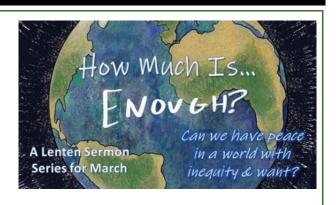

Dan's Musings: Eastering

Can you believe it is almost Easter already? This year is flying by; mild winter temps and an early Easter make it feel later than we think. Easter is one of the most important Christian observances in the Christian year, celebrated from the years immediately following Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension (longer than Christmas and Pentecost have been celebrated). We view Easter as an event and generally celebrate it on one special day each year, yet the early church viewed Easter more as an adjective than a noun, something we might term today Eastering.



One apt analogy for Eastering would be finding out you're going to have a baby. The news is so exciting and epic that you are bursting to share the good news. You might start slowly, but before you know it, you are telling everyone, even perfect strangers, yet everyone joins you in your joy and excitement. You bask in the good will as well as the good news.

Eastering was one of the very earliest forms of evangelism, even predating the term gospel and the emphasis on the birth of Christ. Paul was a primary Easterer (it is really fun playing with the word Easter), sharing the story of Jesus' crucifixion, death, and resurrection—especially his own encounter with the risen Jesus—with everyone he met, whether they wanted to hear it or not. It was as if Paul could not control himself. The news was so fantastic he simply couldn't keep it to himself.



What would an Eastering orientation look like today? Many modern Christians are somewhat embarrassed and uncomfortable talking about their faith. Evangelism has gained a bad name through the efforts of some Christians who try to force their views, who operate from a judgmental and exclusionary base, and who present a very immature and simplistic vision of the Christian life. Rational skepticism has grown huge, and many do not feel adequately equipped to get into deep reli-

gious conversations. But that isn't Eastering. Eastering isn't selling anything; it is merely sharing. Easter people today don't need to tell anyone else how they ought to live. We should develop comfort with sharing what we believe and why it is important to us. We need to find a way to tell our own faith story, to let others know that we draw from a well of faith and tradition of spirituality.

We can also engage in Eastering by working to be effective peacemakers. The gift of Easter, the assurance through resurrection that we worship the Son of God who grants us forgiveness and gives us life, makes it unnecessary to argue, debate, fight, or attack. We can stand in the confidence of a life-shaping, life-affirming belief system that we can offer as a gift rather than an ultimatum. Moving beyond noun and adjective, we can become a verb. We can Easter others through our values, behaviors, and beliefs. Patience, acts of kindness, generous giving, loving gestures, forgiveness, and nonviolent protest can be ways we Easter others.

So, as we move into spring, let's go out and Easter some people. You might enjoy it a lot!

Deep Dive March/April/May: Peacemaker's Toolkit—Practice, Practice

Sunday morning's 15 minutes following morning worship, Deep Dive Adult Spiritual Formation Group meets in the Fireside Room for learning and fellowship. In February, the Deep Dive group was introduced to the tools in the Peacemaker's Toolkit: the Power of Composure, the Power of Questions, and the Power of Listening. In March, April, and May,



we will give a month to each of the three power tools, learning how to use them, how to improve their use, and how to apply them in different settings.

On March 10 (no Deep Dive on March 3), we will have tools training on the Power of Composure. We will learn and practice a number of calming, focusing, balancing, adapting techniques, as well as engage in some fun role play, scenario discussions, "what if...?" sessions. It doesn't matter if you didn't attend in Feb-

ruary; it doesn't matter if you can't come every week. This year we are focusing on peace, peacemaking, and the vision for peace in our world. In April, we will deal with the Power of Questions, and in May, the Power of Listening.

Anderson Park Friends, Inc. is an award-winning nonprofit organization working with the Dane County Parks Division to develop, protect, preserve, and enhance beautiful Anderson Farm County Park. This 300-acre park is located at 914 Union Road within the Town of Oregon and on the southern boundary of the Village of Oregon. The organization's more than 210 members live in Oregon, Brooklyn, and surrounding townships (Town of Oregon, Rutland, and Dunn).

There are so many ways to get involved in this park project! Volunteers meet the second Saturday of each month at 8:00am; see more details on their <u>website</u>. Projects include a Community Garden and an Oregon Area Food Pantry Garden. The organization entered its

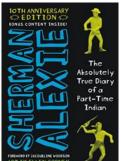
Civil Conversations Facilitator Training: Saturday, April 6, 9:00–2:00

Banned Books Club: March & April



Our Thursday morning Zoom Banned Books Club is growing in participants and enthusiasm. We will meet **March 7** to discuss Sherman Alexie's book, **The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian**.

On April 4, we will explore Mike Curato's book, *Flamer*, the most banned book in the state of Wisconsin.

The pattern of the discussion is to begin sharing personal thoughts on what we found valuable or worthwhile about the book, any discomfort or struggles we had with what we read, why or why not we think the book is problematic, rea-

sons people have given to ban the book, and to talk about the impact censorship has on learning and development. Prayer Beads and Social Justice

Social Justice is a complicated, bigger-than-life topic. It can be exhausting, spiraling our emotions from anger to hope to despair. We may be involved in letter-writing campaigns, protesting, marching, knocking on doors, and confronting. Even with all that effort, we may find ourselves feeling helpless and defeated. This is when we need to stop, take a breath, and pray.

During a recent Sunday morning children's time, Pam McIntyre reminded us of the power of prayer. She showed us her circle of prayer beads and explained how keeping them in her pocket reminds her to pray for others and to pray for peace. She gave the children circles with just 3 beads because, really, we only need to say three things when we talk to God.

- The first bead: We always need to thank God for loving us.
- The second bead: Thank God for always being with us.
- The third bead: Ask God to help us be kind to everyone.

You might ask what prayer beads have to do with social justice. As we journey through the year with our theme of peacemaking, this may be the time to begin a spiritual practice to help us be grateful and gracious.

This is not about being *nice* or ignoring the unkind words and actions we hear and see. We will continue to confront some uncomfortable situations, but asking God's help to be kind will encourage us to practice social justice and live out our peacemaker vows every day. This world is often a place of injustice. Taking some time to practice kindness can help us shine light and hope into dark places.

Project Recovery Crisis Counseling by Phone—Counselors are providing crisis counseling by phone free of charge, focusing on nonjudgmental listening and helping navigate emotions and reactions to stress caused by the public health crisis.
