Dodge County Fair Open Class General Rules and Regulations

Exhibiting is done at exhibitor's own risk. Dodge County Fair Association works to ensure building security and exhibit maintenance during the Fair, but is not responsible for lost, damaged, stolen, or harmed exhibits.

Eligibility: Open Class entries are open to all. ***Open Class entries open Monday, June 22.***

Entry Requirements:

Entries may be submitted online or via paper copy to the Dodge County Fair Office.

To submit via paper copy: Complete entry form provided in the Fair Book and submit it to the Fair Office in person or via US mail (Dodge County Fair PO 654 Beaver Dam, WI 53916)

To submit online: Go to dodgecountyfair.fairentry.com and create an account. Follow on screen directions to submit entries. Payment for online entries must be with credit card (no credit card fees apply). Additional how-to documents available on the Dodge County Fair website.

PAPER COPY ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED BY FRIDAY, JULY 24.

ONLINE ENTRIES MUST BE SUBMITTED BY FRIDAY, JULY 24 at 11:59PM.

There will be NO additions or changes after this deadline after the July 24 deadline. Entry tags will be available for pick up from the Fair Office after the deadline. Please contact the Fair Office to verify your tags are available for pick up. If you wish to have your tags mailed to you, please provide a self-addressed, prestamped envelope.

The open class entry fee is \$30 per exhibitor and includes an exhibitor season's pass. A \$5 stall fee is charged for each dairy and beef cattle entry (department 201 and 202). Complete payment, including all applicable stall fees, must be received prior to exhibitors receiving their entry tags and exhibitor season's pass. All animal exhibitors must provide an accurate Premise ID. Exhibitors may only enter and show ONE item per lot number (exceptions noted in specific departments).

****Note:** Junior Entry Information is available in a separate premium book

Exhibit Drop Off:

Exhibitors may drop off their items beginning at 9:00am on Tuesday of Fair week, also known as Entry Day. All exhibits MUST be taken to their applicable departments with entry tags attached by 7:00pm on Entry Day. Any exhibits brought after this time will not be allowed to remain on display and will not be judged.

Exhibit Release:

All exhibits, including animals, must remain in place until 6:00pm on Sunday of the Fair. Exhibits removed prior may have premium money withheld. Adjustment to release time may be made at

Fair Board discretion (pending inclement weather, human and animal health, or other extreme situation).

Judging:

Please see judging schedule for specific judging times and locations. Exhibitors are encouraged to attend judging sessions, but should refrain from identifying their entries until the judging has been completed.

Judging is done by state accredited judges on dates as noted in each department.

The decision of the judge will be final in all cases except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of the award is proven. No premiums are given for exhibits not listed in the premium book. If original entry tag has been altered, that item will be disqualified and will not be judged.

Premium Payment:

Premiums are set with guidance from Administrative Code, Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection, Chapter ATCP-160, County and District Fairs. All premiums are paid by the Dodge County Fair Association via check. Premium checks can be picked up from the Fair Office on Sunday of the Fair when exhibitors pick up their entries. Entries may not be removed before 6:00pm, but should be picked up by 8:00pm on Sunday of the Fair, as the Fair Association will not be responsible any later.

Electrical Safety in the Animal Barns

No electrical equipment and cords will be allowed to come in contact with any animal pen or contact area. All cords must have factory molded ends no replacement ends allowed. Cords will be free of nicks, frays, missing jacket. Cords will be inspected by superintendents and marked with means provided by Dodge County Fair Association. Cords on electrical equipment brought into the barns like fans would also need inspection and approval by Superintendents and marked with means provided by Dodge County Fair Association. Only Equipment and Cords inspected and approved will be allowed on premises.

- Exhibitors may enter up to 2 animals in each lot number, but can only show 1 animal in each lot number
- Open Class Dairy Cattle Show Catalogue Information must accompany entry form. If submitting entries online, all information must be entered with online entries.
- Premise ID must be provided.
- All animals must be entered in advance.
- 840 Tags will be required in the ears of all dairy animals
- Review DATCP health rules.
- All breed exhibitors meeting with the Dairy Cattle Superintendent will be held on Sunday of the Fair at 1:30pm in the barn.
- No space in the Dairy Barns will be allocated for clipping animals. Charging junior exhibitors for clipping services is discouraged. Professionals wishing to provide such services shall purchase space outside the barns from the Superintendent of Privileges.
- No electrical equipment and cords will be allowed to come in contact with any animal pen or contact area. All cords must have factory molded ends no replacement ends allowed. Cords will be free of nicks, frays, missing jacket. Cords will be inspected by superintendents and marked with means provided by Dodge County Fair Association. Cords on electrical equipment brought into the barns like fans would also need inspection and approval by Superintendents and marked with means provided by Dodge County Fair Association. Only Equipment and Cords inspected and approved will be allowed on premises.
- Junior Exhibitor's may show registered dairy animals (any lots) in the Open Show. The animal(s) must be entered separately with Open Show registration and applicable entry and stall fees paid.
- There will be stricter guidelines on straw and hay can be in the barn. Storage space will be limited.
- **Registration papers must accompany each animal and be checked before animals enter the show ring.**

Please text or call 920.296.7012 to confirm that you will have an entry to pick up. Confirmation of the text or phone call will be made by the superintendent. We will pick up your contest entries (entry forms, fees, and cheese/butter) at your company location on August 14 in the morning.

Judging: Monday, August 17, 1:00pm

Guidelines:

- Exhibits must be truly characteristic of the varieties they represent, show quality, be free from disease, and the net weight of the entry is to be shown on the entry form
- Exhibits under “any other variety” need to have their true name noted on the entry form and tag
- Cheese/butter entries will be picked up at the address provided to the superintendent
 - Please have entry forms properly filled out and \$30 entry fee at time of pick up
 - Checks made payable to Dodge County Fair
 - Your exhibitor’s pass will be given to you on the day of entry pick up
- Entries will be secured in a cooler at a local cheese manufacturer until time of judging
- Entry must contain at least 5 pounds of product in its original form unless note in the class
- Note: if you enter cheese in more than one class, each entry must be at least 5-pound weight. Because of limited display space, cheese made in the regular 40-pound block may be cut and exhibited in a 5-pound piece. This is a special privilege granted to you.
- Cheese/butter shall be judged on a standard scale as identified by WDATCP by cheese type (as it fits into a category for a small-scale county fair).
- All cheese/butter shall be stamped showing state made by month and year.
- Cheese previously tested with a trier shall not be considered as an exhibit for a premium. Such cheese shall be entitled to a complimentary score only. Exception made for Swiss cheese which may have one plug hole.
