LEGEND OF THE FOUR EAGLES



St. Stanislaus is the patron saint of Poland. Born in Szczepanow near Krakow on July 16, 1030, he was ordained a priest after being educated in Poland and Paris. He became bishop of Krakow in 1072. Stanislaus quickly became involved in the political situation of Poland. He aimed his attacks at the evils of the king, especially the unjust wars and immoral acts of King Boleslaus II, resulting in his excommunication of the king. The king, enraged, ordered his soldiers to kill the Bishop. When they refused, the king killed him with his own hands. (East Window of Church)

According to legend, the body of Stanislaus was dismembered after he was martyred, and four eagles came from different areas of Poland to protect the body.

The *St. Stanislaus Parish Four Eagles Award* has been given to an individual or organization which has been especially noteworthy in building up the Parish Community. The first honor was given in 2003.

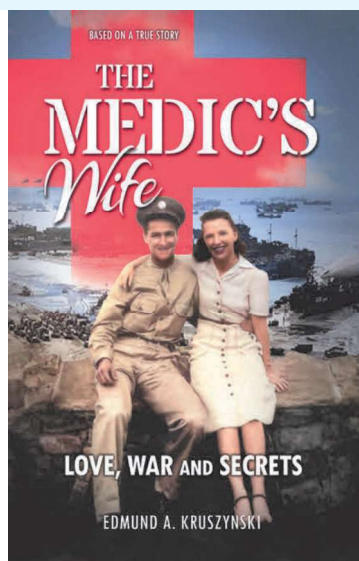

Note:

Soon after the January 2025 Spire I heard from Brigid Krane regarding my “ Grandma Sledz” family story from the 1920’s. She recalled her Uncle Bob Krane’s story from the July 2028 Spire and that another cousin - Edmund Kruszynski - wrote a book based on the true story of WWII and old neighborhood.

I highly recommend it - it’s a story that will stay with you and in your heart. Plus, author Ed Kruszynski is the first cousin of Rich Kruszynski, my classmate from “61 - a great guy.

Bob and Jim Krane (Kruszynski) are Ed (junior), the author’s first cousins. Ed Kruszynski (senior, aka “The Medic”) and Mike Kruszynski (Bob and Jim’s father who owned Kruszynski’s Deli on Fleet and 65th) were brothers.



The Medic’s Wife Story From the Author

The story of a courageous WW II combat medic and the spry widow who ensured his valor was not forgotten.

It’s 1941. Amid the chaos and uncertainty of World War II, a remarkable romance unfolds. Courageous young combat medic, Staff Sergeant Edmund Kruszynski’s dedication to saving lives takes him to the front lines of battle. Through D-Day, the Battle of the Bulge, and the horrors of the Holocaust, Ed soldiers on and saves lives even while seeing close friends perish. Although he returns home adorned with medals, the battle still rages within.

Follow the journey of the medic’s wife Mary, whose strength and devotion are tested as their seemingly unbreakable bond teeters on the edge. Will Mary’s vow to protect her husband’s secrets hold firm, or will the weight of what happened cause their world to unravel? Some vows...are destined to be broken.

It sounds like a plot for a movie. But for former long-time Cleveland, Ohio residents Edmund (Ed) and Mary Kruszynski, it’s a true story. A story that almost remained untold, until a small miracle occurred in 2006. A devastating flood destroyed widow Mary’s Mill Creek condo, it also unearthed a long-forgotten hidden box of WWII photographs and letters. “We knew dad was in the war and mom worked in a military factory, but our parents never talked about it,” said their son who wrote a book about his parent’s experiences. After the box’s discovery, however, Mary gradually begins to reveal the secret details of their story.

Here is their story from the Book Cover:

After the Pearl Harbor bombings, the U.S. Army drafts Ed. He and Mary wed and move to Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia where they live for the next 18 months. In 1943 Ed makes Staff Sergeant (S/Sgt) and deploys overseas. On D-Day, he leads a platoon of medics onto the blood-soaked beaches of Normandy, France. Ed’s unit faces off against the Germans in all five European battle campaigns, and he witnesses the brutality of the Nazi concentration camps first-hand.

While Ed serves overseas, Mary moves back home to Cleveland and lives with her parents. When she takes a job as a military warplane parts inspector, she works 12-hour shifts, seven days a week with one day off a month. As Mary worries about Ed’s safety, unjust accusations about their rushed marriage test her devotion.

In 1945 WWII finally comes to an end. Ed and his valiant platoon receive the U.S. Army’s prestigious Meritorious Achievement Award for exemplary performance against an armed enemy. He returns home adorned with five bronze combat stars, and one silver battle star. Because he struggles to assimilate back into civilian life, a catastrophic event occurs and threatens everything he holds dear.

The Medic’s Wife is named for Mary. If it weren’t for her courage to break her promise of silence, this story would have been just another lost footnote in history. “Mom’s testimony was heart-wrenching, beautiful, and utterly captivating. The Band of Brothers meets the Greatest Generation is how I’d describe it,” says their son.

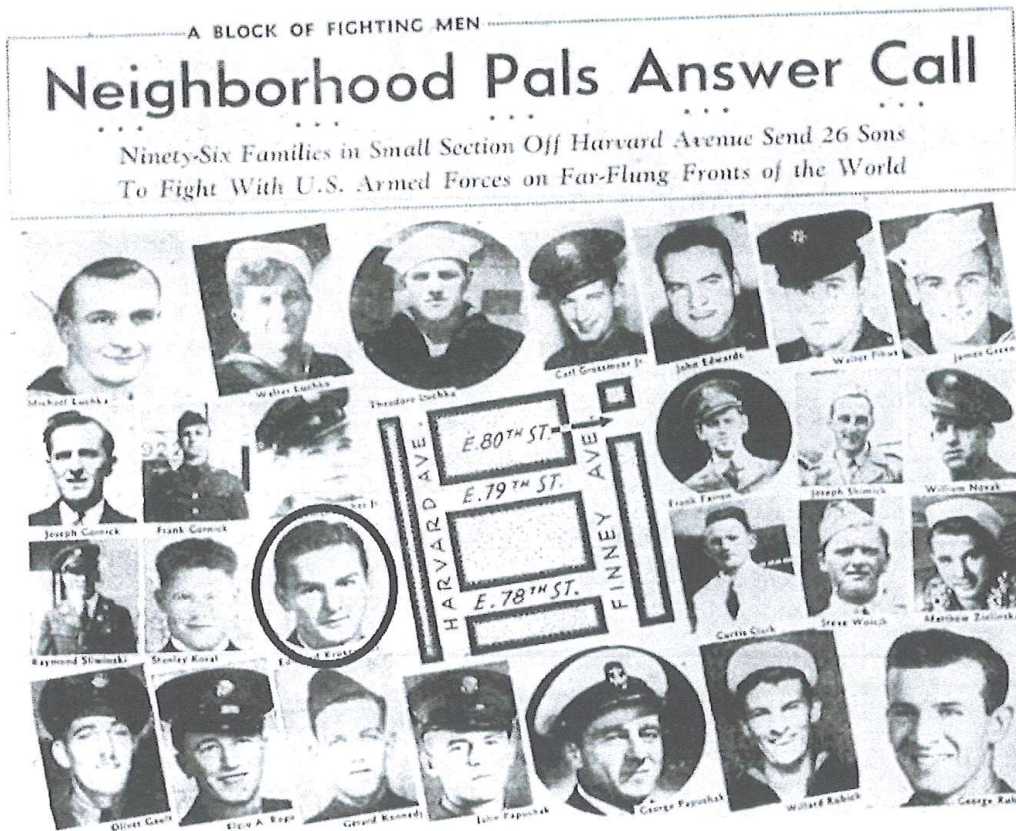

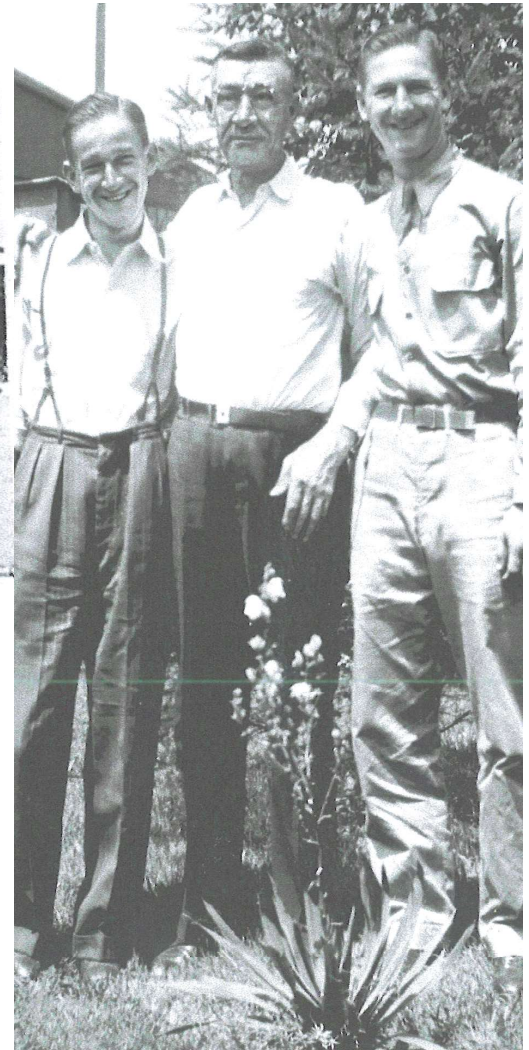

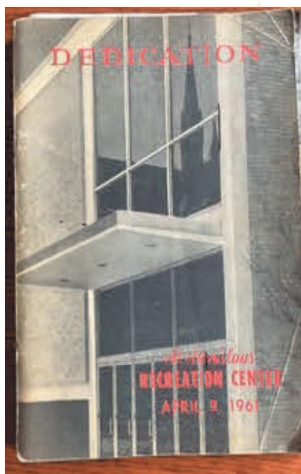

On Monday, April 28, Cleveland Central Catholic High School (CCCHS) and the St. Stanislaus community gathered to celebrate the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the newly renovated St. Stanislaus Social Center and to dedicate the Carol A. Chase Entrance Hall.

The event opened with a warm welcome from CCCHS Principal Sister Allison Marie, S.N.D., followed by prayers of blessing from Father Eric Orzech, pastor of the Shrine Church of St. Stanislaus. The recent renovations mark a significant milestone for the campus, transforming the 65-year-old building with an expanded entrance hall and various other upgrades, including an elevator, energy-efficient windows and lighting, renovated office space, and an outdoor promenade and gathering space.



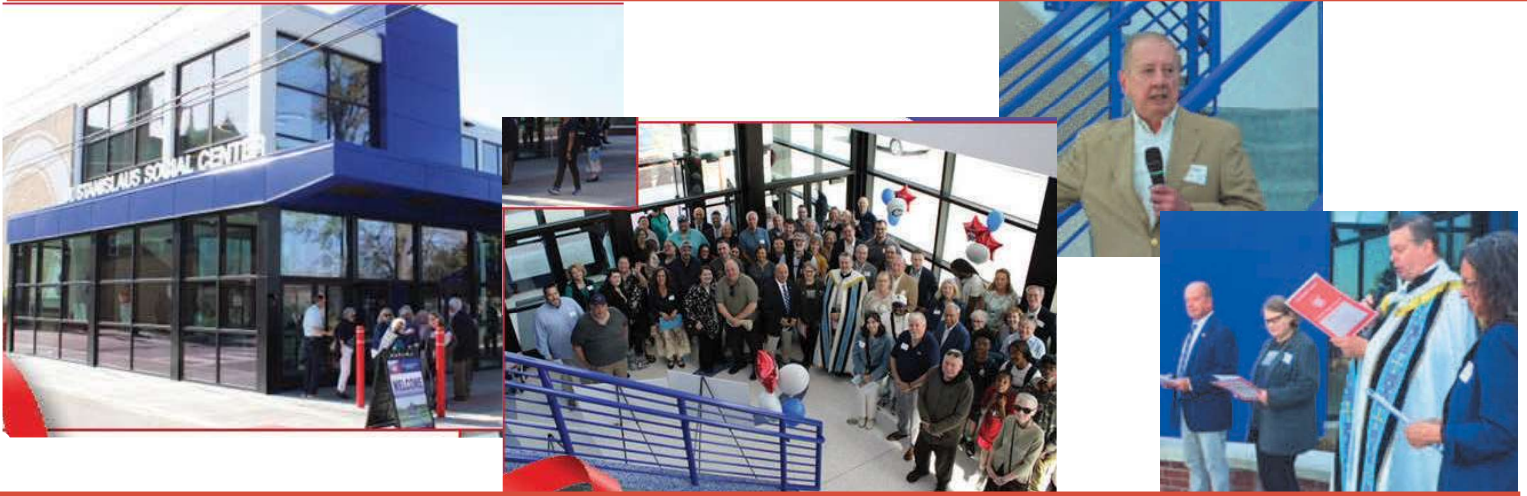
EDITOR NOTE: *It's very appropriate that the dedication ceremony was at the stairway entrance of the Social Hall. Sixty four years ago, April 9, 1961, the original St. Stanislaus Recreation Center dedication book included photos of all the students in school. Among the photos was a stairwell view of Sr. Carmella with her senior home room 317 which included both Carol Majewski Chase and George Chase.*

CCCHS President John Simon, Class of 1972, expressed heartfelt gratitude to George Chase, Class of 1961, whose generosity and dedication made the project possible. In a touching tribute, the new entrance hall was named in honor of his late wife, Carol Ann Chase, also Class of 1961.

Special remarks were delivered by Daniel Sirk, Architect/Owner of SA Group; Joe Korfant, Class of 1985 and Senior Project Manager with the Dalad Group; and Dr. Frank O'Linn, Superintendent of the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland.

The celebration continued with a building tour and a blessing of a memorial bench donated by the family of beloved former CCCHS math teacher, Cory Hargis. Situated in a quiet respite area, the bench is engraved with the words: "A Place to Sit, A Place to Think, A Place to Remember."

"This project sends a strong message to the families, students, and other constituencies we serve in the Slavic Village community that we are committed to the well-being of our campus — now and in the future," said Simon. "We are grateful to the many individuals, foundations, and families who made this project possible through their generous support."



THE DIVINE MERCY SHRINE

*The relics within the new Divine Mercy central reliquary include the following:
The Main Relic is that of the True Cross, located right in the center of the crucifix.
It is surrounded with Carnelian, Garnet and Rainbow Moonstone Labradorite stones.
The two relics directly beneath are those of the place of Christ's birth in Bethlehem & His death on Calvary.*

The next 3 Relics are places associated with His Passion, Death and Resurrection, namely the Garden of Olives, the Holy Sepulcher and the place of His Last Supper.

The lone relic at the bottom is from the site of Jesus' Ascension into heaven.



The four angels are holding relics of the fourteen stations of the Cross to go with the other ten relics at the base of the two kneeling angels, they being reminiscent of the two angels atop the Ark of the Covenant.

The entire background and Crucifix are covered in gold leaf. The doors of the reliquary are meant to be open from Holy Thursday until the Pentecost. When those doors are closed you will see that the door on the left shows symbols of Christ's Passion and Death while the door on the right shows those of his resurrection.

EDITORS NOTE: It is recommended to allow time for a visit, prayer and meditation at the beautiful Divine Mercy Shrine in the West Transept of Shrine Church of St. Stanislaus. The Alumni & Friends sponsored the St. Faustina Portrait back in 2020.

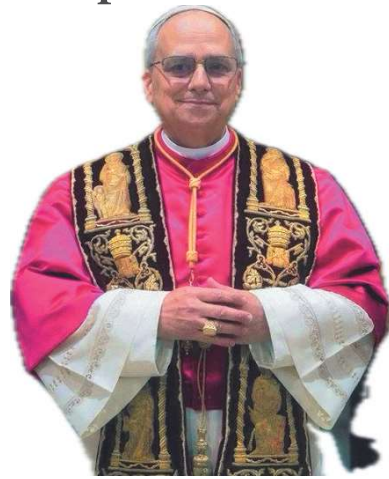
