#### FROM THE PASTOR.



Today, as we continue our celebration of the Christmas season, we focus our attention in a

special way on the Holy Family. This is a great time to thank God for the gift of family life.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church refers to the family as the "domestic church," so today's feast is also a fitting time to consider the importance of the virtue of hospitality — a fundamental aspect of the stewardship way of life — within the context of our domestic churches.

Why is hospitality so important to a stewardship way of life, beginning with family life? Well, we can hardly expect our family members to pray together, study their faith, and serve others if we have a home where we are disconnected from each other or the atmosphere is stressful and tense. Of course there will be moments like this. But we must be intentional in creating homes where everyone feels cherished, accepted and important. We want our homes to be the place where we can get recharged and filled up to go out and bring love to everyone we encounter outside our home.

Today's first and second readings are full of practical wisdom on how to create an atmosphere of true hospitality within our homes.

Our first reading, from the Book of Sirach, speaks of the blessings that will come when children give honor to their parents — both young children who respect the authority of their mothers and fathers, and adult children who lovingly care for older parents. These are the actions and attitudes that create an atmosphere of respect, tenderness and unity in the family; all key elements of hospitality.

Our second reading, from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians, gives still more specific instructions on fostering hospitality within our homes. Paul reminds us of our great dignity as "God's chosen ones, holy and beloved." This applies to every member of the family, from youngest to oldest and all those in between. In the daily drudge of family life it is important to remember that each one of us is cherished by God. We are not just fathers, mothers, children, grandparents; we are all also brothers and sisters in Christ.


Paul's instruction to "put on" compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and forbearance towards each other is the best possible formula for family hospitality. Paul is reminding us that (especially in the messiness of family life) we won't always feel the feelings of compassion, kindness, and so forth. What can we do? We can "put them on" — we can act in ways that a compassionate, kind, humble person would act. This will create a transformative atmosphere of hospitality within the home that will spill out in the family's interactions with those outside the home.

Of course, this is not easy to do. But we can turn to the Holy Family for help.

Lest we think that the Holy Family is somehow unable to sympathize with our struggles, we see in our Gospel passage from Matthew that this Family was certainly not free from trials and stress; quite the contrary. The very life of the newborn Jesus was threatened by Herod's extreme jealousy such that the family had to flee suddenly into a foreign land for protection until Herod's death. Yet Mary and Joseph remained united and ever obedient to the leading of the Holy Spirit for direction. Who better to turn to for help and inspiration for our own families?

Happy feast day to all families living a stewardship way of life!

## PASTORAL PONDERING | NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS!



A good Catholic approach to New Year's resolutions roots them in conversion of heart, growth in holiness, and cooperation with God's grace, rather than mere self-improvement or willpower.

Here's how faithful Catholics typically frame them well:

## 1. Begin with Prayer and Discernment

- Don't just pick popular goals (lose weight, read more, save money).
   Spend time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament or during a holy hour asking:
- "Lord, what do You want to change in me this year? Where am I resisting Your grace?"
- Consider making a short retreat (even one day) or going to Confession before January 1st to get a clear look at your soul.

## 2. Focus on the Theological Virtues and the Cardinal Virtues

Instead of generic goals, resolve to grow in:

- Faith→ Daily mental prayer (15–20 minutes), reading Scripture or the Catechism, attending an extra weekday Mass.
- Hope→ Practicing gratitude, spiritual reading about heaven and the saints, trusting God in areas of anxiety.
- Charity→ Concrete acts of mercy (visiting the lonely, tithing

As we come to the end of the calendar year, it is popular to make resolutions for the New Year. Often these resolutions are short-lived and don't come to much. Hence, I thought I would offer a Catholic take on New Year's resolutions to offer some help as we move into 2026.

consistently, forgiving a specific person).

 Prudence, Justice, Fortitude, Temperance→ Pick one capital sin you struggle with (e.g., gluttony, anger, sloth) and work on the opposing virtue (see page 6).

#### Make Resolutions Small, Specific, and Sustainable.

Catholics who succeed usually choose 1–3 concrete, measurable goals tied to grace:

- Pray a decade of the Rosary every night before bed.
- Go to Confession every month (or every two weeks).
- Fast on bread and water every Friday (or give up snacks between meals).
- Read 5–10 minutes of the lives of the saints daily.
- Perform one hidden act of charity each day without telling anyone.

## 4. Attach Resolutions to the Liturgical Year

Align goals with seasons instead of the secular calendar:

- Advent → deeper prayer and detachment.
- Lent → penance and almsgiving.
- Easter  $\rightarrow$  joy and evangelization.

This keeps resolutions from being a onetime January push.

## 5. Use the Sacraments as the Engine, Not Willpower

The best Catholic resolutions assume:

- Frequent Confession (grace to overcome habitual sins).
- Daily or at least Sunday Mass + (worthy Communion).
- Regular spiritual direction or at least an accountability partner in the faith.

#### 6. Embrace the "Do-Over" Mentality

In Catholicism, every day (even every moment) is a new beginning. If you fail your resolution on January 3rd, you don't wait until next year—you go to Confession and start again January 4th. This is the

opposite of secular "all or nothing" thinking.

## 7. Classic Catholic Resolution Ideas (tried and loved for centuries)

- Morning offering + 3 Hail Marys for purity every morning.
- 15 minutes of mental prayer daily (Lectio Divina, Ignatian meditation, or simple "Jesus, I trust in You" repetition).
- Monthly Confession and a personal rule of life.
- Spiritual reading (10–15 min/day):
   Bible, Catechism, Introduction to the
   Devout Life, Story of a Soul, etc.
- Friday penance (meat abstinence or another sacrifice) all year.
- Daily examination of conscience at night (5 minutes).
- One new devotion (First Saturdays, Sacred Heart enthronement, 54-day Rosary novena, etc.).

## 8. End with a Patron Saint for the Year

A beautiful modern Catholic custom: On January 1st (or the feast of Mary, Mother of God), pray and randomly draw (or intentionally choose) a patron saint for the year. Ask his or her intercession for your resolutions.

#### In short:

A good Catholic New Year's resolution isn't about becoming a "better version of yourself." It's about becoming more like Christ, with the help of His grace and His Church, one small yes at a time.

"Be holy, for I am holy"
(1 Pet 1:16) is the only resolution that ultimately matters—and everything else flows from it.

Growing in Christ, Serving One Another, Sharing Our Gifts, and Connecting in Faith




#### Hear the Testimony of Paul Zucarelli

On Pentecost Sunday in 2017, Catholic businessman Paul Zucarelli went into sudden cardiac arrest after heart surgery. He suffered nine cardiac arrests and was clinically dead for nearly two hours. Doctors had little hope, yet through the fervent intercessory prayer of family, friends, and Bishop Thomas Olmsted, Paul survived and returned with a powerful testimony of Heaven and of Christ's merciful love.

We cannot comprehend the love, mercy and grace of God who created each of us. I am a Blessed man who gives all glory to God Through the Cross of Jesus Christ - Christ in us our hope of Glory.

Paul shares how that experience completely changed his life and his priorities. Once focused on success and comfort, he now travels the country urging people to take God seriously, to return to the sacraments, and to live every day in light of eternity. He tells his story in his books *Faith Understood: An Ordinary Man's Journey*

#### DEL PASTOR



Hoy, mientras continuamos celebrando la temporada navideña, centramos nuestra atención de una manera especial en la Sagrada Familia. Este es un gran momento para dar gracias a Dios por el regalo de la vida familiar. El Catecismo de la Iglesia

Católica se refiere a la familia como la "iglesia doméstica", por lo que la fiesta de hoy es también un momento adecuado para reflexionar sobre la importancia de la virtud de la hospitalidad —un aspecto fundamental del modo de vida de la administración— en el contexto de nuestras iglesias domésticas.

¿Por qué es tan importante la hospitalidad para un estilo de vida responsable, empezando por la vida familiar? Bueno, difícilmente podemos esperar que los miembros de nuestra familia recen juntos, estudien su fe y sirvan a los demás si tenemos un hogar donde estamos desconectados unos de otros o el ambiente son estresante y tenso. Por supuesto que habrá momentos como este. Pero debemos ser intencionados al crear hogares donde todos se sientan queridos, aceptados e importantes. Queremos que nuestros hogares sean el lugar donde podamos recargar energías y llenarnos para salir y llevar amor a todos los que encontramos fuera de casa.

Las primeras y segundas lecturas de hoy están llenas de sabiduría práctica sobre cómo crear un ambiente de verdadera hospitalidad en nuestros hogares.

Nuestra primera lectura, basada en el Libro de Sirác, habla de las bendiciones que vendrán cuando los niños rindan homenaje a sus padres — tanto niños pequeños que respetan la autoridad de sus madres y padres, como hijos adultos que cuidan con cariño de los padres mayores. Estas son las acciones y actitudes que crean un ambiente de respeto, ternura y unidad en la familia, todos elementos clave de la hospitalidad.

Nuestra segunda lectura, de la carta de San Pablo a los Colosenses, ofrece instrucciones aún más específicas sobre cómo fomentar la hospitalidad dentro de nuestros hogares. Pablo nos recuerda nuestra gran dignidad como "elegidos de Dios, santos y amados." Esto se aplica a todos los miembros de la familia, desde el más joven hasta el mayor y todos los que están entre medias. En la rutina diaria de la vida familiar, es importante recordar que cada uno de nosotros es querido por Dios. No somos solo padres, madres, hijos, abuelos; todos somos también hermanos y hermanas en Cristo.

La instrucción de Pablo de "poner" compasión, bondad, humildad, gentileza y paciencia entre ellos es la mejor fórmula posible para la hospitalidad familiar. Pablo nos recuerda que (especialmente en el caos de la vida familiar) no siempre sentiremos compasión, bondad, etc. ¿Qué podemos hacer? Podemos "ponérnosla" — podemos actuar de la manera que una persona compasiva, amable y humilde actuaría. Esto creará un ambiente transformador de hospitalidad dentro del hogar que se reflejará en las interacciones

de la familia con quienes están fuera del hogar.

Por supuesto, esto no es fácil de hacer. Pero podemos acudir a la Sagrada Familia para pedir ayuda.

Para que no pensemos que la Sagrada Familia no puede simpatizar con nuestras luchas, vemos en nuestro pasaje evangélico de Mateo que esta Familia ciertamente no estuvo libre de pruebas y estrés; Todo lo contrario. La propia vida del recién nacido Jesús estuvo amenazada por los celos extremos de Herodes, hasta el punto que la familia tuvo que huir repentinamente a una tierra extranjera en busca de protección hasta la muerte de Herodes. Sin embargo, María y José permanecieron unidos y siempre obedientes a la guía del Espíritu Santo para la dirección. ¿Quién mejor a quien acudir para pedir ayuda e inspiración para nuestras propias familias?

Reflexión pastoral – Al acercarnos al final del año natural, es popular hacer propósitos para el Año Nuevo. A menudo estos propósitos son efímeros y no llegan a mucho. Por eso, pensé en ofrecer una visión católica sobre los propósitos de Año Nuevo para ofrecer algo de ayuda de cara a 2026.

Un buen enfoque católico para los propósitos de Año Nuevo los basa en la conversión del corazón, el crecimiento en la santidad y la cooperación con la gracia de Dios, más que en la mera superación personal o fuerza de voluntad. Así es como suelen enmarcarlos los católicos fieles:

#### 1. Comenzar con la oración y el discernimiento

- No te limites a elegir objetivos populares (perder peso, leer más, ahorrar dinero). Pasa tiempo en oración ante el Santísimo Sacramento o durante una hora santa preguntando:
- "Señor, ¿qué quieres cambiar en mí este año? ¿Dónde resisto a Su gracia?"
- Considera hacer un retiro corto (aunque sea un día) o ir a confesarse antes del 1 de enero para ver claramente tu alma.

## 2. Centrarse en las virtudes teologales y las virtudes cardinales

En lugar de objetivos genéricos, prométete a crecer en:

- -Fe→ Oración mental diaria (15-20 minutos), lectura de las Escrituras o del Catecismo, asistencia a una misa extra entre semana.
- -Esperanza -> Practicar la gratitud, leer espiritualmente sobre el cielo y los santos, confiar en Dios en las áreas de ansiedad.
- -Caridad→ Actos concretos de misericordia (visitar a los solitarios, dar el diezmo constantemente, perdonar a una persona concreta).
- -Prudencia, Justicia, Fortaleza, Templanza→ Elige un pecado capital con el que luches (por ejemplo, gula, ira, pereza) y trabaja en la virtud opuesta.

#### 3. Hacer propósitos pequeños, específicos y sostenibles.

Los católicos que tienen éxito suelen elegir entre 1 y 3 metas concretas y medibles ligadas a la gracia:

 Reza una década del Rosario cada noche antes de acostarte.

- Ir a confesarse cada mes (o cada dos semanas).
- Ayuno con pan y agua todos los viernes (o renuncia a los tentempiés entre comidas).
- Lee diariamente entre 5 y 10 minutos de la vida de los santos.
- Realizar un acto oculto de caridad cada día sin decírselo a nadie.

#### 4. Adjuntar resoluciones al año litúrgico

Alinea los objetivos con las estaciones en lugar del calendario secular:

- El Adviento → oración y desapego más profundos.
- Cuaresma → penitencia y limosna.
- Pascua → alegría y evangelización.
- Esto evita que los propósitos sean una campaña puntual en enero.

#### 5. Usa los sacramentos como motor, no como fuerza de voluntad

Las mejores resoluciones católicas asumen:

- Confesión frecuente (gracia para superar pecados habituales).
- Misa diaria o al menos dominical + (comunión digna).
- Dirección espiritual regular o al menos un compañero de rendición de cuentas en la fe.

#### 6. Abraza la mentalidad de "reiniciar"

En el catolicismo, cada día (incluso cada momento) es un nuevo comienzo. Si fallas tu propósito el 3 de enero, no esperas hasta el año que viene: vas a confesarte y vuelves a empezar el 4 de enero. Esto es lo opuesto al pensamiento secular de "todo o nada".

#### 7. Ideas clásicas de resolución católica (probadas y queridas durante siglos)

- Ofrenda matutina + 3 Ave Marías por la pureza cada mañana.
- 15 minutos de oración mental diaria (Lectio Divina, meditación ignaciana, o simple repetición "Jesús, confío en Ti").
- Confesión mensual y una regla personal de la vida.
- Lectura espiritual (10–15 min/día): Biblia, Catecismo, Introducción a la Vida Devota, Historia de un Alma, etc.
- Penitencia del viernes (abstinencia de carne u otro sacrificio) durante todo el año.
- Examen diario de la conciencia por la noche (5 minutos).
- Una nueva devoción (Primeros Sábados, entronización del Sagrado Corazón, novena del Rosario de 54 días, etc.).

#### 8. Terminar con un Santo Patrón del Año

Una hermosa costumbre católica moderna: el 1 de enero (o la fiesta de María, Madre de Dios), reza y sortea al azar (o elige intencionadamente) a un santo patrón para el año. Pide su intercesión para que te propongan tus propósitos.

En resumen: un buen propósito católico de Año Nuevo no consiste en convertirse en una "mejor versión de ti mismo". Se trata de parecerse más a Cristo, con la ayuda de Su gracia y Su Iglesia, un pequeño sí a la vez. "Sé santo, porque yo soy santo" (1 Mascotas 1:16) es la única resolución que realmente importa—y todo lo

demás fluye de ella.




