Why Sensory Boxes and Water Tables Are Beneficial for Young Children

Children learn about the world through their senses—touch, sight, sound, taste, and smell. For young children, sensory play is more than just fun—it's a critical part of healthy brain development. What is one simple, powerful tool to support this growth? A sensory box or water table.



What Is a Sensory Box or Water Table?

A sensory box or water table is a container filled with materials and objects designed to stimulate a child's senses. From dry rice, sand, water or beans to textured fabrics and scented items, the possibilities are endless. Items can be themed—like "apples/autumn," "under the sea," "animals"—or simply a mix of textures and colored items for children to explore.





The Holmes County Early Childhood Department hosts a monthly playgroup which often features a sensory/water table as pictured above. All children up to 5 years old are invited to join the next pumpkin themed playgroup, October 6, 10:00 a.m., at the HCBDD. We hope to see you there!

M A Fresh Start to the School Year

The beginning of the school year always brings new energy and endless possibilities. It is wonderful to see our students and staff return and already diving into learning and growth!

Annual Report Approved

At the August 2025 Board meeting, the Holmes DD Board officially approved the 2024–2025 Annual Report, reflecting a year of progress, partnerships, and community impact

* Key Highlights (June 2024 – May 2025)

- 301 individuals received services, with the largest group being infants and toddlers (ages 0–3) in our Early Intervention Program.
- 23 children attended the Holmes DD School, continuing our commitment to education.
- 13 adults with developmental disabilities are now employed in the community, with 4 joining the workforce last year.
- Kyle Snyder made history as the first person with a developmental disability to serve on our Board.
- The Holmes Advocacy Group volunteered at events including Open House, Costumes & Candy, Mothers Club, Family Fun Night, and the Spring Festival.
- New activities included American Sign Language classes, monthly bowling outings, and sensory-friendly events like a visit with Santa and an egg hunt.
- 81% of funding came from property taxes paid by Holmes County residents.
- Voters passed the Holmes DD renewal levy in November 2024—thank you for your continued support!
- Employee engagement survey results show high satisfaction with benefits, career development, workplace relationships, and overall environment.



Public Service Announcement: HCAHC Membership

HCAHC (Holmes County Association for Handicapped Citizens) is a nonprofit, non-political organization whose purpose is to raise and distribute funds to improve the quality of life of individuals eligible for Holmes DD services and their families. Proceeds from the Annual Spring Festival and Auction provide all of their funding. Decisions regarding how funding is spent are made by HCAHC Trustees who are elected by HCAHC members. Each year, members pay annual dues which afford them a wide variety of supports and services. Each family may use \$2500/year for respite if they have 1 child with DD; \$3500/year if they have 2 children with DD. Each family can receive transportation reimbursement when they take their loved one with a disability to medical appointments and therapy appointments, or if the family member is attending HCAHC/Mothers Club activities. HCAHC also provides grants to families to help meet the unique needs of their loved one. Lastly, HCAHC provides financial assistance to Holmes County Special Olympics, agencies serving people with developmental disabilities, Mothers Club, Share-A-Christmas, Buddy Softball and pavilion upkeep. The Holmes County Service and Support Administration Department - Getting Back to the Basics

If you have a loved one with a developmental disability, you don't have to navigate the system alone. We're here for you. At the Holmes County Board of Developmental Disabilities, our Service and Support Administrators (SSAs) are dedicated to helping families like yours find the care, resources, and support you need to thrive.

What Is an SSA?

An SSA is more than just a coordinator, they're your partner in care. They'll walk alongside you, helping you understand your options, build a plan, and connect with the right services. Whether you're just starting out or facing a new challenge, your SSA is here to guide you every step of the way.

How We Can Help

We take the time to listen to your family's needs and create a personalized Ohio Individual Service Plan (ISP). From there, we help connect you with services such as:

- Therapy
- Housing support
- Job coaching
- Adult day programs
- Medicaid waivers

We also monitor progress to ensure services are working well, advocate for inclusion and independence, and support you through life's transitions—like moving from school to adult services. In times of crisis or emergency, your SSA will be there to help with planning and support.

Mho Can Get an SSA?

If you qualify for our County Board services, you can request an SSA. To qualify, you must:

- Live in Holmes County
- Have a developmental disability
- Complete an eligibility assessment

If you're unsure about eligibility or just want to talk, please reach out. Our team is happy to answer your questions and guide you through the process.

You are not alone. Our SSAs are here to help your family thrive and ensure your loved one receives the care and support they deserve.
