EcoWB in Action: New Project Update







Helping Great Green Macaws Take Flight in

Costa Rica

Earlier this year, the MacawRecoveryNetwork (MRN) in northern Costa Rica reached out to us for targeted volunteer support as they head into a the world's rarest parrots, with fewer than a thousand left in the wild. Their

pivotal season for the Great Green Macaw (Ara ambiguus ambiguus)—one of goal: to give these birds the best possible chance of survival and rebuild the forest they depend on. MRN's captive-bred macaws are being prepared for carefully timed releases into protected habitat, with close follow-up to learn which sites and conditions

are most favorable. At the same time, MRN is reconnecting fragmented forests by planting native trees and working with local landowners. They're also developing community programs with 'Junior Rangers' clubs for school children and a women-led ranger initiative. EcoWB is actively recruiting experienced volunteers to support MRN's release days and post-release checks; restoration specialists to advise what to plant where so new corridors can function; and educators to co-create lesson materials and train local teachers for programs run under local leadership.

We're also scoping simple monitoring and project-management tools to help the team track progress without extra paperwork. If you're interested in volunteering, head over to our volunteer pages to signup or explore current project opportunities.



Facts About the Great Green Macaw!

- An estimated 500-1,000 left in the world with 400-600 in Costa Rica.
- Classified as Critically Endangered on the IUCN Red List. Main cause of population decline is loss of forest habitat—in particular the destruction of Mountain Almond trees for timber, which the macaws
- rely on for feeding and nesting. They form long-term pair bonds and nest in tree cavities—typically raising just 1–2 chicks a year.

Draper Natural History Museum in Cody, Wyoming—a museum dedicated to the natural history and conservation of the Greater Yellowstone region. Her legacy continues through **The Nancy-Carroll Draper Charitable Foundation**, which has generously agreed to match up to \$33,000 in funds we raise to secure a critical land lease for 5,000 hectares of forest in Somié, Cameroon—where EcoWB volunteers and our local partners at CBBM are already doing remarkable work to protect endangered

Nancy-Carroll Draper was a lifelong

conservationist who believed deeply in the power of education and research to inspire

chimpanzees, pangolins, and other species. But the land itself remains vulnerable. Without securing the lease, the forest

could still be exploited by loggers, poachers, and outside interests—putting years of community-led conservation work, and the future of these endangered species, at risk. The total cost to secure the land is \$66,000, and we have until the end of the year to raise the remaining \$33,000 and unlock the foundation's generous \$33,000 matching grant. 
