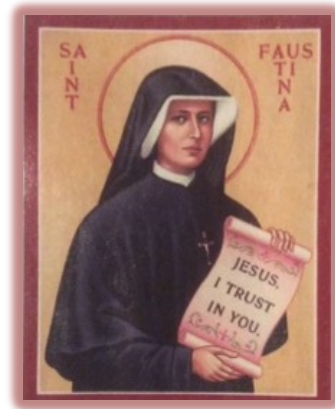

**UPDATE OF: NEW DIVINE MERCY SHRINE**

At the time of our July newsletter, the status was at a “stand still” because we were waiting for the three paintings to be finished. Today we are six months later, and we are still at the same point.

The official Czestochowa artist- Mariusz Gradman has been working on the project. When he is finished with the three large oil paintings, he will personally (with his wife) bring them to Cleveland. Travel will be after the corona-19 vaccine is developed and they can safely travel out of Poland.

The paintings will be rolled into travel cylinder for transport. Once arriving at St. Stan's — he will stretch the artwork onto their wooded mounting frames. Then over a period of several weeks the pictures will be installed into the shrine at which point the remaining wood carvings will be added and the lighting completed.

Thanks to your generosity we can look forward to seeing “our” St. Faustina portrait which will have familiar Cleveland theme images in the portrait background.

The St. John Paul II portrait will contain background images of St Stan's parish representing a personalized connection to his actual visits here. The third and largest image of Divine Mercy will be mounted in the Center location of the shrine.

At this time, it is VERY DOUBTFUL that the entire project will be completed by Divine Mercy Sunday (one week after Easter) which is on April 11, 2021, more likely it would be finished by 2022.

In the meantime, we can still visit, pray, & reflect at the shrine when we come to church AND visualize how the completed project will look when the parish celebrates its 150th year anniversary in 2023.

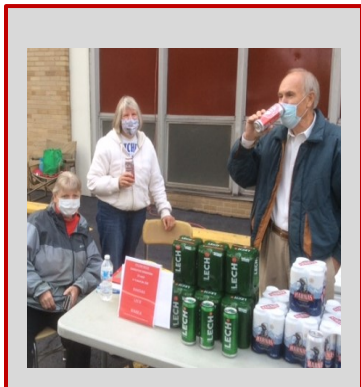

But most of all I remember *The Spire* article about the survey and the local Democrats inviting Senator John Kennedy to speak. The timing and photo angle was perfect for classmate and Spire reporter Mary Praszniwski at the JFK Parade downtown. They both looked great in what looks like an interview. We were happy for Mary! What a great picture!

And we were optimistic about the future after JFK was elected President.

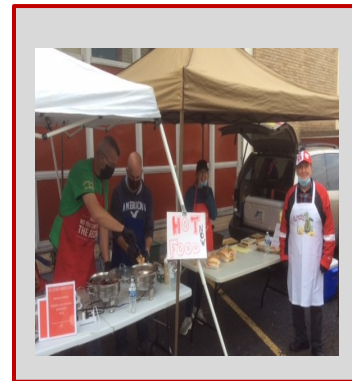

2020 Virtual Polish Festival



Normally and historically the annual St. Stanislaus Polish Festival is held during the first weekend of October. This event has always been a major fundraiser for the parish and requires a dedicated commitment by workers and volunteers. (2019 the total profit was just over \$56,700) This year because of Covid-19 and the pandemic, there was an October VIRTUAL Festival.

Denise Schultz's story in her own words....

“Carrying on a 30+ year tradition of the Polish Festival in a normal year is a daunting task. Attempting it in the year of a respiratory type pandemic may seem foolhardy. Yet, our goals are simple. One, increase fellowship among parishioners and within the community. Two, raise money for the church. In this year of the pandemic with the help of an amazing group of volunteers, some creativity, and lots of prayers to St. Rocco, we achieved our goals and more!

“In any given year of a normal Festival, we start planning in February, advertising by Easter, and fill more than 300 volunteer positions for the weekend. This year we started in August, only advertised on Facebook and by word of mouth, and carried it out with less than 100 volunteers. Our amazing group of volunteers were determined to serve the most important and popular menu items and do it well; be flexible and figure out a drive thru delivery system-sometimes on the fly and in the midst of chaos; and generate a can-do attitude that gives us hope and a blueprint for future Festivals.

“This was the year we reinvented the wheel. Throwing out the traditional concept of our beloved Polish Festival, we focused on a “Virtual Polish Festival” experience. We offered pre-orders for the first time ever. Czarnina and Kolachki were surprisingly popular. We pre-recorded a polka band and posted it to YouTube. This was perfect entertainment while eating the new Baxter and Forman platters. And we offered our traditional raffle tickets along with an online auction that replaced Basket booths, 50/50 raffles and instants. We had all the elements of “Polish Festival” just with a 21st century spin.

“As a faith community, our actions often speak louder than our words. This year we said a lot of words in the form of prayers to St. Rocco. We may be Polish, and St. Rocco is Italian, but our ancestors showed us in 1918 that prayer can get you through anything- even a pandemic year Virtual Polish Festival! We did it! “

Being a fierce advocate for the safety of our students, we monitor the housing situation on Forman very carefully. The big blue house, right across the street from the school, finally came down right after school started this year. The dialogue I had with parishioners regarding the sadness of that now vacant lot made me pause.

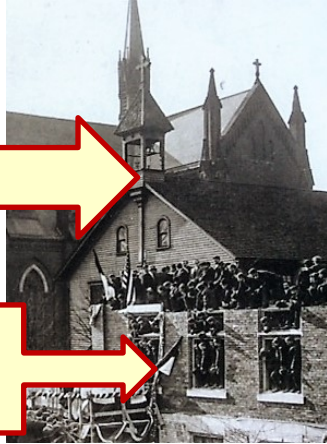
Such stories that big blue house could tell. The last time I was in it, there were tin ceilings that held memories of many families who gathered in the living room. The upper floors had wear marks from hundreds of years of little feet sliding on the hardwood floors. But before the big blue house held families, it held something more precious: the church and school of Saint Stanislaus.

Here is what history I could dig up: *A plain frame, 35 ft (11 m) by 86 ft (26 m), building was erected. The upper story served as a temporary church, and the lower story as a school. The building cost \$4,600. It was dedicated to St. Stanislaus of Szczepanów by Bishop Gilmour, on Sunday, November 13, 1881.*

Now that space continues to serve the students of Saint Stanislaus as the Fifth Grade and I planted bulbs under the new trees. We look forward to the Spring when tulips will bloom along with hope for another faith-filled year of serving the Saint Stanislaus community.

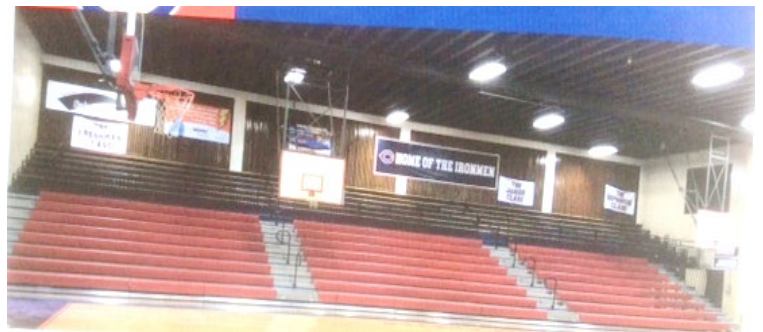
Yes, Catholic education is alive and well on our shared campus! Working together, we are serving over 710 students each year. Imagine the positive impact our schools are having on these students, families, and our broader community. Simultaneously, we are preparing our campus to be a more attractive, welcoming, safer, and more secure place for us all. This will surely benefit our students, but it will also make our campus a community asset to share with others.

Thanks to our collaboration with St. Stanislaus Parish and School, we have embarked on several improvements that are focused on the Social Center building. To date, we have completed these items:

- ✓ Main restrooms, hallway and cafeteria floors and walls scrubbed and sealed
- ✓ New LED lighting in gym, lobby, hallway, and main floor restrooms
- ✓ New stalls in both main floor restrooms (including ADA stall in each)
- ✓ Electric hand dryers installed in both main floor restrooms
- ✓ New bleachers installed on both sides
- ✓ New sound system replaced old one
- ✓ Leaking plumbing repaired
- ✓ New sign installed on Social Center façade



Also, in coordination with the City of Cleveland, Baxter Ave. has been repaved and restriped. The City also replaced several lights at Stefanski Stadium, with superior LED lighting, which our students will appreciate as they make their way back to campus.



Bill Dix: Neighborhood Tales of the Old West

Part One — “The Hangmen”

When my friend’s families and our first television set arrived, early 50s, it seemed as though all that was shown were cowboy movies from the 1930s and 1940s. The stars were: Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, Tim Tylee, Tom Mix, Richard Dix (no kin), Hoot Gibson, Range Rider, Bob Steele, Hopalong Cassidy, Lone Ranger, Tonto, and the Cisco Kid with Poncho. We often re-created movie scenes all over the neighborhood.

Most of us had cowboy hats, kerchiefs, lassos (clothesline pieces), cap pistols, holsters, and horses (bikes).

One part of a movie scene stands out in my memory. I recall being led down East 59th, with a noose around my neck, by Chester and Victor Slabinski. How and why this happened, I have no idea. Perhaps from watching the Oxbow incident?? Anyway, in front of my house, we were confronted by my father who was trimming our hedges. When he saw what was happening, he yelled at Victor and Chester to remove the noose or he would snip off their ears! They did and they ran home. In later years, my father often talked of the incident, always ending with “those two boys just ain’t right!”

Tough Times During the Pandemic

Friend and classmate Joe Lasinis has always been an integral part of the class of '61 reunions, memory books, and email communications. Joe grew up on East 54 St and went to St Stan's thru most of elementary & high school. This year while we all dealt with the coronavirus pandemic — Joe's Family also stressed about a beloved family treasure in the Sierra Nevada Mountains AND the health and safety of his firefighting grandson Jordan.

Here is Joe's story in his own words:

I was the senior sales rep for Xerox Corp in the Cleveland area in the late 60's and then... In the Spring of 1969, I requested and received a job transfer to Fresno, CA, my wife Patty's hometown. There were basically 3 reasons for the move: first, to allow Patty to be closer to her family; second, to be within a 2 hour drive of Yosemite National Park (where Patty and I first met 6 years earlier); and third, to be less than an hour's drive from Shaver Lake and the Sierra Nevada Mountains. Patty's folks shared a cabin they built with 2 other couples in the small vacation community of Shaver Lake, and we (including our 4 children) enjoyed weekends there. When the three couples put the cabin up for sale, I tried to find a way to buy it, but could not afford to do so. For the next 14 years, we looked for a cabin we could afford, while camping in the 'Shaver' campgrounds.

Finally, in 1991, we found a cabin that was built in the '40's that we bought. We spent the next 28 years lovingly updating *everything* ... electrical and plumbing all had to be replaced, as well as most of the interior and exterior walls and interior flooring and ceilings. We basically rebuilt every part of the cabin! Eventually, we made less and less trips to Shaver because LIFE kept getting in the way! Sadly, the taxes, insurance, utilities, homeowner's fees, etc. never stopped, so we decided to sell in 2019. All of our children had such great memories, even as adults with their children, that our oldest child and her contractor husband made us an offer that not only was acceptable but kept the cabin in the family! It was a classic "win-win"!!!



Ironically, this cabin was only about 300 yards away from Joes cabin and the fire jumped to destroy it.

Sadly, less than a year later (on September 4th, 2020), the Sierra Nevada mountains exploded in flames! The largest single forest fire in California history erupted less than 12 miles from Shaver Lake! Known as the "Big Creek" fire, as of this writing in late November 2020, the fire is only 78% contained and has destroyed almost 1,000 structures and 380,000 acres of forest (for a perspective, Cuyahoga County is about 293,000 acres)! Additionally, we have experienced the worst air quality in memory!

Side note: about 5 years earlier, the Association that governs our village placed a fire hydrant on our property, less than 30 feet from our cabin. I was livid about that, mostly because it cut down on the parking spaces available, which are at a premium at each cabin. As it turned out, that fire hydrant became the base location of 5 fire trucks and all the firefighters that were based in Shaver! "Our" cabin was probably the safest structure in the community and would probably be the LAST to burn!!!

Second side note: My daughter and her husband have 3 children ... their family has been enjoying the cabin ever since the sale occurred, as well as 20+ years before. They have spent the first 10 months of their ownership doing what Patty and I did when we first bought the cabin – redecorating and improving everything. Only one member of the family, a son named Jordan, has not been available to spend much time at the cabin ... he, as a California fire-fighter has been "on the fire line" of many of the ongoing fires in the State. In fact, he was scheduled to transfer to the "Big Creek" fire from one he was fighting in Northern California, as soon as that one was contained ... which means he would be basically based on the front porch of "our" cabin - he would be protecting the cabin owned by his own family! Unfortunately, a new fire erupted in the north and he was reassigned to that one.

As of today, it appears that Shaver Lake will be spared from the "Big Creek" fire's destruction. As it turns out, memories of 2020 will be, at best, mixed. Although we ALL have much to despise about this year, please know that the forest management that took place over many years in the Shaver Lake area, and was lacking in most other areas of California, is a testimonial to common sense and foresight. We can only hope the caretakers of the State's forests learn from this tragedy!
