Julian Sommer

Julian Sommer is a 24 year-old cellist and Davis native. After taking his first year of lessons with Kimberly Cole Feeney through the public elementary school program, Julian studied with Julie Hochman until he left Davis to study music at UC Santa Cruz. While at UCSC Julian performed in the Resident String Quartet, served as principal cellist in the university orchestra, and won the university's concerto competition leading to a performance of the Saint-Saens Cello Concerto. These accolades, along with his academic achievements, culminated in him

graduating with highest honors in the music major. Julian now studies with Andrew Luchansky and is pursuing a Performer's Certificate from California State University, Sacramento School of Music. There he serves as co-principal cellist in the university's orchestra. At CSU Sacramento he won the Saturday Club Prize - a scholarship award given to the university's most distinguished student performers. Julian also taught in the university's String Project, a nationally regarded program where college students teach inner-city children under the guidance of master teacher Judy Bossuat-Gallic. Julian's most recent recital can be seen here. He can also be heard playing on <u>Bells</u> - an album of compositions by contemporary composer John Paul Labno.

Our upcoming Sacramento Section Spring recital will be in an online format. Everyone is welcome to participate. We encourage performers of all ages and ability levels. Participating instruments include violin, viola, cello, string bass, harp and guitar. Your music instructor must be a member of ASTA. Performers will need tocreate a YouTube account and create a video on YouTube. Please read the following information to participate.

- The deadline for the application form is Monday, April 26 (postmark). See application form for details.
- The deadline for emailing the link to the online video uploaded to YouTube (unlisted or listed) to the Sacramento ASTA President at kcolefeeney@gmail.com is Friday, May 7 at 11:59 pm. Please see below for details and instructions.
- The recital program with the link to each performance will be emailed to all recital participants and Sacramento Section ASTA members on Sunday, May 9th at 2pm. Please also be sure to provide the participating teachers and students email addresses on the recital application.

Please fill out the recital application and send the completed form and check to Kimberly Feeney, 28 Batavia Ct. Sacramento, CA 95835 by postal mail. **Deadline for the application is Monday, April 26 (postmark). You may also fill out the application online by going to this link.**

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Please note: Checks must be mailed separately if using the online application.

Video submission guidelines

- 1) Dress should be formal. Music does not need to be memorized, but it is encouraged with the exception of sonatas and chamber music.
- 2) The video recording must be made with one fixed camera angle, focused on the performer(s) with face and hands of performer visible at about 6ft-8ft away from the camera. Their entire body should be clearly visible on the screen throughout the performance.
- 3) The video recording must be unaltered and unedited.
- 4) The participant must appear dressed in video as they would in a live recital.
- 5) Check video for sound and visual quality before uploading.
- 6) Send the student's name and a link to their YouTube upload (unlisted or listed) to the Sacramento President via email at kcolefeeney@gmail.com. This email with student's name and video link address is due Friday, May 7 at 11:59pm. Please be sure to receive a confirmation email or try again.
