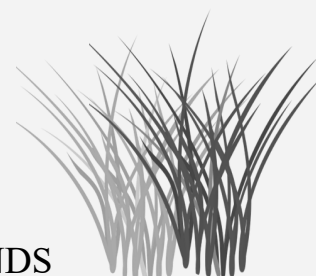

### Tampa Road Perimeter Wall – Project Update

Work continues on the Tampa Road perimeter wall. Tree trimming and grubbing are completed, and the area is now fully prepared for construction. The Board is finalizing permitting and anticipates

construction to begin soon.

The project includes installing new concrete block wall sections where the wood panels once stood, completing all stucco refinishing, and painting the wall to match the newly refreshed monument signs.

### Controlled Access & Security – Community Update

Security guards have fully returned to both the North and South Guard Houses, and resident feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. Many residents have shared how reassuring it is to be greeted by professional staff who support guests, assist residents, and focus on maintaining safety at our entrances at all times.

The Board continues to work closely with our new security provider to support their onboarding and ensure guards are fully trained on community expectations. We also appreciate the valuable insights shared by other ELWCA community Presidents.

The Board has approved a new controlled-access platform, and implementation is underway. We will share more details as we move closer to rollout. For now, the old “green button” system has been disabled, and all guest access is handled by gate guards.

Residents are encouraged to obtain barcode decals for all registered vehicles — barcodes continue to be issued at no cost.

Additionally, in partnership with Board Presidents along Sunflower Drive, the Sunflower entrance has been restored to a resident-only gate. This change has already reduced cut-through traffic.

### Gatehouse Guard Responsibilities

Our gatehouse guards play a vital role in keeping our community safe. When welcoming guests, guards are expected to:

- Professionally greet residents and visitors and assist with basic questions.
- Scan guest driver's licenses and confirm the resident or location being visited.
- Manually grant guest access now that the green button system is disabled.
- If a guest declines to show ID, request their name and destination, then allow access.
- Maintain a professional, alert, and helpful presence at all times.
- Follow uniform standards: black button-down short sleeve shirt, black BDU cargo-style pants, metal security badge, duty belt, and body camera.

### 2026 Budget Approved

The Board of Directors is pleased to announce that the 2026 Master Association budget has been approved. After reviewing projected expenses, reserves, and community needs, the Board reaffirmed its commitment to responsible fiscal management.

We are pleased to share that **there will be no increase in Master Association dues for 2026**. At a time when many communities face rising costs, this reflects our continued focus on competitive vendor management, careful expense control, and strong reserve planning — all without adding financial pressure to our homeowners.

### ELWCA Website Upgrade

Under the leadership of our Communications Director, the Board is moving forward with a full modernization of the ELWCA website. The new site will feature a more contemporary design and improved navigation, making it easier to find documents, access updates, and locate community resources. More information will be shared as we move toward launch.

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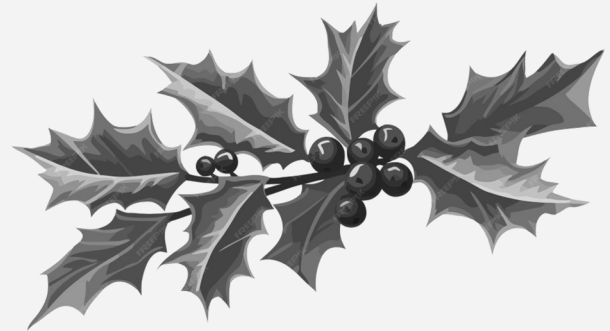

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### Speeding & Traffic Safety – Community Reminder

With recent improvements to traffic-control devices, the Board is now working with the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office to increase monitoring of speeding across the community. Residents may notice added law enforcement presence as part of this effort.

Please remember to observe posted speed limits, obey all traffic-control devices, and use extra caution near crosswalks. Together, we can maintain a safe, walkable, and bike-friendly community for everyone.

### East Lake Road Woodlands Monument Sign

The Board worked closely with the contractor to ensure the East Lake Road monument sign was completed before Thanksgiving — and we are pleased to share that it was. New sod, refreshed landscaping, updated lighting, and holiday décor are also now in place, creating a beautiful and welcoming entrance for the season.

### East Lake Road Corridor Improvements

Approximately 1,500 feet of hedges have been trimmed, along with essential tree work near the East Lake Road entrance. The old monu-

ment sign—which was in poor condition and heavily obstructed—has been replaced with a new sign that matches the standard design across ELW. The Board is also working to implement a routine maintenance schedule to ensure this area is consistently maintained.

### Climate Proxy Data

Determining what the climates have been in the past can be challenging. Actual records of temperature measurements go back a little more than 100 years. Beyond that, we must look to various aspects of the natural environment that will vary based on temperatures, precipitation levels, and other climate factors. These other aspects of the natural environment that vary with changes in climate are referred to as proxy data.

Proxy data comes in various forms, with various timescales, and with varying amounts of reliability. Some of the most common sources of proxy data include:

- Drilling ice cores in glaciers at high latitudes. Think of this as analogous to poking a straw through a milkshake. Conditions at different levels in the core provide clues to conditions at different times.

Oxygen-18 (eight protons and ten neutrons in the nucleus) atoms are slightly heavier than oxygen-16 atoms (eight protons and eight neutrons in the nucleus) because they have two additional neutrons. For this reason, it takes more energy to evaporate a water molecule containing an oxygen-18 atom.

The varying percentages of oxygen-16 and oxygen-18 atoms in the water molecules provide indications of past climates. Warmer temperatures will result in more water molecules containing oxygen-18 evaporating from the ocean, and therefore a higher percentage of oxygen-18 atoms in ice cores from glacier ice after the moisture falls as rain and freezes. There will also be lower concentrations of oxygen-18 in ocean sediment

layers.

Similarly, the hydrogen isotopes H-1 (one proton in the nucleus) and H-2 (one proton and one neutron in the nucleus, also known as deuterium) can also be used as proxy data.

- Dendrochronology is the study of tree rings. The tree rings will be thicker when climate conditions favor tree growth, which typically mean warmer and wetter conditions.
- Borehole temperatures. A borehole is a hole that is dug deep into the ground to allow measuring the temperature of the soil at various depths. The way that the temperature varies with depth can provide clues to past climates.
- Coral skeletal rings can be studied in the same way as tree rings. Coral skeletons are made primarily from calcium carbonate. One calcium carbonate molecule contains one atom of calcium, one atom of carbon, and three oxygen atoms. Since warmer temperatures encourage the evaporation of water molecules containing oxygen-18 atoms, warmer temperatures result in a larger percentage of oxygen-16 atoms in the coral structures. Warmer temperatures will also encourage faster growth rates, making the growth rings wider in warmer climates.
- Pollen grains from terrestrial plants can be found in sediment at the bottom of the ocean. Studying the pollen grains can identify the plants from which they came. The abundance and types of pollen in the ocean sediment provide indications about which types of plant life were thriving at various times, which can give us clues about what the climate was like.
- Ocean and lake sediments. The varying

percentages of oxygen isotopes in different sediment layers provides clues to past climates.

- Physical properties of the ice trapped in glaciers and polar ice packs provide clues to past climates. Varying conditions of temperature, precipitation and humidity will result in various amounts of liquid water and other contaminants trapped within the ice. The presence of these contaminants will affect physical properties such as mechanical strength and electrical conductivity.
- Some human records of events such as forest fires, precipitation amounts, and the dates during which northern harbors or covered with ice provide clues to past climates.
- The types and distributions of the insect population can provide clues to past climates.
- Dissolved carbon dioxide gas in seawater reacts with the water molecules to create carbonate ions and bicarbonate ions. These ions chemically react with dissolved calcium ions in the ocean to form calcium carbonate. Otoliths are small stones of calcium carbonate that form within the inner ears of fish. They act like the inner ears in mammals. They help fish detect sounds in the water, and help with orientation and balance. Studying the relative concentrations of different oxygen isotopes in the otoliths from fish carcasses and fossils can provide clues to past climates.

- Stay tuned for early 2026 updates about possible community gatherings and spring events

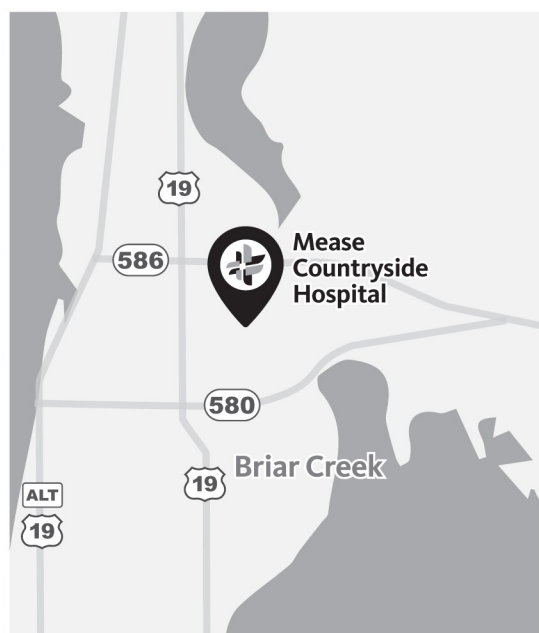

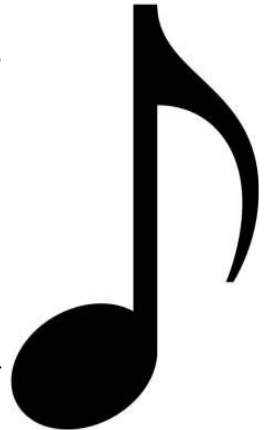
### A New Musical Group Performance Just Minutes From Your Home • Gary Williams

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## How To Host A Cookie Exchange

The cookie exchange or cookie swap tradition has been around for many years. The Christmas holiday season is a favorite time to have these parties. These parties are a lot of fun, and as a bonus you'll have lots of different cookies on hand for the holidays. Just think - bake one batch of your favorite cookie and you'll go home with many different kinds. Invite your friends, family, neighbors, church members, or community group.

- Decide how many guests you want to invite to the cookie exchange. Lots of people will ensure your guests have a variety of cookies to choose from, but too many people means too much baking. Ideally, you should plan the cookie swap for 10 to 12 people.
- Confirm how many of your invited guests will be able to attend. Let everyone (each guest) know how many cookies they need to make. Each guest will need to bring **one (1) dozen cookies** to share and sample at the cookie exchange party and **another one (1) dozen cookies** for each person (guest) attending. For example, if eight (8) people will be attending, each person will need to bring 9 dozen cookies from the same recipe.
- Avoid duplication of cookies by asking guests to RSVP and tell you about the cookies they will bring. Make sure each guest brings copies of their recipe to pass around. Since many people have food allergies, it's important they know the ingredients in the cookies at your party. And if there are family stories and especially ethnic traditions for a cookie, ask the guest to write that information on the recipe.
- Remind guests to bring a large container to take their cookie assortment home. Have extra containers and packing materials like foil, plastic wrap, and tape on hand for guests who may forget.
- Cookies to be exchanged should be wrapped well. They should be placed either on plastic plates with plastic wrap or in disposable containers that are airtight.
- During the cookie exchange, serve warm beverages such as coffee, hot chocolate, hot apple cider, or herbal tea. Don't forget to eat and sample all the delicious cookies!

## Drainage Updates • George Carollo

We have been reminded of the drainage issues along Woodlands Drive regarding the sidewalks continually holding water. This will be discussed in our upcoming drainage inspections along with solutions to remedy.

For example, on the south side of Woodlands Parkway, between Woodlands Drive and the office complex at ELW Parkway, grass and some dirt will be removed to lower the shoulder height along the road to alleviate the puddling of water and redirect it into the swales as originally designed. Over time sediment, grass clippings, etc. have built up along the road's edge, adding to the height of the grass along the shoulder. In areas where this has happened it has impeded proper drainage and caused water to sit and puddle in areas beyond the normal time frame for dispersion. This causes a hazard not only to drivers and pedestrians navigating through large puddles, but also to the roadway itself.

Repeated puddling that sits for extended periods of time causes structural harm to the road surface. Standing water causes pitting of the surface, cracking of the asphalt, and potholes. Additionally, the water can seep into the asphalt which can not only break down the binder that holds the asphalt together but can also cause the underlying base to start eroding, which in turn causes sinking and potholes. Updates will be forthcoming.

In Cluster 4, the Board is reviewing several drainage issues affecting how water flows from the sidewalks and will be working with our contractor on a long-term solution. We are also on track to complete the semi-annual drainage inspection in early December and remains committed to ensuring all drainage systems are properly maintained and functioning as intended.

## **Year-in-Review at Tampa Bay Raptor Rescue: 2025**

2025 was challenging! Until fall migration started, we largely dealt with issues that related to Hurricane Milton. This included a lot of displaced eastern screech owls. Most of the owls were raised and released, but a few came in with permanent injuries. We found sanctuaries willing to take all of them but we had to wait for the government shutdown to be over in order to begin submitting federal transfer requests. The owls came from Palm Harbor, Safety Harbor and Clearwater primarily. One Safety Harbor owl was rescued at a playground near the rock-climbing wall. When we released him, he flew to the top of the slide and went zoop! Straight down he went. He was fine. We released him again, a little farther away from the fun stuff at the playground. One screech owl was rescued from Mike Alstott's house! A ring camera recorded a young man bringing the owl to the door in the middle of the night as he had been hit by a car. The owl remains in residence. Donations for screech owls can be made via paypal on-line at [www.moccasinlakeraptorsanctuary.org](http://www.moccasinlakeraptorsanctuary.org). Even \$5 a month helps.

### **Owl Activity in East Lake Woodlands**

We received one barred owl from near Aberdeen. Although it took a long time for him to heal, we were able to get that bird back to East Lake Woodlands. We released a baby barred owl from Zephyrhills along with him as he had lost his family. Just last night I heard the barred owls outside our window "interacting", so nesting season is in gear. Great horned owls also live in East Lake Woodlands. They do some silly things too. Including getting tangled in ballfield nets and even Christmas lights as we saw last year. Please keep an eye on things on your property and call 727-798-2385 if you have an owl or bird of prey issue. We can help!

### **Aid Given to Ospreys on Egmont Key Following Hurricane Milton**

We also received a lot of red shouldered hawks, ospreys, and bald eagles. Milton did a number on Egmont Key. The Coast Guard went out to get the lighthouse light turned back on, which is very important to the ships that need to come into the port, but ospreys built a nest on it. It had to be removed along

with the babies to make the light house functional again. We went to the island with a wonderful Coast Guard crew on a boat called a metal shark. The dock at Egmont was destroyed so we had to jump off the metal shark. Or in my case, be assisted by the Coast Guard to the beach. All babies were safely retrieved and were taken to our YMCA for renesting/fostering. When arrived we found those platforms questionable due to damage from Milton. We replaced all the platforms gave the original babies and the extra babies back to the osprey parents and left them a lot of fish. It was a success.

### **Care Given to Permanent Residents**

Back at our sanctuary for permanent residents we had our challenges too. Thunder, our 30-year-old bald eagle has been in human care her entire life due to being non-visual in one eye. Unfortunately, a cataract developed on her good eye. The only option to keep her well was cataract surgery. Surgery was successful at Fetch Vet in Brandon! Thunder has had a couple of other health issues throughout the year and has been receiving excellent care at the Animal and Bird Medical Center of Palm Harbor. Penelope, our 10-year-old, is now glove trained so we exhibit a female and a male bald eagle together! One night an adult eagle crash landed into a lanai in Lansbrook. She was successfully rescued and released. A first-year eagle was hit by a car, breaking her wings but not her spirit. Her breaks were meticulously pinned at the Animal and Bird Medical Center. Her bones are healed but she lacks full wing extension so she will be placed as an ambassador after being offered to Native American tribes by USFWS, which is the normal protocol. Traveling with eagles, even back and forth to the vet is difficult, but we managed it and are grateful to all the veterinarians for their care and expertise.

### **Internship Opportunities**

Dr. Kushnir, #thenomadvet, conducted our on-site annual exams. We had Alejandra Corio from SPC assisting. A fantastic article about her internship was published in the SPC magazine. We have spots for Bright Future students and college interns so they can get experience with birds of prey and wildlife issues. 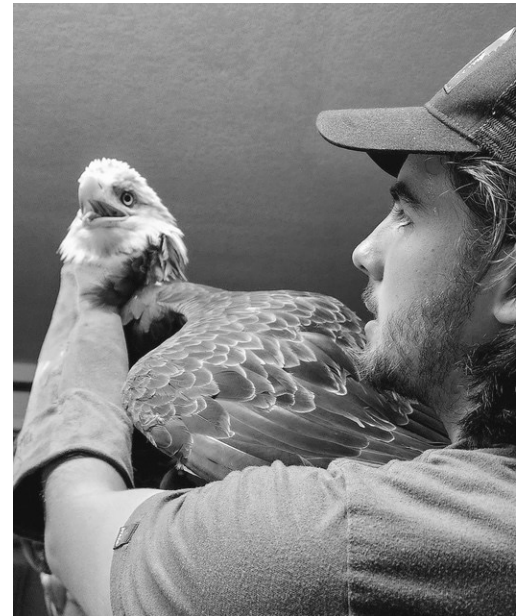

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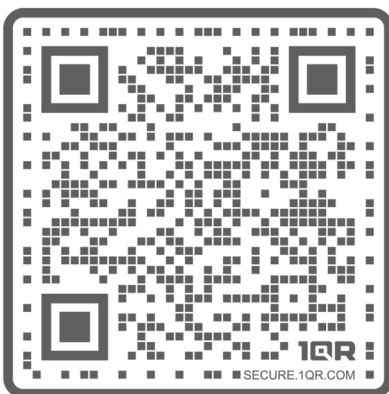

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#### Holiday Season Safety

As the holiday season approaches, East Lake Fire Rescue would like to remind our community that while this time of year is filled with celebration, it can also bring an increase in household fire risks. A few simple precautions can keep your home festive and safe.

#### Holiday Tree Safety

Whether you're bringing home a fresh-cut tree or setting up an artificial one, following these guidelines will help prevent holiday-related fires:

For live trees:

- Choose a fresh tree. Look for green needles that don't easily fall off.
- Water daily. A dry tree can become a major fire hazard.
- Keep it away from heat sources. Place trees at least three feet from fireplaces, space heaters, candles, or heat vents.
- Inspect lights. Check for frayed wires or damaged bulbs. LED lights are safer and stay cooler.
- Unplug when unattended. Turn off holiday lights before leaving home or going to sleep.

#### Discard Your Tree Promptly:

Once your holiday celebrations are over—or if your live tree becomes dry—dispose of it promptly. Dry trees ignite easily and should never be stored in a garage or placed outside against your home. Check with your waste service for curbside pickup or designated recycling locations.

#### Space Heater Safety

- Follow the 3-foot rule. Keep heaters at least three feet from anything that can burn.
  - Use only heaters that are listed (UL, ETL, etc.) and equipped with modern safety features, including automatic shutoff if the heater overheats or is tipped over.
  - Plug directly into a wall outlet. Avoid extension cords.
  - Never leave heaters running unattended. Turn them off when sleeping or leaving the room.
- Inspect units before use. Look for damaged cords or cracks.

#### Lithium-Ion Battery Safety

Lithium-ion batteries power many holiday gifts and household items—from e-bikes to smartphones—but they can pose a fire risk if damaged, overcharged, or used improperly.

- Use only manufacturer-approved chargers and batteries.
- Charge batteries on a hard, nonflammable surface.

- Do not charge overnight or unattended.
  - Stop using swollen, smoking, or damaged batteries immediately.
  - Keep batteries away from heat sources.
- Store larger batteries in well-ventilated areas.

#### Fireworks Safety

- Leave fireworks to the professionals.
  - Consumer fireworks are a major cause of holiday injuries and fires.
  - Sparklers burn extremely hot and can cause serious burns.
- Always follow safety barriers and instructions at public displays.

#### Preventing Holiday Falls

- Use sturdy ladders, not chairs or furniture.
  - Have someone hold the ladder when hanging lights or decorations.
  - Keep walkways clear of cords and decorations.
  - Wear footwear with good traction.
- Take your time—don't rush.

#### General Holiday Safety Tips

- Use flameless candles when possible.
- Stay attentive in the kitchen. Holiday cooking fires are common and preventable.
- Avoid overloading electrical outlets.
- Test your smoke alarms.
- **If You Drink, Don't Drive** Plan ahead with a designated driver, rideshare, or taxi.

## IMPORTANT UPDATE EAST LAKE LIBRARY PASSPORT SERVICES

Due to a recent federal review of the types of facilities that can offer passport services, ELCL must **suspend passport applications**, effective **December 1st**. This change affects our library uniquely because it is the only one in unincorporated Pinellas County with non-profit status. Other libraries in the region are part of a municipal, county, or city government and are not affected. The suspension of this service is a significant loss for our library in terms of revenue and customer service.
