never overload extension cords or wall sockets.
- 6. HANG OUT CAREFULLY. While most holiday home safety tips focus on festivities inside, this outside pointer is very important too. Hang outdoor lights by securing them to exteriors with clips, hooks or insulated holders. Tacks and nails can damage wiring and cause dangerous electrical arcs especially during wet weather.
- 7. TURN EVERYTHING OFF. When you go to bed, turn off all the holiday lights. Unplug the tree, make sure outside decorations are off, and double-check space heaters. If you leave during the evening, resist the temptation to come home to a brilliantly lit house. Play it safe, and turn everything off before you go.
- 8. WINTERIZE THE HOUSE. Prepping your home for cold weather also secures it for the holidays. Develop a plan to winterize the house, and let it become an annual property inspection too. This strategy helps you spot potential problems with the fireplace, fire sprinkler system, electrical wiring and more.
- 9. SHARE WITH NEIGHBORS. Talk with homeowners on either side of your property and across the street about watching out for each other. If one family plans on being away for the evening, another can keep an eye on the empty house. If a fire breaks out or some other emergency occurs, everyone stays covered with a little neighborly watchfulness.
- 10. HAVE A PLAN. Because fires occur more often during the holidays, it's important to be ready with an evacuation plan. If you already have one, refresh the details with a practice run before things get too hectic. If you don't have a plan yet, developing a strategy can become a life-saving present for your family.

# Measles ...By Tennille Cline, RN

There is currently a measles outbreak in 5 Ohio counties. Measles is very contagious and can be serious. Measles spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It is so contagious that if one person has it, up to 9 out of 10 people around him or her will also become infected if they are not protected. Your child can get measles just by being in a room where a person with measles has been, even up to two hours after that person has left. An infected person can spread measles to others even before knowing he/she has the disease—from four days before developing the measles rash through four days afterward. Some of the more common measles symptoms include:

- high fever (may spike to more than 104° F),
- cough,
- runny nose (coryza),
   red, watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and
- rash (3-5 days after symptoms begin).

The best protection against measles is measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine. MMR vaccine provides **long-lasting protection against all strains of measles**. If a child is exposed and not vaccinated, they will be asked to stay home from school for 21 days. If you have any questions, please call and speak with our nurse or seek advice from your doctor
