
Join our Liturgical Ministry Team!

Deacon on Duty-28 Steps

Following the diaconate convocation last week, Juanita and I spent a few additional days up north in and around Petoskey. One of our day trips included a drive out to the Cross in the Woods. We had been there once before many years ago. I recall from that first trip standing at the base of the crucifix, looking up at Jesus looking down at me. I was moved at the thought of Jesus looking at me as if to say, "I am here because of your sins."

Wanting to re-experience that humbling moment, I prepared to climb the steps to reach the base of the crucifix. That is when I saw the two signs for the Holy Stairs. The one sign said not to walk on the marble stairs which ran up the left side of the concrete steps to the crucifix. The other sign briefly explained the tradition of the Holy Stairs in Rome, Italy and how these marbles steps in Indian River, Michigan were for a similar purpose. For those not familiar with the Holy Stairs (Scala Sancta in Latin), they are a set of 28 marble steps located near the Basilica of St. John Lateran in Rome. The steps in Rome are believed to have been part of the praetorium of Pontius Pilate in Jerusalem and Our Lord was said to have climbed the stairs during His Passion (Mark 15:16; John 18:28). The stairs were brought to Rome by Saint Helena, mother of emperor Constantine. Over the centuries a tradition has come about of pilgrims climbing the stairs while on their knees, meditating on the Passion of the Lord.

So, without much thought and preparation, I dropped to my knees and proceeded to climb the 28 cold, wet marble steps. Having no instructions or formal prayers (though I found out later online there are prayers said while climbing the Holy Stairs in Rome) I began my trek up to the Cross in the Woods.

With each step I thought about Jesus walking up his 28 steps, leading to, leading to his meeting Pilate and a death sentence. With each step I thought about Mary at the foot of the Cross. I alternated between praying a Hail Mary and the Fatima Prayer (O my Jesus, forgive us our sins...). I meditated on what Jesus must have been thinking as he climbed those steps, thinking of my sins and his desire to sacrifice himself for me. for all of us.

Those first few steps were fairly easy. But as I prayed and meditated a minute or so on each step the feeling started to change. While it was not a crippling pain, there was a growing discomfort as I moved my way up to the Cross. As the discomfort increased, amidst the prayers I started thinking about Colossians 1:24, Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. Then my thoughts turned to just how much Jesus must have and does love me to have climbed the steps of the praetorium.

I share this in the spirit of the humble tax collector from our Gospel reading this weekend, but also in the spirit of hope and gratitude. The pain resulting from a half hour climbing those 28 marble steps on my knees was a reminder of the pain sin -- my sins -- cause. Yet, meditating on Jesus' journey up his 28 steps reminded me why he endured his pain, his suffering, his cross. Jesus did so out of love and mercy for me, for all of us.

Years ago, I stood at the foot of the Cross in the Woods looking at the face of Jesus, looking back at me with a sense of him saying, "I am here because of your sins." This time, I came away with a sense of Jesus saying, "I am here because I love you." These are not "either/or" takeaways from the experiences, they are "both/and" experiences. Jesus journeyed to the Cross for our sins out of love for us. What a gift to receive from 28 steps!



Weekend Mass Parking at Park Rite Garage

St Aloysius parishioners and guests who attend weekend Mass may park for free in the Park Rite Garage beneath the Detroit City Club Apts. on Washington Blvd. After Mass, ask one of the ushers for a scan pass, then use it at the gate or full validation. This courtesy extends only to Saturday or Sunday Mass, along with religious holidays, and parish related activities before or after Mass.

It <u>does not</u> extend to sporting events or other activities unrelated to St. Aloysius, even if someone attends Mass that same day.
