Beloved in the Lord,

We are coming to the Holiday season once more. How good it is that Our Lord should give us for marking the passing of each year so many opportunities to ponder the most important things. That we should have in the Solemn Feast of All Saints the annual remembrance of our brethren who have run the race of life well in pursuit of the Savior and now beckon to us to join them in the realm of beatitude, that we should have the spiritual instinct for gratitude to God for His providence in the yearly keeping of Thanksgiving Day, that we should seek the face of Christ Himself in those first moments of his visibility after His birth, and that the Christmas season rings in the new year, a poetic image of the New Life promised us, all indicate our nearness to heaven even as we persist in this mortal coil. May we meet these days of merriment in Faith.

This week:

<u>Wednesday:</u> Bishop Rhoades will celebrate a special Jubilee Year Mass at Sts. Peter and Paul, Huntington at 6:30pm. This is a great opportunity to pray with our bishop and to gain a plenary indulgence for the holy year. See the Jubilee Year pamphlets in the church entryway for more.

<u>Saturday:</u> All Saints Day. We will have Mass as we usually would for the First Saturday of the month at 9am. However, because All Saints Day falls on a Saturday it is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation this year.

All Souls Day

Next Sunday we will keep the annual Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed. This is a day on which we uphold a great act of charity for our beloved dead: praying that those in purgatory be sped along to eternal happiness with the Saints in Christ. We will take this opportunity to think well on the inevitability of death and what we should do to prepare for it.

Things to watch for next weekend:

Black Vestments: These have a long and venerable history of being worn by the clergy for Requiem Masses. Indeed, black clothing has been the traditional attire for mourning in the western world for centuries. Mourning and grief are appropriate reactions to death. God gave us the gift of life as a good, therefore the loss of life is a true loss worth mourning for a period. Black vestments are a sign that the Church, in compassion, mourns alongside those who have lost their loved ones.

Black vestments also indicate a penitential character of the Requiem Mass. We do not know the state of each soul when someone dies. Likely, among those of us destined for Heaven, most will need to endure purification in Purgatory. Black vestments help to remind us of that penitential reality: that we can and should offer worthy sacrifices for the dead as a final act of love for them.

Music: At the 9am Mass, the music will be appropriate to the more sorrowful character of the day. We will use a simpler chanted Kyrie eleison, English chanted Gloria from the Missal, and the Latin chants from the missal for the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) and Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), which have heard used before at our parish. As usual, we will sing the propers for the day from the Pew Missal and add appropriate hymnody in between.

Incense (at 9am Mass): To accompany our prayers for the dead, that they may be a sweet fragrance offered to God.

Book of the Names of the Dead: Last year we introduced a book for inscribing the names of those who have died. This will be found once again adjacent to the St. Joseph shrine in the Church. I suggest writing the names of family or friends who have died in the last year, i.e. since last November. This book will remain out for you to inscribe new names from All Souls Day until Advent.
