Guidelines for Communion For Catholics

- 1. To be in a state of grace, that is to say, to be free from any unconfessed mortal sin.
- 2. To abstain for at least one hour before Holy Communion from any food and drink, with the exception of water and medicine.
- 3. To know what you are receiving and to approach the altar with devotion.
- 4. St. Mark uses altar rails. Please go to the far end of the rail and either kneel to receive Holy Communion on the tongue or remain standing to receive in your hand. The distribution of the Precious Blood remains suspended.
- 5. Please consume the Holy Eucharist in front of the minister of Holy Communion, before walking away.

For Non-Catholics: We welcome you to Holy Mass and are glad you are here. Please feel free to participate by singing, standing, kneeling, etc. However, the reception of Holy Communion is reserved for Catholics in a state of grace. At the time of Communion, please feel free to come forward with your arms crossed over your chest for a blessing or to remain in your pew.

FROM THE PASTOR



In today's Gospel reading from St. Luke, we receive a reminder about the proper use of the gift of time, a fundamental aspect of a stewardship way of life. Our passage highlights one of the

most famous dinner parties ever thrown, recalling the day that Martha and Mary hosted our Lord in their home. We are told that Martha, as a good steward, welcomes Christ in but then becomes "burdened with much serving" while her sister and fellow hostess chooses to simply sit with Jesus, listening to Him speak.

Martha becomes indignant at Mary's behavior and complains to Jesus, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving? Tell her to help me." But Jesus, in His infinite wisdom, refuses to get pulled into this sisterly spat. Instead, He offers Martha a fresh way to look at the situation. "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing."

What is that one thing? It is to put Jesus first in our lives and above all other things; to "sit at his feet" and listen as Mary did, giving Him the priority of our time no matter how busy we think we are. When we truly commit to putting Christ first in our daily lives through a regular time of prayer and frequent participation in the sacraments, we will find that all our other concerns become less pressing, less overwhelming.

Why is this so? Because the time we invest in our relationship with God saturates all aspects of our lives with His grace. And because God cannot be outdone in generosity. He will abundantly reward any sacrifice we make to spend time with Him. ©Catholic Stewardship Consultants, 2025

Pastoral Pondering

In the Catholic tradition, prayer is a foundational practice, understood as a personal and communal relationship with God. It's seen as a dialogue, not a monologue, where the individual lifts their heart and mind to God, seeking communion, guidance, and alignment with His will. Below is a concise overview of the Catholic understanding of prayer, grounded in Church teaching and tradition:

1. Definition and Purpose:

- The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 2559) defines prayer as "the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." It's an act of love, trust, and dependence on God, fostering a covenant relationship.
- Prayer's primary aim is communion with God, aligning human will with divine will, as modeled by Jesus in the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13).
- 2. Types of Prayer (CCC 2626-2643):
 - Adoration: Worshipping God for His infinite goodness and majesty (e.g., Eucharistic adoration).
 - **Petition**: Asking for personal needs or forgiveness, acknowledging human dependence on God.
 - Intercession: Praying for others, reflecting charity and solidarity (e.g., praying for the living and the dead).
 - **Thanksgiving**: Expressing gratitude for God's gifts, as seen in the Eucharist ("thanksgiving" in Greek).
 - **Praise:** Glorifying God for who He is, beyond what He does.
- 3. Forms of Prayer:
 - Vocal Prayer: Spoken prayers, like the Rosary, Our Father, or Hail Mary, engaging both body and soul.
 - Meditative Prayer: Reflecting on Scripture or sacred mysteries (e.g., Lectio Divina or meditating on the Rosary's mysteries).
 - Contemplative Prayer: A silent, loving gaze toward God, seeking deeper union, as taught by saints like Teresa of Ávila and John of the Cross.

4. Theological Foundations:

- Prayer is rooted in the Trinity: Catholics pray to the Father, through the Son, in the Holy Spirit (CCC 2655).
- Jesus is the model of prayer, seen in His constant communion with the Father (e.g., John 17). The Holy Spirit inspires and sustains prayer (Romans 8:26).
- Mary and the saints are
 intercessors, not mediators, whose

prayers join ours to God (CCC 2673-2679).

5. Role in Catholic Life:

- Prayer is essential for salvation, as it nurtures faith, hope, and charity (CCC 2558). It's a daily obligation, often through practices like morning/evening prayers, Mass, or the Liturgy of the Hours.
- The Eucharist, as the "source and summit" of Christian life (CCC 1324), is the highest form of prayer, uniting believers with Christ's sacrifice.
- Prayer strengthens against temptation and fosters virtues, as seen in the lives of saints like Thérèse of Lisieux, who called prayer "a surge of the heart."
- 6. Practical Expressions:
 - Liturgy: The Mass and sacraments are communal prayers, uniting the Church on earth and in heaven.
 - **Devotions**: Practices like the Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet, or novenas deepen personal devotion.
 - **Spontaneous Prayer**: Heartfelt, unscripted prayer is encouraged alongside structured forms.

7. Challenges and Growth:

- Catholics are taught to persevere in prayer despite distractions or dryness, trusting God's presence (CCC 2729-2733).
- Prayer requires humility and openness, as St. Augustine said: "Man is a beggar before God."

Supporting Evidence:

• The *Catechism* (Part Four, CCC 2558-2865) provides a comprehensive guide to prayer, emphasizing its centrality.

• Vatican II's Sacrosanctum Concilium highlights liturgy as the primary expression of prayer, uniting the Church. Saints' writings, like St. Ignatius of Loyola's Spiritual Exercises, offer practical methods for deepening prayer.

For further exploration, consult the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* or resources from the Vatican (vatican.va). Prayer, in Catholicism, is not just a practice but a way of life, drawing believers into God's love and mission.

Stewardship Spotlight: Fidelis Ladies

At St. Mark, we encourage people to embrace a life of stewardship by offering ways to grow in Christ, serve one another, share our gifts, and connect in faith for all ages and stages of life. Fidelis is a parishsponsored school-year program with girls in grades 6-12 into sisterhood with women, young and old, leading each other to Christ. The girls are Fidelis Sisters, and the adults are Fidelis Ladies. This spotlight highlights our Fidelis Ladies.

Alaina Duncan, Fidelis Lead Lady, shared that being a Fidelis Lady greatly impacted her faith and helped her connect with other women at St. Mark. Through the small group sessions each week, they discuss the scriptures, virtue of

the week, saint quotes, and invitations. "This has led to deep and authentic friendships. I am constantly in awe of our younger Fidelis sisters and our Lady mentors and their faith, wisdom, and example."

The Fidelis program incorporates all the St. Mark stewardship pillars: grow, serve, share, and connect. Fidelis Lady Bridget Russo shared some examples she has witnessed. "A King's Message about making giving IMPACTFUL, not just what you have left over . . . invitations (to) read the Bible or commit scripture to memory. The ladies and sisters made cards for a senior home last Christmas and delivered a beautiful concert to the residents the day they dropped them off. Events dedicated to wonderful female friendships, where sisters and ladies can enjoy ice skating or hiking. Every sister or lady who takes part in a Fidelis night shares their gifts with everyone else there. We have a wonderful hospitality team that cooks and cleans up each week. Many participants are crafty or sporty and excel at the activities. Some are gifted in organization and planning, and others have the gift of crafting captivating messages. During our discussion, every person who shares their perspective is giving a gift to the small group. I've honestly gained more from the sisters during those talks than I've given."

The mission of the Fidelis ministry, "forming girls – heart, mind, body, and soul – into a sisterhood of mature, virtuous disciples of Christ through the witness of Catholic women," focuses on growth in relationship with Christ and connecting in faith, which overflows into serving one another and sharing our gifts. St. Mark Fidelis invites girls in grades 6-12 and women to join them. They would love to have you come and see what Fidelis is all about on Wednesday nights this fall! Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Warm and heartfelt greetings from the **Sylhet Catholic Diocese of Bangladesh**—a mission land where the Spirit of God moves silently among Indigenous peoples, marginalized families, and faith-seeking souls. As we prepare to celebrate the Jubilee Year 2025, under the theme "Pilgrims of Hope," we renew our call to journey together—clergy, religious, and laity—as a synodal Church, united in love, solidarity, and mission.

In the spirit of Synodality—walking together, listening to each other, and discerning God's will—we embrace the urgent call to bring healing, justice, and the Good News to the most vulnerable in our region. As Pilgrims of Hope, we are committed to building a Church that reflects God's mercy through concrete service. Today, we appeal to your generous heart to support **five key priorities** for the development and sustainability of our diocese:

- <u>Education for Orphans and Underprivileged Children</u> Many orphaned and impoverished children in Sylhet Diocese cannot access education. Inspired by the Gospel and the Jubilee Year's call to renew lives, we aim to establish boarding and educational programs that offer not only academic learning but also spiritual, emotional, and social support—empowering children to become witnesses of hope and transformation.
- <u>Food Relief During Natural Disasters</u> Our region is frequently struck by floods and storms that leave communities devastated. As a Church of accompaniment, we want to establish an emergency food support system and disaster relief fund to respond swiftly to crises—providing food, shelter, and compassion when it is needed most.
- <u>Faith Formation and Evangelization</u> In this Jubilee Year, the call to deepen our faith and spread the Gospel is more urgent than ever. We are investing in faith formation programs, catechist training, retreats, sacramental preparation, and Small Christian Communities (SCCs) to ensure that the flame of faith continues to burn brightly in every village and family.

Why Your Support Matters:

We are a new diocese with vast responsibilities and limited resources. With only a handful of priests and vast mission territory, our ability to serve spiritually and pastorally is deeply challenged. But with **your prayerful and financial support**, we can become a Pilgrim Church of Hope—proclaiming the Gospel, defending human dignity, and building bridges of peace and justice.

ANUNCIOS EN ESPAÑOL



En la lectura del Evangelio de hoy de San Lucas, recibimos un recordatorio sobre el uso adecuado del don del tiempo, un aspecto

fundamental de una forma de vida de mayordomía. Nuestro pasaje destaca una de las cenas más famosas jamás organizadas, recordando el día en que Marta y María recibieron a Nuestro Señor en su casa. Se nos dice que Marta, como buen mayordomo, da la bienvenida a Cristo, pero luego se siente "cargada de mucho servicio", mientras que su hermana y compañera anfitriona elige simplemente sentarse con Jesús, escuchándolo hablar.

Marta se indigna por el

comportamiento de María y se queja a Jesús: "Señor, ;no te importa que mi hermana me haya dejado sola para servir? Dile que me ayude". Pero Jesús, en su infinita sabiduría, se niega a dejarse arrastrar por esta disputa fraternal. En cambio, le ofrece a Marta una nueva forma de ver la situación. "Marta, Marta, estás ansiosa y preocupada por muchas cosas. Solo se necesita una cosa".

¿Qué es esa cosa? Es poner a Jesús primero en nuestras vidas y por encima de todas las demás cosas; "sentarnos a sus pies" y escuchar como lo hizo María, dándole a Él la prioridad de nuestro tiempo sin importar cuán ocupados pensemos que estamos. Cuando realmente nos

comprometemos a poner a Cristo en primer lugar en nuestra vida diaria a través de un tiempo regular de oración y participación frecuente en los sacramentos, encontraremos que todas nuestras otras preocupaciones se vuelven menos apremiantes, menos abrumadoras.

¿A qué se debe esto? Porque el tiempo que invertimos en nuestra relación con Dios satura todos los aspectos de nuestras vidas con Su gracia. Y porque Dios no puede ser superado en generosidad. Él recompensará abundantemente cualquier sacrificio que hagamos para pasar tiempo con Él. ©Consultores de Mayordomía Católica, 2025

Reflexión pastoral

En la tradición católica, la oración es una práctica fundamental, entendida como una relación personal y comunitaria con Dios. Se ve como un diálogo, no como un monólogo, donde el individuo eleva su corazón y su mente a Dios, buscando la comunión, la guía y la alineación con Su voluntad. A continuación se presenta una descripción concisa de la comprensión católica de la oración, basada en la enseñanza y la tradición de la Iglesia:

1. Definición y Propósito:

- El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica (CIC 2559) define la oración como "la elevación de la mente y el corazón a Dios o la petición de cosas buenas de Dios". Es un acto de amor, confianza y dependencia de Dios, que fomenta una relación de pacto.
- El objetivo principal de la oración es la comunión con Dios, alineando la voluntad humana con la voluntad divina, según el modelo de Jesús en el Padre Nuestro (Mateo 6:9-13).
- 2. Tipos de oración (CIC 2626-2643):
 - Adoración: Adoración a Dios por su infinita bondad y majestad (por ejemplo, adoración eucarística).
 - **Petición**: Pedir necesidades personales o perdón, reconociendo la dependencia humana de Dios.
 - Intercesión: Orar por los demás, reflejando caridad y solidaridad (por ejemplo, orar por los vivos y los muertos).
 - Acción de gracias: Expresar gratitud por los dones de Dios, como se ve en la Eucaristía ("acción de gracias" en griego).
 - Alabanza: Glorificar a Dios por lo que es, más allá de lo que hace.
- 3. Formas de oración:
 - Oración vocal: Oraciones habladas, como el Rosario, el Padre Nuestro o el Ave María, que involucran tanto el cuerpo como el alma.
 - Oración meditativa: Reflexionar sobre las Escrituras o misterios sagrados (por ejemplo, Lectio Divina o meditar sobre los misterios del Rosario).
 - Oración contemplativa: Una mirada silenciosa y amorosa hacia Dios, buscando una unión más profunda, como enseñaron santos como Teresa de Ávila y Juan de la Cruz.

4. Fundamentos teológicos:

- La oración tiene sus raíces en la Trinidad: los católicos oran al Padre, a través del Hijo, en el Espíritu Santo (CIC 2655).
- Jesús es el modelo de oración, visto en Su constante comunión con el Padre (por ejemplo, Juan 17). El Espíritu Santo inspira y sostiene la oración (Romanos 8:26).
- María y los santos son intercesores, no mediadores,

cuyas oraciones unen las nuestras a Dios (CIC 2673-2679).

5. Papel en la vida católica:

- La oración es esencial para la salvación, ya que alimenta la fe, la esperanza y la caridad (CIC 2558). Es una obligación diaria, a menudo a través de prácticas como las oraciones matutinas y vespertinas, la Misa o la Liturgia de las Horas.
- La Eucaristía, como "fuente y cumbre" de la vida cristiana (CIC 1324), es la forma más alta de oración, que une a los creyentes con el sacrificio de Cristo.
- La oración fortalece contra la tentación y fomenta las virtudes, como se ve en la vida de santos como Teresa de Lisieux, quien llamó a la oración "una oleada del corazón".
- 6. Expresiones prácticas:
 - Liturgia: La Misa y los sacramentos son oraciones comunitarias que unen a la Iglesia en la tierra y en el cielo.
 - **Devociones:** Prácticas como el Rosario, la Coronilla de la Divina Misericordia o las novenas profundizan la devoción personal.
 - **Oración espontánea**: Se fomenta la oración sincera y sin guion junto con formas estructuradas.

7. Retos y crecimiento:

- A los católicos se les enseña a perseverar en la oración a pesar de las distracciones o la sequedad, confiando en la presencia de Dios (CIC 2729-2733).
- La oración requiere humildad y apertura, como decía san Agustín: "El hombre es un mendigo ante Dios".

Evidencia de apoyo:

- El *Catecismo* (cuarta parte, CIC 2558-2865) proporciona una guía completa de la oración, enfatizando su centralidad.
- El Sacrosanctum Concilium *del Vaticano II* destaca la liturgia como la principal expresión de la oración, uniendo a la Iglesia.
- Los escritos de los santos, como los Ejercicios Espirituales de San Ignacio de Loyola, ofrecen métodos prácticos para profundizar en la oración.
