Guidelines for Communion For Catholics

- 1. To be in a state of grace, that is to say, to be free from any unconfessed mortal sin.
- 2. To abstain for at least one hour before Holy Communion from any food and drink, with the exception of water and medicine.
- 3. To know what you are receiving and to approach the altar with devotion.
- 4. St. Mark uses altar rails. Please go to the far end of the rail and either kneel to receive Holy Communion on the tongue or remain standing to receive in your hand. The distribution of the Precious Blood remains suspended.
- 5. Please consume the Holy Eucharist in front of the minister of Holy Communion, before walking away.

For Non-Catholics: We welcome you to Holy Mass and are glad you are here. Please feel free to participate by singing, standing, kneeling, etc. However, the reception of Holy Communion is reserved for Catholics in a state of grace. At the time of Communion, please feel free to come forward with your arms crossed over your chest for a blessing or to remain in your pew.

FROM THE PASTOR



Today, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome — the cathedral church of the Pope and the mother church of all Christendom. While this feast honors a sacred building, it also reminds us of a deeper truth: we, the People of God, are the living temple of His presence.

In the first reading, Ezekiel describes life-giving water flowing from the temple, bringing renewal wherever it goes. This image calls us to be channels of God's grace in the world. St. Paul tells us, "You are the temple of God, and the Spirit of God dwells in you" (1 Cor 3:16). As stewards, we are entrusted with the sacred task of caring for this temple — our own hearts and our parish community — so that God's presence may shine through us.

In the Gospel, Jesus cleanses the temple, declaring that His body is the true dwelling place of God. Through our baptism, we share in this mystery and are called to reflect God's holiness in all we do.

Today's feast is an invitation to renew our commitment to the Church — to participate actively in her mission, to serve generously, and to let our lives be signs of God's living presence in the world. © Catholic Stewardship Consultants. 2025

Pastoral Pondering

Last year, I noted that the norm for the distribution of Communion in the United States is standing and on the hand. I brought it up because parishioners were questioning why Bishop Martin, when he visited the parish, did not utilize the altar rails. This is not the norm universally, but each conference of bishops is asked to adopt that posture which is to be normative. The USCCB website states the following:

The *General Instruction* asks each country's Conference of Bishops to determine the posture to be used for the reception of Communion and the act of reverence to be made by each person as he or she receives Communion. In the United States, the body of Bishops has determined that "[t]he norm... is that Holy Communion is to be received standing, unless an individual member of the faithful wishes to receive Communion while kneeling" and that a bow is the act of reverence made by those receiving (no. 160). The right to receive Communion on the tongue or on the hand and whether to receive kneeling or standing belongs to the individual. The normative practice, however, is clear and is set by the body of bishops. https://www.usccb.org/prayer-and-worship/the-mass/order-of-mass/liturgy-of-the-eucharist/the-reception-of-holy-communion-at-mass

When we began offering the Traditional Latin Mass a number of years ago, we added the altar rails to meet the requirements of that particular celebration. The use of the rails gradually became the norm at the parish because more and more people started to use them. Many believe it promotes reverence and devotion. At the same time, obedience is a virtue, and I think it is important to be united with other parishes in the Diocese and return to the normative practice as noted above, which we will implement here at St. Mark on the First Sunday of Advent, November 30. (Correction: The previous sentence was updated to clarify that this change applies only at St. Mark.) As noted above, each individual retains the right to kneel to receive the Eucharist.

I also want to be clear that love and devotion for the Eucharist can be expressed in any number of ways within the life of the Church. No one can argue that the Diocese of Charlotte does not have a deep love for the Eucharist. It is the center of our lives, and it is certainly the center of our parish here at St. Mark. From our love for the Eucharist flows our commitment to effective catechesis, evangelization, and our tremendous outreach to the poor. Those things remain unchanged.

Any time changes are made, especially in the liturgy, it touches people deeply. My hope is that after almost 11 years as your pastor, you know how much I love and care for you and for the liturgy entrusted to us. I simply believe that it is better that we are faithful to the liturgical norms given to us by legitimate Church authority as outlined in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal. Personal preferences, including my own, which go beyond these norms should not encroach on the liturgical celebration. As our Holy Father reminds in his pontifical motto, In Illo Uno Unum (In the One (Christ) we are one), in the liturgy and in our Catholic life.

ADORATION

By Donna Fodale, Adoration Coordinator I am very blessed that people often share with me certain things they read, hear, or experience pertaining to the Eucharist and Adoration. They share things that have touched their hearts and have helped them grow in their devotion to the Eucharist and Adoration.

One parishioner came across a video that included seven words that have helped her reflect more deeply on the power of the Eucharist. Not only can this be a powerful prayer used after receiving the Eucharist at Mass, but it can also be a powerful prayer to say before the Blessed Sacrament in Adoration.

The seven words are: "Jesus, hide me in Your wounds forever." Some of the profound meaning of each word or phrase:

- Jesus Asking for spiritual survival; it is an act of surrender. Jesus said, "Come to Me, all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28)
- Hide Me You are asking Jesus to be your shelter and a place of safety. You place yourself under His protection.
- In Your Wounds A place of healing power, asking to be submerged in mercy. By His wounds we are healed.
- Forever A seal of eternity: not just today but beyond death. Never let me wander; never let me leave You. Make this permanent in me.

A great time to say these words is as soon as you have consumed the Host at Mass, or when you are before the Lord in Adoration.

What are some of the things that you do in Adoration that help you enter more deeply into prayer? How does the Lord speak to you during your time in Adoration? By observing November as the Month of the Holy Souls, we are reminded of our duty to intercede for the deceased, emphasizing faith in the mercy of God and the eventual reunion in heaven.

Gaining a Plenary Indulgence for the Holy Souls in Purgatory: There is still time to gain a Plenary Indulgence for those souls who are waiting to join the saints in heaven. To gain an indulgence each day from now through November 8, the faithful must be in a state of grace, receive Holy Communion, visit a cemetery to pray for the departed, recite an Our Father, and recite the Creed.

St. Gertrude Prayer to Release Souls from Purgatory!

The St. Gertrude Prayer is attributed to St. Gertrude the Great, a 13th-century German Benedictine nun and mystic known for her deep devotion and contemplative visions. According to tradition, Jesus revealed to St. Gertrude that reciting this prayer would release many souls from purgatory.

The prayer is as follows:

"Eternal Father, I offer Thee the most Precious Blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the Holy Souls in Purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal Church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen."



Stewardship Spotlight: Uniting with the Universal Church

We celebrate the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome today. After centuries of Christian persecution, the Lateran Basilica was dedicated by Pope Sylvester I on November 9, 324. It is the oldest church in the West. In addition to its significance as the seat of the Pope, the head of the universal church, its history as the first cathedral where Christians could openly worship and publicly practice their faith is cause for universal celebration.

This feast reminds us of our love and unity with Christian's throughout the ages and around the world. We are blessed to enjoy physical spaces set apart to encounter God, including chapels, churches, basilicas, and cathedrals. Setting aside sacred time to spiritually connect to God with the universal church also helps us grow in holiness. Praying the Liturgy of the Hours, the official set of daily prayers for the church, also known as the

Divine Office, includes psalms, readings, and prayers for specific times of day, joining our prayers with all the prayers of the church. "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus." (1 Thess. 5:16-18) Choose whatever time of day works best for you, begin with one set of prayers, and sanctify this time each day.


2025 DSA Update: 90%!

High School Ministry at St. Mark is open to ALL high school teens. Please do not hesitate to email me with any questions! Gus







DEL PÁRROCO



Hoy, la Iglesia celebra la Fiesta de la Dedicación de la Basílica Lateranense en Roma, la iglesia catedral del Papa y la iglesia madre de toda la cristiandad. Si bien esta fiesta honra un edificio sagrado, también nos recuerda una verdad más profunda: nosotros, el Pueblo de Dios, somos el

templo vivo de Su presencia.

En la primera lectura, Ezequiel describe el agua vivificante que fluye del templo, trayendo renovación dondequiera que vaya. Esta imagen nos llama a ser canales de la gracia de Dios en el mundo. San Pablo nos dice: "Vosotros sois templo de Dios, y el Espíritu de Dios mora en vosotros" (1 Corintios 3:16). Como administradores, se nos confía la sagrada tarea de cuidar este templo, nuestros propios corazones y nuestra comunidad parroquial, para que la presencia de Dios brille a través de nosotros.

En el Evangelio, Jesús purifica el templo, declarando que su cuerpo es la verdadera morada de Dios. A través de nuestro bautismo, compartimos este misterio y estamos llamados a reflejar la santidad de Dios en todo lo que hacemos.

La fiesta de hoy es una invitación a renovar nuestro compromiso con la Iglesia: participar activamente en su misión, servir generosamente y dejar que nuestras vidas sean signos de la presencia viva de Dios en el mundo. © Consultores de mayordomía católica, 2025

Meditación pastoral

El año pasado señalé que la norma para la distribución de la CEI año pasado, noté que la norma para la distribución de la Comunión en los Estados Unidos es de pie y en la mano. Lo mencioné porque los feligreses se preguntaban por qué el obispo Martin, cuando visitó la parroquia, no utilizó las barandillas del altar. Esta no es la norma universalmente, pero a cada conferencia de obispos se le pide que adopte esa postura que debe ser normativa. El sitio web de la USCCB establece lo siguiente:

La Instrucción General pide a la Conferencia Episcopal de cada país que determine la postura que se utilizará para recibir la Comunión y el acto de reverencia que debe hacer cada persona al recibir la Comunión. En los Estados Unidos, el cuerpo de obispos ha determinado que "la norma... es que la Sagrada Comunión debe recibirse de pie, a menos que un miembro individual de los fieles desee recibir la Comunión de rodillas" y que una reverencia es el acto de reverencia hecho por quienes la reciben (no. 160). El derecho a recibir la Comunión en la lengua o en la mano y si recibe de rodillas o de pie pertenece al individuo. La práctica normativa, sin embargo, es clara y está establecida por el cuerpo de obispos.

Cuando comenzamos a ofrecer la Misa Tradicional en Latín hace varios años, agregamos los rieles del altar para cumplir con los requisitos de esa celebración en particular. El uso de los rieles se convirtió gradualmente en la norma en la parroquia porque cada vez más personas comenzaron a usarlos. Muchos creen que promueve la reverencia y la devoción. Al mismo tiempo, la obediencia es una virtud, y creo que es importante estar unidos con otras parroquias de la Diócesis y volver a la práctica

normativa como se señaló anteriormente, que implementaremos aquí en San Marcos el Primer Domingo de Adviento, el 30 de noviembre. (Corrección: la oración anterior se actualizó para aclarar que este cambio se aplica solo en San Marcos).

Como se señaló anteriormente, cada individuo conserva el derecho de arrodillarse para recibir la Eucaristía. También quiero dejar claro que el amor y la devoción por la Eucaristía se pueden expresar de muchas maneras dentro de la vida de la Iglesia. Nadie puede argumentar que la Diócesis de Charlotte no tiene un profundo amor por la Eucaristía. Es el centro de nuestras vidas, y ciertamente es el centro de nuestra parroquia aquí en St. Mark. De nuestro amor por la Eucaristía fluye nuestro compromiso con la catequesis efectiva, la evangelización y nuestro tremendo alcance a los pobres. Esas cosas permanecen sin cambios.

Cada vez que se hacen cambios, especialmente en la liturgia, toca profundamente a las personas. Mi esperanza es que después de casi 11 años como su pastor, sepa cuánto lo amo y me preocupo por usted y por la liturgia que se nos ha confiado. Simplemente creo que es mejor que seamos fieles a las normas litúrgicas que nos da la autoridad legítima de la Iglesia, como se describe en la Instrucción General del Misal Romano. Las preferencias personales, incluidas las mías, que van más allá de estas normas no deben invadir la celebración litúrgica. Como recuerda nuestro Santo Padre en su lema pontificio, In Illo Uno Unum (En el Uno (Cristo) somos uno), en la liturgia y en nuestra vida católica.
