What's hanging at St. Andrew's?

You may have noticed that we hang different flags in the front windows of the church, but do you know what they represent? Currently, we have two flags- the Two-Spirit Flag and the Every Child Matters Flag; here is what they signify:



Two-Spirit: An Indigenous-specific term used by some Indigenous people to self-identify. While the term itself is Anishinaabe-based, it has been taken up by different Indigenous nations to describe complex experiences and identities as well as cultural roles and responsibilities. Two Spirit can sometimes refer to sexual orientation and at other times to gender identity, depending on the individual and/or their particular nation. It can also describe roles and responsibilities specific to different Indigenous nations, sometimes tied to gender identity and/or sexual orientation, and sometimes not. The flag was created in 2026, and the two feathers at the center represent masculine and feminine

identities. The circle to which the feathers are attached represent the unification of masculinity and femininity into a separate, unique gender. Its placement in front of the rainbow flag signifies explicit inclusion of two-spirit experiences in the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

Also, on display is the Every Child Matters Flag. The orange background symbolizes the impact of the residential school system on Indigenous communities. The eagle feather honours and recognizes all the children forced into the Indian Residential School. The phrase "Every Child Matters" is a tribute to the innocent lives lost and carries a profound message.



Short reminders of our history for this Centennial year continue...



Throughout 2025, we'll be featuring very short stories about United Church history. Many thanks to Gayle Simonson, a lay member of the United Church at Southminster Steinhauer in Edmonton, an experienced history researcher, and a writer who has written for historical journals and UCC publications. She is a key volunteer in the United Church archives for both Northern Spirit and Chinook Winds. Gayle's generosity means that we'll have frequent reminders of our history with a focus on ordinary people.

Rev. Thomas Richard Davies was ordained in Alberta in 1930 and served in Ponoka and Stettler before being called to Highlands United Church in Edmonton in 1940. As a military chaplain in Europe 1942-1945 he was deeply moved by the events of war and the devastation he experienced. He began collecting pieces of stained glass from the shattered churches he saw through France, Germany and Holland, and carefully labeled each with its original location. On his return to Highlands, 24 pieces were incorporated into a memorial window, the glass surrounding a list of members lost during the war. Highlands website records the image and story for all to share in this tribute to the terrible losses of war.

Framed by Creation

Waterton United Church rests in the heart of Waterton Lakes National Park in Alberta, where wind brushes the tall grass and mountains rise like blessings above the lake. Surrounded by breathtaking natural beauty, the church is a place of welcome, wonder, and worship. A sanctuary within a sanctuary.

The United Church has had a presence in the park since 1955. The current building, dedicated in 1961, was thoughtfully designed to honour its setting. Architect George Watson positioned the sanctuary's great cathedral window to frame Mount Vimy, inviting

creation into every service.

"People who aren't involved in the church but just stop to visit look out, captivated by the view of the mountain over the lake," says Carol Watt, Secretary. "It's a special thing that happens. It touches something deep within."

Your gifts through Mission and Service help keep the church open year-round for youth group sleep-overs, weddings, meetings, occasional workshops, and retreats. In the summer, guest ministers and musicians arrive weekly to lead worship from late June through September, filling the sanctuary with inspired voices and music that echoes across the valley. The church hosts youth retreats, weddings, and spiritual gatherings, and with a small room and kitchenette tucked behind the sanctuary, it also welcomes leaders seeking quiet and renewal.

"Providing space for reflection and retreat is an important aspect of the ministry we offer," Watt shares.

A newsletter captures the heart of it: "Waterton United offers a unique ministry to the wealth of summer visitors who flock happily into the national park and then find this gem of a United Church of Canada."

As The United Church of Canada celebrates its 100th Anniversary, the Pastoral Care Committee will be spearheading the production of a new Church Pictorial Directory.

IPC Canada Photo Services Inc. will be taking photos and producing the Directory. We are scheduled to have our pictures taken on Thursday, September 25; Friday, September 26; and Saturday, September 27, 2025.

Scheduled hours will be 2:30 – 8:30PM on Thursday and Friday, and 9:30AM – 3:00PM on Saturday.

Pastoral Care will schedule all photo appointments (a sign up sheet will be on the HUB over the summer). Please sign up early to get the best appointment time for your family! We will require volunteers to help with hosting the photography sessions throughout the 3 days (perhaps 2-3 hour shifts – again, a signup sheet will be made available on the HUB). This is to greet families and to fill out sitting forms supplied by the photographer.

The selection of the directory pose and the portrait viewing will follow shortly after your photography session (One convenient appointment), sign a general release, and have the opportunity to purchase portraits (no obligation). There is no cost to have pictures taken, and a free directory is included with your sitting. Your only cost will be for any portraits you may choose to buy. Remember, portraits make great Christmas presents!

As a congregation, we have the choice of including addresses and phone numbers in the back of the directory. Each member has the choice for their information to be included or not. This is what the confidentiality forms are for. In these times of privacy, you may be inclined not to have your personal information printed, other than your name under your picture. Let me repeat: The Choice is yours to be made at the time of your sitting.

A Pictorial Directory is a handy way to connect names with faces and is a lasting keepsake to enjoy and share with future generation. It helps build and strengthen our faith community and is a valuable reference for our church family. It is a way to acknowledge and celebrate our history as a member or adherent to St. Andrew's United Church in 2025.

We will not be doing a mass calling out to people, so if you wish to join in this anniversary celebration, please stop in and sign up to get your picture taken. Alternatively, please call Joanne in the church office to make your appointment. Should you choose not to have a picture included, you can still have your name and personal info included.
