An update on adult service and transportation ... By Marianne Mader

Last year at this time, many adults attended day services at Holmes DD and were concerned about an upcoming 7/1/22 change.

Now that the dust has settled, Holmes DD adults are receiving day services and transportation from a few different providers.

- 32 adults attend GentleBrook's day program in Holmesville.
- 16 adults attend Midwest's day program in Millersburg.
- 12 adults attend Sacred Ground's day program in Berlin.
- 20 adults work and earn minimum wage at Lynn Hope Industries in Holmesville.
- 24 adults are transported to their day program and employment locations by Midwest.
- 32 adults are transported to their day program, employment and volunteer locations by Precious Angel transportation.
- 12 adults are transported by Sacred Grounds.
- 11 adults are transported to their day program or employment location by Holmes DD (ending in May).

Sometimes people ask what Holmes DD does for adults since we stopped providing adult services.

Day program and transportation services continue to be authorized and monitored by Holmes DD SSAs.

Holmes DD SSAs remain the individual/family's go-to-person regarding DD services, health and welfare concerns, employment, and government benefits.

Services, whether provided by Holmes DD or a partner organization, are possible because of Holmes DD tax levy funds.


Superintendent's Message

The State of Ohio is experiencing a crisis that impacts people with developmental disabilities. Individuals are not getting the support they need because service providers are unable to find and keep staff. Many individuals with DD receive services paid by Medicaid with the County Board of DD providing matching funds. Medicaid payment rates are determined by the State of Ohio and have not been raised for years. In fact, it is common for an employee to make \$12-13 an hour. Because of Medicaid rules, County Boards cannot supplement the rate. Here in Holmes County, we have a transportation provider who has tried for over a year to hire a driver. There are families in Holmes County who need help. Holmes DD is providing funding, but Medicaid's low wages do not bring workers to the table. There is an advocacy effort going on where individuals, their families, and organizations who support people with disabilities are sharing their concerns with policymakers in state government. In the News Too Much?

Sometimes we hear things so often they lose their impact. Lead can be one of those topics. But the reason we hear about it frequently is that it is relatively common, and it is preventable. In Early Intervention, we periodically have children who have developmental delays because of high lead levels.

Young children are particularly vulnerable to the impact of lead because one of the places our body likes to store lead is in the brain and the brain of a child is rapidly developing. Another reason adults and older siblings are less vulnerable to lead in the environment is because they are not putting non-food things in their mouth and as you know, very young children explore things by mouthing them.

We tend to know the common sources of lead: lead pipes, old homes, antique toys/cribs with lead paint. Interestingly, there are sources of lead that you may not have considered. Such as the glazing on pottery; particularly if it is storing food that is acidic -- the lead will leach into the food. Also cheap children's jewelry like plastic necklaces from other countries can contain lead paint and they easily chip. Finally, supplements can be another source. It is important to buy from reputable companies; those companies who voluntarily get their supplements tested for contaminants. Some herbals and supplements indicate third party testing on their label.

Although government regulation can be a headache, when it comes to lead in our environment, it has been very beneficial. Lead exposure has been reduced by 97% from 1990 to 2016.

Dave's Safety Corner: Hot Water Heaters by Dave Crilow

Hot water heaters have multiple temperature settings. Here's what you need to know.

Temperature settings:

Low-80-90°

Hot (triangle symbol) - 120°

This is the most energy efficient and scald-safe temperature. This temperature will not kill bacteria or sanitize.

A-130°

This temperature is considered comfortable, somewhat energy efficient and scald-safe. This temperature will kill bacteria in 6-8 hours and will not allow bacteria growth.

B-140°

This temperature is considered very hot. It is ideal for sanitization and killing bacteria, but also has the potential to scald in less than 6 seconds.

This is the standard temperature setting on new hot water heaters.

C-150°

This extremely hot temperature is ideal for sanitization and killing bacteria, but will scald in less than 2 seconds.

Very Hot-160°

This is the hottest—hottest temperature setting on hot water heaters. This temperature is ideal for sanitization and killing bacteria, but will scald on contact.

Things to consider when setting hot water heater temperature.

- If you have young children or elderly people in your household, consider lowering the temperature to 120° to avoid a scalding risk.
- If you have a dishwasher that does not preheat water, consider raising water temperature to 140° to ensure there is no opportunity for bacteria to grow.
- If you're looking to save energy costs, each 10 degrees lower your water heater temperature saves about 3-5% on energy costs. Just don't go lower than 120°.
- 4 or more people in the household? Keep the temperature set to the high end of the ideal range (140°) to ensure there is plenty of hot water to meet the increased demand.

The individual we provided support to is a long-time resident of Holmes County who rarely reaches out for assistance from the Holmes DD. You might know him. His name is Timothy Thompson. He loves to ride his lawn mower around town and pick up any lawn mowing jobs he can along the way. He asked me to share this with you, as he is still open for business!

At first, we received a call from one of Timmy's friends. She contacted us to see if we could help Timmy find a ride each week to the grocery store. We were able to meet this need by connecting him with **Love Inc.** They are happy to take him to all his familiar stops in town.

As we worked with Timmy, he asked for help to remove an unwanted guest from his home. He said, "I just want my home back". To get this guest out, **Millersburg Police** said Timmy had to serve him an eviction notice. **Critchfield Law Office** took Timmy's case as pro bono, working with him to prepare an eviction notice and represent him at a hearing. A big thank you to Chad Yoder and Oliva Mirich for assisting with this case.

When visiting Tim, I noticed the skirting around his trailer had come away. Timmy couldn't repair it himself so Holmes DD reached out to the community via Facebook to see if anyone was willing to help with this project. Our post was shared by many of our followers. In a short time we received a response from Jordan Hartzler, from **Hartzlers Quality Housing**. Jordan sent Rich Burrier, a 25 plus year service tech to Timmy's home. Thank you Hartzlers Quality Housing for giving back to the community!

And one more agency in town has helped with purchasing new locks for Timmy's home and are arranging for his home to have a good house cleaning.

Good hearted people work for these agencies/businesses and came together to support Timmy. It has been rewarding for Timmy and all of the folks involved. He's very happy to have his house back, and says thank you to all who have helped him along the way.
