EVERYBODY'S CHURCH IN DOWNTOWN DETROIT

Before I get into today's Gospel I want to chat about the archbishop's determination to assign Fr. Salvatore Palazzolo as the priest here at St. Aloysius. Fr. Sal is a fellow canonist who works in the office next to mine at the chancery. He is the Judicial Vicar and runs the archdiocesan tribunal. He is an incredibly fine priest and a close friend. I recommended this move as my duties as Episcopal Vicar for Clergy Discipline and as the priest exercising governance over Old Saint Mary in Greektown was a more than full time enterprise and I felt I was neglecting St. Al's just a bit. Both historic parishes need a serving pastor. Accordingly, I thought it best, and the archbishop agreed that both his Judicial Vicar and Episcopal Vicar should have their own parish. That is not to say that I will be disappearing. I love St. Al's and have real history here. I will continue in my weekday Mass duties and will fill in from time to time on weekends. In short, Fr. Sal and I will be supporting each other's efforts in our respective parishes. So no worries, I am not going anywhere really. You could not be in better hands than those of Fr. Sal.

In our gospel reading this week, Christ is yet again urging us to place Him first. He is dramatic, even extreme in giving us examples; indicating we must put Him before our families and more radically, carry a cross for Him. What Christ is really telling us is there must be no limits, no contours to our loyalty, our devotion, our commitment to the way of the Christ. We are either "all in" or not in at all. He calls upon us to calculate what we are doing, not to make a hasty decision in choosing His way. We have to throw ourselves into complete and absolute love — nothing less. Christ uses this intentional and terminal language because He wants to leave no doubt as to the way to salvation. You cannot hope to be with Him if you are half a friend — its varsity or nothing.

I don't know about you but that is pretty intense for me – pretty final. But really, when you think about it, isn't that how all big decisions in life really are. Sometimes we have to take a side, we have to stand up for principal, we have to commit. We discover all rather quickly that if we try to please everyone, try to "cover our bets" we suddenly end up standing for everything so as to stand for nothing at all.

This Gospel is ever so relevant to our parish and its future. We live in a world where facts no longer matter. It is a world where everyone has an opinion so long as they can advance that opinion in the form of online spears rather than having the gumption to come forward out of the shadows and engage in actual conversation. This is a sickness throughout society. The rectangular device that owns many of our lives – that invention which has as its best-selling sites those which degrade women with pornographic images and urge our young people to enter into a relationship with an "Al girlfriend or boyfriend" in their Facebook advertisements – or worse. Our parents give their children these devices and in many cases do not govern their use. After all, the child is occupied, and the parent gets to pretend they are single again. Earlier this week I was getting carry out at a restaurant across the street from the chancery and was going to say hello to a young, professional woman who was waiting for her food next to me. I was amazed that she could not put the rectangle down – it owned her, consumed her, to the point where she could not care if there was a human being standing next to her.

All of us must ask, are we of God or of this place? To whom do we belong? For which team do we play? God is watching, and each of us in our own time must choose.
