Pastor's Perspective—Generosity, Blessing, Grace

[Jesus said] I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved and will come in and go out and find pasture. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. – John 10:9,10b-11

As spring blossoms around us in the world, we experience God's invitation to live in this moment, full of abundant life. Notice the sights, smells, sounds, and even the feeling of the air (or the rain!) around you. Each of these are invitations to delight in the blessings of God's grace.

We call God's generosity **blessing** when we receive good things in our lives – like enough food, shelter, positive relationships, and happiness. God blesses us because of who God is, not because of who we are or what we do. As with the gifts of spring, God provides goodness in our lives without requiring that we do anything.

We call God's generosity **grace** when we receive good things that we don't deserve – like forgiveness for hurting someone, or *more than enough* food or money or anything else, or children or friends who take care of us. God gives us grace because of who God is, not because of who we are or what we do. God provides grace in our lives without requiring that we do anything.

And also...

God created each of us in God's image and likeness. That means that God created us to be 'like' God – generous, offering abundant life, blessing others and filled with grace. When we respond to God's generosity with thankfulness and generosity, we live into who God created us to be. When we share God's blessings with others, we live into the image of God in us. When we offer grace to other people (and remember, by definition, that means offering that which other people don't deserve!), we manifest God's self in us! Giving grace opens space within us to receive even more grace.

In the next couple of months, we at Prince of Peace will be seriously contending with how to best steward the gifts with which God has blessed us – as a congregation, with finances, staff, a building, ministries that are dear to us and the ministries God is calling us to next. Our congregation will have major decisions to make at the annual congregation meeting in June. This shows up most obviously in how we choose to share these blessings through how we fund our budget. As Jesus came to give abundant life, our role is to *start with* 'what is God calling us to do in this moment?' and *then* figure out how our funding model (budget) fits with that.

You have already been invited to be a part of this conversation through the cottage meetings that happened earlier this year. This month, the congregation council will work with those notes, your pastor's and leaders' visions, the anticipated income from pledging, and LOTS of prayer to lay out our vision of how God is calling us to minister in this moment, for the next year, and beyond. We will share these ideas and understandings through the annual report, coffee with council, the congregation meeting, and anywhere else someone asks us about it. So please, ask!

Also, pray. Consider how you want to be a part of the next steps on this journey. Consider the places in which your life is abundant. Consider how you want to bless Prince of Peace's ministry through sharing how God has blessed you – with your abilities, ideas, hopes, attendance, and finances. Jesus came that we might have abundant life and share it too! May God continue to bless you and our shared ministry at Prince of Peace so that we might share abundant life with others.

Prince of Peace is excited to be partnering with the Appalachia Service Project for a summer mission trip! We are sending 13 volunteers (5 youth, 2 young adults, and 6 adults) to spend a week of their summer making homes warmer, safer, and drier. Appalachia Service Project (ASP) envisions the eradication of substandard housing in Central Appalachia and the transformation of everyone who comes in contact with this ministry.

Mission Trip participants have covered most of the program fee but are seeking support to cover additional expenses for transportation, food, and supplies. Our first fundraiser will be an envelope fundraiser that will kick off on April 19th! Simply select a numbered envelope of your choice and then return it to church with a donation that matches the number on the envelope. For example, envelope 1 is a \$1 donation, envelope 15 is a \$15 donation, and so forth.

Our next fundraiser will be a flamingo fundraiser coming in May! Supporters can place an order to have one or more of their friends "flamingo flocked." When an order is placed, a flock of lawn flamingos will appear on your friends' lawns in the night, where they will roost for the day, before being moved to the next location. Board of Stewardship Online Giving

There are many benefits of on-line giving both for the giver and the church:

- The donations automatically take place on a schedule, so they are predictable and don't require someone to remember to give nor be present in person.
- They make the recordkeeping much easier.
- The giver can make changes online at any time including making additional donations (hint)
- Online gifts save the cost of buying donation envelopes for those donors.
- Online gifts put less of a burden on volunteers such as counters as well as staff.

However, there are some drawbacks to on-line giving. For the purposes of this article, I am going to concentrate on the implications for in-person worship. The offerings part of the service is its own unique worship activity. Those of us who give on-line aren't well represented in this act of worship. The offering plates look almost empty as they get passed around and placed on the altar which can discourage participation in the offering for occasional attendees and visitors. Myself, I try to remember to bring a quarter to have something to put in the plate.

The Board of Stewardship is ready to implement a way for on-line givers to participate in the offering; cards to put in the plate. We are preparing to implement the cards but have a few details to work out. The basic plan is to have the cards ready in the slots in the pews where you might find pencils, visitor forms, Stephens Ministry information cards, etc. Participants in on-line giving would take a card and place it in the plate before passing the plate on. The biggest issue to address is getting the cards back in the slots for the next service. This is where it would help a lot to have some volunteers join the two members of the Board of Stewardship to work on this task. There is a lot of flexibility since it can be done anytime from Sunday afternoon to an hour before the next service. Music Notes...

"Go ye therefore and teach all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen." - **Matthew 28: 19-20**

The Easter season in the church year lasts through Pentecost and is 50 days long. It is a season I find I don't often reflect on. On a lark I asked AI about this period, I must say the response surprised me. It had some insightful things to offer.

It said, the arc of the Jesus story is striking at this point. It moves from death to resurrection to transformation — not just of a single person, but of a community. Easter represents a dramatic reversal; Pentecost is what happens when people try to live inside that reversal. The 50 days between them are almost like a held breath. I can relate to that thought. This is a period when we do a number of community activities, like Affirmation of Baptism, Graduations, family gathering, congregational meetings and such.

Pentecost fascinates me because it's where the personal becomes communal. The disciples go from hiding behind locked doors to speaking publicly in languages they didn't know. Whatever you make of the theology, that's a profound image of fear becoming courage, and private belief becoming outward action.

The season also has a beautiful structure: joy mixed with uncertainty. Even after Easter, the disciples are confused, grieving, doubting. The risen Jesus keeps showing up unexpectedly — on a beach, on a road to Emmaus, in a locked room. Pentecost feels like the moment the community finally stops waiting and starts moving.

We have much to learn culturally and spiritually from this portion of the gospel story of Jesus. When we think about it, people can be inspired by this arc of the story, even across traditions, the pattern it traces loss, unexpected renewal, then the challenge of sustaining that renewal in community with others. That's a deeply human rhythm, not just a religious one. Spend some time reflecting on the Gospel stories over these 50 days. See what draws and inspires you this year. Approach it from faith, curiosity, or even something else.

Many musical and study opportunities still exist in these remaining weeks of the ministry season. Join the community. Be a part of the coming out party.

Reflections on the Values and Mission of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

What Does it Mean to Bear Witness?

One of the ELCA core values is “Dignity, Compassion and Justice.” Specifically, “Every person is created in the image of God and deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. Following the example of Jesus, we seek to care for others with compassion and to work for justice. We stand for human rights and strive to protect the well-being and dignity of all people.”

On our behalf, the ELCA is carrying out the Gospel message around the world in providing missionaries and in its aid and advocacy programs. It provides resources to individuals and congregations that can help us choose actions that carry out Jesus’s commandment to love our neighbor:

On September 11, 2019, Mary Campbell, an ELCA Program Director, spoke to us about the AMMPARO program— “Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities”. She told us there were children in our area who needed our involvement, especially for protection and advocacy. We followed her advice on how to find those children; we learned about the young men at Viator House of Hospitality who entered the U.S. as children seeking asylum. Our relationship with VHH has grown, and we are a Faith Community Partner with them. We support them by providing needed items, and they are a beneficiary of our Lenten dessert competitions.

During the ELCA 2025 Churchwide Assembly, a new social statement was approved. It is titled “Faith and Civic Life: Seeking the Well-being of All.” Article 3 states that “God intends that humans should use their knowledge, wisdom, and power to foster the common good. When that is done by institutions through policies and regulations, or by individuals in acts of caring, humans are fulfilling their vocation to serve God’s activity in the world.”

The Spring 2026 edition of *Living Lutheran* magazine included an article by Kristin Johnston Largen titled “Bearing Witness: Put your body where love is needed”. She is the president of Wartburg Theological Seminary, and she reminds us that we received the gift of the Holy Spirit in our baptism. We are expected to “serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.”

Being a faithful witness includes sharing the good news of God’s forgiveness and the power of the Gospel to bring hope to the world. She implores us to “Lift up your voice, open your ears, share your heart and reach out your hands.”

You can be a faithful witness by thinking about which population needs your voice, your hands, your compassion, your financial support. Who are you concerned about? Whose human rights are being violated? Who does not feel welcome or safe in the U.S.? Who is not being treated with dignity and respect?

Then, consider what you can do about it, and let your faith guide you to action.

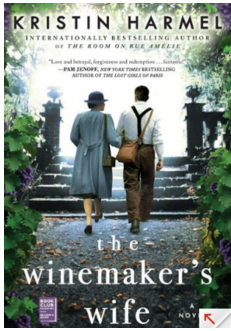
