RevVibes: What the Church Is Really For

Every so often, someone will say to me, “Pastor Vicki, I’m worried. Worship attendance isn’t what it used to be.” And I understand that concern. Many of us remember seasons when the sanctuary felt fuller, when the pews held familiar faces who are no longer with us—some because they have moved or passed away, some because of the cultural change the church went through when we became a Reconciling congregation, and still others who never grasped the importance of becoming deeply engaged in the life of discipleship.

But here is the truth I want us to hold gently and clearly: a church’s health is not measured by how many people sit in the pews on a Sunday morning. It is measured by its faithfulness to Christ’s call to love, serve, welcome, and transform its community...By that measure, People’s UMC is doing extraordinarily well.

Look around. We have a thriving Preschool and 4K program nurturing young minds and supporting families who depend on us. We host a Wednesday Night Community Supper that welcomes not just our congregation but our neighbors—people who need a meal, companionship, or simply a place to belong. We open our building to groups, ministries, and community needs because we believe our space is not meant to be guarded—it is meant to be shared.

This is the work Jesus asked of the Church. As Jesus said, “The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve” (Mark 10:45). Not to count heads, but to wash feet. Not to cling to the past, but to meet the needs of the present. Not to fear scarcity, but to live generously out of God’s abundance.



Attendance numbers may tell us something, but they do not tell the whole story. They do not reveal the kindness offered in the Gathering Space, the prayers whispered for hurting neighbors, the children learning in our classrooms—whether during the week or on Sunday mornings—the meals served with dignity, or the ministries that quietly change lives. I want us to be a people who look not at what we fear losing but at what God is creating among us.

A people who recognize that the church does not exist for us alone, but for the world God loves.

And as we remember that calling, may we hold this truth close: the greater community does not exist for the church—rather, the church exists for the greater community.

So as we enter this new year, I invite us to trust the path we are on. To celebrate the ways People’s UMC is alive, vibrant, and serving with purpose. And to remember that the truest measure of a church is not its numbers—it is its heart.

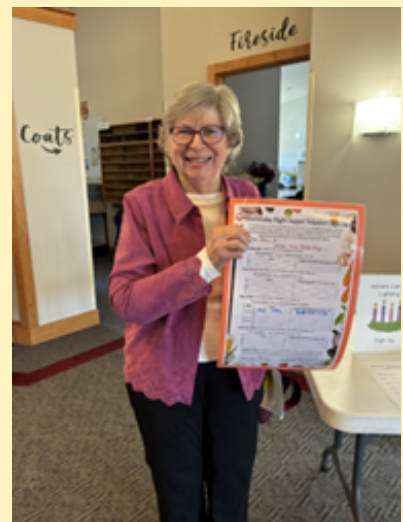

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.



Our congregation's finance committee has selected the Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues,



we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

January Mission of the Month: Shelter from the Storm Ministries

The Missions Committee has selected Shelter from the Storm Ministries (SFTSM) to be the Mission of the Month during January 2026. SFTSM is a Transitional Living Program for homeless, single mothers and their minor children.

Residents are offered a safe, stable environment where families can take a breath and regain confidence to grow and thrive. Support includes physical resources, individualized case-management, a faith-based environment, prayer, and community. Volunteers help the organization carry out its mission.

The ministry was founded by a group of believers from local churches who were moved by the alarming number of homeless students in the Sun Prairie area, with a mission of walking alongside single mothers as they break the cycle of poverty—empowering them to build a stable, hope-filled future for themselves and their children.

The wholistic approach centers around:

- Education and employment
- Health and wellness
- Spiritual growth
- Legal support
- Parenting and relationships
- Financial literacy
- Life skills



A plan is created for each family to help them meet their goals and be ready to transition to independence in 12 months. Mothers must be committed to making change and adhering to program requirements.

Book club is on winter break, staying home reading books to recommend for the club

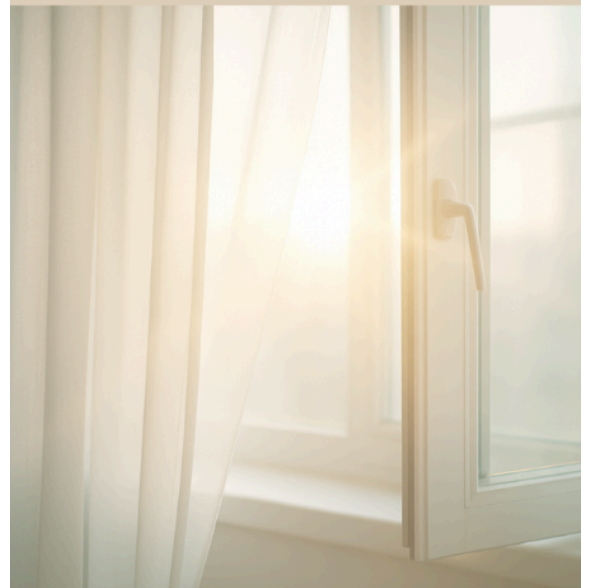


to read next year. This year we have decided to read a classic book over our break. *The Great Gatsby*, by F. Scott Fitzgerald.
