The first Developmental Disabilities Awareness month was March 1987 when Ronald Reagan issued a Presidential Proclamation that called upon Americans to provide the "encouragement and opportunities" necessary for people with developmental disabilities to reach their potential. Today, DD Awareness month focuses on raising awareness about the inclusion of people with developmental disabilities in all facets of community life, as well as awareness of the barriers that people with disabilities still sometimes face in connecting to the communities in which they live. Holmes DD is committed to this important work as can be seen in our vision statement "a community where everyone belongs".

And everyone lets loose with a joyful noise when they see that ball go through the net. Community members witness firsthand the genuine sportsmanship displayed by the Bucks when they hand the ball to a teammate so that player has an opportunity to make a basket. It all looks like fun and games but hearts and attitudes change because of these games as many of these community members have never interacted with a person with a disability. A big thank you to the Bucks players and their coaches (Duane Morrison, Rachel Day, and Miriam Miller) for being ambassadors of good will here in Holmes County.



We are thankful!

Holmes DD has received financial support from State, Federal, and local groups over the last several months.

Funds received from the Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) Fund paid for summer therapies for students during the summer months in 2021 and will again in 2022. Holmes DD also used GEER funds to purchase iPads, therapy equipment, instructional software, assistive technology devices, and computers for our classrooms.

Funds from the American Rescue Plan Act are being used to purchase instructional supplies for school students and computers for Early Intervention staff.

American Heart Association/NFL grant: Only 32 schools in the nation received this grant submitted by teacher Grant Fox. Funds will be used to buy physical education equipment.

Family Fundraiser: A family member of a school student held a Tupperware fundraiser for the school and raised funds to purchase new switches for our students.

Did you know that the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) says no screen time for children under the age of 18 months unless it is video-chatting? For children 18 – 24 months, screen time should be along with someone who is engaged with them to help them understand what they are seeing.

Why such recommendations? For two big reasons: First, it seems children who engage in a large amounts of screen time have changes in their brain; there is a "thinning" in areas that do thinking, reasoning, imagination, learning, and language called the cortex. It also impacts children's ability to attend to "non-screen" activities. A second big reason, children under two learn less from a screen than when learning from another person.

Then from age 2 – 5, the AAP recommends limiting screen time to 1 hour of high-quality programming. Although children can learn from programming it is narrow, or what is called "silo" learning. It's like only doing bicep curls when lifting weights – the arms get strong but everywhere else stays weak – the same thing happens in the brain when children have a lot of screen time.

It doesn't stop with learning, language, and creativity; OTs and PTs are seeing children who are heavy screen users have less development in motor and proprioceptive areas. This doesn't mean that children aren't captivated or entertained by screens as we all know! It is so easy to give a young child a smartphone or tablet to entertain them while riding in a car, shopping, waiting in line or when we are trying to get something done but resist the urge!!! Instead take the extra effort to engage children and include them in what you are doing! They will learn in a much "richer" way.

Ohio State University - Assistive Technology (AT) of Ohio

AT Ohio's mission is to help Ohioans with disabilities learn about or acquire assistive technology. Assistive Technology refers to devices, equipment or services that assist individuals with disabilities to function independently in the areas of work, home or school. We offer several programs and services to achieve that goal.

The **Device Lending Library** is one of AT Ohio's programs.

AT Ohio has a large library of assistive technology devices for you to try out, free of charge.

All high-tech AAC devices (Accent 800, 1000, 1400, Tobii Dynvox I-13, I-16, etc.) must be borrowed through Speech Language Pathologists (SLPs) or Occupational Therapists (OTs) only. Families wishing to borrow a high-tech AAC device through Assistive Technology of Ohio MUST have an SLP or OT they are currently working with request the device.

Assistive technology devices can be life-changing - but they can also be very expensive. In tough budget times, you don't want to go out and buy an expensive device and then find out that isn't the right device for you. Fortunately, with the Assistive Technology of Ohio Device Lending Library, you don't have to.

Simply peruse our library for a device you think may be of benefit to you, then request it through our on-line application. Once we receive the signed agreement form, we will contact you with approval notice and shipping information. (We communicate through email. If you are borrowing a device, please check your email for updates and information on your request.)

You may try the device for 30 days from the day you receive it. No device will be released without a signed agreement form.

AT Ohio will send you a shipping label along with the device for you to return it to us after the 30-day trial period. If you prefer, you may also drop the device off at our west campus location.

Please note: due to the end of the school year, the cut off date to request devices used by SLPs, teachers, etc. in the school is April 30.

Pads with speech apps can only be borrowed by professionals such as Speech Language Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, and teachers. If you are a parent wishing to borrow an iPad with speech apps, you MUST have an SLP, teacher or an Occupational Therapist request the device. The device will be shipped to the professional requesting it. We are no longer shipping iPads to families.
