From the Pastor's Desk



We often hear the Christmas song, "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year." It conjures up feelings of warmth, festivity, and joy whenever it is played. I used to love the Staples commercial that would play the same song, with slightly varied lyrics, during the first week of September.

Accompanying the song, fathers and mothers would be pirouetting through the store, gathering numerous school supplies for their children as they prepare to send them back to school after a long summer break. The expressions of joy on the parents' faces were delightful, while the children looked somber, realizing that summer vacation was soon to end. In reality, I believe the Most Wonderful Time of the Year, at least for Christians, is Holy Week, which begins with Palm Sunday and concludes Holy Saturday night.

Holy Week is the most significant week in Catholicism. Spanning from Palm Sunday to Holy Saturday, it marks the final stretch before Easter Sunday and recalls the final week of Jesus' life on earth. During this sacred week, Catholics pray and reflect on the profound journey of Jesus' suffering, sacrifice, and victory over death. It starts on Palm Sunday, commemorating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. It continues to Holy Thursday, which celebrates the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist. It includes a reflection on Good Friday that recalls Jesus' horrific death by crucifixion. Throughout this week, Catholics reflect on the emotional intensity of Jesus' Passion, contemplate His boundless love and mercy, and anticipate the joyous hope of His Resurrection. I believe it is the most wonderful time of the year because it serves as an intentional Holy Week that can serve as a spiritual pilgrimage to truly deepen our faith (A Catholic Guide to Holy Week 2024 | Dynamic Catholic, n.d.).

Palm Sunday: As we begin our celebration of Holy Week, let us take some time to reflect on the meaning that corresponds to the week's rituals so that we can fully absorb God's profound love for us. This year, Holy Week begins today, Sunday, March 24, 2024. The celebration commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. It begins with Catholics carrying blessed palm branches into the Church, symbolizing the crowd's welcoming gesture of Jesus into the Holy City of Jerusalem. The Gospel readings recount the story of Jesus' death and Passion, evoking reflection on His sacrificial love and the profound significance of Holy Week. (See Mark 11, verses 1-11)

The Mass on Palm Sunday differs from every other Mass in that Palm Sunday includes two readings from the Gospels. First, at the start of the Mass, we recall Jesus' entry into the Holy City. Later, we read the entire Passion account during the Liturgy of the Word. After attending Mass, it is a common practice for Catholics to display the palm branch received at Mass somewhere in the home. Some place it behind a crucifix, some take several palm branches and weave them together to create a palm cross, and some place a small branch in their Bible on the page that commemorates Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. Since palm branches are blessed, they should never be thrown in the trash. Those who do not wish to keep their branches can return them to the Church, where the branches will be retained and burned to be used as the holy ashes on the following Ash Wednesday.

Perhaps you are unaware of this custom, but it has often been a common custom to do a deep cleaning of your home on Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday. This tradition arises from the Jewish custom of preparing the home for Passover. Another long time tradition is for Catholics to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation before Easter or during the Easter Season. St. Andrew's, throughout Lent, increased opportunities for Confession by opening our doors every Wednesday at 7 PM so that people could avail themselves of this special sacrament.

The Chrism Mass: Many dioceses celebrate the Chrism Mass on Tuesday, Wednesday, or the morning of Holy Thursday. Chrism refers to one of the oils used in the celebration of different Sacraments. During the Chrism Mass, the Oil of the Sick, the Oil of Catechumens (the oil used during the Sacrament of Baptism), and the Sacred Chrism are consecrated by the Bishop for use throughout the year. In a prayerful procession, large vessels of these oils are carried to the altar for the blessings and consecration of Chrism, which is a mixture of oil and balsam. After Mass the oils are distributed to representatives of each parish and are taken back to the parishes to be used for the Sacraments throughout the year.

There is also a renewal of priestly promises during the Chrism Mass. Traditionally, every priest within a diocese attends this Mass and recommits his life to serve the Lord, with a commitment to serve the People of God. The Bishop requests that the laity of the diocese pray especially for him and the priests of the diocese. All are invited to attend the Chrism Mass, which will be celebrated on Tuesday, March 26, @ 3:30 PM at Our Lady of Hope Parish, Blackwood, NJ. Please consider attending this Mass, as Monsignor Marucci, Fr. Rush, and Fr. Infanti, with all the

priests of the diocese, recommit their lives to continue serving the Lord.

Holy Thursday: Holy Thursday is the first day of the Easter Triduum and launches the most sacred days of the Catholic faith. It begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, commemorating the Last Supper celebrated by Jesus and his disciples on the Jewish holiday of Passover. It is not a Holy Day of Obligation, but most Catholics make a special effort to attend Mass on this night. During this Mass, the priest washes the feet of some members of the parish in commemoration of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples. It was during the Last Supper that Jesus taught his disciples that the Eucharist is truly His Body and Blood. Jesus' disciples were the first Catholic priests. So, during the Last Supper, Jesus taught them the importance of the Eucharist, which is why priests celebrate Jesus' sacrifice during every Mass. Because of this, the Last Supper is also significant because it promulgated the beginning of the priesthood.

Many traditions surround Holy Thursday. Some people use it as a day to go on a local pilgrimage and visit several churches. On this night, the Eucharist is placed in a special vessel called a Repository and placed within a shrine decorated elaborately as a show of reverence and respect. When parishioners pilgrimage to various churches, they commit to pray for the priests of that parish and for an increase in vocations to the priesthood and the religious life. Holy Thursday is a celebration of the institution of the Eucharist, so it is a golden opportunity for Catholics to spend some time in Adoration. For this reason, many churches remain open during the night. St. Andrew the Apostle Parish remains open until Midnight to allow people to spend this time with Jesus. St. Andrew the Apostle Parish will also host a carpool pilgrimage to visit local parishes. If interested, please sign your name on the sign-up sheet so we can prepare for a proper number of drivers. We encourage Parishioners to pray the following prayer at each location:

A Prayer for Holy Thursday: Dear Jesus, in these last few days leading up to Easter, as I recall your passion and death, let me remember that, above all, I am called to feed your sheep. You have given me a model of how to live; may I strive to be all that you created me for, spreading the love of God and the truth of our Catholic faith wherever I am able. You are the way, the truth, and the life. Amen.

Good Friday is a most somber day in the lives of Christians. The celebration commemorates the day Jesus died and saved us from our sins. His death on Good Friday and Resurrection on Easter Sunday are the most important events, which is why it is called "good." On this day,

Catholics fast and remember the suffering of Jesus as he died on the cross. Good Friday is the only day of the year in which Catholic Mass is not celebrated. Instead, Catholic Churches celebrate the Passion of the Lord with emphasis on the Veneration of the Holy Cross in the afternoon, with the Stations of the Cross within a service of light (Tenebrae) at night. It is customarily a day of solemn prayer.

On Good Friday, we are called to express utmost reverence and respect to the Lord. This can be achieved by maintaining an element of silence throughout the day. It is appropriate to minimize distractions, such as choosing not to listen to music or watch TV, driving in silence, and minimizing social media. It is an excellent spiritual practice to intentionally make it a day of quiet and reflection. Many families move a crucifix to a place of prominence in their home or rest it on a cushion next to a small lit candle. The hours of noon until three in the afternoon are especially solemn, as this was the time of Jesus' crucifixion. Catholics are urged to attend a Veneration of the Cross or Stations of the Cross prayer service during this time. Many Catholics who are unable to participate in these services make a point to either read the Passion accounts in the Gospel or watch a movie adaptation to reflect on the agony of Jesus' sacrifice and suffering.

A Prayer for Good Friday: Dear Jesus, No one knows change better than you. You died on the cross, and three days later, you rose from the dead. Forty days later, you ascended into heaven and left the world transformed for the rest of time. Help me to transform my soul, to die to sin and death, and be reborn in your love and eternal life. Amen.

Holy Saturday: No Mass is offered on Holy Saturday until the Easter Vigil. However, many churches host a short prayer service in the morning. This is an opportunity to pray Morning Prayer together as a group or a family. Many families pray the Rosary together and reflect on the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary. St. Andrew the Apostle Parish hosts a Blessing of Easter Baskets and Food at 9:00 AM and an Easter Egg Hunt for the children at 9:15 AM. Most parishes spend the morning and early afternoon preparing for the Easter Vigil. If time permits, please come to the Church to volunteer if you wish to do something special for the Lord. Holy Saturday is typically a day of preparation for Easter Sunday. Families can dye Easter Eggs, a symbol of new life, in preparation for celebrating new life in the Resurrection.

The **Easter Vigil** is the Mass celebrated on Holy Saturday Night and begins the Easter celebrations of Jesus' Resurrection. It begins with a blessed bonfire outside the Church, the lighting and procession into the Church with

the Paschal Candle, the proclamation of the Exsultet, and Old Testament readings that foretold Jesus' death and Resurrection. It is the day that new catechumens, those entering the Catholic Church, receive the Sacraments for the first time. It launches the celebration of Easter, the great Paschal Feast.

A Prayer for Holy Saturday: Dear Jesus, You are courage incarnate. As you hung on the cross for my sins and the sins of the world, you showed me that all things are possible. You knew that life did not end on the cross. It was only the beginning of a new and glorious eternal life. Amen.

Easter Sunday is a continuation of the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. It is a Holy Day of Obligation because the Mass celebrates the most important teaching in the Catholic faith - that Jesus died for our sins and rose from the dead so that we could share eternal life with him in heaven. Attending the Easter Vigil fulfills this Mass obligation. Easter reflections focus on hope and the symbols we see during Easter Vigil and Easter Mass - especially the idea of darkness into light. It's a tradition to wear new clothes to Mass. Some families bring Holy Water containers to refill from the newly blessed water in the Baptismal font.

A wonderful way for families to begin their Easter dinner is to read the account of the Resurrection in the Gospels and for each family member to mention one thing they are incredibly grateful for. Reflect on this past Lenten season and share one thing you will continue to do throughout the Easter Season to help you grow in your spiritual life. Jesus won our salvation for us! We are freed from sin! Alleluia!

Since at least the fourth century, Christianity has marked Holy Week. After the time of the persecutions, Christian emperors of both the East and West issued various decrees forbidding amusements and games. They directed that these days were spent free from worldly occupations and entirely devoted to religious exercises. Pardons were granted to those in prison, and many charges in court were dropped in honor of Christ's Passion.

In the Middle Ages, all secular business was prohibited, and the time was spent in recollection and prayer. Often, kings and rulers secluded themselves in monasteries. During some eras, no servile work was allowed during the Triduum, and the faithful were to be present at all liturgies. In 1642, Pope Urban VIII rescinded this obligation because of the changing conditions of social life.

A Prayer for Easter Sunday: Almighty Father, I thank you

for the gift of your Son, Jesus Christ, who rose from the dead and redeemed humankind. Fill us with the fire of the Holy Spirit, that we may be faithful disciples and enthusiastic witnesses of our Catholic faith. Alleluia, Christ is risen! The Lord is risen, indeed. Alleluia! Amen.

Please join us in tracing the footsteps of our Lord as we celebrate the Holiest days of our liturgical year. You are invited to make a spiritual retreat by attending the liturgies of **Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil.** Please consider making a special sacrifice to the Lord for all the good He has done for you.


CHRISM MASS 2024



We will continue to use the same recipe.

Hamburger Noodle Casserole1 cup cottage cheese1 lb. hamburger beef1 cup sour cream15 oz. can or jar tomato sauce12oz. egg noodles

1 medium chopped onion 2 cups Shredded Monterey Jack Cheese

Combine the hamburger, green pepper and onion and sauté until meat is cooked. Salt and pepper to taste. Add tomato sauce and simmer for 20 minutes. Cook noodles according to package directions. In another bowl combine sour cream and cottage cheese. Blend cottage cheese and sour cream mixture with the cooked noodles. Salt and pepper to taste. In a lightly greased aluminum pan spread the hamburger mixture. Next, layer the noodle mixture. Top casserole with shredded Monterey Jack cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until thoroughly heated. NOTE: Please freeze the casserole, cover with aluminum foil, date and label St. Andrew's "Hamburger Noodle Casserole."


