Church Council Executive Board Update

Greetings Prince of Peace (PoP) members from the Church Council Executive Board! We are proud to serve you and always open to your questions and comments. After the Town Hall meeting after church on Sunday, October 12th, we want to make sure everyone is informed about current and planned council activities. Following are comments/updates on various areas discussed.

Community Engagement Staff Liaison Position

Over the past two years council has recognized the need to move beyond depending on tithes and offerings to support the work we do at PoP and beyond our doors into the community. The Community Engagement Committee was formed under the direction of Mark Walther to try and figure out what we could do to recognize needs in the community, how to address those needs and ways to create financial opportunities at the same time.

We are proud of the work Mark and his team have already done, but we needed to make sure we have plans in place to address ongoing work in the community, staff support for work volunteers cannot do and prepare PoP for the future success of our community engagement. Council made a formal commitment this past spring during budget planning to create a staff position to support the community engagement team. (Funds from monies received from the government during COVID for Employee Retention were designated to fund this position for a year.) This position works hand in hand with the Community Engagement team to ensure we are succeeding in our goal to grow the impact PoP has in the community.

After much discussion and consideration of all important areas for such a position by all of the council, prerequisites for a new Community Engagement Staff Liaison position were given to the Personnel Committee. This committee then created the job description with recommended salary and suggested metrics.

We first asked Scott Uddenberg if he was interested in this position since we already know he supports the values and work done at PoP. Scott has extensive experience in negotiations as the union rep for the Chicago Symphony Chorus which we also felt would serve us well in negotiating contracts with outside organizations interested in using PoP space.

We are very glad Scott accepted the position of Community Engagement Staff Liaison and officially began his work September 11, 2025. (This is an hourly position which Scott accepts in addition to the work he already does as the Director of Worship and Music.) The money currently budgeted to support this position is an investment in the future success in the life of PoP.

A Few Other Areas of Interest:

- Members in need of Pastoral care (a health concern, hospitalization, funeral need, or request for benevolence/emergency funds) please contact Terri Lamberti (224-456-7375) who will then assist in your request and/or refer you to Pastor Gail Heidtke during Pastor Erin's leave of absence.
- Council is having a special meeting to review, discuss and work ahead on Strategic Ministry plans prepared by Pastor Erin before her leave of absence. We are moving forward to plan our immediate future.
- Regular Council meetings occur the third Tuesday of every month at 7:00 in the CLC. These meetings are open meetings (except when an executive session is called for a vote) if you are ever interested in attending.
- Please look for a new bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall identifying current Council members so you can know who to consult with for any questions for a specific board.
- While the Sunday presenting explanations of our financial reports has already occurred once you read this article, know that you can always ask financial questions of Lisa Benson, Treasurer, or Carol Pfeifer Board of Finance Chair. Financial reports will appear quarterly in Tidings.
- The next Coffee with Council occurs on Sunday, November 16th in rooms 206 & 208 off of the Fellowship Hall. This will allow questions and answers to be heard by all in attendance...hope to see you then!

September 2025 Financial Overview

Operating Results:

YTD Income:

<u>Tithes and Offerings</u> received are \$103,716 compared to the target of \$122,971. Tithes and offerings fell short of budget by \$19.3 thousand. We no longer can rely solely on tithes and offerings for sustainability.

Preschool has taken in \$56,497.

<u>Facility Usage/Other</u> has taken in \$15,540. This includes \$7.5 thousand from our investment accounts and interest, along with \$1.6 thousand from the Pakistan Church, \$.4 thousand from the ESO, \$3.7 thousand for preschool, and other recitals. The Bulgarica school is now using preschool rooms on Saturday mornings for \$275/ week. We received \$825 in September, and the estimate to be received for the school year is \$10-\$11 thousand. The Community Engagement Committee YTD revenue is on target (bingo/events).

YTD Expenses:

<u>Executive/shared services</u> expenses are \$86,290. This includes salaries and benefits for pastor/office staff, payroll services, Realm and other office expenses. We will absorb the cost of sub pastors during Pastor's leave of absence.

Board of Property expenses of \$40,080 are higher than expected due to the fellowship hall air conditioner repair, plumbing and ejector pump in a preschool classroom, new lighting in worship center, refrigerator repair in kitchen, emergency lighting batteries, and water filter for replacement (to be installed).

<u>Preschool</u> expenses are \$45,298. This includes teacher salaries and operating expenses. Total was under budget

These are the top three categories of expenses. Further details can be discussed or shared if requested or needed.

Cash Information:


Unrestricted funds: \$276,841 includes our main checking/savings/investment accounts. This is what we use to pay current salaries and bills.

Restricted Funds: \$234,989 are funds set aside for a particular purpose because of designated giving. It also may be appointed by Congregation Council funds for a certain project or expense. Restricted monies include the \$42.3 thousand Leone fund (restricted principal \$23 thousand, earnings can be used for building maintenance), \$7.6 thousand remaining for V2020, \$170 thousand in memorial fund gifts designated either by the contributor or the Council, and the \$15 thousand designated by the Council to fund the first year of the new position.

Undesignated funds: \$167,673 include donations from memorials of \$21.1 thousand where the donor didn't restrict the use. It also includes funds received from the IRS payroll tax refunds during Covid \$146.6 thousand.

The Board of Finance is researching what the recommended cash emergency reserve we should have for a congregation of our size is.

Music Notes...

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in times of trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the seas, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult."

Psalm 46: 1-3

The Reformation stands as the defining moment in Lutheran history, marking not merely the birth of our denomination but the rediscovery of the Gospel's transformative power. When Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-Five Theses to the church door in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517, he set in motion a movement that would restore the biblical truths we cherish today.

At the heart of the Reformation lies the doctrine of justification by grace through faith alone. Luther's profound spiritual struggle led him to rediscover what Scripture had always proclaimed: we are saved not by our works, pilgrimages, or payments, but solely through God's grace received by faith in Jesus Christ. This liberating truth freed countless believers from the anxiety of never knowing whether they had done enough to merit salvation. For Lutherans, this remains our central confession and greatest gift from the Reformation.

The Reformation also restored Scripture to its rightful place as the supreme authority in matters of faith and practice. By translating the Bible into German, Luther gave ordinary people direct access to God's Word, declaring that Scripture alone, not human tradition or papal decree, should guide Christian belief. This principle of sola scriptura continues to anchor Lutheran theology, reminding us that our teachings must always be measured against biblical truth.

Furthermore, the Reformation recovered the biblical understanding of the priesthood of all believers. Luther taught that every Christian has direct access to God through Christ, without need for human mediators. This doesn't diminish the pastoral office, which Luther valued highly, but affirms that all baptized believers are called to serve God in their daily vocations, whether as parents, workers, or citizens.

As Lutherans, we celebrate the Reformation not as an end in itself, but as a return to the ancient Gospel that has always been Christianity's foundation. The Reformation's gift to us is not novelty but recovery—the rediscovery of Jesus Christ as our only hope, God's Word as our only authority, and God's grace as our only salvation.

We have a special service planned for Reformation Sunday October 26th at 9:45am.

Adult Choir will sing an anthem based on the Psalm above, Our Handbell Choir will play, our Praise Band, Crossroads will play, we will have a guest pianist, our organist, Collin, and a wonderful full brass ensemble, we'll hand out bibles to our second grade students, and we'll install our council, to do the important work our congregation has elected them to do. Always changing, always growing, with God at the center. That's Prince of Peace Lutheran Church.

Join us and see the celebration. Bring some friends. It will be a special morning to share in.

As I sit here, I am a little in awe of the date. The calendar reminds me it's three months since my stroke. I promise not to tirelessly regurgitate my hospitalization, but my stroke is often forefront in my mind particularly as I attempt to type my ideas. My former students would giggle at my efforts to type a simple sentence without errors.

On my discharge, I was warned that my emotions would be subject to change at a moment's notice. My husband sat in a corner nearly in tears since my feelings have already been known to bounce all over the place. I can be as irrational as a teenager talking to their parents as my grandsons would have to admit. (You did know I was a grandma, didn't you?) I may begin with a touch of anger that my fingers are not cooperating. This left hand of mine still disobeys my wishes. I should almost send this out without editing any of the text. I think I will send this to my daughter and make her figure it out so I don't toss my laptop across the room. (She did. I am.) Then, there is frustration as I try over and over to type or get dressed or eat without a mess that only Moe loves. Getting my arm in the correct shirt sleeve can be comical or just plain sad depending on how far into the day I am. After these repeated errors, my Type A personality has me depressed. I am not one who can dismiss these mistakes without a care. I was especially worried when doctors were still figuring out which skills I had lost forever and which were simply temporarily gone. My hopes soared when I started making laps around the nurses' station, but the exhaustion quickly brought me back to reality. My whole family was confused as we were trying to find the cause of the stroke, and even the bubble test did not provide any answers we had been counting on. My emotions are as strong and numerous as an Inside Out 3 cast would be.

Stephen's Ministers are specifically trained to be attuned to the myriad of emotions we all feel. They are able to help you peel back the layers to see how all of our feelings interweave with each other. While a lot of these feelings were not happy or enjoyable, they were simply the process of healing. Stephen's Ministers are always that listening ear as you progress on your healing journey. I'm sure it does but the biggest reasons probably have to do with they are more likely to keep getting your donation because you don't have to remember to make the next one or even be thinking about it. There are probably also donors who give more than intended because they never get around to turning the automatic donations off despite planning to (you're welcome Special Olympics).

I am hoping this will not only give on-line givers a way to participate in the offering but a practical way for attendees to see how many people really support the church and encourage a few more people to become on-line givers. As I have shared before, my teaching philosophy and goals for the confirmation program stem very closely from my own confirmation curriculum here at Prince of Peace. Relationships with adults as lay leaders that have become family, musical offerings during worship, bringing friends or siblings' significant others to church, are just a few of the key elements that have stayed with me into adult-ish hood and as a church leader.

Another major element was the requirements/expectations of filling certain roles within the worship service. Very often I chose the musical pathway - kids' chimes, vocal duets and trios, singing with choir. But the other roles I played were reading scripture passages, ushering, and serving communion. This ultimately led to my interest in acting as assisting minister on a Youth Appreciation Sunday once I got to high school. But the steps I want to focus on for the time being are the roles of ushering and serving communion.

In October, this was the first time that kids stepped into these very important roles within the worship service. As the lead acting staff member in this coordination, I was surprised to find the number of spinning plates that were involved in order to integrate the confirmation kids into these roles. I was also surprised to find the hesitancy and uncertainty to embrace the kids brave enough to be my guinea pigs and step into these roles in the first weeks.

Any time kids try something new for the first time, the execution is a little messy. And let's face it, anytime anyone of any age tries something new for the first time, the execution can be completely and totally messy. This is where we can offer grace, understanding, and share experiences with the kids - not block them out and take over to make sure it's correct.

Now I have lots of fabulous adults who can be excellent teachers for our kids. And I have fabulous high school kids who can be leaders for the younger kids as well. Jesus insisted the children come to Him and be part of the conversation. As we continue to embrace several youth with the privilege and responsibility in acting in these roles in worship, it is a wonderful opportunity for the adults to create another way that our congregation can grow young.
