Pastor's Perspective - New Staff Position

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the desert."
- (Isaiah 43:19)

At Prince of Peace, our "new year" begins each July 1. It's on that day that we officially begin with new people on the congregation council and boards and a newly adopted budget. I am grateful to all of you who do so much ministry at Prince of Peace. Many of you do this 'behind the scenes,' without serving on a board, a committee, or the council. However, running the ministry of the church ALSO takes a lot of people who step into these elected positions. The Congregation Council are those whom you elect to, alongside me as your pastor, care for the mission and direction of the congregation. Each new council gives us the opportunity to discern God's calling in new and different ways. Each new budget year gives us the opportunity to experience God doing a new thing through our ministry.

This year, one of these new things will be increasing our external revenue sources through expanded community engagement. Over the last couple of years, Mark Walther has worked *tirelessly* to form and steward relationships with ministry partners, space sharing partners, and plan and host events at Prince of Peace. Not wanting the tireless to become tired and most importantly, in an effort to increase staff and congregation ownership in stewarding community relationships, two years ago the council created, and the congregation elected, a new committee called the Community Engagement Committee. These folks will come alongside Mark to support, continue, and expand the work that is already being done. We hope that with many people stewarding relationships and sharing ideas, PoP's mission to Love God. Follow Jesus. Invite All. will be expanded. We also expect that these relationships will continue to result not just in ministry but in financial resources that support the continued ministry of the church.

This year, we are expanding this even further. You may have noticed or heard that included in the budget adopted at the annual meeting is \$15,000 intended for paid staff time also to attend this work. The congregation council, personnel committee, staff, and I are working on a job description and hopes/expectations for this position. There is much more to share, and there will be more to share in the coming months too! If you were at the annual meeting, you will remember that as the meeting unfolded, this new opportunity was not able to be discussed. If you have questions, please let me know, or come to the next Coffee with the Council (August 17) to learn more.

Choosing to put financial resources toward this position was a difficult decision for the council, particularly while at the same time choosing not to offer financial raises to church staff and pastor this year. The council had to balance the anxiety about our current financial position with the hope that investing in this way will have positive financial results. The decision to invest in this way was predicated on an understanding that we will reduce costs where possible (check out the Board of Finance reports to discover places where we have already found savings!). It was also made with the hope that intentional, accountable staff time will create consistency and stability for the long term that will enable the Community Engagement Committee and other volunteers to continue to grow this outreach ministry as a sustainable economic engine for the church's ministry.

Looking into the future, I estimate that in 20 years, 90% (or more) of the congregation's income will need to come from sources outside of "regular tithes and offerings." While this seems like a long time away, Prince of Peace's council is hard at work NOW joining God in this new thing. While we differ in personal perspectives about whether and how this new position might lead us toward continued and increased financial stability, we continue to be committed to working together on behalf of this congregation to live into the mission God has set out for us.

You will continue to hear much more in the coming weeks and months as we both try this new thing and continue to reduce expenses in other areas. Please always feel welcome to share your ideas, thoughts, and questions with me and council members. We may not yet have all the answers, but we will work together to discover the next new thing God is bringing us. Throughout it all, please continue to keep Prince of Peace, our ministry, and our elected council members in your prayers. May our present and future be guided by the God who always makes a way in the wilderness... and always with something new.

At Prince of Peace the Council will listen, not just spew information!

Come and visit the Council members at the table in the Fellowship Hall on the following dates after church, at 11:15:

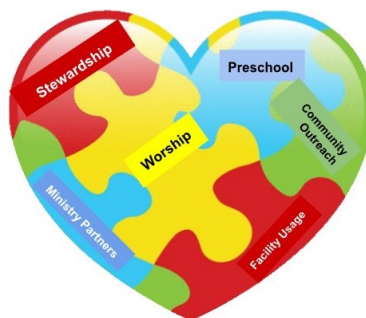

School Supplies Collection for Lutheran Social Services of Illinois

LSSI depends on the generosity of congregations in Illinois to provide backpacks and school supplies for children in their care, especially now that more families are struggling with rising food and health care costs. Prince of Peace, as a mission partner, is committed to helping the hundreds of Chicagoland children in the Foster Care and Intact Family Care programs.

Our goal will be 90+ backpacks this year! (Last year, we donated 87 backpacks)

Our collection this year will be from **July 20 to August 3** and includes:

backpacks, especially the large, sturdy ones

colored pencils

crayons—24 per box

pens—black, blue, and red

pencils

pencil sharpeners

children's markers (not permanent markers)

erasers—large, usually pink

pocket folders—solid colors

glue sticks

rulers

wide ruled notebook paper

scissors

highlighters

tissues

gift cards to Target or Walmart so that the older kids can purchase what their school and grade level require -- \$10.00 to \$20.00.



All donations must be new and unused. They can be dropped off in the bin marked “LSSI School Supplies” in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday mornings, or in the church office during weekday office hours.

You may also participate by sending a check payable to Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, or authorize a payment online, annotated “LSSI school supplies.” Your donation will be used to purchase backpacks. The checks/online donations must be received at church on or before **August 3rd**.

The collection ends **August 3rd**. Our donations will be picked up at the end of that week, to allow enough time for LSSI staff to distribute them to the children before school starts on August 18th.

Music Notes...

- Luke: 17:1 & 4

We are going to try something new this month in worship at Prince of Peace. On August 24th we will use a liturgy new to us for that one Sunday called Of the Land and Seasons. In the introduction of the leader's guide for the service it says, "Of the Land and Seasons is intended for quarterly use, once each season. ...the themes and images developed in this are those of life on the land: tending, shepherding, planting, nurturing, protecting, reaping, training. The observances affirm the sacredness of the farm, orchard, and ranch, and the holiness of the calling to tend God's garden and produce food for the world." The recommended Gospel in this service is Luke 17:1-10, an excerpt is above. Jesus talks of forgiveness: the need for us to be forgiven, and the need for us to forgive. Much can be said about how humankind has treated God's garden and the need for forgiveness, but we must also be willing to forgive those trespasses by others to move forward, as much as seven times a day! This all can be a tall order for us! The hope is this service will help us to celebrate our relationship with the land, and to each other, and give us reflection on each other as we move forward together. We will also celebrate the remaining seasons for the rest of the year: Fall, winter, and spring, each on a different date during each season. Let see how these services inspire and connect with us together beginning August 24th.

Members of Prince of Peace's Adult Choir will be participating in a special performance by Elmhurst Choral Union on Saturday August 30th at 3:00pm. "An American Civil War Memorial" composed by Dr. Michael Karasis in remembrance of the 160th anniversary of the conclusion of the Civil War will be presented at the Elmhurst Reformed Church with professional orchestra, soloists, and Elmhurst Choral Union with narration provided by Wesley Truman Daniel, great-grandson of President Harry S. Truman. A memorial Color-Guard will also be present from the Elmhurst American Legion to honor those who died during this the bloodiest conflict in American history. The grandma is laid up this month, but here is an article she's written in the past. If you need to talk to someone - reach out to a Stephen Minister!

"The Lord remembers us and will bless us" Psalm 115:12a

This month I was invited to my class reunion of something more than ten years. Some people 's enthusiasm for the big event bubbles from every pore. Others shrink in fear of not living up to this mythical bar self-placed at enormous altitudes. I'm keeping track on Facebook of crash diets, clothes purchases and new hairstyles. Many comments include reminiscences about former times when we had less weight but more energy, higher hopes but lower responsibilities, less technology but more free time. Overall we had fewer kids, husbands, pounds, bills and worries but more secrets, boyfriends, homework, parental rules and needs for new clothes.

It's interesting to view the immediate reactions when one is told to remember their days in high school. What do you think of first? Maybe you think of your feet racing toward home base. (*That one is obviously not mine.*) You could think of your legs kicking in a swimming pool. (*That is more like it!*) Your torso could be twisting and convulsing in the latest dance moves. (*I actually won a disco contest, thank you very much.*) Those arms could be wrapped around a first, or second, or third love of the week. Your cool mouth is going full steam with groovy talk about the latest 8-track from the Herman Hermits. (*You can figure out my age.*)

Yet others think of legs that ran from the law. Maybe your torso hid bruises created by lashes from a drunken father. A wider top might try to hide an unwanted pregnancy. That tired brain could feel defeated from one more multiple-choice test.

It's hard to tell about one's past. Many of us have crammed awful memories into the corners of our hearts, but after all these years, that gruesome bulk is threatening to burst. Some histories still need to be released to allow peace.

Sometimes, it is better to relive these memories with someone, but a person who is not a close friend. AH-HA! Stephen Ministry to the rescue. Do you realize that our church has trained members of the congregation who are sitting home right now waiting to get a phone call from a Stephen Leader? Do you know that even though a Stephen Minister may not have a care receiver, they still attend meetings twice a month to maintain their skills? Next year, you can look back and think of the loving support your Stephen Minister provided just by listening. We don't give advice. We don't make judgments. We just are ready to help mold that heart when you release histories. Give one of us a call. We can answer any questions. (*Well, maybe we know some answers about Stephen Ministry, not tough math ones or ones about all those buttons on remote controls.*)

PoP for Confirmation and Emerge

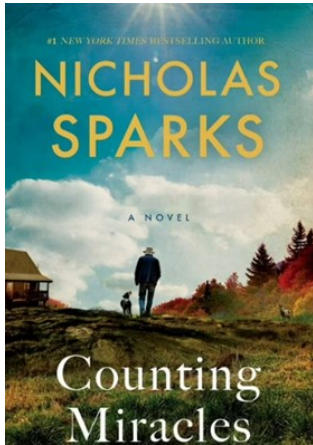

I believe when I started my position as Director of Youth Ministries, it was Pastor Erin who told me that by Year 3 I would be able to say I know how to do this job. That timeline has been spot on. The first year, I was doing the motions and having fun learning how to make connections with the kids in a different way than I had as just a member of the congregation. Year 2 I had a grasp of all the things I knew I should be doing but hadn't figured out how to do those things. Now that I have had a class of kids who have gone through the full Confirmation program, I have a solid plan on what I want to accomplish with the kids who go through our Confirmation curriculum.

I know this idea may sound obvious, but I am training kids to be members of our church. I suppose I have been more focused on Prince of Peace, little "c" church, not the general ELCA big "C" church. We (myself, Pastor Erin, and lay guides Tom Lamberti and Mary Simonis), share our upbringings and history of the Lutheran Church to establish an understanding of how the congregation got to where it is today. We teach them the stories and the words to say during worship. We teach them leadership skills through community projects that take weeks of preparation and execution. We teach them membership involvement by finding places to use their strengths in the ministries of our congregation, like teaching Sunday School or joining Tech Team, or bringing a dessert for the Lenten Event dessert competition. We offer opportunities to be part of worship services beyond just experiencing the service, by sharing musical talents on festival Sundays or reading scripture.

Kids have so many different activities to spend their time doing, and the timeless complicated "how do we get kids to show up" is also a part of this program. I tell parents, and kids, that I would rather see them when I can and be 110% present and ready to do the things than never see them at all. This flexibility and teamwork with families has been really successful. Ask our recent confirmands what their future at Prince of Peace looks like.... They will tell you that Prince of Peace is their church and future spouses better be on board with that. I know that there are still plenty of kinks and adjustments that can and will be made as each new class of Confirmation kids needs something a little different, so programming changes ever so slightly. But I am excited to have awesome high schoolers help me continue to create a bright future for our church, for both next month, and the next several years to come. God has blessed me and the congregation with amazing families who bring giggles and youthful energy to our community, and that makes this job so much fun. With only his old dog, Arlo, for company, he lives quietly, haunted by a tragic accident that took place decades before. When he hears rumors that a white deer has been spotted in the forest—a creature of legend that inspired his father and grandfather—he becomes obsessed with protecting the deer from poachers.

As these characters’ fates orbit closer together, none of them is expecting a miracle . . . but that may be exactly what is about to alter their futures forever.

On Sundays, when we gather at Prince of Peace, we do so as an act of worship (as well as to reconnect with friends). Have you ever thought about how portions of the service are individual acts of worship, many of which you can practice at home? For instance, you can read the Bible at home and sing hymns at home.

There is one act of worship we do during the service, though, that I think has a special meaning only when done in church and that is putting our gifts in the offering plate. To me, it is made more special by doing it as a community and then seeing our combined acts of worship presented to God on the altar.

The only thing is that, in the last 20 years or so, I only do that occasionally. Instead, I do the on-line giving set up to be done automatically. In fact, I have participated in promoting that as a good way to make one's offerings and I certainly don't advocate stopping doing that.

So how do we reconcile this contradiction? My proposal is to put some kind of token into the offering plate that will represent the money given online. Right now, we are planning to make laminated index card-sized statements that we give online. I had thought about using coin-type tokens but the cost of having these made is prohibitively expensive unless someone knows a less expensive way to get this done. I would love to know about it.
