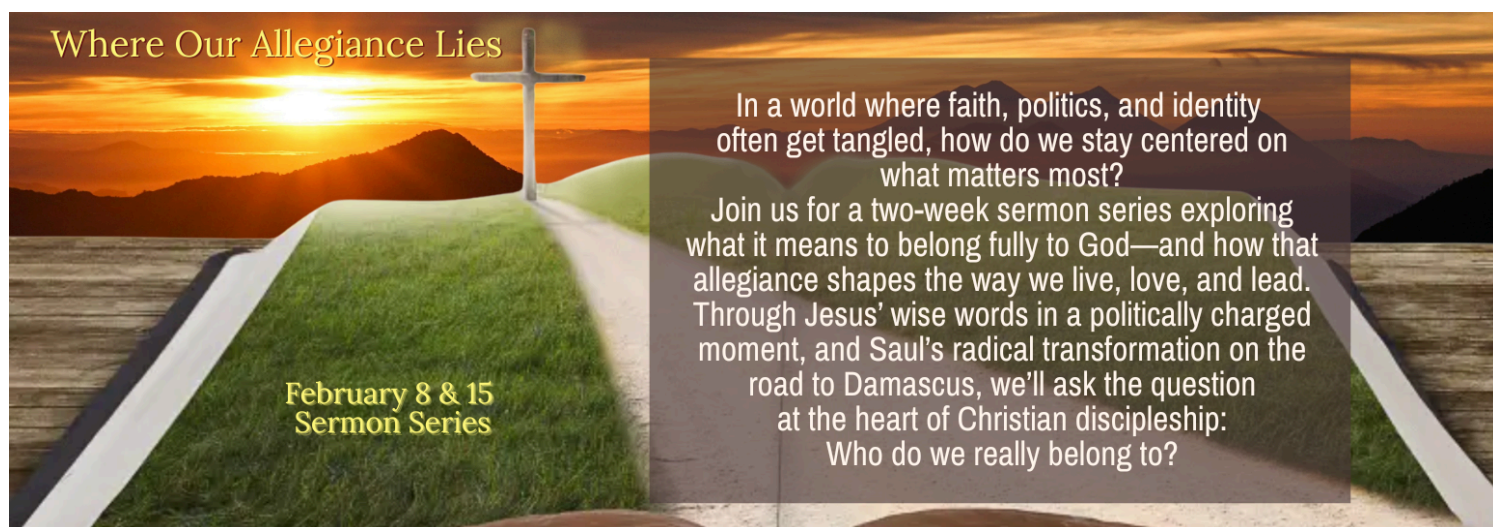


Sundays

Revyvibes: Naming the Challenge of Christian Nationalism

Loving one's country is not the same thing as Christian nationalism—and the church must be clear about the difference.

Christian nationalism is the belief that the United States is, or should be, a distinctly Christian nation and that Christianity should be closely tied to national identity and political power. While it often uses religious language, Christian nationalism is not the same as the Christian faith. In fact, it risks distorting the gospel.

Jesus was explicit: “My kingdom is not from this world” (John 18:36). He refused to align God's reign with political authority. He did not seek control, demand loyalty to a nation, or privilege one group over another. Instead, he called his followers to love their neighbors, welcome the stranger, care for the vulnerable, and practice humility and mercy.

History warns us about what happens when faith and nationalism become fused. During World War II, the U.S. War Department cautioned Americans that movements combining nationalism with moral or religious certainty often gain power by dividing people, appealing to fear, and wrapping themselves in patriotic language while undermining democratic values. These warnings were not about one party or one moment in time—they described patterns that repeat whenever power is confused with righteousness.



Christian nationalism follows those patterns when:

- Christianity is used to draw lines of belonging rather than extend grace
- Disagreement is treated as disloyalty
- God's name is invoked to justify exclusion, fear, or domination
- National identity is elevated above love of neighbor

The danger of Christian nationalism is not only political. It is deeply spiritual. When Christianity is tied to nationalism, the cross is overshadowed by the flag. Jesus' call to love enemies is softened. The command to welcome the stranger becomes conditional. Faith shifts from following Christ to defending a way of life.

Scripture reminds us that “our citizenship is in heaven” (Philippians 3:20). That does not remove us from civic responsibility, but it does shape how we engage it. Our ultimate allegiance is to Christ—not to any nation, ideology, or political movement.

At People's Church, we will not all agree on politics—and that is not our goal. Our calling is to remain rooted in Jesus, to resist fear, to reject hatred, and to practice a faith marked by love, humility, and courage. The church is at its best not when it claims power, but when it bears witness.

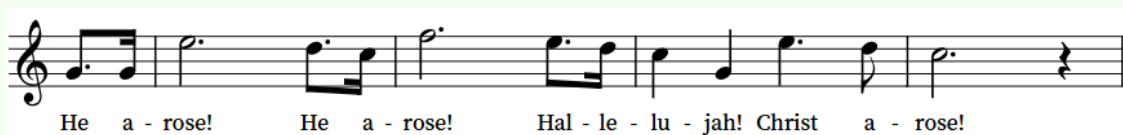
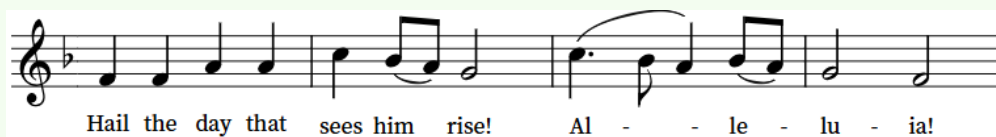
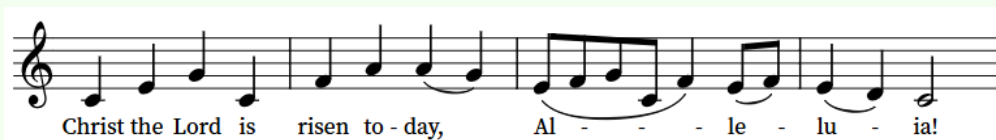
Musical Notes

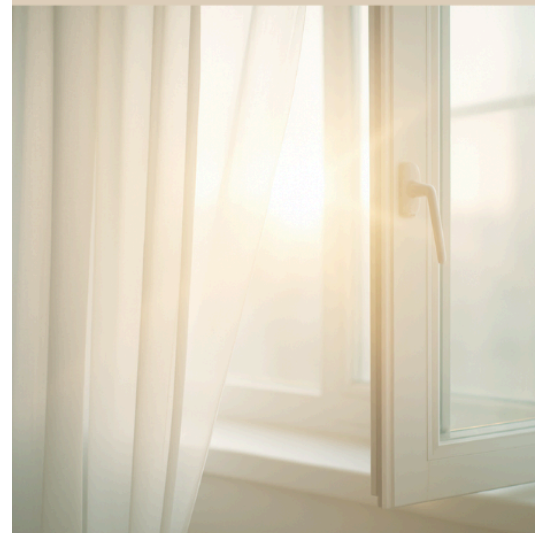
Volunteer Wanted in the Sound Booth

Adventures in E-Payments

While I'm old enough to remember paying all my bills with checks, now I pay those bills electronically. The one monthly payment I still make by check has been my monthly giving to People's United Methodist Church. I've seen the "GIVING" button on the church's website but, I guess, because this is a payment I make because I want to instead of because I have to, I have not considered that I could make this payment electronically.

I know that electronic payments are more convenient, secure and generally simple to set up. When I was reminded recently about this option I decided to see if I could successfully set up my monthly monetary gifts to Peoples Church. It was easy and intuitive. I simply went to the website, selected "GIVING" and the system prompted me through the process. In under 15 minutes I was able to set up my giving to General Giving, Paving the Way and Building Maintenance.

It was possible to give via debit or credit card or directly from bank account. As with my other electronic payments, I chose to pay via credit card. The information I needed to provide, along with the normal credit card information was whether I wanted to make a one-time payment or pay periodically. I chose periodically and was given a number of choices, including my choice of monthly. I had to specify the amount and the category to which I wanted my gift to go. I chose the start date and was able to specify an end date.

Easy-peasy, and now when I am up at the cabin watching the snow fly or watching the neighbors go by on their 4-wheelers, I don't need to figure out whether to hang on to the check until I get back home or send it US mail. The payment to People's Church is secure and will happen on the day I specified. And perhaps a little less work for all involved as there is no writing, sending, deciphering how to apply, endorsing or depositing of checks.

Assisting Immigrants Initiative: People's UMC hosted a training program for anyone in the community or general public to learn about how to assist immigrants in different volunteering ways. Training Date was January 17, 2026 from 10-Noon, sponsored by the Oregon Area Immigrant Support Network. 85 people attended and People's provided beverages.

Active Shooter Training was presented on January 11, after worship here at People's, for anyone interested in attending. The audience learned how to protect themselves and others in a shooting incident.
