Pastor Tom's Message

A New Vision + A Fresh Hope

Proverbs 29:18 reminds us that "without a vision, the people perish." There is something about a new vision that gives us fresh hope for the future. On the first day of May, the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church in cooperation with The Connectional Table, our denomination's main coordinating body, publicly released the text of a new vision statement for our 12.5 Million member world-wide denomination. The text of their press release was as follows: "The vision states:

The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections.

This vision statement complements the Church's longstanding mission statement, inspired by Matthew 28:18-20: "The mission of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

The vision encourages United Methodists to embody the following principles:

- Love Boldly: Passionately love God and, like Jesus, embrace and include people of every age, nation, race, gender and walk of life. Inspired by Matthew 22:37-39 and John 13:34-35
- Serve Joyfully: With a Christ-like heart, journey alongside the most vulnerable, offering care and compassion with joy.
 Inspired by Psalm 100:1, Nehemiah 8:10, John 13:14-15 and 1 Peter 4:10
- Lead Courageously: Follow Jesus' example by resisting and dismantling all systems of evil, injustice, and oppression, striving for peace, justice and reconciliation.

Inspired by Joshua 1:9 and Ephesians 6:10

"This is a Kairos moment in the life of The United Methodist Church. This new vision is not simply a statement or a plan, it is a catalyst for transformation," said Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, President of the Council of Bishops. "It is a vision that will help the Church embrace the divine opportunities before us, to follow where God is leading us, and to more fully engage in our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

I love it when our church's teaching is memorable and practical! I encourage all of us to consider ways in which we might love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously. You can be sure that in the midst of this Summer's muchanticipated times of rest and relaxation, our church leadership will be considering ways in which this vision might become reality in our own community.

Dr. Ward is a member of MLUMC, chair of the Education Committee, and Sunday School teacher. Congratulations!


WELCOME NEW MEMBERS

Richard Campbell



MLUMC LONG STANDING FOOD MINISTRIES CONTINUE TO NOURISH BOTH BODY AND SOUL

Four (4) long-standing food ministries fall under the umbrella of the Missions and Outreach Committee, most notably the Food Pantry, the Northside Lunch, the Food Lift, and the East End Cooperative Ministries Dinner.



• The Food Pantry (led by Liz DiPietro and Tom Wagner) has been in existence for over 20 years and provides perishable and non-perishable items twice a month to approximately sixty families (totaling 160 individuals) in our surrounding communities. The Food Pantry's reach increased during 2024 when it added families involved with the fledging Spanish ministry that our Church is sponsoring.

- The Northside Lunch (led by Louanne Baily and Francie Robb) has been in existence for over 40 years and provides lunch on the first Thursday of every month to approximately 150 impoverished individuals in the North Side neighborhood. During the height of Covid, these lunches were supplemented with sanitary and protective supplies. The late Bishop George and wife Carolyn were two of the longest tenured volunteers.
- The Food Lift (led by Don Langston and Monica Kao) has been in existence for over 15 years and receives/distributes perishable food items daily (year-round), not only to our Food Pantry but also to churches and social service organizations in economically challenged neighborhoods throughout the Pittsburgh area. The Food Lift also supports a monthly food distribution (third Tuesday of every month) by the Beulah Baptist Church in the Beltzhoover neighborhood.
- The East End Cooperative Ministries Dinner (led by Rob Spicher and Betsy Raynor) has been in existence for over 30 years and provides dinner on a bi-monthly basis (4th Sunday of the "even" months) to the EECM housing/social service facility in the East Liberty neighborhood. The dinner feeds approximately fifty residents transitioning from homelessness, addictions, and incarcerations.



In addition to the folks mentioned, many other volunteers contribute their time and talents to these food ministries to ensure their success and sustainability. MLUMC is certainly making a positive impact on the lives of all whom these food ministries touch, both recipients and volunteers alike.

BREAKING BREAD

Food Lift volunteers provide food for people in need and receive spiritual nourishment in return.

Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread.

1 Corinthians 10:17

It's 4 o'clock in the afternoon at the Breadworks Bakery on Pittsburgh's North Side. The bakery is closed to those purchasing bread, but remaining open to those collecting bread donations. Volunteers from MLUMC's Food Lift are there.

Bob Festor and James Hanson of the Food Lift are loading loaves, rolls, buns and special breads into king-sized plastic bags. The bags will be delivered to Beulah Baptist Church for their food distribution, serving over one hundred families in need. Food Lift volunteers will then return to the Breadworks at least one more time during the week to collect breads for other charities and pantries distributing food. "This bread is like the Bread of Life," says Bob Festor. "It's helpful to so many people." While charities can see the effect the food has on those in need, Bob speaks of how the Food Lift has touched him, "It's knowing that you are doing your part to help others in need - it is a blessing."

Volunteer James Hanson explains how collecting and delivering food to hungry people has addressed his concerns, "Food going to waste is enough to make me lose it. I'm doing my part to make sure this food doesn't get wasted." He shares what volunteering has meant to him, "I have a lot to be thankful for and my time with the Food Lift reminds me of all I have."

"I love working with the Food Lift!" That's how volunteer Keith Ray sums up his experience. Like most Food Lift volunteers, Keith has collected bread items from the Breadworks as well as from other bakeries. Volunteers also pick up and deliver donated food from groceries and restaurants. However, what Keith loves most is not the food, but the people. "I have so many interactions with so many people every time I pick-up and every time I deliver. When I arrive with a carfull of bread for Jubilee Kitchen, everyone jumps into action." This enthusiasm to feed hungry people is matched at a number of places that receive food from the Food Lift. Keith describes it this way, "It's a blessing to be able to work with so many wonderful people from different churches and organizations across town."

Food Lift volunteers work throughout the year collecting food donations and delivering the food to pantries, churches and charities that feed hungry people.

We served approximately 2,000 meals in total (eat-in, take-out, limited delivery) during our March 7th, March 28th, and April 18th (Good Friday) Fish Fries. We are unique in that we do not charge - all can eat regardless of financial means. Thanks to generous donations not only from attendees but also financial partners of our committee, we were able to cover almost all of the costs – an amazing testimonial to those who believe in these events and the ministry they are providing. We had quite the menu with plenty of everything (particularly desserts). Rest assured that no one went home hungry! Live piano music, the offering of Communion elements, and a prayer table on Good Friday, were all big hits. Attendees were from all parts of our larger church "family" – congregants, friends, Weekday Ministries, Scout Troop 23, English Second Language, Dormont and Mt. Lebanon neighbors, Duplicate Bridge, Bethany Evangelical, First Presbyterian of Castle Shannon, St. Paul AME, Beulah Baptist, etc. Hospitality and fellowship were plentiful for all!

CHURCH FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Since 2018, every edition of The Window has included financial information on our Church – this edition is no different. Summarized below are the Church's 2024 actual, 2025 budgeted, and 1st quarter 2025 actual financial results.

The 2025 budget projects a deficit of over \$100,000, assuming payment in full of the Connectional Contribution (aka Apportionment). A budget with a \$100,000+ deficit was also approved in 2024. Fortunately, numerous unbudgeted and special gifts resulted in a bottom line positive for the year. Let's hope the same result occurs in 2025!

The Finance Committee would like to extend its heartfelt thanks to all whose pledges, non-pledged gifts, and other financial contributions ensure that our staff is paid, our buildings are maintained, and our ministries continue to flourish during 2025. Please keep that financial support coming!
